

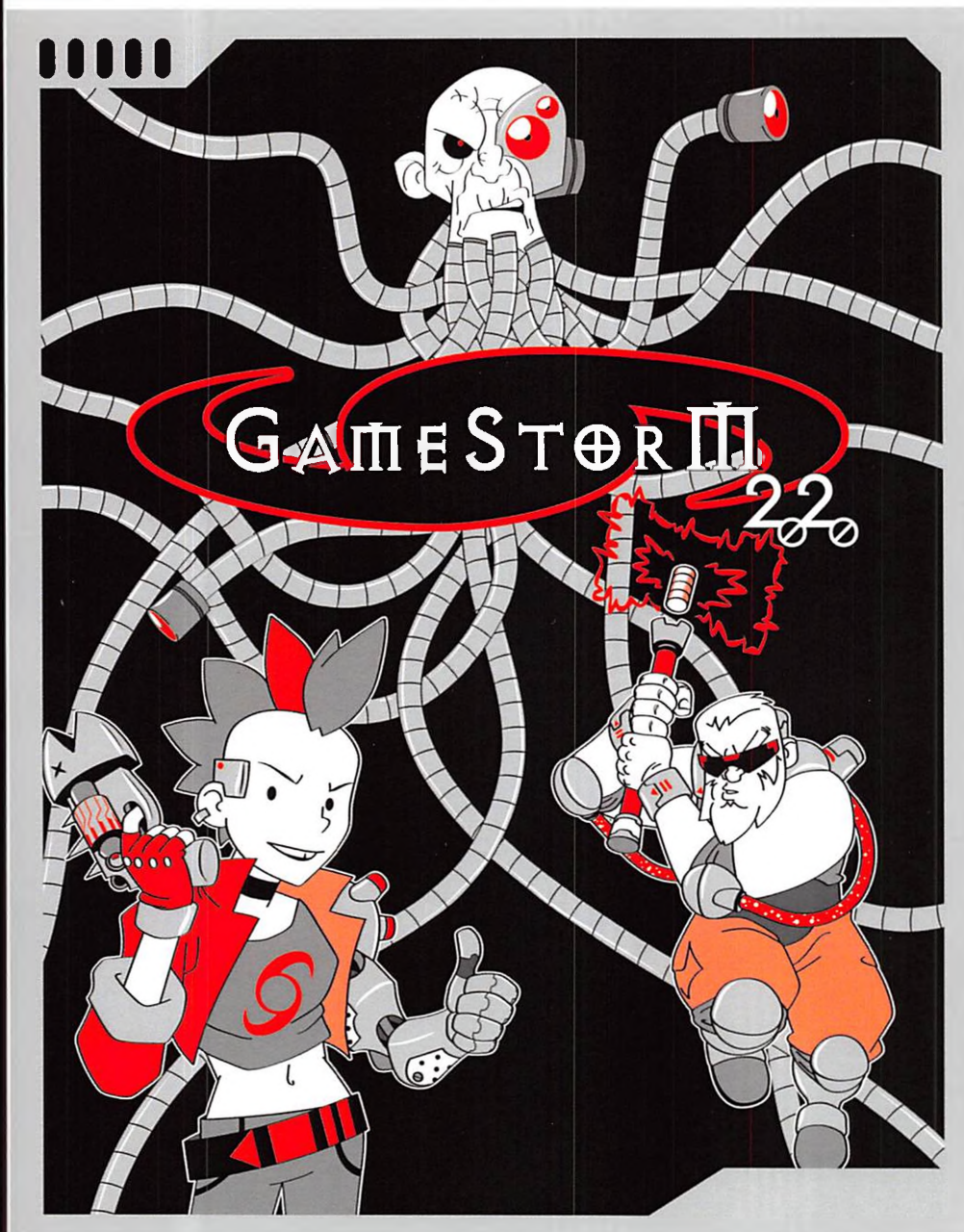

Convention Policies

Oregon Science Fiction Conventions, Inc. (OSFCI) Code of Conduct

OSFCI does not tolerate discrimination or harassment of any kind, including but not limited to physical assault, battery, deliberate intimidation, stalking, inappropriate language or unwelcome physical contact.

This policy applies to any attendee's interactions with fellow con-goers, program participants, hotel employees, and guests of the hotel, including panel discussions.

Be respectful of and courteous towards others. Attendees are expected to understand that one needs to ask before touching and that "no" means "no". If someone says "no" or "go away", an attendee's business with that person is done.

Violation of this policy can result in action by the convention committee ranging from warnings to having the violator's badge revoked with no refund, and the decision of the event

chair is final. Action by the convention in no way precludes the injured individual or the hotel from pursuing whatever remedies, civil or criminal, they see fit.

After the event, OSFCI may take further action, including banning the violator from further events.

Please note that other behaviors, including but not limited to destruction of hotel property, can also result in the actions described above.

OSFCI Statement of Inclusiveness

OSFCI is committed to creating a safe and inviting space that is inclusive of all fans, gamers, families, and members, regardless of race, ethnicity, age, orientation, or gender identity. We take security and anti-harassment policies very seriously to ensure safety and respect for all attendees of all of our sponsored events.

Weapons Policy

OryCon does not allow real weapons either as part of a costume or for everyday convention wear.

Examples include, but are not limited to, real firearms, ammunition, tasers, pepper spray, or other real weapons.

The OryCon committee and staff have the final say on what items require peace-bonding or removal to safe storage.

Props Policy Safety

We reserve the right to inspect and reject any prop and/or device at any time. Violation of this policy in part or in whole may lead to your removal from the convention by convention staff and/or from the hotel by hotel security or local authorities.

Banned items:

- Functioning projectile weapons, devices, or toys, including items meant to be thrown (See information for disabled projectile weapons below.)
- Firearms or projectile items that look like real or functioning weapons from 10 feet away

- Live steel
- Props made of metal
- Potentially dangerous props which are not part of a bona fide costume
- Props wide or long enough to inhibit hallway traffic

The OryCon committee and staff have the final say on what items require peace-bonding or removal to safe storage.

Peace-bonding:

Any item or prop that could be used as a weapon, could be dangerous, or appears to be dangerous (even if it's not), must be peace-bonded. Peace-bonding is an agreement to carry your prop safely and requires signing an acknowledgement of the requirements of safe carry. A staff member will attach a peace-tie to your item which signals to all staff that your item has been reviewed.

Purchased items:

If you buy a prop in the Exhibits Hall or Artist Alley, remember to get it peace-bonded, if needed. Also, exhibitors occasionally sell a few things that you can't carry around the con at all, like live steel

swords. If you buy one of these, you need to immediately take it off-site or to your hotel room.

Where? Peace-bonding will be conducted in the front lobby at the Peacebonding Table. Check at the Info Desk for directions.

Examples of items requiring peace-bonding:

- Any prop or device that resembles a weapon from any genre
- Toy sword made of foam

Prop conduct:

- Do not brandish or wave around props
- Do not point or aim props at anyone
- Prop firearms must have a highly visible orange tip
- Props must always stay holstered, slung, or sheathed, except while posing for photos

Special exception for disabled projectile items:

Projectile items which do not violate any other aspect of the banned items lists are allowed only if they are, or have been made, permanently non-functional. "Permanently" means

it is not possible to repair or restore the item to functionality. In most cases, this means the item must be filled with glue and all moving parts rendered immobile. This decision is at OryCon's sole discretion.

Violations

Any violation of this policy may result in a warning, temporary convention suspension, temporary or permanent membership revocation, up to and including legal action, at OryCon's discretion.

Changes

This policy may be changed at any time at our sole discretion. The most current version of this policy will be on the OryCon website, <https://orycon.org/41/policies/>. Our code of conduct is available at <http://osfci.org/code-of-conduct-2/>. Printed copies will be provided in the operations office.

Child Policy

All children must be registered with the convention, and all children purchasing memberships must be accompanied by an adult.

Children ages 5 and under are admitted

to the convention without charge and will be issued a badge that must be kept with the child (or a nearby diaper bag, for example) rather than with one of the parents. The child must be under the supervision of an adult, or in the official Child Care Area, at all times. If a young child is found unattended, he or she will be delivered to the Child Care Area and the responsible adult(s) will be billed. Children ages 6-12 are admitted at half the adult price. Children over the age of 10 may operate independently as long as they cause no problems. Those not capable of operating responsibly on their own must be kept under adult supervision or taken to the official Child Care Area. Children 6-10 need to be under the supervision of someone age 16 and up. All children 12 or under must be under direct adult supervision after 8 PM. Children 8 and over may work as convention volunteers, but those ages 8-11 may do so for no more than 4 hours per day. Those ages 12-16 may do so for no more than 6 hours per day.

Smoking Policy

Smoking allowed in designated areas only.

Vaping is considered smoking for purposes of this policy. Vaping is allowed in designated areas only.

Party Policy

What is a party?

Any event held in hotel space where:

- Fliers are posted
- Public invitations are given out (verbally or written)
- If Convention Committee or Hotel Security deems it to be a party.

Rules:

A member of OryCon must register the party with OryCon Hotel Liason. This person will be responsible to see that the rest of the rules are followed in their party.

The list of parties will be handed off to the OryCon Party Coordinator at con.

Responsible individual must not be under the influence of alcohol.

A contact list for individuals responsible for each party must be given to the OryCon Party Coordinator prior to the event.

If alcoholic drinks are served ALL members must show valid identification.

Responsible individual must attend their party during party hours, or if needed, leave someone connected with them in charge with a way to be contacted if they are required to be somewhere else.

No alcoholic drinks in other hotel or convention space. All alcohol must remain in the party room.

Comply with all hotel rules and Oregon state law. If you do something that gains the attention of the hotel (noise complaints, smoking, etc.) then the person or persons responsible for the room and party are responsible for any fines or legal problems that may arise.

Photo Policy

By entering the OryCon convention space, members consent to video and/or audio recording by both OryCon staff and other event attendees.

Visual recording includes both photography and videography.

Some convention spaces or events will

prohibit or restrict visual and/or audio recording; signs will be posted indicating such restrictions.

For the purpose of visual recording, OryCon event spaces are not public.

Attendees may ask photographers and videographers to not be specifically recorded; however, unintentional or non-specific recording is likely due to the nature of the convention.

People have a reasonable expectation of privacy and the right to control visual and audio recording in their hotel rooms.

When stopping for photography in a hallway, please be brief and do not block the flow of hallway traffic. Be aware that a flash or other light source may interfere with event activities.

OryCon will only accept submissions if they include an explicit statement from the owner of the work giving OryCon permission to reproduce, publish, and distribute the work for the purpose of promoting OryCon. Submissions must be sent in the form of links to online galleries

(Flickr, YouTube, Photobucket, Facebook, etc.). Attachments will be ignored. Please send all submissions to photos[at]orycon.org.

Signage Policy

Signs may be attached to vinyl walls with blue painters tape only.

Pet Policy

While we appreciate that this hotel is pet friendly, all nonservice animals are not to be brought into function space. This includes suites that are being utilized for programming. This is for the safety and comfort of all our members. When not in function space please follow all rules set by the hotel and local laws. This includes leash laws and cleaning up after your pet.

Volunteers

Want to be in on the know at the convention? Have an hour to kill between activities? You should volunteer because Orycon runs on Blood, Sweat, and Volunteers. We know this, we have the T-shirt. Volunteers are the stuff from which great conventions are made. Some of it is as simple as sitting in a

chair, checking badges. We have more complex stuff, but either way, we need you and it's a great way to get that amazing feeling of helping out and feeling appreciated without making a huge time commitment.

And the perks! The Perks! We got stuff! There is cool swag available for volunteers on the last day of con. Great things from the vendors' tables and other wonderful items are donated just to reward volunteers. Picking order for your reward is based on hours worked. The fan with the most hours gets to pick their swag first, so the more hours you volunteer, the greater the chance of you getting the best swag.

Activities & Events

Art Show

The OryCon Art Show features fantastical works from all facets of fandom. From steampunk to faeries, dragons to deathstars our artists translate their visions into two and even three dimensions! Stop by and see what your favorite local artist has been up to in the last year, and discover new artists who have recently joined us. While visiting the Art Show, be sure to fill out a ballot for the Member's Favorites Awards!

Featured events this year include Artist Pictionary, with favorite artists of the convention, along with Scheduled Artist Demos and Sketchbook Critiques that are happening on Friday and Saturday, and Saturday morning, Art Show is located in the Exhibit Hall next to the Dealer's Room and is open to membership. Please do not bring in any food or drink. No photography is allowed in the Art Show.

Child Care

Childcare will be provided by professional adult nannies. The parent or legal guardian must sign a medical waiver so that the nanny can release the child for emergency medical care in the event of an emergency and the parents cannot be located in a timely fashion. We also require a liability waiver. Both forms will be available at check in. Scrip will be available at the rate of \$5 per hour or 5 hours for \$20. For security purposes, the room number will only be given to scrip purchasing convention members at the OryCon Info Desk in the main lobby.

Waivers are available on the orycon.org website. Low allergy healthy snacks, safe toys, G-rated videos, games and arts and crafts will be available. We plan on having beds and a playpen for naps in a separate room from the play area, in case your child needs quiet time. The kids always have a lot of fun. We do not have any spare diapers so please leave all the necessary supplies for infants and toddlers in training pants. Pajamas might be a good idea if

the child is staying late. Hot meals, bottle or spoon feeding snacks, medication and special nutritional needs, are the responsibility of the parents. Please alert the nannies of any allergies. This service is provided on a first-come, first-served basis. The nannies are legally allowed to take only a certain number of kids (total number is age dependent) at a time. A \$10 surcharge will be applied for late pickup. For more information or to donate child-appropriate items please contact childcare@orycon.org.

Children's Programming / OryKids

OryKids' goal is to provide a slate of programming to make OryCon a more family-friendly event and, of course, fun for kids! OryKids programs explore fan interests like gaming, costuming, crafts, music, science and writing as well as kid stuff like story times and play times. We have designed activities to appeal to a wide age range (3-12) with some events listing specific ages, and our programs are scheduled all in one

room on the lower level, down the hall from the Dealer's room. OryKids is made possible by a great group of volunteers, so please be kind to them! Please note that our programs are not childcare and that OryCon rules and common sense should guide caregivers in whether or not to accompany a participating child.

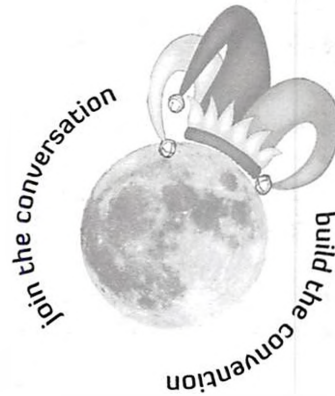

In Memoriam

Barbara Oldham, 65, died on June 10, 2019. From Portland, Barbara was an avid reader of SF, attending and participating in the committees of SF Cons at home and abroad. Barbara's health issues caused her to decline physically in the last few years but she never complained and she never missed an OryCon. She was a proud member of the group who have attended every single OryCon. She had a delightful sense of humor and enjoyed a whole family of stuffed pet/friends who often accompanied her at conventions

Anthony "Skip" Ward, 70, died on July 11, 2019. Skip was born in Oregon in 1949 and was a member of The Society of Strangers that put on at least two science fiction conventions in Portland in the early 1970s. While still in college; Skip was an early member of the SCA and active in west coast APAs. After retirement, he returned to his family home in Portland in the 1990s, renewing his friendship with long time Portland fan, John Andrews. Skip worked in the Multnomah County library system and rejoined the Portland fannish community.

John A Pitts, 54, died October 3, 2019. John learned to love sci-fi at the knee of his

grandmother, listening to her read authors like Edgar Rice Burroughs and Robert E. Howard. Best known for the Sarah Beauhall urban fantasy series, he also published short fiction (including a collaboration with Ken Scholes). He earned a BA in English and a Masters of Library Science at the University of Kentucky, and worked in the technology sector. He is survived by his wife Kathy Pitts, daughter Emily, and son Patrick.

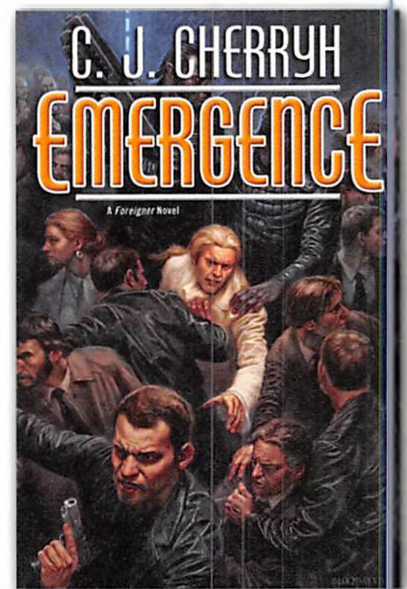
Lifetime Achievement



I write full time; I travel; I try out things. She never took to the piano lessons, much to her later regret (it would have made it much easier to write midi accompaniment for a number of Firebird Arts & Music CDs). In grade school, when she asked to learn the flute, the adults consulted and decided her fingers would have trouble with the fingering and she found herself with a French horn and was told that it would sound much like a flute (not!). She learned to sing from Julie Andrews movies and Peter, Paul and Mary records and learned

guitar from various family members. Harmony, she picked up from church hymnals when she found she couldn't sing in the key everyone else sang, but noticed there were convenient harmony notes in the hymnal. So when Cecilia discovered filk music in the mid-1980's she was well-prepared by past artistic endeavors, and fell in with friends who wanted to sing about Dr. Who, Blake's Seven, Star Trek, and songs about science fiction and fantasy books. She was soon writing lyrics and original music and performing at conventions across the US, Canada and England. Her music can be found on two CDs, Of Shoes and Ships and Harmony in Practice. 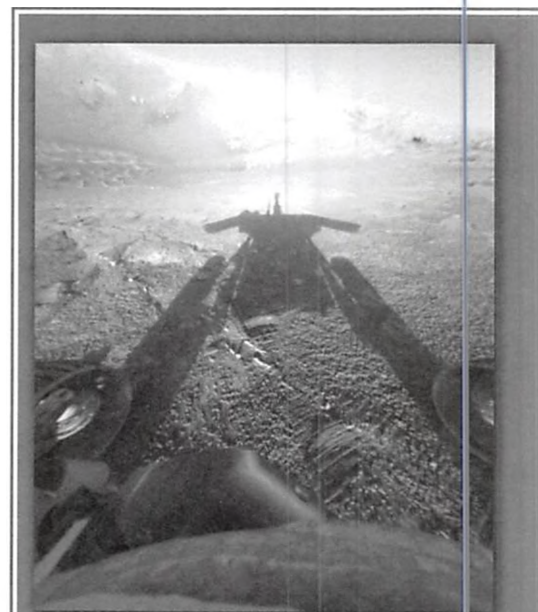
CD Woodbury
