



There are other writers and there is Anne McCaffrey. The two categories are possibly of equal force and moment. On the other hand, perhaps Anne has the edge.

I met her first at one of the Milford Science Fiction Conferences that week-long gathering of sf writers which took place every summer at that time up at Milford, Pennsylvania, under the auspices of Damon Knight and Kate Wilhelm. Later, Anne was Secretary-Treasurer of Science Fiction Writers of America during my first term in office. Note that she was both Secretary and Treasurer at once. Nowadays, SFWA has a Secretary plus an Executive Secretary, plus a Treasurer. Again, the former and the latter arrangements may be essentially equal in activity and effectiveness. On the other hand, perhaps Anne had the edge.

Of course, those were just her official duties. Her unofficial duties encompassed running a cranky mimeograph and publishing the SFWA Forum, acting as unofficial SFWA representative in the New York area, being useful to other and newer writers, and in general handling all the extra and unusual problems that couldn't be delagated to anyone else.

In addition she was running a house, raising two sons and a daughter and—of course—writing. All this she got into about twenty two hours out of the day. It was rumored that she slept as much as two hours out of the twenty four, but that might be an exaggeration.

From all this came, first Restoree, in 1954, followed by Decision at Doona, The Ship Who Sang, To Ride Pegasus—to say nothing of the Dragonflight and Dragonquest, those two soaring books about the dragonriders of Pern. Then there were a couple of books edited by Anne in 1970 and 1973, respectively, Cooking Out of This World—an sf cookbook to which sf authors contributed their favorite recipes—and Alcheme and Academe, which delivered exactly what the title promised. Also three gothic novels—eleven books in all to date, including one Hugo and one Nebula winner within their pages.

Currently, she lives in Ireland, in the neighborhood of Dublin, a tall, green-eyed, silver-haired author, with natural warmth and enthusiasm sufficient to melt all the icebergs in the North Atlantic Drift; though, naturally, I believe she is far too responsible a person to do so. Experimental data has already established that no more than one micro-anne is safely indicated for a gathering of twenty to fifty people, even if these happen to be of the sf persuasion; and Anne, herself, of course, has this in mind at all times.

At the moment she is working, as we dragoniacs are happy to learn, on White Dragon, the third of the books about the dragon-riders and Pern. When not writing she is busy with a number of other things. For one, she keeps and ride s her own horse—a heavy hunter. Undoubtedly, from time to time, she also sings a bit. She studied voice production for nine years before turning to the stage direction of opera. Later, she handled the production and stage direction for the premier in Wilmington of Carl Orff's Ludus de Nato Infante Mirificus, as some reading this may already know. She has not had much time for that sort of work in later years—which would be a sad loss to the theater if it were not for the gain it signals to literature in general and sf in particular.

But her voice remains with her. I will never forget one Saturday night at Milford, when I sat in a straight chair less than six feet from her when she was singing. It is a remarkable experience to sit less than six feet from an operatically trained voice, while it is in action. A number of occasions have produced fond memories among sf people who remember Anne's singing; and her duets with Isaac Asimov have, on good report, made angels weep.

The Ghost of Boskones Past

This article should really be titled The Hosts of Boskone, since Boskones divide themselves into four groups, depending on their sponsors: The Strangers Club, BOSFS, early NESFA, and late NESFA.



The Strangers Club was an early Boston Fan group with no Boston residents. The club was organized in February 1940. The same group founded the NFFF in April 1940 and put on the first Boskone in February 1941. The mind boggles at what might have followed next had World War II not disrupted the club. An attempt was made to continue the by now 'traditional' conventions after the war, but it seems to have fizzled away. The first Boskone was a small, informal gathering which mostly discussed NFFF business. Discussing NFFF business naturally became an instant ancient and honorable Boskone tradition. The second had a formal program, complete with a dramatic presentation and an auction. The third featured an appearance by the legendary Claude Lawrence Degler.

The next cycle of Boskones began when Dave Vanderwerf was energetic enough to feel that there should be a Boston convention and crazy enough to run the first one. This cycle was sponsored by the Boston Science Fiction Society (BOSFS) and they were to be held twice a year. After Boskone II it was decided that once a year was sufficient. Erwin Strauss (also known as Filthy Pierre), the Chairman of Boskone III (and also known as the compiler of the Strauss Index), stuck to the old schedule and sponsored Boskone TII himself. As a result, there are former BOSFS members who will dispute the legitimacy of both Boskone III and Erwin Strauss.

The Skylark Award was conceived by the Boskone I committee as a memorial to E.E. Smith, but it was not awarded until Boskone II. Over the years it has come to

symbolize both professional excellence and the friendly encouragement of fan groups.

Skylark Award

The Skylark is the annual award given by the New England Science Fiction Association, Inc., in honor of the late E.E. 'Doc' Smith. The award was first conceived by the committee of Boskone I, in September of 1965, when they were informed of the death of the man whose writing inspired the name of the convention.

The award is given to the person who, in the opinion of the Association, has contributed significantly to science fiction, both through work in the field and by exemplifying the qualities which made 'Doc' so well-loved by all who knew him. Previous recipients were:

The award is in the form of a lens mounted on a wooden base, with an inscribed brass plaque. The name and form of the award commemorate the two classic series by E.E. Smith, The Skylark Series and the Lensmen series.



Science Fiction Story Contest

RULES

- 1. The contest is open to all amateur writers who are residents of New England or members of the New England Science Fiction Association. An amateur is defined as someone who has never sold a work of fiction.
- Stories must be the original work of the person entering them, must be less than 7,500 words long, and must fall into the category of science fiction or fantasy.
- An entry fee of 50¢ per story will be charged to defray expenses of the contest.
- 4. Stories must be typed in black, double spaced, on one side of $8\frac{1}{2}$ x ll white paper. Title of the story should appear at the center top of the first page, and the top left corner of each subsequent page. Writer's name should NOT appear on the manuscript, but should appear on a separate cover sheet along with the writer's address and the title of the story. Manuscripts will be given an entry number on receipt, and will be identified by this until final judging is complete.
- 5. Although all reasonable precautions will be taken to prevent loss of manuscripts while in our hands, NESFA cannot be responsible for such losses. For your own protection, keep a copy of your manuscript.
- 6. Each manuscript must be accompanied by a self addressed, stamped, envelope for its return.
- Entries should be mailed to NESFA, Box G, MIT Branch P.O., Cambridge, Ma. 02139, and must be postmarked prior to midnight, October 31, 1975.



- 8. Results of the contest will be announced at the Boskone Science Fiction Convention to be held at the Sheraton Boston Hotel on March 5-7, 1976. The winner will be awarded a plaque and an inscribed book.
- All Manuscripts will be returned to the authors during March 1976. All rights to the stories remain with the authors.
- 10. Any entry that does not conform to these rules will be returned to the author and the entry fee will be refunded. In all cases the decision of the judges will be final.







PHOTOGRAPHING ARTWORK

If you wish to photograph any of the artwork, you must first sign a statement affirming that any photographs you take are for your personal use and will not be sold, reproduced, publicly displayed, or otherwise distributed, without the written permission of the artist. A few artists have requested that no pictures whatsoever be taken of their artwork (due to copyright restrictions, etc.) and their names are listed on this statement. Please ask for a copy at the Art Show desk.

BIDDING ON ARTWORK

Most of the artwork in the Art Show is for sale. The bid sheet attached to each piece will tell you whether it is not for sale (NFS), or whether it will be sold by auction or by written bid.

Auction artwork is marked for auction on either Saturday (at 4 PM) or Sunday (at 12 noon). The auctions are one hour long and will be held as part of the main program in the Commonwealth Room. Contrary to the usual auction practice, the winning bidder will not pick up and pay for his artwork at the auction; he will simply sign an acknowledgement of his bid and will pick up his artwork later. (See PICK UP AND PAY, below.) This is being done for three reasons: 1) it allows the artwork to remain on view and be voted on all day Saturday.

2) It means that the art buyer has to go through the hassle of paying only once for all of his artwork. 3) It eliminates the security problem of people carrying their auction-bought artwork in and out of the Art Show.

Written Bid artwork may be bid on at any time by
writing your name and bid on the bid sheet. All bids
must be in even dollar amounts. This artwork will be
sold to the person with the highest bid on the bid sheet
at 2 PM Sunday. Artwork marked 'Written Bid' will not
be auctioned. The Art Show chairman will simply circle
each high bid at 2 PM on Sunday and the artwork will be
available for pickup by the purchaser any time after that.

PICK UP AND PAY

The Art Show will be open for art buyers to pick up and pay for their artwork from 2 PM to 5 PM on Sunday. All your purchased artwork, whether bought at auction or by written bid, must be picked up and paid for during this time. If someone






