### Bucconeer Facilities Update by Marty Gear

For *Bucconeer*, we will utilize the new section of the Baltimore Convention Center and four major hotels. At the BCC, we currently have a reservation for 185,000 square feet of exhibit/function space as well as 30 meeting rooms. This represents a 60% increase in the amount of space we used for *ConStellation* (the 1983 Worldcon).


Most of the daytime activities as well as the Hugo Ceremonies and the Masquerade will be held in the Convention Center, located across the street from Oriole Park at Camden Yards and three blocks from Baltimore's Inner Harbor dining and shopping area.

Our four hotels are the Baltimore Marriott Inner Harbor, The Holiday Inn Inner Harbor, the Radisson Plaza Lord Baltimore, and the Omni Inner Harbor Hotel. We have paired our hotels so that the party hotels will be the Marriott and the Holiday Inn, which are directly across from each other on Eutaw Street. The quiet hotels will be the Omni and the Radisson, which are joined by an overhead walkway.

We are planning for the evening activities, except the Masquerade and the Hugo Award ceremony, to take place at the Marriott/Holiday Inn pair, although some activities such as the Regency Dance are tentatively planned for the Radisson.

# **Broadside One Discussion Topics Results**

I received a total of nine replies to our request for comments on our Topics for Discussion in Broadside One.

We got one response on the question, "Should we release our pirate apprentices from their apprenticeship at the end of *Bucconeer*?" Dean Gahlon felt we should, "...especially if you can do it in a way that adds to the silliness of it all." Dean, would we do it any other way? We have our first professional writer apprentice, Patricia A. McKillip, who just reached the age of twelve in 1996. She will be a pirate apprentice until the year 2032 unless we release her at the end of *Bucconeer*. Our other apprentices are Jane Sarah Dahl, Michael Nevin, and Philip Schmitt.

Our question on badge design produced the greatest amount of discussion. Many of the respondents felt that displaying their True Name in the largest possible font size was the most important factor. Doug Faunt made a suggestion that badges could

include ham radio operator callsigns or e-mail addresses. Nearly everyone agreed that including a member's city, state/province, and country in medium to large type was important. Steven Ritter was the only respondent who wanted to give members the choice of displaying their fannish name in large type with their True Name placed below in smaller type. For the badge holders, clips were preferred over pins. And Rob Liptak thought that Bucconeer should limit itself to one uniform badge design for everyone. Your editor was the only person who felt we should use name eye patches instead of badges.

We got a lukewarm response to the question, "Should our Con Suite serve beer (local microbrewery only) in the evenings?" A small majority felt we should serve beer. I think Mark Olson said it best with his answer, "Yes." Several people said we should try to control the amount of drinking by using drink tickets, punch cards, or some other means.

Only two people had opinions about children at *Bucconeer*. But I'm afraid that steel cages and cattle prods are not realistic options. *Bucconeer* 

parents and kids—we really need your opinions to help us plan the child care and children's programming for *Bucconeer*. Please send your ideas to Mary Morman, our Child Care and Babysitting Coordinator; and John Pomeranz, our Programming Manager, at *Bucconeer*'s postal or e-mail address.

Steven Ritter voted affirmatively seven times for holding a Crab Feast. Several other people fondly remembered *ConStellation*'s Crab Feast in 1983 and were also in favor of another one.

Because *Bucconeer* will run from Wednesday to Sunday rather than the more usual Thursday to Monday, we are considering scheduling the Hugo Award ceremonies on Friday evening. On the question of which evenings we should plan to schedule our major events, nearly all of our respondents were in favor of holding the Masquerade on Saturday night.

For our last question about arranging special behind-the-scenes tours, there was interest in having a tour of the NASA Goddard Space Center in Greenbelt, Maryland. The people who responded clearly wanted any such tours to occur before or after *Bucconeer*.

Whoa! Oops, I mean, Avast ye matey! We have less than two years to go before we have to put on a Worldcon or reveal that the whole thing was a colossal hoax. Your committee is still deep in the planning stage for *Bucconeer*. There's still time left to influence our decisions. Please send your comments before March 31,1997 for publication in Broadside Three. We are also open to suggestions for new topics for Broadside Four.

# **Bucconeer** Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) List

by Perrianne Lurie

(Editor's Note: Perrianne is Bucconeer's Keeper of the E-Mail. She is the person behind baltimore 98@access. digex.net. The following is a list of some commonly asked questions.)

#### I. Memberships

- **Q:** Can I send in my credit card membership payment via e-mail?
- A: No. We cannot accept memberships via electronic mail. Credit cards are accepted by mail or at our Fan Tables at conventions that we attend.
- Q: What do I get for my membership? A: Supporting members will receive all available publications, may nominate and vote for the 1998 Hugo awards, select the 1999 Hugo awards nominees, and vote for the site of the 2001 Worldcon (after paying the voting fee).

Attending members have the additional right to attend all five days of Bucconeer and the 1998 World Science Fiction Society business meeting.

Children do not receive any publications (except for any special child-oriented publications we may send) and do not include any voting privileges (except for any child-oriented awards we may organize), but may attend Bucconeer as long as they are accompanied by a parent or other responsible adult at all times. Children's memberships will also include access to babysitting, but we have not determined how many hours will be included in the membership; additional hours of babysitting will be available for purchase.

- **Q:** I already have a supporting membership, but I want to attend.
- A: You can convert your supporting membership into an attending membership by paying the difference between a supporting and an attending membership at the time you're converting your membership. You would subtract \$30 (the cost of a supporting membership) from the cost of an attending membership (currently \$110) to get a conversion rate of \$80.

#### II. Dealers' Room

- Q: How can I reserve tables in the Dealers' Room?
- A: We are accepting deposits of \$50 per table to reserve up to five tables. A deposit merely puts you on the Dealers mailing list, just like an inquiry does. There are no guarantees of acceptance into the Bucconeer Dealers' Room. Final decisions probably won't be made until early 1998. If you are not selected, your deposit will be refunded.

To reserve space, send a check or money order payable to Bucconeer or credit card information (account holder name, account number, and expiration date) for Visa, MasterCard (Access), or American Express to Bucconeer, P.O. Box 314, Annapolis Junction, Maryland 20701 USA. If you wish to pay in British pounds sterling, send a cheque or money order to John Dallman, c/o EDS Unigraphics, Parker's House, 46 Regent Street, Cambridge, CB2 IDB, GB. Include a letter telling us how many tables you re reserving your real name. business name, postal address, telephone number(s), e-mail address(es), and a detailed description of the type of merchandise you plan to sell.

- Q: How many memberships do I get with my tables?
- A: None. You will need to purchase attending memberships for anyone who will be working at your table during Bucconeer.
- **Q:** How much will the tables cost?
- A: We don't know yet, but if you're on the Dealers mailing list, we'll let you know as soon as the price has been set.

#### III. Volunteers

- **Q:** How can I volunteer to work on *Bucconeer*?
- A: Send us a letter or e-mail with your name, address, and e-mail address and we'll send you our Volunteer Questionnaire. Or stop by our table at a con near you, or drop by one of our committee meetings.
- **Q:** If I'm a volunteer, do I have to purchase a membership?

A: Yes. Everyone except for our Guests of Honor must purchase an attending membership. If we have a surplus after the convention is over, your membership fee will be refunded if you worked at least the minimum number of hours. (The exact number of hours has not yet been determined, but we'll let you know once it has.)

#### IV. Programming

- **Q:** I'm an author/artist/editor/scientist fan and I'd like to be on the program.
- A: Great. Our programming team will be sending out invitations in early 1998. We'll keep your name and address on file if you send us a letter telling us what your interests are and how we can contact you.

# Golden Duck Award for Excellence in Children's Science Fiction Literature

The Golden Age of science fiction is 12. Most of us started reading as children, but no Hugo category honors those that write science fiction for children. Most children's librarians and teachers are of the opinion that science fiction is garbage or if asked to name a children's science fiction book, can only recall A Wrinkle in Time.

The Golden Duck Award was created by several interested fans who were unsuccessful in lobbying for a children's Hugo in 1991. It is a cash award, funded by *Duckon*, a western Chicago suburbs convention that started in 1992. Anyone can nominate a children's science fiction book to the committee. The committee takes suggestions from interested parties and narrows down the field to approximately five books in each category with one write-in position. Then anyone agreeing to read all books in a given category can vote in that category. We vote Australian style similar to the Hugo ballot. The winners are announced at the Worldcon each year.

# U.S. Navy Foils Piracy Threat

BALTIMORE, Nov. 17, 1996—The USS Constellation was moved 1½ miles from Baltimore's Inner Harbor to a dry dock at Fort McHenry Shipyard in response to rumors that the Pirates of Fenzance were planning to capture the Navy's only remaining Civil War-era vessel. While the 179 foot long wooden all-sail warship is being sheltered, it will undergo a major \$9 million restoration. In the spring of 1999—when the threat of piracy is over—the Constellation will return to its regular berth, where it has been a popular attraction since 1955.

# **Buckyballs Earn The 1996 Nobel Prize for Chemistry**

On October 9, 1996, the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences cited Robert F. Curl Jr. and Richard E. Smalley, both of Rice University in Houston, Texas and Harold W. Kroto of the University of Sussex in England, for their collaborative discovery of a third form of carbon, the buckminsterfullerene.

The most common "fullerene," or "buckyball," is composed of 60 carbon atoms bound in a soccer ball shape arranged in 20 hexagons and 12 pentagons. These findings in 1985 have spurred a search for new substances, polymers, catalysts, and drug-delivery systems. The discovery has prompted novel insights into superconducting materials and the origins of the universe.

The buckyball has also become the first official molecule of a Worldcon (and you thought ethanol was *Bucconeer's* official molecule). The buckminsterfullerene was named in honor of R. Buckminster Fuller, designer of the similarly contoured geodesic dome. We have adopted the buckyball as a symbol of the near-future technology we wish to showcase at *Bucconeer*.

### **Coming Attractions**

The next Broadside should arrive in your mailbox in June. In BS Three, we will bring you an article on how to publish a story in *Analog* by John W. Campbell Award nominee Michael A. Burstein; a little surprise for our Chairman, Peggy Rae Pavlat; and some memories from Michael Walsh, the chairman of *ConStellation*—Baltimore's first Worldcon in 1983.
