We have had many distinguished additions to the convention program. Among them is Dr. Hermann Muller, Nobel Prize winner in biology, who will speak on LIFE ELSEWHERE AND ELSEWHEN. Speaking in a lighter vein are Robert Bloch, whose topic is "What Every Young Spaceman Should Know", and L. Sprague de Camp, telling us "How to Write a Science-Fiction Story."

Hans Stefan Santesson, editor of the Unicorn Mystery Book Club, has as his topic "Editors: Myth and Reality." Dr. Oscar C. Brauner will review the book Poethistoric Man.

Added to our board of pseudoscience experts is s-f author Randall Garrett, who will entertain us with his learned discourse on "The Perfect Thermoplastic." Harlan Ellison, fan editor and (as those who have ever met him will agree) a colorful personality, will talk on an unspecified subject. Being prewarned by our spies, we are keeping smelling salts, fire extinguishers, and our Sergeant-at-Arms handy.

Sam Moskowitz, long-time fan and author of The Immortal Storm, a monumental history of fandom, will be moderator of a debate between Walter A. Willis, editor of Slant, and Edward Wood, co-editor of The Journal of Science-Fiction. The topic of debate will be "Fandom---Is It Still A Force in Science-Fiction?" Mr. Willis will take the affirmative and Mr. Wood the negative.

The Philadelphia Science-Fiction Society tells us that they are preparing a skit for us, but have sworn us to secrecy regarding its subject. Take our word for it, though---it sounds like it'll be the surprise hit of the entertainment session!

Toastmaster for the banquet will be Will F. Jenkins---better known to the science-fiction world as Murray Leinster. Also speaking at the

Featured on the Monday evening entertainment program will be an event unique, we believe, in science-fiction history. It is the first science-fiction ballet, the story of one spaceman meeting his fate in outer space. Entitled ASTEROID, and with original music composed especially for it, the ballet will be danced by the University of Chicago Knights of the Ballet, under the direction of Guy Bassett. Costumes, designed by Perdita Nelson, will be fluorescent. The ballet will be danced under ultraviolet light. Ballet lovers will find ASTEROID a new experience, and even those who can't quite see "Swan Lake" will, we feel sure, be enthusiastic.

In addition to the notables who are scheduled on the program, many other personalities well-known in science-fiction will be attending the convention. Among these are Forrest J. The masquerade will be scheduled Sunday evening, the last night of the convention, and will be held after the entertainment part of the program, from 10:30 until (probably) dawn.

The party will be sponsored by the Elves' Gnomes and Little Men's Science-Fiction, Chowder and Marching Society, who initially requested that such an affair be held. The Little Men have engaged the beautiful pent-house bungalow suite of the Morrison for the party, and there will be music, refreshments and humorous prizes for the best costumes.

E. E. Smith Succeeds Reinsberg As Moon Commissioner!

FOUL PLAY FEARED IN FIRST COMMISSIONER'S DISAPPEARANCE

On June 3, 0900 GMT, First Lunar Commissioner Mark Reinsberg was engaged in a reconnaissance flight over the area near the crater Manners which had been illegally claimed by a Berkeley, Calif. group. At 0915 the Commissioner's craft was spotted moving across Mare Tranquillitatis. At 0917 our observatory reported a blinding flash of light, and when the instruments were again able to focus, there was nothing left of the Commissioner's ship but a new crater on the Moon.

Maclear Crater Outpost Station reported that a ship bearing the green tricolor of Den Elven, Gnomen und Kleine Männern Zukunftsmen, Fischsuppe und Marschieren Gesellschaft of Stuttgart and of Berkeley was seen heading north at an untoward pace at approximately 0920. Whether this had any bearing on the case cannot be determined at the present time.

E. E. Smith, Ph. D., elected Second Lunar Commissioner at an emergency meeting, stated: "We can come to no other conclusion but that the First Commissioner must be presumed foully murdered. We shall leave no crater unturned to effect the apprehension of his assassins."

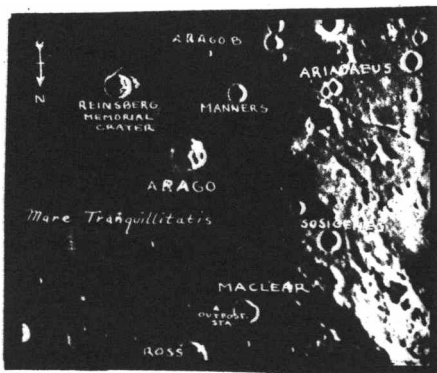

The Second Lunar Commissioner further stated that the new crater would be designated "Reinsberg Memorial Crater" and a fund launched immediately for a bronze plaque. A substantial amount was contributed by one commission member, who modestly preferred to remain anonymous, and the amount was doubled by a contribution from C. L. Barrett, M.D., who said: "This will, in only a small measure, reflect my esteem for the late Commissioner Reinsberg. And it is my hope that the rest of the science-fiction world will join me in posthumously honoring him for his job well done."

Speaking officially for the Solar Council, which consists of distinguished entities from every planet, Szugubbia, of Venus, said of the late Commissioner: "A martyr for the cause of order in the Solar System, Reinsberg of Earth will be remembered for his relentless campaign against illegal satellite claims. In joining the rest of the System in honoring his memory, Venus confers upon the late Commissioner the Sevenfold Order of the Golden Plooch."

By convention time, the Tenth Anniversary World Science-Fiction Convention will have doubled—and perhaps even tripled the largest previous convention membership.

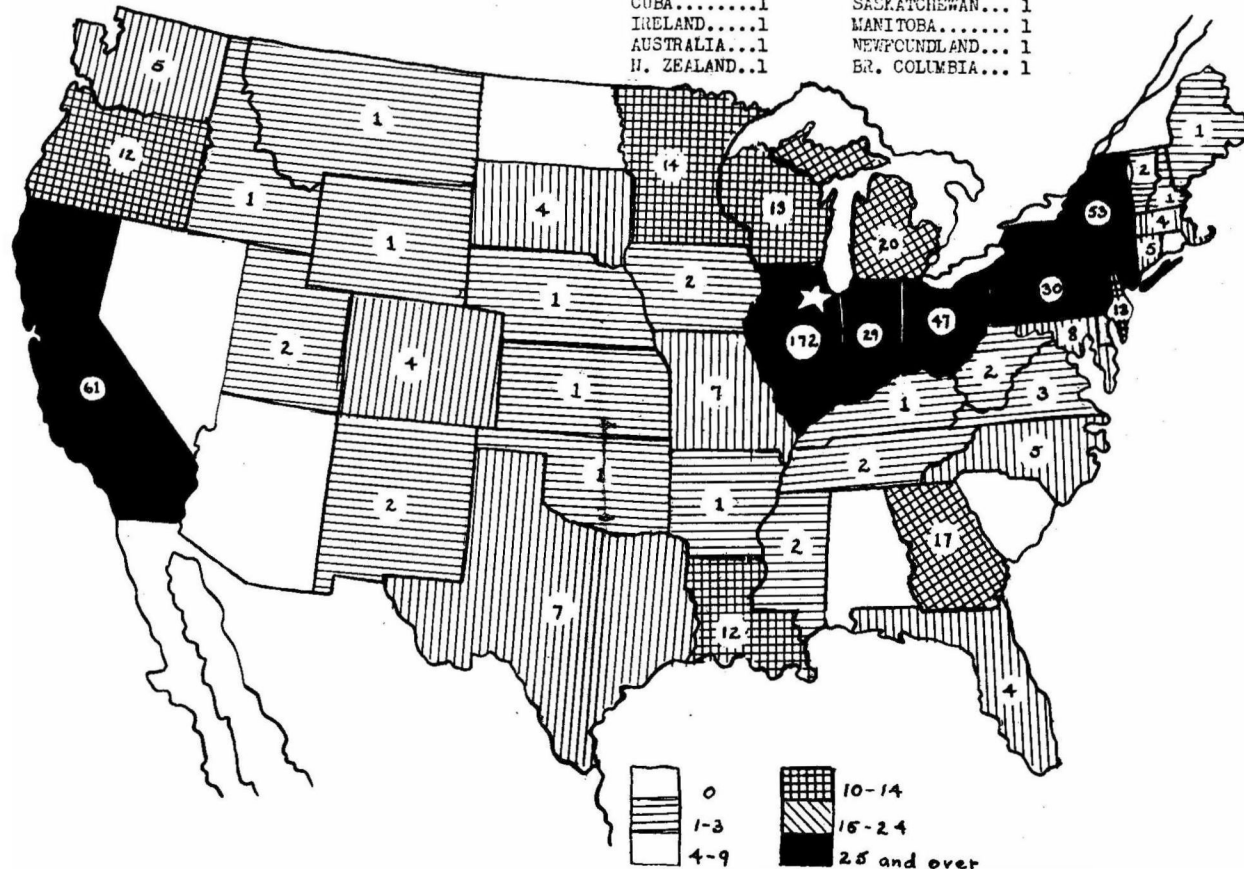


