## **Day Memberships**

These cost £15.00 a day on Friday, Saturday & Sunday, £10.00 on Monday. They're valid until 10:00 on the day after issue.

## Badges

Please wear your badge at all times. We reserve the right not to replace lost badges, and to make a charge for replacement. Remember, your badge is your only proof that you are a member of the convention.

## No Glass In The Pool Area!

#### Don't take any glass into the pool area!

"Why not?" you may ask (we like these rhetorical questions!).

Quite simple, really: if broken glass gets into the pool, the hotel will have to drain it. They can't do this over Easter, and they can't let people use it with broken glass in it. The swimming pool would be shut. We'd get a big bill. The perpetrator would be very unpopular, but that's all right because they wouldn't be at the convention anymore. We're not joking. There will be plastic glasses available, put your drinks in those. Encourage others to do so, report any glasses, attended or unattended, to hotel or convention staff, and if you forget, don't hassle those who remind you. So, remember, no glass in the pool area.

#### **Weapons Policy**

No real weapons may be carried under any circumstance. No realistic replica weapons except as part of a Masquerade costume. No projectile weapons of any kind. The Chief Steward, Gary Stratmann, has the final decision on what constitutes a weapon, and he, his deputies or the committee may confiscate anything, at any time, for any reason.

### Awards

There will be ballot boxes at Registration for the **BSFA Awards** and for the **Doc Weir Award**.

### **Dealers Room**

The Dealers Room is in the Royal Annex on the Third Level This is open as follows Friday 14:00 - 18:00, Saturday 10:00 - 18:00, Sunday 10:00 - 18:00, Monday 10:00 - 14:00. You cannot take food or drink into the Dealers Room unless you are a dealer. There will be signing sessions in the Royal Annex each day at 17:00, check the newsletter for names of authors. There will be a comics signing on Saturday at 12:00. If you're an author and you'd like to take part in a signing session, please let us know.

#### Art Show

The Art Show is in the Ascot Room at the back of the hotel on the Ground Level and will be open: Saturday 10:00 - 18:00, Sunday 10:00 - 14:00. The Art Show shuts two hours before the Art Auction at 16:00 on Sunday. The Art Auction is also being held in the Ascot Room. The Art Show will not reopen after that time

### Con Desks

Some of these will be in the **Royal Annex**, some in the **County Annex**. Please see **Tim Illingworth** in **Ops** if you want to set up a con desk. We cannot secure con desks.

#### **Book Auction**

If you have books to be auctioned, please give them to Ops, clearly labelled with the name of the seller and where the proceeds should go (the seller, charity, elsewhere). The con will take a 10% commission for non-charity items.

### Profits

*Evolution* is a non-profit making organisation. Any profits remaining after the convention settles its accounts will be distributed amongst a number of fannish and/or charitable good causes, one of which will be **Intermediate Technology**. Intermediate Technology exists to raise funds for appropriate technology in developing countries

## **Smoking Policy**

We strongly discourage smoking in the programme areas. If you must smoke there will be a smoking section in the **County Room**. Only **Programme participants and Tech crew** may smoke in the **Windsor** and **Richmond** rooms. Only dealers may smoke in the **Dealers Room**. There is no smoking in the **Art Show**. In workshop and syndicate rooms, filking sessions and costuming programme, **smoking is at the discretion of the organiser**. As it's also a food service area, the **Connaught & Belvedere** is a **non-smoking bar**, the **Polo** will be a **smoking bar**.

#### **Posters And Signs**

We don't want to damage the fabric of the hotel. Posters and signs may be fixed to Glass, Wood and Metal only using BluTac, no drawing pins, but never ever to wallpaper! Please don't obscure the hotel or the convention's signage - the hotel layout is quite complicated and we're worried about losing people in these endless corridors if the signs are obscured. And don't stick things to the wallpaper.

## HOTEL INFORMATION

## **Hotel Layout**

The layout of the hotel is quite complicated, but we've done our best to signpost it for you. In the Lobby, where Registration is, you are on the Ground Level. Reception is on your left as you're facing in from the door. The stairs in front of you lead up, past the Newsroom on the Second Level to the Programme Rooms on the Third Level. The Pool Area is the place that you don't take glasses into (have we said this enough, yet?)

## **Pool Area And Health Club**

This is free for residents of the hotel. So if you've got a room, splash about to your heart's content. Oh yes, did we mention that you don't take glasses into the pool area?

## **Hotel Food And Drink**

Convention food & drink will be served in the Connaught & Belvedere room on the Third Level. Food will be served between 11:00 and 22:00. The convention bar will remain open until at least 02:00, and later if there's demand. There are two other bars in the hotel, the Polo Bar with those interesting seats and The Drawing Room. The Brasserie is more expensive than the Connaught & Belvedere, and Henley's Restaurant is more expensive still. Both restaurants will do an à la carte menu as well. The Brasserie is open from 11:30 to 23:30, Henley's Restaurant is open from 18:30 to 21:30 for dinner. Breakfast will be served between 7:00 and 11:00. The hotel will check breakfasts against room keys, but you may buy breakfast if you are not staying in the hotel.

## Corkage

Corkage rates are available; if you wish to bring food and drink in from outside please see Ops to arrange this. WARNING: Remember hotels make money by selling accommodation, food and drink. Please do not attempt to bypass this procedure or enter into competition with them. The convention will not support you in the event that you get caught.

## **Room Payment**

When you check in the hotel will ask for a credit card impression or cash in advance. Remember that you can provide credit card details, but still pay in cash.

## **PROGRAMME INFORMATION**

## **Evolutionary Themes**

Our main theme is how things evolve and change, with exploration of the past, the present and the future. We'll be spending time looking at British SF, with our "A Very British Genre" series - this is based on the book written by one of our guests, Paul Kincaid, and published last year by the British Science Fiction Association. In five linked panels we'll be exploring the history of British SF from its earliest days.

## Workshops

There will be an extensive workshop programme of massage, belly dancing, Victorian gadgets, jewellery, KenJo games, and basic tech. These are limited in numbers so please sign up as soon as possible in Ops. If you turn up at the Workshop without having signed up in advance and there are no places, tough. If you do sign up, and later change your mind, please let Ops know this as well.

## Costuming

The costuming programme stream takes place on the **Fourth Level** in the **Wentworth room**. As well as what's shown in the programme, there will also be videos of earlier masquerades,

sewing circles and generally busy fun activities. This is open to everyone with an interest in costuming or masquerades, and they're always interested in new blood (there are the sacrifices to take care of, after all...).

#### Masquerade

If you want to take part in the Masquerade, you must tell Ops or the Masquerade organisers in the Wentworth room as soon as possible. Make sure to discuss any special tech or audio requirements with the Masquerade organisers in advance. The masquerade organisers are Alice Lawson and Krystyna Oborn.

#### Writer's Surgery

## **LOCAL INFORMATION**

#### Local Shops (And Not So Local)

There is a small shop in the hotel for emergency supplies of chocolate, souvenirs and the like. Near to the hotel, there are three reasonably nearby shopping centres. Firstly, you can walk to the village of Harlington in a few minutes. It has a selection of small shops, including newsagents, a couple of takeaways, a pharmacy and the like. Further away, but accessible by bus or car (about five minutes away) is Hayes itself. This is a typical, but small, British high street, with newsagents, small general stores and so on. The main supermarket is on the ring road around the town. Finally there's Heathrow Airport itself. We don't recommend this, as Heathrow can be quite busy and expensive, but it is open early and late but not 24 hours. Finally, if you were born to shop, trains run from Hayes & Harlington Station to Windsor, Reading and Central London (for Oxford St and Charing Cross Rd). Windsor's a bit touristy, Reading's got all the usual big stores, Oxford St needs no introduction and Charing Cross Rd is a bibliophile's mecca.

#### Pharmacy

The pharmacy in Harlington will be open on Saturday. The pharmacy in Heathrow Terminal 2 will be open between 07:00 and 21:00 every day.

#### **Cash** Machines

The nearest cash machines that we know of are in Hayes.

#### Churches

The nearest churches are; RC, Immaculate Heart of Mary, Botwell Lane, Hayes 0181 573 2065; CoE, St Anselm, 101 Nield Rd, Hayes 0181 573 0958.

#### **Days Out**

An interesting, if expensive, day out is a trip to the new LegoLand at Windsor Safari Park, which opened last weekend. It's £15 for adults, £12 for children.

The beers named are the hand pumped beers available, and the 'Star Rating', from 1 to 5 is a personal view of the standard of the beer. All views expressed in this guide are those of the reviewer and will probably not be those of a lot of other drinkers...

The Crown, Sipson Road (A408), Sipson

- Open 11-11 (Mon-Sat) 12-3, 7-10:30 (Sun). Food 12-2 (Mon-Sat) bar snacks
- Chadwick's Finest; Courage Best; (\*\*\*)
- Smallish village local, recently refurbished into a pleasant no frills pub.
- The Office, Bath Road (A4)
  - Open 11-11(Mon-Sat) 12-10:30 (Sun). Food 12-9:30 (Mon-Sat) 1-4 (Sun)
  - Courage Best; Marston's Pedigree; (\*\*\*\*)
  - Friendly, but noisy pub opposite the Trust House hotel. Beware the Friday night karaoke.

The Pheasant, West End Lane, Harlington

• Open 11-11 (Mon-Sat) 12-10:30 (Sun) (extensions till 12:00 midnight Easter Sat and Mon). Food all day, plus restaurant at rear open in the evening.

- Chadwick's Finest; Courage Best; (\*\*\*)
- Busy yet friendly food oriented pub. The closest pub to the hotel, has its own charity well and a very strangely shaped restaurant at the back.

The Red Lion, High Street (A437), Harlington.

- Open 11-3, 5-11 (10:30 Sun). Food 12-2, 5:30-8 (Mon-Fri)
- John Smith's Bitter (occasionally); (\*\*)
- Small basic local pub. Large screen TV for Football matches.

The Three Magpies, Bath Road (A4)

- Open 11-11(Mon-Sat) 12-10:30(Sun); food all day (8:00am breakfast)
- Theakston's XB, Best Bitter; John Smith's Bitter; Courage Best; (\*\*\*\*)
- Comfortably refurbished, food oriented pub on the A4. Popular with taxi drivers.
- The Wheatsheaf, High Street (A437), Harlington
  - Open 11-3, 5-11 (10:30 Sun). Food 12-2, 5-8 (Mon-Sat)
  - Courage Best; Webster's Yorkshire Bitter; (\*\*\*)
  - Friendly village local, don't be put off by its appearance.

The White Hart, High Street (A437), Harlington

- Open 11-11 (10:30 Sun). Food 11-9:30 (Mon-Sat) 12-3, 5-9 (Sun)
- Fullers Cheswick Bitter, London Pride, ESB, London Porter; (\*\*\*\*\*)

• Lively, sometimes noisy, very popular pub. Definitely worth the walk.

The White Hart, Bath Road (A4)

- Open 11-11 (10:30 Sun). Food all day
- Courage Best; Theakston,s XB, Best Bitter; (\*\*\*)
- Large roadside pub with "Conservatory overlooking Flight Path".

The William IV, Harmondsworth Lane, (off A408), Sipson

- Open 11-3 5-11(Mon-Fri) 11-11 (Sat) 12-10:30 (Sun) Food 12-2, 5-8
- Bass; Webster's Green Label; Courage Best; (\*\*\*\*\*)
- Very pleasant 16th century pub just off the main road. Watch your head on the door to the car park

## **A Brief History of Food**

#### being an incomplete guide to food and restaurants near the Radisson...

Since this is an airport hotel on the main A4, the options for food within reasonable distance of the hotel break down into the following:

The Radisson Edwardian. Every time I've eaten there it has either been a buffet put on by a computer company, or a "banquet" put on at the end of a company meeting so I can't tell you what the normal restaurant food is like. On the other hand it *is* local!

**A** Pub. There are a number of pubs, some in walking distance, and many more a short taxi or car ride away. A list of the ones recommended or avoided by the Radisson's concierge are given below.

Fast Food. Depending on how far you like to walk, there are only a few places within walking distance of the hotel. Those that I could find are listed below; if you find others please let the newsletter know!

A Restaurant (other than one in a hotel or pub). As far as I could determine by driving around and around the area, there are none within easy walking distance of the hotel. A list of recommended places slightly further from the hotel is given below.

#### Pubs

The Five Bells Harmondsworth Village This one was particularly recommended by one of the porters at the Radisson, especially for the Irish bitter. Same directions as for the King William below, but once you reach the King William turn left and go down a country lane and it is on the first road on the right.

The Ostrich Colnbrook 0753 682628. This is described as a quintessential old English pub and mutters of "Dick Turpin" were also to be heard. Recommended.

**The Pheasant** West End Lane 0181 759 9685. The pub has good beer and good pub food and there's a restaurant attached which has had several good reviews. Walking distance from the hotel. Go out of the front of the hotel, turn left onto the main road, take the first turn on the left (which has a signpost for The Pheasant), and it's about 5-10 mins walk. I've eaten at the pub (not the restaurant) several times and the food was always good (for pub food).

The Plough Sipson Road 0181 759 1938. Out of the hotel, turn right onto Bath Road and right at the lights towards Sipson. At first you will think you're on the wrong road since it all seems either residential or empty land but then you'll pass the Crown pub on the right and the Plough is a bit further down on the right It is probably not walkable. The lunch there is particularly recommended.

The Red Lion High St. Harlington 0181 759 7514. Out of the hotel, turn left onto Bath Road and left at the lights. About ½ mile down you'll find the Red Lion on the right (if I remember correctly). The advice I was given is that if you've got that far the White Hart is only a short distance further on the left and is well worth the extra walk. ½ mile from front of hotel.

The Three Magpies Bath Road 0181 759 1071, almost directly opposite the hotel (across the A4) but not recommended

The White Hart High St., Harlington 0181 759 9608. Same directions as the Red Lion but more highly recommended. ½ mile from front of hotel.

King William IV Sipson Road 0181 759 9874. Out of the hotel, turn right onto Bath Road and right at the lights towards Sipson. At first you will think you're on the wrong road since it all seems either residential or empty land but then you'll pass the Crown pub on the right and the Plough is just a little bit further down on the left, be careful or you'll drive past it since the "front" faces down the road away from the direction that you're driving. It is walkable but it is a fair walk (more than 10 minutes). Very highly recommended.

#### Restaurants

Indian Hayes Tandoori Station Road, Hayes 0181 573 4949. This is described as the best tandoori around! About 2½ miles from the hotel, so not a walk unless you *really* want to build up an appetite. Of course, once you're in Hayes there are a number of other restaurants around but I'll leave them to you to track down and review for the newsletter.

Italian Basically there aren't any recommended ones near the hotel so you have the choice of: the Terraza in Ashford (01784 244887) Ashford is about 8 miles from the hotel (so definitely not walking distance!) but again once you're in Ashford, there are a number of other restaurants (including a particularly good chip shop called Jack's), or Antico on Eton High Street (0173 863977). I don't have any other details about this except it is on the list from the Radisson concierge. Eton seems to be a good place to go if you want a range of good restaurants so my advice is to get a taxi there and wander around! You might also try Windsor (not the castle but the local restaurants) if you're driving around the area.

Chinese Pangs Cottage Yeading 0181 845 2776 Go Sing West Drayton 01895 44174 Hee's A4 (heading towards London) I can highly recommend Hee's, a very good Chinese restaurant on the A4 heading in to London, but it is a good way in (10-15 minutes drive) and not cheap (though not as expensive as some of the Chinese in Central London!)

#### Fast Food

I'll just mention a couple near the hotel, see notes on the area below for where else to try.

McDonalds Right next to the hotel is a 24 hour drive-through McDonalds, so I'll be fed for the convention! They seem to switch over to the breakfast menu about 6am and back to regular "food" around 10:30-11:00. One word of warning: a colleague ordered a fish sandwich there about 4am one morning and it was a bit dried out, so check your food and demand a fresh one if necessary.

Harlington Tandoori High St, Harlington 0181 476 3300. Indian/Nepalese restaurant and food store (several shop fronts adjoining), just about opposite the Red Lion (so follow directions as above). The food store has a sign saying it's open until 9pm but when 1 went by there at 10:15 pm it still looked open.

Fish & Chips/Kebabs High St., Harlington A couple of doors down from the Tandoori, and opposite the Red Lion. I had a saveloy and chips and I got a big bag of chips for 75p. I think I probably went at a bad time (just before closing) but it tasted like some of the chips were freshly cooked and some had been sitting drying out for a while. Nonetheless cheap, filling and the freshly cooked chips were very nice! Open until 11pm but shut on Sundays.

#### Other restaurants/fast food etc.

Heathrow Airport has a large number of food places that range from quite high quality restaurants through to Burger King and cafeteria-style food. Terminal 1 is a short mortarbomb lob from the hotel.

The general area near the hotel (say, within 10 miles) consists of a vast number of small towns linked by good roads and each small town is likely to have Chinese, Indian and Fish & Chip shops. There are also quite a lot of pizza delivery places and such. The A4 runs past the hotel and if you head out towards the M25 there is a wine bar/restaurant on the right which I didn't have time to check out. If you take the A4 in towards London you'll pass a lot of hotels, a good bowling alley (with a McDonalds in it, I believe), and then you are on the long run into London with various restaurants and take-aways every couple of miles. (There is also a big guitar shop on the right when you're near Hounslow for you filkers who need new strings...). I've just been told there is a good Mexican restaurant in Staines, and since there are a large number of other restaurants and shops there, it might be worthwhile checking out.
