The mailing label on this progress report contains: your name (as it appears in our computer), your membership number (if you are a member—if not, you are receiving this PR because you requested information on OryCon), the name that will appear on your badge (if you requested something other than your mundane name), and your address. If any information is incorrect or has changed, please let us know. The best way is by mail, but if you *must* call (503-283-0802), please *spell* out the changes.

If the name on the label starts with "T/" or "G/", the membership came with a dealer's table or was purchased as a guest of someone else, and no name has yet been given to us. If you can, let us know the name to go with the membership before the convention, and we'll have the badge ready in that name. Otherwise, the person will be stuck with being "T/something" until free time is available at Registration to print a new badge.

Memberships and dealer's tables *are* transferable. If we are notified before the con, we'll have the new badge ready. Otherwise, we require a signed note from the purchaser of the membership before we can accept the transfer.

Remember, let us know *before* the convention, and you can save time waiting in lines at the convention.

He has a Master's Degree in Science Education, and was honored for Teaching Excellence by the 1985 White House Commission on Presidential Scholars. But you don't want to know about that... the *important* thing about Michael Kube-McDowell is that he is a science fiction author. He's had dozens of stories in magazines like *Twilight Zone*, F&SF, Isaac Asimov's Science Fiction Magazine, Analog, and Amazing. Three of his stories have been adapted into episodes of the television series Tales From the Darkside. He is the author of the recently-completed Trigon Disunity" trilogy: Emprise, Enigma, and Empery, as well as the novel After the Flames. For Emprise, he was a finalist for the Philip K. Dick Award.

Michael has never been to a con in Portland, and is looking forward to it. He and Tim Powers are excited about appearing together; they have often been nominated for the same awards, but have never "appeared" together at a convention. And, lucky you, you get to see them together for the first time.

Hotel

This year OryCon moves to another Red Lion property—the Red Lion Columbia River, located near Jantzen Beach Shopping Center at the Oregon-Washington border.

The hotel is the ideal size for an OryCon. We take up all of the hotel's meeting space and will not have to contend with other groups who may or may not appreciate science fiction conventions.

As with all Red Lions, concealing face masks are not permissible in the lobby, restaurants, or bars for reasons of security. This will be a factor to notice more carefully in the Columbia River facility since access to meeting room space from the guest rooms is directly through the lobby.

Room rates for the con will be a flat \$55.00, plus tax, per night for up to four people. The reservation cards will be mailed with the second progress report later in the summer.

The hotel has expressed their enthusiasm at hosting our convention and their willingness to help in whatever ways possible. One area in which we will ask for their assistance is in helping with the difficulties in handicapped access. Elevator access to the upper and lower level meeting space is through an elevator in the kitchen area. To us this is the most unsatisfactory aspect of this hotel. However, the committee and the hotel staff will do everything possible to help ease this situation.

Speaking without a mike will be a waste of your time. No one will hear a word you say because of the size of the space and the number of people attending.

I also hope to have this year's Masquerade videotaped. Nothing on this is confirmed yet, so wish me luck.

I am, of course, in need of gofers to help out backstage and at stageside. I am also looking for a couple of "specialty acts" to help liven up the halftime break (while the judges are out). If you, or someone you know, has something appropriate to offer please contact me *soon*. I have no intention of filling these spaces at the last minute.

The same applies to anyone who has an appropriate background in costuming. I hope to encourage new people to apply for the judging positions—both in historical and in fantasy—and am hereby inviting anyone who may be interested to contact me. I would appreciate hearing from the "well known" people too.

Technical Crew

The Technical Crew is headed (and tailed) by Lauri Powers. The Technical Crew will obtain and set up equipment, and handle equipment breakdowns. The Technical Crew will will also set up the two-channel video system, which will provide science fiction programming to all hotel guests' rooms and to projection TV's in the two video rooms.

If there is interest, the masquerade can be videotaped for later broadcast over the video system. To make this happen, a camera operator must volunteer.

The Technical Crew will arrange for slide projector(s) and enough carrousels so that there will be no conflict between an event in progress and the event scheduled to start 3 minutes later. If your event requires a slide projector, notify Lauri Powers or the Programming coordinators (Anthony Pryor or Linda Pilcher) as soon as possible. Sound equipment provided for programming rooms will be minimal: One microphone per programming room.

If your event requires electricity to power equipment, you will need to let the Technical Crew know at least a week before the convention. If you plan to use substantial amounts of power, a room full of computers for example, please let the Technical Crew know even sooner so that arrangements can be made with the hotel.





Bring the Westercon back to the City of Roses


