



Policies

Badges

Wear your badge at all times. Many of the function rooms and events will have people checking badges at the door. The convention center security staff have been instructed to check badges as well.

Lost Badge

A replacement badge is available at Registration. You will be charged the FULL MEMBERSHIP RATE for a replacement badge. If you locate your lost badge, a refund is available at registration minus a \$20 handling fee. Don't lose it, folks.

Volunteering

All of the "see the convention from the inside" stuff aside – WE NEED YOUR BODY! Please come to the Volunteer Desk near Registration in the Moscone North Lobby. A "Gopher" lounge will be available to all members who have worked four hours per calendar day. Other incentives (earned based on hours worked) include a t-shirt and a "Volunteer Appreciation Party" hosted by the Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America on Sunday, September 5. Check with the Volunteer desk for more information.

Smoking

All convention function rooms in all facilities are non-smoking. All public areas are non-smoking unless posted. There is a smoking area near the Con Suite.

San Francisco has very strong non-smoking laws. Many restaurants and other businesses are non-smoking. Be very careful where you light up.

Alcohol

Please, please do not drink and drive. Find a designated (non-drinking) driver or stay in the hotel. Blood alcohol level of .08 is considered "under the influence" by California law.

No one under the age of 21 may be served alcohol. If necessary, check IDs at parties.

Children

It is the parent's or guardian's responsibility to monitor their child's activity and maintain a reasonable amount of control and supervision. Any violation of this policy may be grounds for expulsion. Kids-in-Tow must be with a parent or guardian at all times unless they are in Child Care. Young Phan Programming is NOT Child Care.

Non-Human Policy

All Non-Human members must be accompanied by a human member at all times. Any unaccompanied Non-Human members may be sold in the Terry's Dream Auction.

Weapons

Any members wearing props as part of a costume, both Hall and Masquerade, must act with common sense and full consideration for the safety of others and their surroundings. They must conform to all Federal, California State, San Francisco City/County statutes and to any restrictions placed on the Convention by the Moscone Convention Center and the Hotels. Most weapons are prohibited by local laws. These include genuine firearms, facsimile firearms and functional projectile weapons (i.e. sharpened knives, battle axes, throwing darts, stars, nanchajku, etc.). Additionally, ConFrancisco prohibits anything except a match or cigarette lighter that emits real flame and anything that emits a harmful energy field (i.e. lasers). All weapon facsimiles or props must be peace bonded in a visible manner in such a way that they cannot be removed. The use of a weapon as part of the Masquerade must be approved by the Masquerade Director prior to the event. Failure to do so is grounds for immediate expulsion from the Convention.

Any weapons purchased in the Dealer's Room must be securely wrapped and the buyer provided with a copy of the weapons policy.

The safety of our members and cooperation with our hotel and convention center facilities, as well as present liability laws, necessitates this policy.

to identify whether you wish to be Host or Guest and check out the selection of menus. Plan on a different dining experience in the spirit of the Worldcon.


Lunch with the Honored Guests

RESTAURANT GUIDE

The biggest problem in preparing a restaurant quide in San Francisco is what to leave out, not what to put in. Since we did not want a quide that is as big as the restaurant section of the Yellow Pages, deliberate choices had to be made about what to leave out. So, the places listed here have one or more of the following characteristics: proximity to the convention sites, recommendations from Bay Area fans, a special quality that makes it unique, and of course, the food. We also tried to include a wide variety of what is available in our city, so we hope there will be something for everyone. This list cannot include every restaurant even around the convention sites, so don't be surprised if you find a "gem" just by walking around.

Restaurants are grouped by their proximity to convention locations and by type. There are also establishments listed which are in other parts of the city, (or even outside the city). In those cases, you will need a car, bus or taxi to get to them, but it will be worth it. Where they are accepted, reservations are advised, especially if you have a large group. The price range refers to the entrée (or sandwich,

etc.). It does not include drinks, tax, or tip. The "fan friendly" (③) means that you can go there in costume, but remember to use good taste and that the law requires shoes in restaurants. Dress is casual unless otherwise noted. If credit cards are accepted, that will also be indicated.

Schedules and Fares:

Muni: Serves the city of San Francisco and Daly City BART station. Hours of service are 5am 'til midnight on most lines. Owl service is provided on main lines. Fores are \$1.00 which includes two free transfers (one if you board in an underground station). Frequency varies by line and route with the fastest being 5 minutes on main lines at commute hours and the slowest being 60 minutes on Owl service. Most lines are 12-20 minute frequency; 15-30 minutes on Weekends. Passes for unlimited travel are available for one month at \$32.00; ½ month at \$16.00; one week for \$15.00; three days for \$10.00 and one day for \$6.00. Passes may be purchased at any establishment that displays a FASTPASS sign or at BART/Muni stations. 673-6864

BART: Hours of service are 4am to midnight on weekdays, 6am to midnight on Saturday, and 8am to midnight on Sunday on the Concord-San Francisco/Daly City and the Richmond-Fremont lines. The San Francisco/Daly City-Fremont and Richmond-San Francisco/Daly City lines run 5am to 7pm Monday through Saturday (transfer in

downtown Oakland in off hours). Trains run every 30 minutes early morning; every 15 minutes during extended business hours; every 20 minutes all other times. Fares range between \$.80 and \$3.00 depending on the length of the trip. Tickets can be used on multiple trips and are purchased with cash and/or change at all BART stations. 788-2278 AC Transit: Operates primarily in Alameda and Contra Costa counties (all East Bay communities). Fares are \$1.10 for local service; \$2.00 for transbay westbound service, and \$2.50 for transbay eastbound service. Transfers are \$.25. Buses run every 15-60 minutes (depending on time of day and route.) (510) 839-2882

CalTrain: Operates between San Francisco and San Jose during extended business hours. Fares are \$1.75 to \$4.50 depending on distance traveled. CalTrain operates every 30 minutes during rush (5am to 8am and 4pm to 6pm) every hour in-between and less frequently after 6:30pm. 557-8661

SamTrans: Fare between San Francisco and north San Mateo county is \$.85. Buses run every 15 minutes during peak and 30-60 minutes in off hours. (800) 660-4287

Cable Cars

Introduced to the City in 1873, they run in the only such system left in the world. Fares are \$3.00 adults, \$1 seniors and youths 5-17. Hours of operation are 6am to 1 am daily. Two lines originate from Hallidie Plaza (across the street from the Parc Fifty-Five) on Market St.: the Powell-Hyde line climbs Nob Hill and Russian Hill ending at Aquatic Park in Fisherman's Wharf, and the Powell-Masan line, with yellow signs, climbs Nob Hill to Chinatown then on to Fisherman's Wharf at Bay and Taylor Streets. The California line runs straight up California St. from the Hyatt Regency Hotel at Market and Drumm, up and over Nob Hill to Van Ness Ave.

Muni Metro Streetcars

These vehicles travel underground downtown and on the streets in outlying neighborhoods. The five lines are J (Church), K (Ingleside), L (Taraval), M (Ocean) and N (Judah).

Parking

Curb Those Wheels!

Visitors driving in San Francisco should make note of the law requiring you to curb your wheels when parking on hills. Even on slight grades, cramp the wheels of your car to the curb and set the brake. That is, turn the wheels into the curb when pointed downhill and towards the street when parked uphill. Manual transmission cars should be left in gear and automatics should be in "Park". Strict enforcement of this distinctive San Francisco traffic regulation prevails throughout the city.

Watch Those Curb Colors!

To avoid expensive parking tickets and even heftier towing charges, pay attention to curb colors.

RED: No stopping or parking EVER

YELLOW: ½ hour loading for commercial vehicles

only (from 7am to 6pm)
WHITE: 5 minute limit – to take on or let off

passengers only – when business is open. GREEN: 10 minute parking limit between 9am and 6pm

BLUE: Only for properly identified vehicles of physically handicapped persons. Illegally-parked vehicles will be cited. \$100 fine!

Special Tow-Away and Loading Zones and Permit Parking Areas =

To summarize, WATCH THE SIGNSI One of San Francisco's main sources of income (or so it seems) is parking and traffic fines. There are lots of timed zones, permit only parking and areas that are towaway zones during certain times. Fines run from \$12 to over \$110 PLUS towing charges. Beware of street cleaning days -- check for signs.

If the Worst Happens

In the event that your car is towed, take the current registration or rental agreement to the nearest police station to obtain release papers. Be prepared to stand in line and pay all fines and towing charges. This is expensive and time consuming, so pay attention to parking signs or park in designated lots.

Tips and Tricks

Walking in the City: San Francisco is only 50 square miles in area and moderately easy to walk (there are some hills but, we are an adventurous lot, no?). Very few areas are dangerous during the day, but at night it pays to stay out of the project areas. Be aware that the neighborhood known as "The Tenderloin" is next door to our hotels (south of 5th Street and east of Market) and should definitely be avoided at night unless you are with a aroup.

Driving in the City: By now you know that street parking is scarce. Be aware that the city is very diligent at ticketing (\$20.00 is about average, although parking in a bus stop may cost you your first-born). San Francisco intersections are subject to strict enforcement of the Anti-Gridlock Act. In other words, if you can't be sure you will clear the intersection (because of traffic), don't enter. Fine: \$80. It's expensive and difficult to store a car and you probably won't need it.

Panhandlers: By law, they, like any other people, are allowed to request assistance (monetary or otherwise), but are not allowed to follow you around or otherwise pressure you. San Francisco's downtown area (like that of most cities) is full of homeless and street people who are generally harmless.

Neighborhoods: The Moscone and the hotels are in the "Downtown" or "Financial District".

GOLDEN GATE PARK

With over 1,000 acres of lovely drives, walking trails, bridle paths, lakes and beautiful gardens, the park is an oasis in the city. The Park's many

attractions include the Conservatory of Flowers, a National Historic Landmark that is a year-round floral wonder. The Academy of Sciences contains Steinhart Aquarium, Morrison Planetarium and numerous natural history exhibits from around the world. Stroll across the Music Concourse to the De Young Museum, the Asian Arts Museum, and the Japanese Tea Garden. Another short walk brings you to the Strybing Arboretum and Botanical Gardens featuring 6000 species of rare and unusual plants. Other points of interest in the Park include Speckles Lake where model boats are sailed, Stow Lake, the perfect place to rent a paddle or row boat, two Dutch Windmills just off Great Highway and even a small herd of buffalo grazing by Kennedy Drive.

MUSEÉ MÉCANIQUE

1090 Pt. Lobos/Great Hwy.

Located at the scenic Cliff House, this arcade displays operating antique mechanical games including movie machines, mechanical fortune tellers and coin-operated miniature models. And don't miss the Camera Obscura located on the patio.
