



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No matter how many books you've read, you have never read a book like this one. The first book of collaborative short stories ever created, it is unique in publishing history.

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What happens when Ellison meets with Shickley? What comes out when talents as different as Ellison and E. V. Vojt work together? How do you categorize the hybrid produced by the deadly mixture of Harlan's irreducibly weird Ellison? And how can two strong personalities like Silverberg and Ellison get along at the same story line?

You're in for a lot of surprises. Open the book and judge for yourself.

Harlan Ellison has provided introductory notes on each piece, explaining the method of collaboration. Most of the stories were written especially for this volume; only nine have previously appeared in book form.

### Solaris \$4.95

When Kiro Korvin left Earth for Station Solaris, he was prepared for the hazards of space travel—solitude, hardship, exhaustion, perhaps death—but not for the cruel sacrifice of learning his old destination to be dead, so that he ready to confront the unknown.

He had been prepared (and suppressed) and so longer feared. An ensemble creative spirit had taken possession of them, and Solaris had—though it knew them better than they did—decimated and killed them. In the name of their own evolution. Our culture takes long time life, another goes mad, a third disappears before the phenomenon of the creature is explained.

The human culture on Solaris seems to be a dead end, but a profoundly

powerful and several million years beyond our own civilization. To the explorers on Solaris, it becomes a mysterious alien force, threatening its elemental nature and challenging to their intel-

ligence. From the perspective of Solaris, emerges a new view of the nature of man: a creature who scours all the corners in quest of other worlds and greater life. His knowledge without having explored his habitat, dark passages and secret chambers, without discovering what lies behind doorways that he himself has sealed.

Flashing across galaxies to track the costly emulsion by impulsive exiles, Sleepy Jim McGivern embarks on another perilous mission in the saga of the Stainless Steel Rat.

An ignorant impervious who doesn't like anything (including himself), the surly, surly Jim McGivern is never above a brief truce, but does he and his winsome bride, Angelina, indulge in a bit of honest sport, but just chummin' till next year? The cat's out of the bag in every town he visits, from the sprawling metropolis of Kansas City to the backwoods of Kansas. Jim confirms yet a threat from a distant world. Jim is again enlisted as interstellar agent and spy in the cause of universal peace. The planet of Cleland in the Equinox belt is ravaged by the forces of the ungodly (unfriendly warbees). Jim is sent to clear hostile, fear-driven society, ruled by the indomitable Kryl and his band of gray rats, to end that military excess and venture past to the unknown.

Jim, however, is driven by danger fear, and suspense, the wild, unpredictable consciousness and energy aided by his mastery of crime techniques (as well as a little help from Angelina), he desperately stakes certain destruction, but ultimately prevails the enemy. ### I Am Legend \$4.95

By Richard Matheson

Not for the squeamish is a long night's reading of this book, which brings vividly to life this ancient terror of the dark, the unknown.

The pessimistic view variously Matheson describes as have been responsible for the recurring plagues of the Middle Ages. By 1975 it is turning people to white-faced, glassy-eyed sleepwalkers unable to die.

What can we do to save ourselves from this horror—trials, regaining consciousness in the grave, clearing out the soil so that we can start again? Can we be born again? Is there any way? Man's education is hideously immunoed in I AM LEGEND.

Richard Neville, mysteriously spied by the plague that sweeps the earth in 1970 and turned with terror and pain, searches for a clue to man's chance for survival amid the black terror of no earth reverberating with the loath, the damned, the reverting masses of the dead. As the days wear on, though, why, he must have had another choice but to minister in the spark of human life against the encroachment of an all-encompassing evil?

When Ruth appears, walking her way over the hills that Neville had not dared to cross. Ruth with the courage to keep reading until follow the mate and the matron to a stunning climax that is a rebirth of life—and death.

### EARTHJACKET

By Jim Marrinan

At a time when much is being written about the destruction of our environment, here is an imaginative novel which takes us into a world that did not heed the warnings, that permitted the unchecked exploitation of technology.

Given good industrial leisure and abundant, however class structure exists. And with ordinary and machines encroaching upon society, robbing the earth of air, and water, what would happen to the balance of life to growth and regeneration?

She comes onto the artificial land scape of the Texans and Sheepies—a society in which life and survival is totally dependent upon understanding existence in a system imposed by man. Self-sufficient, self-contained, perfectly ordered... until one man among the oppressed Sheepies asserts his independence, upturns the ruling class of Texans, and in so doing effects the total collapse of the technological order.

Quick-paced, dramatic, filled with action and suspense, this is a story of rebirth, the assertion of individual freedom, and the affirmation of nature.

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\* RULES for the BUSINESS MEETING : \*



19

The business meeting of the 28th World Science Fiction Convention will be held at 09.00 am. on Sunday, August 23, 1970. The site of the 1972 Convention will also be selected at that time. The meeting will be conducted according to "Robert Rules of Order, Revised", as interpreted by the Parliamentarian, except where contravened by the following Special Rules:

1. All motions, resolutions, or other items to be presented for a vote of the convention membership must be submitted in written form together with a written second, and received by the Chairman of the HEICON'70 Committee at least 18 hours prior to that meeting.
2. Convention bids are only acceptable on the grounds of the rules already published in Progress Report 2.
3. If the Parliamentarian thinks the circumstances warrant it, he may accept - subject to the approval of the Chairman - motions submitted to him after the deadline, but before the opening of the business meeting, provided such motions are submitted to him in written form, with written seconds. These motions, if approved by the Committee, will be presented to the convention after all other business are concluded.
4. Amendments may be submitted from the floor under the following restrictions:
  - a). Amendments must be related to the general aim of the original proposal; "amendments that are actually new proposals will be automatically ruled out of order.
  - b). Amendments-to-amendments will be only allowed with the consent of the original amendator under the "originator's consent clause" in "Roberts'" and will not otherwise be admitted to vote. In short, any amendment of to a legitimately-submitted proposal will be voted on as offered or as amended with the consent of the amendment's originator only.
5. In all cases, the decisions of the Parliamentarian will be final.

No person may participate in the con-site selection business meeting, either as a bidder or as a spectator or as a voter, unless they are a registered member of HEICON'70 International - 28th World Science Fiction Convention. After this requirement is met, certain other requirements as appearing hereafter will be imposed for eligibility for participation:

Any city in the western region of North America, as defined in the traditional rotation plan, is eligible to submit a bid for the 1972 convention, provided that the persons bidding are known to be associated with science-fiction or fandom. The bids that have been submitted as specified here and in Special Rule No. 2 will be considered eligible. Otherwise ineligible cities may bid provided the out-of-turn-bid is sanctioned by a 3/4 vote of the con-site selection business meeting, subject to the requirement stated in Special Rule No. 2

All voters must be members of the 28th World Science Fiction Convention - HEICON'70 International. Ballots for site selection were distributed with Progress Report 3 and are obtainable at the Registration Desk. Voting is by preferential (or Australian) method. The NOREASCON-Committee has collected mail ballots and issued mail voters receipts in the Name of the 30th NASFiC. The NOREASCON-Committee will turn over sealed mail ballots to the HEICON-Committee, along with a list of voters. Upon selection of the site of the 30th NASFiC, the NOREASCON-Committee will turn over the 30th NASFiC-Committee the funds held in trust and all membership records. This procedure has been prepared by the HEICON-Committee and the NOREASCON-Committee. Persons voting by mail who wish to attend the site selection session at HEICON may do so by presenting their 1972-receipt as identification. They may not vote in-person. Attendees' ballots will be accepted at the site selection. The names will be checked to prevent duplicate voting (mail and in-person).

Das Business Meeting des 28. Welt - Science Fiction - Konvents wird am Sonntag, dem 23. August 1970, um 09.00 Uhr stattfinden. Der Ort des 1972er Konvents wird ebenfalls zu diesem Zeitpunkt gewählt. Das Meeting läuft nach den Regeln der "Roberts Rules of Order, Revised" ab, interpretiert vom Parliamentarian, sofern nicht folgende Regeln widersprechen:

1. Alle Anträge, Resolutionen oder andere Beiträge, die zur Abstimmung vorgelegt werden sollen, müssen in schriftlicher Form, zusammen mit einer schriftlichen Unterstützung eines Zweiten, dem Chairman des HEICON '70-Komitees spätestens 18 Stunden vor Beginn dieses Meetings übergeben werden, in Englisch.
2. Bewerbungen für einen Con sind nur unter Berücksichtigung der im Progress Report 2 veröffentlichten Regeln zulässig.
3. Hält es der Parliamentarian für notwendig, kann er - mit Zustimmung des Chairmans - Anträge, die nach dem Schlußtermin, jedoch vor Beginn des Business Meetings bei ihm eintrafen, noch zulassen, vorausgesetzt sie sind in schriftlicher Form und mit einer schriftlichen Unterstützung eines Zweiten eingereicht worden. Diese Anträge - sofern vom Komitee angenommen - werden der Versammlung am Schluß der Tagesordnung unterbreitet.
4. Zusätze oder Änderungen können von der Versammlung unter folgenden Bedingungen beantragt werden:
  - a). Sie müssen dem allgemeinen Ziel des ursprünglichen Antrages zugehörig sein. "Zusätze" oder "Änderungen" die eigentlich neue Anträge sind, werden automatisch ausgeschlossen.
  - b). Zusätze zu Zusätzen werden nur mit der Zustimmung des ursprünglichen Zusatzbeantragers - nach der "originator's consent clause" in den "Roberts Rules od Order, Rev." - zur Abstimmung zugelassen. Andernfalls sind sie von der Abstimmung ausgeschlossen.
5. Die Entscheidungen des Parliamentarians sind unanfechtbar.

Ohne eine Mitgliedschaft am HEICON '70 International - 28. Welt - Science Fiction - Konvent erworben zu haben, darf niemand als Bewerber, Zuschauer oder Wähler an der Wahl des Con-Ortes für 1972 teilnehmen. Außer dieser Bedingung sind folgende Regeln zu beachten:

Jede Stadt der Westregion Nordamerikas kann nach dem traditionellen Rotationsplan eine Bewerbung für den Con 1972 einreichen. Städte die nicht im Rotationsplan enthalten sind, also aus anderen Regionen, können sich nur bewerben, wenn eine 3/4 Mehrheit der Anwesenden die - nicht turnusmäßige - Kandidatur zulässt.

Alle Wähler müssen Mitglieder des 28. Welt - Science Fiction - Konvents, HEICON '70 International sein. Anleitungen zur Wahl und Stimmzettel wurden mit Progress Report 3 verteilt. Außerdem sind weitere Stimmzettel am Registrierungs-Büro erhältlich. Die Wahl wird nach dem australischen System abgehalten. Das NOREASCON-Komitee hat die Brief-Wahlzettel gesammelt und den Wählern Quittungen im Namen der 30. NASFIC gegeben. Die geschlossenen Umschläge werden vom NOREASCON-Komitee dem HEICON-Komitee übergeben, zusammen mit einer Liste der Wähler. Nach erfolgter Abstimmung übergibt das NOREASCON-Komitee die erhaltenen Beiträge und die Mitgliederlisten dem 30. NASFIC-Komitee. Briefwähler die am HEICON Business Meeting teilnehmen wollen müssen ihre 1972-Quittung vorzeigen und dürfen nicht ein zweites Mal abstimmen. Die Namen der anwesenden Wählern werden - zwecks Vermeidung von Doppelstimmen - mit der Liste der Briefwähler verglichen.



The TAFF - Transatlantic Fan Fund - was created in 1953 by Don Ford and Walter A. Willis, for the purpose of providing funds to bring well-known and popular fans across the Atlantic. The first winner, A. Vincent Clarke, was unable to accept in 1954; however, since that time the TAFF has regularly brought overseas fans to the U.S.A. and sent American fans to European conventions.

TAFF exists solely through the support of fandom. The candidates, in each TAFF campaign, are voted upon by interested fans all over the world, and each vote is accompanied by a donation of no less than one dollar. These votes, therefore, and the continued interest of fans, are what makes TAFF possible. This year's TAFF campaign closed on July 15. We are glad to announce that the 1970 winner Elliot Kay Shorter will attend HEICON '70 International as Fan Guest of Honor.

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


Fan A: Australia in '75? Great idea!

## **ROBERT SILVERBERG**

Robert Silverberg was born in New York City and lives there today. He began reading science fiction shortly after the end of the Second World War, became an active fanzine-publishing fan in 1949, and made his first professional sales in 1953. By 1955 he was well established as a writer, both alone and in collaboration with Randall Garrett (as Robert Randall). Upon graduation from Columbia University in 1956 he became a full-time writer, and he has remained one ever since. His output has included a wide variety of material, including a number of books on archeological and other scientific topics. Among his recent work, the novel "Thorns" finished second in the voting for the Nebula Award in 1968, and "The Mask Of Time" placed second in 1969. "Thorns" was a HUGO finalist in 1968 as well, along with his novella "Hawksbill Station". In 1956 he received a HUGO as the most promising new author, and he won the HUGO trophy again in 1969 for his novella "Nightwings". His wife Barbara is an electronics engineer. She insists she is not a fan of SF, but nevertheless she attends many conventions with her husband and has been known to read an SF novel now and then.

Robert Silverberg wurde in New York geboren und lebt auch heute noch dort. Kurz nach Beendigung des zweiten Weltkrieges begann er, science fiction zu lesen. 1949 wurde er ein aktiver fanzineherausgebender Fan und 1953 konnte er seine ersten Verkäufe tätigen. 1955 war er bereits als Schriftsteller etabliert, teils allein, teils in Zusammenarbeit mit Randall Garrett (als Robert Randall). Nach dem Abschluß der Columbia Universität wurde er 1956 freier Schriftsteller. Seine Arbeiten reichen von Büchern archäologischer und anderer wissenschaftlicher Natur bis hin zur SF. Von seinen neueren Werken kam der Roman "Thorns" (Dornen) bei der Nebula-Wahl 1968 an zweiter Stelle an und "Masks Of Time" (Masken der Zeit) errang den selben Platz 1969. "Thorns" war zusammen mit seiner Erzählung "Hawksbill Station" 1968 in der Endliste der HUGO-Wahl. Er erhielt 1966 einen HUGO als vielversprechendster neuer Autor und gewann diese Auszeichnung erneut 1969 für seine Erzählung "Nightwings", (Schwingen der Nacht). Seine Frau Barbara, von Beruf Elektronik-Ingenieur, behauptet kein SF-Fan zu sein, besucht aber trotzdem viele Cons mit ihrem Mann und liest ab und zu science fiction.

## **EDWIN CHARLES TUBB**

Edwin Charles Tubb was born just after the First World War. He has read SF for more years than he cares to remember, and still finds it the most fascinating and mentally stimulating type of literature. In 1950 he sold his first story "No Short Cuts" to New Worlds. Since then he has been a regular contributor to magazines in the English speaking world and his novels have been published in a dozen languages. In 1955 he gained the Cytricon Literary Award and for many years he won the Nebula Prize. Recently he has been included in the BSFA's list of the ten most popular British authors. In 1956 he became the editor of Authentic Science Fiction. Adaptations of his work have appeared on French television and short stories on South African Radio. His work has also appeared in several anthologies, among them those edited by Judith Merril. Ted is firmly convinced that science fiction is here to stay - as a mature and responsible medium of entertainment.

Edwin Charles Tubb, kurz nach dem ersten Weltkrieg geboren, hat SF schon länger gelesen als er sich erinnern möchte und hält diese Literaturgattung für die faszinierendste und geistig anregendste überhaupt. 1950 verkaufte er seine erste Geschichte "No Short Cuts" (Keine Abkürzungen) an das englische Magazin New Worlds. Seit dieser Zeit ist er ein regelmäßiger Mitarbeiter der englischsprachigen Magazine und seine Romane wurden in etlichen Sprachen übersetzt. 1955 erhielt er den Cytricon Literary Award und gewann mehrere Jahre den Nebula Preis, sowie neuerdings, einen Platz in der BSFA-Liste der zehn beliebtesten englischen Autoren. 1956 wurde er Herausgeber von Authentic Science Fiction. Seine Werke wurden für das französische Fernsehen und für südafrikanische Radiostationen bearbeitet. Seine Kurzgeschichten sind in einigen Anthologien enthalten, auch in den von Judith Merril redigierten. Ted ist davon überzeugt, daß die Science Fiction daseinsberechtigt ist und bleibt, als reifes und verantwortungsvolles Medium der Unterhaltung.

## **HERBERT W. FRANKE**

Dr. Herbert W. Franke was born in Vienna in 1927. After graduation he studied physics, mathematics, chemistry, psychology and philosophy at Vienna university. He received a Ph.D. for his thesis about electronical optics. After a short period of research work and a five-year term of industrial work, Dr. Franke has been a full-time writer since 1957. Besides numerous non-fiction books, Dr. Franke has written outstanding science fiction. He received the Ernst H. Richter Award three times for the best sf-novel. All German reading fans consider his works as some of the best SF written by a German author, be it "Das Gedankennetz" (The Thoughtweb) or "Der Elfenbeinturm" (The Ivory Tower). Right now he writes SF-radioplays and TV-features. In collaboration with Prof. Dr. Dr. E.H. Graul he is working on a book about futurology. His newest SF-novel "Zone Null" (The Zero-Zone) will appear just in time for HEICON'70. Dr. Franke's wife Charlotte translated for some time the German editions of F & SF and Galaxy.

Dr. Herbert W. Franke wurde 1927 in Wien geboren. Nach dem Abitur studierte er dort Physik, Mathematik, Chemie, Psychologie und Philosophie. Er promovierte zum Doktor der Philosophie über ein Thema der Elektronenoptik. Nach kurzer Forschungsarbeit und fünfjähriger Industrietätigkeit, lebt Dr. Franke seit 1957 als freier Schriftsteller. Neben etlichen Sachbüchern ist er auch als Verfasser von science fiction hervorgetreten. Dreimal erhielt er den Ernst H. Richter-Preis für den Jahresbesten deutschen SF-Roman. Allen Lesern sind seine Werke noch in bester Erinnerung, sei es "Das Gedankennetz" oder "Der Elfenbeinturm". Zur Zeit schreibt er utopische Hörspiele und Zukunftsthemen für das Fernsehen. # JOHN BRUNNER

was born 1934 in Oxfordshire, England, and educated at Cheltenham College. He sold his first novel at the age of 17 years, just before leaving school. After two years compulsory service in the RAF, he worked under SF writer John Christopher and then as publisher's editor under John F. Burke. In 1958 he sold a novel to America and became a freelance. John Brunner has published between 50 and 60 books, a lot of them SF, of course. He contributed to all leading SF magazines and to many other periodicals too. John Brunner received the British Fantasy Award, the British Science Fiction Award and the HUGO for the best SF novel of the year: "Stand On Zanzibar". His work has been translated into eight languages. John has also written film-scripts, articles, reviews and songs, one of which has recently been recorded by Pete Seeger. John has also acquired increasing reputation as a poet. He lives in London with his wife Marjorie and his other interests include travelling, the peace movement, playing saxophone, guitar and banjo, all very badly, he says.

John Brunner hat bereits zwischen 50 und 60 Bücher veröffentlicht, davon viele SF-Romane. Er war Mitarbeiter bei allen führenden SF-Magazinen und bei anderen Zeitschriften. John Brunner wurde ausgezeichnet mit dem British Fantasy Award, mit dem British Science Fiction Award und mit dem HUGO für den besten Roman des Jahres: "Stand On Zanzibar". Seine Werke wurden in acht Sprachen übersetzt. Er verfaßte auch Film-Drehbücher, Artikel, Rezensionen und Lieder, wovon eins kürzlich von Pete Seeger aufgenommen wurde. Auch als Dichter hat John sich einen Namen gemacht. Er lebt in London mit seiner Gattin Marjorie und interessiert sich für Reisen, für die Friedensbewegung, spielt Saxophon, Gitarre und Banjo, alle ziemlich schlecht, so sagt er.

Papa gonna build a little boy next time.

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
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
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


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
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
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
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
