

First Fandom and Big Heart Awards

Three First Fandom awards were announced during Chicon 8's opening ceremonies. The Big Heart Award for service to fandom was also presented.

First Fandom was created in 1958 as an organization for those active in science fiction or fannish activities by the time of the first Worldcon in 1939. Now, anyone who has engaged in correspondence, collecting, conventions, fanzine publishing or reading, writing, or a science fiction club for at least 30 years may be eligible for Associate Membership. These three awards were voted on by the members.

FIRST FANDOM HALL OF FAME AWARD: George W. Price

The First Fandom Hall of Fame, created in 1963, is a prestigious achievement award given to a living recipient who has made significant contributions to Science Fiction throughout their lifetime.

George W. Price was introduced to science fiction in 1947. He became active in fandom in the early-1950s and was a member of the Philadelphia Science Fiction Society. His first convention was TASFiC. In 1953, he joined the University of Chicago Science Fiction Club, and was later elected president. Beginning in 1965, he began hosting monthly science fiction parties at his home which continued for 20 years. He became an early partner in Advent: Publishers. A technical writer, Army veteran, college graduate and chemical engineer with a life-long interest in limericks and puns, he has been an active science fiction fan for more than 70 years.

POSTHUMOUS HALL OF FAME AWARD: August Derleth

The Posthumous Hall of Fame was created in 1994 to acknowledge people in Science Fiction who should have, but did not, receive that type of recognition during their lifetimes.

August Derleth was an internationally respected fan, author, editor, correspondent, poet, lecturer and publisher of science fiction as well as a writer of mystery, horror fiction, regional fiction and natural history. In addition, he was a 1938 Guggenheim Fellow and a co-founder in 1939 of Arkham House. In 1948, he was elected president of the Associated Fantasy Publishers at Torcon (the 6th Worldcon). Derleth wrote more than 150 short stories and more than 100 books during his lifetime. It is for these historic accomplishments that August Derleth is being inducted this year into the First Fandom Posthumous Hall of Fame.

SAM MOSKOWITZ ARCHIVE AWARD: Doug Ellis and Deb Fulton

Sam Moskowitz Archive Award was created in 1998 to recognize not only someone who has assembled a world-class collection but also what has actually been done with it.

Doug Ellis and Deb Fulton run one of the most important pulp conventions that focuses on original artwork, pulps and films covering the past history of the field: the annual Windy City Pulp and Paper Convention.

Doug and Deb are major collectors of artwork and pulp magazines who generously share their holdings with other fans. They have conducted significant research and written important books that help perpetuate the memory of past genre artists. Doug is the author of dozens of essays and, with Deb, has edited and published *Pulp Vault* for more than 20 years.

It is for the unique collection that they have assembled and for the service that they have given to the field for decades that the members of First Fandom selected Doug Ellis and Deb Fulton to receive the Sam Moskowitz Archive Award for 2022.

BIG HEART AWARD: Mark Linneman

Mark Linneman was presented the Big Heart Award, fandom's highest service award.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE AWARD: The Internet Science Fiction Database

The Internet Science Fiction Database was honored with a special committee award by Chicon 8.

Special Guest and Guest of Honor Introductions

Rounding out the ceremony, our special guests and guests of honor were invited to join Charlie Jane and Annalee for an insightful conversation. We were (briefly) given a glimpse into the wonderful worlds of story creation, artistic expression, academic endeavors, and fan celebrations.

Safer Spaces

Looking for a place where you can relax and gather out of the attention of the dominant culture? Need a place to pray or meditate? Need a place with less stimulation and softer lights?

We have the spaces for you. As part of the diversity and inclusion initiatives, this year's Chicon is including several Safer Spaces, an Interfaith Space, and the Tranquility Base (Low Sensory Space). While anyone is welcome in the Interfaith Space and Tranquility Base (Low Sensory Space), we do request that those not part of the Safer Space's designated group not enter those spaces.

All of the Safer Spaces are found on the Blue Level in the West Tower, just across the skybridge and to the right.

People with Disabilities Safer Space (Found in Gallery 5): This room is a space set aside for People with Disabilities, both visible and invisible. Intentionally created with a more open plan to allow for better use of mobility assisting devices, this is a place where you can relax without being stared at, and it is set up to accommodate recharging scooters and other necessary devices. Here you can gather with others who understand the challenges of living with a disability and discuss frankly without worrying about able bodied opinions.

LGBTQ+ Safer Space (Located in Gallery 4): This space is for anyone who identifies as part of the LGBTQIAA+ spectrum. This room is a space for you to be able to rest, recharge, and find community with other Queer Folx from all around the world, without having to worry about the pressures of a heteronormative culture. Informal gatherings are encouraged and specific events may be considered – just reach out and ask.

BIPOC Safer Space (Situated in Gallery 3): This space is for Black, Indigenous, and other People of Color to be able to rest, recharge and find community away from normative white culture. In addition to being a place for impromptu discussions of the panels, events, and other goings on at the convention, it can also host more organized events – just check in and ask.

Interfaith Space (Occupying Gallery 2 is the Interfaith Space): In addition to hosting certain religious services already noted in the program schedule, this room is also set aside for Friends of Bill W. Meetings from 6pm to 7pm each night, and it is also open for the Islamic times of prayer. Any time with events not scheduled the room is open for prayer or meditation by anyone. An e-Reader with sacred texts form a variety of religions is also available here. If you would like to lead a service for your religious group, please ask.

Tranquility Base (Low Sensory Space, Housed in Gallery 1): This space is for those who are feeling overwhelmed by the convention, with all the extra noise, the bright lights, and the quantity of people. This space is intentionally kept a bit dimmer and quieter than the other spaces, and it is the perfect place to find the quiet you need to rest, recharge, and restore your balance if you're feeling maxed out.

WSFS Preliminary Business Meeting Report (Friday)

Friday's Preliminary WSFS Business Meeting set debate time limits for all pending Constitutional amendments and Standing Rules changes. No proposed Constitutional amendments were postponed indefinitely (killed). The four proposed Hugo Award eligibility extensions passed without objection. Most committees were continued as currently constituted; however, the Hugo Awards Study Committee was not continued and was thus dissolved, although proposals submitted by the committee will be considered this year. The meeting ran out of time to consider proposed changes to the Standing Rules and the two non-Hugo-Award-related Resolutions, so they will be considered at tomorrow's meeting.

Saturday's first Main Business Meeting will start with the elections for the WSFS Mark Protection Committee, followed by consideration of two changes to the Standing Rules (C.1 and C.2), followed by Resolutions D.5 and D.6. After that, the meeting will take up the Constitutional amendments pending ratification, starting with item E.1. If time permits, the meeting will then start considering newly proposed Constitutional amendments. Item F.2 will be considered before F.1. Item F.6 was specifically postponed until Sunday's meeting, with a provision that it not come up before F.5. All references to item numbers are to the WSFS Business Meeting agenda, which is available on the Chicon website.

The Saturday Business Meeting will start at 10 AM sharp in Crystal Ballroom B on the ground floor of the West Tower.

2022 Nommo Awards

The 2022 winners of the African Speculative Fiction Society's Nommo Awards were announced today in a ceremony held at Chicon 8. The Awards were hosted by Sheree Renée Thomas and presented by previous winners Chikodili Emelumadu, Wole Talabi and Oghenechovwe Donald Ekpeki.

The African Speculative Fiction Society, composed of professional and semiprofessional African writers, editors, publishers, graphic artists and filmmakers, was founded in 2016. Members of the African Speculative Fiction Society nominate the short list and then vote for the winners in each category. This is the sixth year that the Nommo Awards have been given, prize money sponsored by Tom Ilube CBS. This is the first year that a panel of readers have contributed to the selection.

The host for the awards, Sheree Renée Thomas, said of African speculative writing: "What makes African speculative writing distinctive is not just a matter of geography, for in the African novel, the continent and her nations are not merely a setting to serve as an accessory to the storytelling, but the people, their communities, and their cultures are an essential foundation from which the writing springs."

All works are speculative fiction, were published between January 1, 2021 – December 31, 2021, and are by Africans as defined by the ASFS and Nommo Awards Guidelines.



The Nommos were presented for the first time in 2017. The awards are named for twins from Dogon cosmology who take a variety of forms, including appearing on land as fish, walking on their tails.

Ad Astra: Navigating the Stars of Fandom

Humans have long navigated this world by gazing up at the night sky, following the patterns and constellations shining down upon them. Similar to how we have relied upon the stars to guide our way, we are fortunate to have dedicated fans to guide us towards a greater enjoyment and appreciation of conventions.

Sam Lubell, a longtime convention attendee and newsletter editor for last year's DisCon III, has generously provided these definitions for new Worldcon members! These interpretations will be especially helpful as new attendees join us over the weekend.

Con Suite: Place where convention members can find free (soft) drinks and light munchies. These are not meant to replace a meal but instead provide a quick snack. Please take your food next door to the con suite eating area.

Fanzine: Sometimes just called a "zine," a fanzine is a publication put out by one or more fans. Some are written entirely by one person (a perzine or personal zine) while others resemble a magazine with articles by different authors. The **Fanzine Lounge** (pictured below) is a good place to read fanzines and learn about how to get your own copies.

Filk: The "music of fandom," these are songs on subjects of interest to fans ranging from space exploration to cats and computers. These songs are often sung to tunes borrowed from folk music (or other sources) and sometimes to original music. It is called filk because someone many conventions ago made a typo (it was supposed to be folk music) and it stuck. Conventions frequently have filking in the evenings. The **Chicon_Guide** has filking in ROOM starting at TIME.

Table Talks: These are sometimes called *Kaffeeklatches*. These are small group conversations with a guest, ranging from talking about an author's latest books to anything the guest (and the audience) want to discuss. This is a good way to learn more about an author, or take a chance and sign up for a table talk with someone whose name you don't recognize. This could be a way to make a new friend and learn about what new authors/editors/publishers go through in today's market.
