Global Science Fiction Event Heads to Melbourne

After Anticipation, the recent World Science Fiction Convention (Worldcon) held in Montreal, Canada, in August, the eyes of the global science fiction community now turn to Melbourne. Aussiecon 4, to be held 2-6 September 2010 at the new Melbourne Convention and Exhibition Centre, will be the 68th Worldcon since 1939. The five-day event represents a rare opportunity for Australian science fiction, fantasy and horror aficionados to join with authors, editors, agents, and other members of the international and Australian science fiction community.

The five-day Aussiecon 4 event will comprise several concurrent streams of panel discussions on a wide range of speculative fiction topics -- including writing process and craft, explorations of popular culture, young adult fiction and themes, Guest Of Honour presentations, academic theory and many more. Other key attractions include one of the largest science fiction Art Shows for the year, a Dealers Room encompassing books, short story anthologies, magazines, comics, DVDs and collectables, and a glittering Masquerade.

Key drawcards at Aussiecon 4 will be official Guests of Honour <u>Kim Stanley Robinson</u>, multi-award winning author of the Mars trilogy (*Red Mars*, *Blue Mars* and *Green Mars*), as well as numerous other novels, and <u>Shaun Tan</u>, award-winning artist and writer whose works include the acclaimed wordless novel, *The Arrival*, and *The Rabbits*. A large number of international and Australian authors are also expected to attend.

According to Rose Mitchell, Co-Chair of the Aussiecon 4 organising committee, the premium field of authors, illustrators and other leading industry figures will be the largest ever assembled in Australia. "Worldcon is a truly amazing and unique phenomenon," Mitchell said. "It has all the features of an international writers or film festival, but celebrates a very specific genre -- science fiction, fantasy and horror.

"Worldcon comes to Australia just once in a decade, and brings together several thousand professionals and enthusiasts from around the world -- all of whom share a passion for science fiction, fantasy and horror. I can't recall another event here in Australia where one can have casual conversations with favourite authors and artists while simply wandering around the convention!"

One of the star events of every Worldcon is the presentation of the prestigious Hugo Awards for science fiction and fantasy achievements in fiction, film and fandom (and more). The 2010 Hugo Award winners will be determined by the votes of those who register to attend Aussiecon 4 early. Recent 2009 winners include Anticipation Guest of Honour Neil Gaiman for *The Graveyard Book* and Joss Whedon for *Doctor Horrible's Sing-Along Blog*.

AUSSIECON 4 ANNOUNCES RECORD HUGO NOMINATION TURNOUT

Aussiecon 4, the 2010 World Science Fiction Convention ("Worldcon") taking place in Melbourne, Australia 2 - 6 September, received a record number of nominations for the 2010 Hugo Awards, science fiction's most prestigious and storied awards.

The convention received 864 nominating ballots, up from 799 nomination ballots received at Anticipation, the 2009 Worldcon in Montreal, Quebec, and 483 nomination ballots at Denvention, the 2008 Worldcon in Denver, Colorado. Nominations arrived from 20 countries on 6 continents.

"We are absolutely delighted to have such a record-breaking nomination year," said Perry Middlemiss, cochair of Aussiecon 4. "It's been a wonderful year for science fiction and fantasy, and we worked hard to encourage fans from all over the world to tell us what they thought was the very best the field has to offer. The nomination turnout assures that the nominations this year will truly be world-class work. We can't wait to see fans from all over the globe here in Melbourne in September."

This year's Hugo Award nominations will be announced 22:00 BST, Easter Sunday 4 April, at Odyssey 2010, this year's Eastercon (British National Science Fiction Convention). Balloting for the Hugo Awards will commence thereafter and will conclude on 31 July at midnight, PST. The Hugo Awards themselves will be announced at the Hugo Awards Ceremony at Aussiecon 4 in Melbourne on Sunday, 5 September 2010.

The Hugo Awards are the premier award in the science fiction genre, honoring science fiction literature and media as well as the genre's fans. The first Hugos were awarded at the 1953 World Science Fiction Convention in Phildelphia (Philcon II), and have honored science fiction and fantasy notables such as Robert Heinlein, Issac Asimov, Robert Silverberg, Ursula K. Le Guin, J.K. Rowling, Neil Gaiman and many others.

Aussiecon 4 (http://www.aussiecon4.org.au/) is the 2010 World Science Fiction Convention ("Worldcon"), the yearly gathering of the World Science Fiction Society (WSFS), an organization dedicated to the promotion of the science fiction and fantasy genres. Robin Johnson, chair of the first Aussiecon and a longtime conference organizer.

Best-selling Young Adult writer Garth Nix will serve as the Master of Ceremonies for the Hugo Award Ceremony on Sunday, September 5.

Winner: "The Perforation" by Helen Stubbs, The Gold Coast, Queensland, Australia.

"This is my first competition win, so I'm delighted," Helen said. "It's fun to superimpose a speculative reality onto our homeland. Playing with local places in an imaginative way enriches our culture and expands and develops our identities as creative individuals." Helen has recently been awarded a Regional Arts Development grant to write a novel. The winning story will be published in Aussiecon 4 Souvenir Book.

1st Runner Up: "The Rise & Fall of a Fair Dinkum Superhero" by Aidan Doyle, Melbourne, Victoria, Australia

"It's always nice to know that other people enjoy my writing," Aidan said. "I wanted to write a superhero story set in Australia. With great power comes great responsibility. Fortunately for most concerned, Australia has had little power on the global scale." Aidan attended the Clarion Writers Workshop and had about a dozen stories published since 1993.

"I wondered what a device called a 'Make Ready' would do and in what type of world people would benefit from it," Brooke said. "I'm both grateful and thrilled to be highly commended in this competition." In 2006, Brooke was shortlisted for the Allen & Unwin Young Writers' Award for "Wrong End of the Gun" for writers under 21.
