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



Code of Conduct

Be respectful and courteous towards others. We expect you to understand that you need to ask before you touch and that no means no. Harassment of any kind, from intimidation to illegal behavior will not be tolerated. Please be aware that harassment is illegal under various sections of the New York Penal Code. This policy applies to your interactions with everybody. We also expect you to refrain from illegal, destructive, and hazardous conduct.

Violation of this policy can result in action by the con committee ranging from warnings, to having your badge revoked with no refund, to permanent banning. Action by the convention in no way precludes the injured individual or the hotel from pursuing whatever remedies, civil or criminal, as they see fit.

If you feel you are being harassed, please let a member of the Ops staff or Con Chair(s) know. If necessary, please ask a Committee member to find one of those people for you. You will be treated with respect and your concerns will be taken seriously. All names involved will be kept confidential to the extent possible, but any accused has the right to know enough detail to be able to defend him or herself.

Please note that violation of other Lunacon policies or other behaviors not listed, including but not limited to, destruction of hotel property, can also result in the actions described above.

Lunacon is a members-only event and the con committee reserves the right to determine who may be a member.

Parties in a hotel room are considered the responsibility of the person who rented the room. Thus, a person throwing a party in his or her hotel room has the right to eject any person from his or her party if he or she deems that the person is behaving inappropriately.

Smoking

The Hilton Rye Town Hotel is completely nonsmoking. Smoking is only allowed in designated areas outside.

Convention Badges

Yes, you do need your "stinkin' badges"! You must be able to produce a badge to enter any convention activities or when requested to do so.

Lost Badges

If your badge is lost, check with Registration or Member Services to see if it has been turned in. A fee of \$5 will be charged if the badge has to be replaced. A second badge replacement costs \$10. We will not issue a third replacement.

Drinking Age

The legal drinking age in the state of New York is 21. Convention security and hotel staff will be enforcing this.

Parties

- All parties MUST be held only in the designated party wing. Any parties in other areas will be closed down.
- Please note that alcoholic beverages may not be served at open parties. Open parties serving alcohol will be closed down.
- Parties MUST register with convention services, regardless of whether they are open or closed.
- Parties posting flyers or other advertisements around the convention will be treated as open parties and subject to the alcohol restriction.

Photography

This is a private event; by registering, individuals grant Lunacon and designated photographers a non-exclusive right to photograph, videotape, otherwise record, and publish (in print or electronically) themselves, companions, activities, costumes, artwork, sales goods, and other property used or displayed in their normal participation of the convention.

Photographers, ask permission before you photograph or audio/videotape any individual or group. Anyone who does not wish to be photographed or recorded should state their wishes unambiguously.

There is NO FLASH PHOTOGRAPHY at Lunacon.

We presume that you are acting in an amateur capacity unless otherwise stated. If you are acting on behalf of a publication, video production organization, or news medium (freelance or employed) of any kind, you must register as a member of the press (commercial publication, media, fanzine). Press passes may be obtained by going to the convention office and speaking with the operations staff to receive an orientation and press kit. Articles or media coverage released after the convention may earn you a membership to the next Lunacon.

Anyone wishing to sell photographs, audio, or video recordings of any part of the convention (including the masquerade) must read and agree to the terms contained in a separate photographers/videographers contract.

Individuals or organizations violating these guidelines by selling, reproducing, broadcasting, or publishing materials obtained at a Lunacon convention without permission may be guilty of copyright violation and/or trespass, and may be prosecuted to the full extent of the law. If you have any questions as to what is appropriate, contact the Operations Staff for further information.


Weapons Policy

We want everyone to have a safe and enjoyable time at Lunacon, so please be sure to follow the rules listed below. Failure to adhere to them could result in you being asked to surrender your badge and leave the convention without a refund.

Weapons may be included as part of a hall costume with the following restrictions:

- 1. Use good judgment. Even if it complies with the remaining rules, if it is unsafe or would reduce the enjoyment of others, please don't do it.
- 2. No projectile weapons. If it projects a solid, liquid, gas, or energy with enough force to annoy, it is a projectile weapon.
- 3. No replicas of any current or historical firearm are permitted (a phaser is acceptable, a space marine's assault rifle is not). Working bows are, unfortunately, included with the above.
- 4. All edged weapons must be peace-bound and incapable of being drawn. We will have security staff to assist with enforcement of this.
- 5. Staves, canes and non-working replicas (boffer or cardboard swords, etc.), while not needing to be peace- bound per se, nonetheless must adhere to the same behavioral guidelines as any edged weapon (see below).
- 6. Weapons may not be drawn in any public area of the convention!
- 7. Weapons may not be worn in such a way as to create a hazard to other attendees or fixtures of the convention (e.g. scabbards that extend far enough to be a trip hazard to passersby).
- 8. We define weapons to include real weapons, facsimile weapons, anything actually used as a weapon, and anything an otherwise ignorant being would surmise is a weapon.

The aforementioned rules apply to costumes included as part of the Masquerade competition. Anyone considering wearing a weapon as part of a hall costume is warned that any violation of the above rules is grounds for immediate expulsion from the convention with no refund. When in doubt, ASK!

Ryk Spoor

Born in Omaha, Nebraska, Ryk E. Spoor spent the early years of his life living in several different locations including Omaha; Vermilion, South Dakota; Atlanta, Georgia; and Latham, New York. With the move to upstate New York, his family settled in, moving only once more, to Schenectady, New York, in 1976.

An asthmatic since 21 months old, Ryk spent much of his time reading (averaging one book per day from the time he was seven or eight through his mid-twenties). While his early years included much reading in science and related subjects (with a particular fascination for volcanoes), Ryk quickly developed a love for fantastic literature, starting with the Oz series by L. Frank Baum. His father's collection of science fiction novels and anthologies quickly became his favorite reading resource and by the time he was nine years old he had read much of Heinlein, Asimov, Van Vogt, and other well and less

well-known authors of the Golden Age.

It was at the age of eleven, in sixth grade, that he was introduced to what would be one of the most influential authors of his life – E. E. "Doc" Smith – by his teacher for that grade, Mr. Dickinson, who gave him a battered, slightly cigarette-burned copy of *Second-Stage Lensmen*. This grand-scale space opera transformed his view of what stories could be like and has influenced him ever since (most obviously in his *Grand Central Arena* and its sequel *Spheres of Influence*, which are deliberate nods to Doc Smith and the Golden Age).

At the same time, he explored his junior high school library and found numerous other science fiction novels as well as some suspense and horror; that library introduced him to Balmer and Wylie's *When Worlds Collide*, the *Danny Dunn* series, the *Alfred Hitchcock Presents...* anthologies of horror, and many others.

It wasn't until reaching high school, however, that he encountered four other things that transformed his life: computer networks and their ability to let geeks communicate safely; epic fantasy in the form of *The Lord of the Rings* and *The Hobbit*, and later *The Sword of Shannara*; the first roleplaying game, *Dungeons and Dragons*; and *Star Wars*.

From the time he was six and had one of his stories read out loud to a higher-grade class, Ryk had known he wanted to write and had been writing ever since. Even by the age of 11 he was submitting stories, but never had a clear idea of *what* he wanted to write – fan fiction aside. But the combination

of all of these imagination-firing concepts triggered the realization that he wanted to create *worlds* like these books he was now reading. It was in 1978 that he first wrote down the name "Zarathan" and drew the map which exists, in still recognizable form, in the front of his novel *Phoenix Rising*, published well over 30 years later.

While he knew that he wanted to be a writer, unfortunately that wasn't really a career goal, and for the next several years he drifted from one possibility to another, living in an independent apartment for a year or so with two friends, beginning college at the local community college, attempting to join the military (for which he was, honestly, entirely unsuited), then returning to complete a degree in mathematics and science before going to the State University of New York at Albany for a degree in Psychology. Eventually, after many dead-end explorations of possibilities, Ryk began graduate studies at the University of Pittsburgh in the School of Information Science; it was not until 1999, however, that he would finally obtain his Master's degree.

In the interim he accumulated experience in a variety of jobs ranging from hospital office worker to bank clerk, store manager, burger flipper, and bookseller, before finally landing a quality assurance and product development job with small computer-software developing company Intranaut.

During the same period, Ryk began dating, and eventually married, his long-time friend Kathleen Moffre; they were married in 1995 and by 1996 their first child, Christopher, was born. Christopher was followed by Gabriel, Victoria, and Domenica.

Intranaut developed software-based computer training courses for Pearson/Prentice Hall at the time, and for a few years Ryk continued to work there... until the company came apart in spectacular fashion, having attempted to transition to a filesharing company along the lines of Napster and attracting the legal attention of AOL-Time Warner and the RIAA.

Left without a job and in the middle of a sudden crash of the economy in the wake of 9/11, Ryk managed to barely keep afloat with some independent consulting jobs. Still, things were desperate.

But that was about to change, in several ways.

Throughout all of this time, Ryk had maintained an online presence, most prominently on Usenet's "newsgroups", under the nickname of "Sea Wasp" (a name first used in 1978), and was well-known in those online communities. It was in 2000 that someone posted an excerpt of a message from "Eric Flint", describing his intended work on re-issuing the works of James Schmitz, one of Ryk's favorite Golden Age authors. The excerpt made Flint sound like someone who thought that he knew better than Schmitz what Schmitz should have written, and the "Sea Wasp" posted a scathing opinion about how no one with that attitude should have any business "editing" the work of a dead man.

So began a flamewar that lasted over two thousand separate posts, and culminated in an online friendship with Eric Flint... and led, quite directly, to Baen Books publishing Ryk's first novel, *Digital Knight*.

During this period, Ryk finally got another job – as a technical writer for International Electronic Machines. Within a year he won his first SBIR award for the company, and has remained there ever since. Now Research and Development Coordinator, Ryk has averaged over one million dollars in

new contracts for the company each year, has managed multiple R&D projects (several of which he conceived and proposed as well), and has written multiple patents. In addition, he is also named as an inventor on multiple patents for wireless sensors, inspection systems, smart video analysis, and sensor fusion, and on multiple additional pending patents.

This work experience proved invaluable in writing his later works, as many of them made considerable use of sensor technology in the plot – none more so than the *Boundary* series with sensor technology wizard A.J. Baker.

In 2012, he finally realized a decades-long dream with the publication of *Phoenix Rising*, introducing the world to his fantasy universe centered on the world of Zarathan. The invitation to become Guest of Honor at Lunacon was something of a surprise, and forced him to admit... "yeah, I guess I HAVE to call myself a professional author now!"

Ryk now lives in Troy, New York, with his wife Kathleen, their four children, one poodle, and seven chickens.





Excerpt

Phoenix in Shadow by Ryk Spoor

Prologue.

This is... most interesting.

It surveyed the clearing, smoke still drifting from multiple scattered fires which had – mostly – died out by now, dozens of bodies of monstrous, twisted... *things* lying everywhere, and a huge scar of blackened earth that stretched from an underground opening to fan out all the way to the edge of the clearing; ash, dust, and blood coated everything black, gray, and red-brown, shocking againt the vibrant green of the jungle. *It appears I have arrived rather late for the party. What a shame.*

It ... well, *sniffed* would have been an appropriate term, but while it did think of the perceptions it gained as scents, they were not; the senses it extended were far beyond those of ordinary creatures, born of its essence and power, and not limited to the physical. *A mighty battle indeed, and much more than I would have expected...*

In all honesty it *had* expected that – when the conflict came – one of two things would happen; either Thornfalcon would kill the Phoenix, or the new-minted Justiciar would somehow overcome Thornfalcon. If the latter, well, then his expectations would be fully met. But it had thought this confrontation still a bit in the future, and its arrival here was purely fortuitous – a morning conference with its most useful acolyte to make some further arrangements... which, it seemed, would no longer be necessary. *So let us see what really occurred*.

As the senses of magic and power, tracery of traces of past conflict, began to impress itself upon the being's consciousness, it raised one eyebrow. *Oh, now, not nearly so simple as I thought. No, not at all.*

There certainly was godscent here – it knew the particular tang of Myrionar well. *Of necessity*, it thought with a smile, for it is rather hard to fool others with a counterfeit unless one truly understands the original. But there were a myriad of other scents. Alchemical concoctions and materials had been used with abandon, and it was impossible – with the god-fire's interference – to tell if it had all been Thornfalcon's work, or someone

else's. Other types of magic... and was that another god-scent? It frowned. No, it's possibly more than one. Or a mixture, magic and god-power. Not familiar directly... but there is a touch of the Mortal God about it that I do not like at all.

While it did not – precisely – fear any of the gods, there were those it was very wise to take extremely seriously. The Greatest Dragons, certainly, Chromaias and the Four... but of them all, perhaps the most to be feared by those – like itself – which walked the darkest paths was Terian, the Nemesis of Evil, Light in the Darkness, the Mortal God, the Infinite. *Yet it is not the touch of a priest or a god-warrior. Something else, and that is intriguing indeed.*

Finally it found one of the things it was looking for; Thornfalcon's body, headless and now burned almost beyond recognition. *Now, let us see...* It frowned. *Scarce anything remains. I can barely sense his soul now. It desperately clings to the remains still, which is why I sensed not his defeat before I came... but it is nigh-obliterated.*

Reaching out, it drew in what remained, or tried to. But even the effort of pulling in the traces caused them to fade, shatter, just as touching the ashes caused them to collapse into shapelessness, losing whatever they had kept of their shape in life.

It smiled with an edge of apology. I had promised you power, Thornfalcon, and of your people you had shown much promise... and begun to learn true mastery. I am surprised your life has truly ended. This should not have happened.

One – or more, it corrected itself – of the weapons used upon Thornfalcon must have been made in such a fashion as to break even the most unique changes that the being had made to Thornfalcon's essence, to shatter that particular soul-hungry pattern and make it impotent. Were it otherwise, Thornfalcon would rise again, though it might have taken time. I would do well to remember this myself, for when the time comes.

This did leave another problem, in that it could not simply ask Thornfalcon what had happened, what he had learned in that final and titanic conflict. *Must do this the harder way; depending on what the Phoenix learned, and how he, or she, chooses to act, I may be on a rather limited timetable now!*

It extended its senses farther, to make sure there were no witnesses. *I do not want interruptions now; there are things that would need explanation.* Fortunately he had come here early in the morning and Thornfalcon's little estate was set at a distance from other residences, but there would be gawkers, or more purposeful visitors, soon enough.

I can see that someone took Thornfalcon's head. Single cut, very clean, large blade. Definitely this "Phoenix" as described.

But were you fighting him alone, avenging Justiciar of Myrionar? True, you have killed two others, and it smiled to think of what would come of that second killing, one it had sensed only a short time before, but Thornfalcon was undoubtedly much more challenging an opponent, and I did not read your prior battles as ones in which you had no difficulty. No, you had help, I think.

It shifted form to one more comfortable for careful inspection of the perimeter. It was at the edge of the clearing that traces would remain of those who had come in... or left. It took some time, but finally it found what it sought: a faint set of marks and tracks leading away, into the jungle.

Two sets of feet.. no, three... left here. And, it would appear, at very much the same time. Yes, my little Phoenix, you have acquired friends... and here, I have your scent.

It laughed aloud suddenly, a sound that was more tearing metal and shattering bone than human amusement. Kyri Victoria Vantage! A perfect symmetry, and oh, it makes so very much sense of all things. Yes, an excellent choice, Myrionar, a well-played choice of your final piece in our game.

The creature could now understand the exact way in which the prior Justiciars had died; they had been undone by their own sentiments, slowed or confused by the child they had known all their lives confronting them with their crimes. Mist Owl would have allowed his death as a sort of futile penance, while Shrike... It smiled. Shrike would have become emotional and desperate for another reason.

However, Thornfalcon... The figure shook its head. Thornfalcon would not have been so affected. He did have other interests which might have led him astray, but that of pure sentiment, no. She would have

It considered the scents of the companions. Both young men, yes. Of a similar age, it would seem. The first... there is a general familiarity about it, but the individual is unknown. But it has been a long time since I scented this particular... could it be?

It moved along the trail, finding that the three were traveling in a nearly straight line, and very purposefully... *Towards the capital, I think. Yes. Interesting. That may make things difficult... but I must learn more before I act.*

It retraced its steps, looking for additional clues that it might have missed. Why is there a hint of the Mortal God on this one? There was no immediate answer, though the faint scent taunted him maddeningly. Never mind. Let us examine the third.

The third young man... Now that is most interesting. There is a scent with him of... plastics. Electronics. By my Power, this boy must be from the other world!

Something about that bothered him. After a moment, he recalled what that was. Zarathanton... the five young people who had been, as they might have said, "framed" for the assassination of the Sauran King... his agent had been emphatic that they claimed to come from Earth. It would be ludicrous to suppose that another such traveller could have come so soon, so this must be one of those five – one who has either escaped the inescapable, or been released.

There was also some other energy, a sense, that sent a tingle of warning and anticipation throught the creature. *Traces of something ancient, ancient indeed. Yet I cannot quite make it out.*

But that was not all. There was another trace of presence, another spirit-scent... And this, too, something hinting of the familiar. It allowed itself another good-natured internal complaint about the limitations it was currently saddled with. Necessary for the way things must be done, yes, but there are times I am tempted...

Too many feet – humanoid and otherwise – had trampled these grounds in that combat, especially

in that endgame against a tide of unnatural monstrosities. *And that was* very *well-done, Thornfalcon. I have a* suspicion as to the source of these things, but for you to have found it, been able to make the appropriate bargains... it truly is a shame you are dead. It quickened its pace, criss-crossing the entire clearing, walking, sensing, sniffing...

A very faint scent caught at its senses now, and it glanced around and down, found itself looking at a tiny thing that glittered on the ground. Changing shape back to human, it reached down and gingerly picked up the little metal shaft. *Pointed. Notched at the other end.* It sniffed carefully. *Alchemical bolt. But how* tiny. *Now what could...*

For a moment it was no longer smiling. Now that is too far for coincidence; first the child of Zaralandar finds his way here and is working with the last Justiciar, and now this? From the center of the Great Forest to here? With the Phoenix and whoever these others are? Voorith had no visible connections here, so what would have led this one hence?

Its eyes narrowed and it looked around, suspicious. *And if that is the case, other aspects of the plan may be in more danger than it appears*. It sniffed again at the ground, and now, with its senses fully alerted, it caught the faintest hint, a chime and a flicker in the background.

That it recognized instantly, and it grinned savagely, realizing that all of their plans were in more jeopardy than it had imagined... and it was glad of it, in truth. My oldest mortal enemy... is it truly you again, Khoros? Have you dared to try your hand once more? I must discover if it is so!


It was even more glad, now, that its true goals were still buried layers deep, hidden behind the dozen other plots in which it was involved. *Kerlamion, o King, your plans proceed apace... yet they may be doomed to failure.*

As might be true of the other three branches of the conspiracy. It nodded. I must find a way to have this possible connection discovered, brought to their attention. It strode into the jungle, chuckling, shape becoming something swift and terrible, arrowing towards the once-holy sanctum.



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

When Star Wars arrived in its 1978 theatrical re-release, I was nearly four years old. My parents took my older brother and I to see it. I must have fallen asleep waiting for the film to begin, because when I did wake up, I think it was after the opening credits. The sound of intergalatic warfare, and the massive starships filling the screen and passing overhead became what is one of my earliest memories. The next couple of hours melted down the still-developing gray matter in my cranium and poured it again into a new mold. That mold was one of imagination, heroes, creatures, robots and a limitless visual horizon. I think my life going forward, as an artist, was inevitable from then on.

I grew up in San Jose, CA. My father worked at Lockheed-Martin, not in any cool engineering capacity but rather he painted the sides of planes, or satellites, or Trident I missiles or whatever else was being produced there. In 1979 or 80, my dad brought home what might have been an annual report or brochure of some kind, which featured glorious pictures of the SR-71 Blackbird, the most beautiful aircraft ever designed, to this day. What was particularly amazing to my kinder-aged mind was that this aircraft was a reality of what films like Star Wars only promised. In some way, it helped me to believe that the amazing could be realized.

Along with Saturday morning cartoons, among which Battle of Planets was an early favorite along with the usual Looney Toons fair, my next love was comic books. I was never hugely into the usual series, though familiar with them. No, I was drawn early on to Marvel's Rom: Spaceknight. You see a theme here. Between Star Wars and Rom, you can imagine what my earliest drawings were all about.

My mom spent most of her career working in the commercial printing industry, as an operator of large machinery. As Silicon Valley erupted, all those 400-page manuals that used to accompany software were printed locally in those days. It was good times for printers. It was also good times for a young artist, as there was never a lack of blank paper in the house.

It was a great era to be a young, burgeoning fantasy and SF-artist. Video games were new, and I was (am?) obsessed with them. It wasn't long until this young medium was also inspiring my drawings. Those things colored much of my visual world. But until 6th or 7th grade I had very little exposure to the painted work of illustration that would inspire me for the long haul. I didn't read much standard fiction if it didn't have path choices at the end of each page. 4 touchstones are worth mentioning that pushed me in the direction I eventually followed. Otherwise I might've ended up a comic book artist or video game developer.

- 1.) In 6th grade a friend handed me the Red Book edition of Basic Dungeons & Dragons. We didn't play then, but the Larry Elmore art blew my mind.
- 2.) In 8th grade, in the school library, in a spin rack from across the room, my eyes locked on to the Richard Corben cover to Warlock of Firetop Mountain, the first book in the Fighting Fantasy series.
- 3.) Wandering through a book store in 9th grade (I still wasn't reading much, but it was a store that also had art supplies), I saw, propped up on a promotional table, the large, yellow cover of Michael Whelan's second art collection, Works of Wonder.

I didn't know Whelan at the time, though later I realized that I'd seen a couple of pieces and loved them. What the book showed me was not only amazing art that resonated deeply with me, but, since it was a collection of covers done for Del Rey Books (with the printed covers shown as thumbnails), it

finally put together in my mind that one could have a career illustrating this kind of work. Here I was seeing a string of work that was a career, whereas before I was only seeing paintings here and there. From that point on, I knew where I was headed.

4.) I started finally playing Dungeons & Dragons in high school. Book after book of 2nd edition greatness. So much incredible art.

Concurrent with #3, I became interested in some of the books in Whelan's art book. My English teacher--bless her soul--purchased for me the first two books in Piers Anthony's Incarnations of Immortality series. I devoured them and it was off to the races for the next number of years. I was hooked. Del Rey's marketing plans worked.

It was not all art, though. My Jr. year I met a girl named Monica and I started dating my first girlfriend. She is here with me at Lunacon, 24 years later!

I attended the California College of Arts in Oakland, CA and studied as a Drawing major. Private art schools are about as expensive as Ivy League Universities, and you certainly aren't going to be making Ivy League money at the end of it. I compacted all the necessary and desired courses into a 3-year program and left, unfortunately without a degree, but also without crippling debt that two more years might have saddled me with.

It was 1994 by then. A little game called Magic: the Gathering was beginning to be a thing. I was finishing up that 3rd year of college when a friend called and told me that the art director for Magic, Jesper Myrfors, would be in San Francisco, signing autographs. He was also an illustrator in the early days of the game. I didn't have a portfolio put together yet, so I grabbed a bunch of paintings, some as large as 30x40", packed them in my car, and went to the game store to meet him. I asked if he'd be willing to look at my work when he was done. He agreed and I went and brought my artwork in and stood it around the display cases. Jesper looked over the work and offered me my first professional work, for their new card game, Vampire: the Eternal Struggle (called Jyhad at the time), at the tender age of 19. By the end of the year I was added to Magic with the Ice Age expansion, and the rest, as they say....


20 years later, I continue to hone my craft and have been honored to contribute to many different kinds of products that I hope bring joy and amazement to others as that prior generation's art brought to me. That I got to work on D&D along the way is a nice bonus. As I continue moving my work towards the goal of doing more book illustration, I find that even though it's taken longer to get there than I thought it might, the detour has been incredible.
















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

Mike's work has, justly, won several Hugo nominations, two Prometheus awards, a Sturgeon (for "House of Dreams"), and the very first Robert A. Heinlein medal. He is also a fan, and his novel <u>Fallen Angels</u>, written with Jerry Pournelle and Larry Niven, joyously celebrates SF fans as heroes.

But that's not all (Wait! There's more! Now what would you pay!) Mike is also a polymath, a genuine Renaissance man, one of the smartest people I know. Whenever I ask him a question—and I have asked him many over the decades—he always has information on the subject—pretty much any subject. I have read emails from him about magnetic fields, fault-tree analysis, Persian fortifications, medieval climate changes, the number of teeth lost by pregnant women in ancient Greece, early American railroads, Jane Austen. And that's only a sampling.

Now, how does a person get to know that much about so much? I don't know. My own favorite is "Melodies of the Heart" — but you might have a different favorite. Go read Flynn to find out. The Shipwrecks of Time By Michael F. Flynn Part I. Old Books

1. The New Station of Francis Delacorte

Milwaukee in the August of nineteen hundred and sixty-five was likewise suspended. The immigrant rush had long-settled into bars, churches, neighborhoods; into the clang of proletarian industry and the grassy aroma of hops; and the unsettlings to come were as yet only implicit in the raised eyebrows at a Texas instrument company; in the steaming jungles of a far-off land, and in a few dead bodies in an Alabama town.

Two months earlier, Edward White had stepped out into the emptiest of skies to poise exquisitely alone at that point where falling went on forever – one small step closer to the moon that a martyred president had pledged.

But a great deal else beside Ed White danced in the air. Sometimes, when the laughter and the chatter in the neighborhood bars quieted, this city of workmen could hear the faint rumble of the future rolling toward them. The fall elections had swept an avalanche of Democrats into the Congress, and the President had a blank check for his Great Society. The Vatican Council was about to meet for its fourth and final session. "Freeways" groped toward one another across the face of the city, slicing neighborhoods into shards through which strangers could pass on their way elsewhere. And the Braves too poised delicately between Milwaukee and Atlanta, for they had already announced their intention to move the franchise at season's end.

It was a cool day for August, but the days had been growing cooler for many years now, so who could say what was typical anymore? The clock in Union Station read a quarter to eleven when the *Morning Hiawatha* pulled in, but if the temperature planned to break seventy that day, it had best get a move on.

Francis Xavier Delacorte stepped from the train into a station as new as any passenger station would ever be again. The platforms were spotless, the metal gleamed, the polished wood trim shone. Even the uniforms on the porters looked fresh from the tailors.

The slump of eighteen hours of travel was on his shoulders, and he set his suitcase on the platform and let the other passengers swirl and eddy past him. He had gone the extra fare for the Pennsylvania's *Broadway Limited* because Pullman sleeping cars were the best to be had; but between the jostle of the rails, the quarrels

Congratulations! You have been selected for the post-doctoral fellowship at the Milwaukee Institute for Historical Research. A stipend from the Institute will cover your professional expenses and a modest salary. You will work directly with Professor Jonathan Henkle, Director of the Institute... There was more, of course – minor details like taxes, housing, and so forth, all elegantly signed by Mrs. Janis Szczepanski, Executive Secretary.

Most of his fellow passengers had swarmed up the stairways, but a few like Frank waited for additional luggage to be unloaded by the Negroes. He arched his back and stretched his arms to work out the kinks. He felt the stubble on his cheeks and decided he should freshen up before he checked in at the Institute.

No wonder Watts had burned. But nothing he could possibly say would sound anything but patronizing. So in the end he said nothing at all, and gave the man a generous tip.

The building was unprepossessing brick with an entry like an airlock: outer door, small vestibule, inner door. Cunacon Book Raffle

The New York Science Fiction Society-the Lunarians, Inc., in keeping with our educational purpose, has taken an active role in the future of the genre. In 1989, the Society established a scholarship fund whose sole purpose is to help beginning writers in science fiction and fantasy from the greater New York Metropolitan area attend either of the Clarion writers workshops held nationally as well as the Odysssey Writers Workshop. The scholarship fund was later renamed in memory of the late Donald A. and Elsie B. Wollheim, renowned fans, publishers and Society members. The Donald A. and Elsie B. Wollheim Memorial Scholarship Fund has been able to provide partial scholarships to well over two dozen aspiring writers since its inception.

The major source of income for the Fund is the Book Raffle held annually at Lunacon. Do-nations come from major publishing houses such as DAW Books and others as well as from society members and the public. Patricia McCracken





Elliot became an SF fan in 1962. He joined the Society for Creative Anachronism (SCA) in 1968, a few months after its East Kingdom was created. In the SCA, he was the longest standing member in the Barony of the Bridge, which was established in 1973.

But let him speak for himself:

According to his candidacy statement on the 1970 Trans Atlantic Fan Fund (TAFF) ballot, "Elliot Shorter certainly isn't... he stands taller. Always visible at a convention or fan gatherings due to his height and girth, with or without a guitar slung on his back. But the important thing about Elliot is that he is fun! Fun to talk with, sing with, get drunk with, turn a mimeo crank with. Elliot

has been a great addition to fandom since he first started attending cons (most worldcons and east coast regionals since 1962, a number of Midwescons and Westercon 22). He has been Sergeant at Arms at Lunacons and at NYCon III, auctioneer at Lunacons, panelist at Boskones, art show judge at Westercon 22 and St. Louiscon. He has been chosen Parliamentarian for the 1971 Worldcon -- Noreascon. Elliot ... was chairman of the Ways and Means Committee of the Eve. Sess. of City College of CUNY for 5 years. He is a member of the Society for Creative Anachronism, Tolkien Society of America, Hyborean Legion, ESFA, Lunarians, Fanoclasts and NESFA. He has also participated in the publishing of ENGRAM, the HEICON FLYER, LOCUS and NIEKAS.

Shorter, nominated by Ginger Buchanan, Jack Gaughan, Bruce Pelz, John-Henri Holmberg and Waldemar Kumming, won TAFF that year, beating out LOCUS publisher Charles Brown and artist and SF writer William Rotsler. As TAFF delegate for 1970, he went to the worldcon in Heidelberg, Germany, where he was also that convention's Fan Guest of Honor.

Elliot was Sergeant-at-Arms for NYCon 3, the 1967 World SF Convention; he'd been a military policeman while stationed in Germany with the U.S. Army. He was also on the bidding committee, "7 in 77," which was organized to run a Worldcon in Orlando, Florida. Although Orlando won, because the hotel declared bankruptcy and refused to honor its contract, the convention was moved to Miami Beach.

Obítuary - Frank Díetz

The death of Franklyn M. Dietz, Jr., -- Frank to his many friends -- was announced on Facebook on October 22nd. Dietz, who lived at the end of his life in Marietta, Georgia, participated in many of the major activities of mid-20th century SF fandom. With David A. Kyle and his then wife Belle, in late 1956 he founded the Lunarians, aka the New York Science Fiction Society, which in turn launched Lunacon, a convention that continues to this day. For years, Lunarians met in his Bronx apartment at 1750 Walton Avenue, moving with him and his second wife, Ann -- Belle had died -- to Oradell, NJ, as the neighborhood around them decayed.

He was chairman of the first 14 Lunacons, and was Fan Guest of Honor at the 2007 Lunacon. His activities as "Station Luna," an effort to record the proceedings of many World SF Conventions, continued for many years. He recorded events at the 1950 Worldcon in New Orleans. It was there that a loud party in his room was moved to a larger venue: the now legendary Room 770, and the name of a Hugo-winning newszine. He was one of the organizers of the Guild of Science Fiction Recordists, and of the International Science Fiction Correspondence Club in 1949, which promoted correspondence among fans in different countries. Frank recorded events on tape at many other conventions, continuing at least until the 1967 Worldcon in New York City.

He recorded events at the 1957 Worldcon in London, and while there was inducted into the Order of St. Fantony, which featured, according to Rob Hansen's website, "an elaborate ceremony staged by the Cheltenham Circle, in full medieval costumes, with real swords, armor, etc. Those who received this signal honor were Walt Willis, Bob Silverberg, Terry Jeeves, Bobbie Wild, Eric Bentcliffe, Ken Slater, Bob Madle, Franklin Dietz and Ellis Mills. We were given the test of the true fan, under threat of the executioner's axe -- a real one -- if we failed. It was to drink a glass of water from the well of St Fantony. It looked like water, smelled like water ... but it turned out to be 140 proof white Polish liquor."

Among the fanzines he published or co-published, with Belle and later with his second wife, Ann, was SCIENCE, FANTASY, AND SCIENCE FICTION, starting in April 1948, GROUND ZERO, from March 1958 to February 1960, and LUNA MONTHLY. He and Ann also published books as Luna Publications, including SPEAKING OF SCIENCE FICTION, a collection of interviews by Paul Walker. They also did typesetting for other publications, including for my own ALGOL (later STARSHIP), SCIENCE FICTION CHRONICLE, and various of my Algol Press titles, including THE BOOK OF ELLISON.

In an editorial in the December 1990 issue of SCIENCE FICTION CHRONICLE, I wrote, "Don Wollheim ... took me seriously... I must have been 13, maybe 14 at the time; I'd been reading SF for about 4-5 years. 'What you need is fandom,' is more or less what Don told me, and more to the point, he told me how I could contact this miraculous community. He gave me the name and phone number of ... Frank Dietz, who headed the New York SF Society, the Lunarians... I ... fit right in with the Lunarians. My first fannish contact, I dimly remember now, was the Lunarians Christmas party in December, 1960."

I wrote, then, "Thirty years ago this month." Now, it's fifty-three years ago. And I'm finally saying farewell to Frank Dietz.



The New York Science Fiction Society-the Lunarians, Inc.

The New York Science Fiction Society-the Lunarians, Inc., is the sponsoring group behind Lunacon. It is one of the New York Metropolitan area's oldest science fiction and fantasy clubs. A non-profit educational organization, the Lunarians was founded in November 1956 in the Bronx. Its name is derived from "Station Luna," a call sign used on recorded works by founding member Frank Dietz. The first Lunacon took place in May 1957 and has continued to be held as a yearly event (except in 1964, due to the New York World's Fair). Lunacon 2013 marks our 55th annual convention, an accomplishment few other groups have attained.

With a long and rich tradition in SF fandom, the Lunarians have had many well-known members over the years. Among them have been Donald A. Wollheim, Art Saha, Jack L. Chalker, Charles N. Brown, Elliot Shorter, John and Perdita Boardman, Andrew Porter, Seth Breidbart, Devra Langsam, Brian Burley, Ira Donewitz and Ben Yalow. We can also count Sam Moskowitz and David Kyle among our founding members. The Society's emblem known as "Little Loonie" depicts a spaceman sitting in a crescent moon reading a book. Based after designs by Christine Haycock Moskowitz and David Kyle, the current version was drawn by Wally Wood. It is also used in connection with Lunacon.

The New York Science Fiction Society-the Lunarians, Inc., in keeping with our educational purpose, has taken an active role in the future of the genre. In 1989, a scholarship fund was established by the Society whose sole purpose is to help beginning writers in science fiction and fantasy from the greater New York Metropolitan area attend both of the Clarion workshops (and now Odyssey). The scholarship fund was later renamed in memory of the late Donald A. and Elsie B. Wollheim, renowned fans, publishers and Society members. The Donald A. and Elsie B. Wollheim Memorial Scholarship Fund has been able to provide partial scholarships to over three dozen aspiring writers since its inception.

Following this, in 1992, the Society continued its educational goals with the establishment of the Isaac Asimov Memorial Award, which serves as an everlasting tribute to his contributions to the fields of science fiction and science fact. Presented usually on an annual basis at Lunacon, the award honors those who have contributed significantly to increasing the public's knowledge and understanding of science through his or her writings, and who exemplify the personal qualities which made the late Dr. Asimov so admired and well-loved. Recipients to date have been Hal Clement, Frederick Pohl, Ben Bova, Stephen Hawking, Stephen Jay Gould, Michio Kaku, Charles Sheffield, Charles Pellegrino, Arthur C. Clarke, Yoji Kondo (Eric Kotani), Neil deGrasse Tyson, Gregory Benford and Vernor Vinge. The award will not be presented this year as changes are being made to its voting procedures.

In 1997, to honor the memory of the legendary fan, fan historian and editor, the Society created the Sam Moskowitz Memorial Award for best non-fiction contribution to the genre published in the previous year. The first recipient was Vincent Di Fate for his book, "Infinite Worlds: The Fantastic Vision of Science Fiction Art".

The New York Science Fiction Society-the Lunarians, Inc. is currently concentrating its efforts on Lunacon as the club aspect of the Society goes through some structural modifications.
