From the Chair

Voyager – the Skinny

Now that Voyager 1 has 'officially' left the Solar System (what do NASA know – we think it will really leave the Solar System on 18th April 2014, during the Satellite 4 Opening Ceremony), we now give you the low-down on our farflung bit of humanity.

Voyager 1 was launched on September 5th 1977, 16 days AFTER Voyager 2. (How can NASA put satellites outside the solar system, but cannot count to 2 in the right order?)

The Voyagers weigh-in at 773 kilograms each (or about 8 Satellite 4 chairs – more if I can ever stick to the diet!)



Electrical power is supplied by three radioisotope thermoelectric generators, powered by plutonium-238. With a half-life of 87.74 years, the generators are already down to 75.1% of their original


power.

Each Voyager carries a 'Golden Record', with music and pictures to entertain any aliens who find it (and can understand the instructions on 'how to play this disc').

It contains greetings in 55 languages from Akkadin to Wu, including English and Welsh (but not Gaelic).

The music includes Bach, Barcelata, Beethoven, Chuck Berry and Blind Willie Johnson. (They were going to wait for Voyager 3 for composers whose names do NOT begin with 'B'.)


It also contains a brain wave recording of Ann Druyan, who selected the music (and later married Carl Sagan). (Apparently she did not select any filk!)



Unlike the Pioneer plaques, NASA decided NOT to

include a picture of a naked Sir Cliff Richard. (Presumably because we DO want the aliens to make contact.)

The most famous picture taken by Voyager is Pale Blue Dot – a portrait of our home planet.

Hotel Update

The Convention will take place in the Crowne Plaza Hotel, Congress Road, Glasgow G3 8QT. The hotel is situated about two miles from Glasgow City Centre and beside the Scottish Exhibition and Conference Centre.

Overflow accommodation is available at the Campanile and the Hilton Garden Inn – both across the car park from the Crowne Plaza – and the Marriott, which is just over a mile from the Crowne Plaza.

At time of writing rooms in the Crowne Plaza & Campanile are nearly sold out. However we still have ample rooms available at the Marriott and Hilton Garden Inn.

Booking

There is an online bedroom booking service managed by Glasgow City Marketing Bureau, a link to the booking site and more information about our hotels are available from our website's *The Convention Hotel* section.

You will need a debit or credit card to book but there is no charge taken at this time.

You may also wish to know the Cancellation Policy for rooms booked using this service:

Individual Bookings up to 2 Rooms: Cancellations can be made up to 48 hours prior to arrival without penalty. Cancellations of all or any room nights after the 48 hour deadline will incur 100% charges.

This currently covers all your room bookings but if you have, or wish to, book more than two rooms please see the full booking cancellation policy, which is available on our website.

Getting There

Trains: Glasgow has two major railway stations in the city centre, Glasgow Central Station and Glasgow Queen Street Station. The Crowne Plaza is less than 2 miles from either of these and a taxi should cost about £5.

The nearest railway station to the convention hotel is Exhibition Centre. This

lies on the Argyle Line from Glasgow Central Low-Level Station. On exiting the station, turn sharp right and take the covered walkway towards the Scottish Exhibition and Conference Centre (SECC). The hotel is straight ahead.

Planes: The hotel is 8 miles from Glasgow International Airport. A taxi from the airport will cost about £20. There is also a bus service which will take you into the City Centre – an open return on the bus costs £5.

and Automobiles: The hotel is adjacent to the SECC, the Clyde Auditorium (known locally as the 'Armadillo') and the famous 'Squinty Bridge' (aka the Glasgow Arc). The M8 motorway runs close to the venue and the SECC exit is Junction 19. Just follow the brown tourist signs bearing the name of the hotel.

Parking

The Crowne Plaza has a car park which is available to all convention members at a discounted rate of £1 per hour (up to £9 per day). The prices at each hotel for their residents are:

Surrender this to Ops on Friday and they will allow you to put your name down for *one* limited-availability item (subject to there being space). From Saturday morning onwards you are welcome to sign up for as many of these types of item if there are spaces available. Note that tokens are not transferable between members.

The Programme

Satellite 4 aims to deliver all the major items and events fandom expects of an Eastercon, but with the same emphasis on 'Science Fiction, Science Fact, Science Fun' as previous Satellite conventions. The programme is still developing, but a taste of what we have lined up so far is given below. There are still vacant programme slots. So please volunteer, or put forward programme ideas, via the website – see the relevant section at *Contact Us: Sign Up & Request Forms*.

Beginnings and endings (to help those yet to finalise their travel plans)

The convention will begin on Friday afternoon with the Opening Ceremony, incorporating a welcome from the Lord Provost of Glasgow, followed by a Civic Reception hosted by the City and the official opening and first viewing of the Art Show. On Monday we plan to run programme until late afternoon, with Satellite convention's traditional *Dead Laika* Party* in the evening.

Day Guests

In addition to our fabulous Guests of Honour, Special Guest and Guests Emeritus, we've invited some interesting local speakers to Satellite 4. Jean Anderson and Marc Alexander will talk on their *Historical Thesaurus of English* project; Roddy Hamilton explores the interface between SF and religion; Glasgow-based satellite manufacturers Clyde Space will be coming along to give us an insight into their work; and science communicator Jon Davies (who some will remember from Satellite 3) returns with his popular science lecture, this time with an SF twist!

Special Guest Sir Terry Pratchett

As expected, Sir Terry won't be able to join us for the whole weekend. However, we are pleased to say that he plans to be with us for the full day on Sunday, along with his PA, Rob Wilkins, and agent Colin Smythe. We very much look forward to seeing them at the convention, and hearing about Sir Terry's recent projects.

Talks

Satellite 4 will feature the BSFA and Hay lectures, plus talks on diverse topics from fan speakers. Returning from previous Satellite conventions are Robert

Law talking on the Voyager missions; Colin McInnes on geoengineering; and Phil Wellings with an update on inadvisable rocket science. And what event would be complete without a contribution from the inestimable Mr ED Buckley! We're also pleased to have a talk on the trans-Atlantic cable from long-standing fan Bill Burns; Serena Culfeather and John Wilson will provide an insight into the joys of *The Bee Factory*, and Nik Whitehead explains the challenges of *Timekeeping on Mars*.

Panels

These will include serious discussions on different aspects of the genre, debate over topics concerning the status and future of fandom, and of course fun items. Planned so far are panels on the work of our sadly missed Guest Emeritus (the late) Iain M Banks; a look at various types of publishing and their associated challenges; and a topical discussion on the future of Eastercon if Scotland were to gain independence following the September 2014 Referendum. We also aim to delve into alternative history, take a look at 'Proto-SF' and try to convince the audience of which was the most successful space mission ever.

The Way We Were

Satellite 4 is the 65th British National Science Fiction Convention and, to mark the event reaching pensionable age, we'd like to invite you to bring along photos from past Eastercons to share with the membership. A scanner will be available in Ops, so you don't have to risk exhibiting your precious originals, and there will be a space to display your scanned photos, plus pens for you to add information about where and when the photo was taken. Both serious and amusing photos are welcome, although the committee reserves the right to remove anything offensive or unacceptable.

Workshops

A variety of workshops will take place over the weekend. In addition to a writers' workshop lead by GoH Juliet McKenna, there will be chances to try your hand at arts and crafts, and physical activities, including a walk (or run, for the more energetic!) round some of the pubs sites of Glasgow in collaboration with Glasgow Hash House Harriers (please bring suitable clothes and, especially, footwear, if you plan to participate). Or why not come along and help Loncon 3 get stuffed (creating an enormous flock of soft toy pigeons of course)! We'll also be featuring prominently a series of workshops on Conrunning, led by Mark Meenan and the rest of the Satellite 4 committee.

Mark writes: "Are you interested in knowing more about how conventions are run? Would you like to run your own convention, but don't know where to start? At last year's Eastercon, Eight Squared, we promised to host a workshop for people new to running convention. The workshop will cover basics like finding a venue, budgeting, care and feeding of a GOH. There will be an opportunity to ask questions of people with experience of running different conventions, from small local cons up to Worldcons."

Other programme items

Where other conventions have beer or whisky tastings, Morag and Catriona offer you the opportunity to sample scones, whilst Ming brings the delights(?) of military field rations from around the world. There will be lots of games and quizzes to join in – compete for supremacy in Tig's Tribble Pursuit, test your knowledge in Mad Elf and Danae's anime quiz, or attempt to survive the machinations of Munchkin. A formal debate is traditional at Satellite conventions and this time we plan to focus on an eco-theme, discussing whether we humans should put our own house in order before moving offworld. We're also in negotiation over author readings, book launches, and so much more that it's hard to imagine where we're going to find time and space to put it all!

Evening Extravaganzas!

Satellite 4 aims to offer some outstanding evening programming that everyone will enjoy. On Friday we have a play by Ian Sorensen marking the 50th Anniversary of Dr Who, entitled *Dr Whorrible's Singalong Blog*, then it's time to break out your kilts and get onto the dance floor for a proper Scottish ceilidh with *The Reel Fling*. Saturday evening sees the announcement of the Hugo Award Nominations and two very contrasting musical items. We have a set from Jordan Reyne, renowned for her pioneering combination of celtic, steampunk, industrial and folk sounds, and The Ambassadors Ball, with live music from fabulous local big band, That Swing Sensation. We hope as many members as possible will attend the Ball dressed as dignitaries from planets and cultures, real or imaginary, across time and space – but everyone is welcome, whether in costume or not. The BSFA Award Ceremony takes place on Sunday evening, followed by a live performance from the legendary Scottish Falsetto Sock Puppet Theatre and then the convention disco. The theme of the disco, marking the 40th anniversary of cult SF/horror movie Young Frankenstein, is *The Modern Prometheus*.

Provides a free in-depth travel guide to Scotland, including accommodation, restaurants, things to do and events.




Information on events, restaurants, attractions and travel; also provides maps of the city

Live real time train running information and sells tickets for trains in Glasgow, as well as the rest of the UK.


