

THE WAST

The San Antonio Convention
Center has two exhibit halls
comprising 240,000 square
feet. There is additional
space of close to one-quarter
of a million square feet within
a square mile, most of it in the
convention center meeting
rooms!

There are almost a DOZEN hotels within three-quarters of a mile of the Convention Center, with the Main Convention hotels, the Marriot River Walk and Marriot Rivercenter, comprising more than 1300 rooms and the others contributing over 2300 additional rooms!

The famous River Walk was a Civilian Conservation Corps project. Branches and canals leading from the River wind all through the downtown area, including inside one of the hotels! River-going "taxis" make regular stops along the Walk and at the Convention Center.

Every year, the Fightin'
Texas Aggie Band has
been denied permission
to march in the annual
River Parade. (Think
about it...)

The Arneson River Theater (an outdoor auditorium with the stage split from the seating by the San Antonio River) is almost acoustically perfect and requires no additional sound or PA equipment.

The roof of the Convention Center Arena was raised straight up over 50 feet to provide more seating in the '70s. It looked like it had "popped its top," until the sides were filled in.

San Antonio is the seventh most popular tourist site in the United States.

The Tower of the Americas, the "space needle" built for the '68 World's Fair, is over 700 feet tall and has a revolving restaurant at the top.

The Palacio del Rio hotel, built in '67-'68, was constructed by "stacking" completely finished and furnished (including beds and chairs) room-modules.

The San Antonio International Airport is the third largest in the Republic, behind DFW and Houston Intercontinental.

Mexico is only 3 hours away by car and no passport is required to cross the boarder! All you need is a valid U.S. driver's license.

In a not-so startling move, the LoneStarCon Board of Directors has invited more fans to uphold the fine traditions that have blossomed in the ensuing months. The addition of these distinguished personages brings even more experience and variety to an already impressive committee. The now-expanded board is comprised of:

Willie Siros, Bid Chairman, is

one of the founders of the scientifiction conferences SolarCon and ArmadilloCon and the infamous organization The of Fandom Association of Central Texas. In addition, he cochaired the well-received LoneStarCon 1. Mr. Siros has also been active in WSFS

and has volunteered his time and expertise for various WorldCons and regional conferences around the U.S. since the late '70's. It seems only fitting that he lead the way in seeking a WorldCon for his native state.

The Vice-Chairman, Fred Duarte, Jr., has been involved in Fandomsince 1980 and WorldCons since 1983. Mr. Duarte is a regular attendee/worker at cons all across the lower forty-eight states and has held department-level positions at

several WorldCons, notably Noreascon 3, Chicon V, and the soon-to-be-held MagiCon.

Karen Meschke has volunteered her services to head up the fledgling Admin department. She has also been active since LoneStarCon 1. Ms. Meschke is well-known for her "go get 'em," no-nonsense approach.

Robert R. Taylor, Ambassa-

dor-At-Large and All-Around Dapper Dresser, has been an avid coconspirator of Mr. Siros since the dim, distant past. Currently the President of the above mentioned F.A.C.T., Mr. Taylor brings his

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

Interesting News Department

Our corporation was denied, in late May of this year, our application for 501(c)(3) status by the Internal Revenue Service. Therefore, we have paid \$140.00 in Federal Income Tax for the year. In addition, we paid out \$115.00 in Texas State Tax.

St. Louis fans have formally declared a bid for their city for the Worldcon in 1997. We wish them well (but not *that* well).

The infamous band Los Blues Guys has declared their backing and support for the Bid. The eclectic musicians are definitely serving as Ambassadors of Good-Will, not to

mention Rock 'n' Roll.

The Fandom Association of Central Texas, Inc., the fan group based in Austin, Texas, has also come out in favor of the Bid.

A Few Words From the Chairman

Almost ten years ago, a few fans in Austin launched themselves into the national fan limelight and ended up having to do a lot of work (i.e. the 1985 NASFiC in Austin). Some people thought it was a great warm-up for a future Worldcon. I, for one, wasn't sure. In fact, I even foolishly said in the 6th issue of the Texas SF Inquirer that after LoneStarCon, we weren't going to try for a World SF Convention. Okay, so I mis-spoke myself. Not that anyone really believed me. After all, Texas has never held a World SF Convention.

For the first time since Tom Reamy's Big D in '73 (Dallas in 1973) Worldcon bid, we have enough experienced fans around to form a legitimate contender. People have asked, why San Antonio? What's wrong with Austin? Nothing that a first-class convention center wouldn't fix. Alas, Austin doesn't have the necessary facilities for a Worldcon. Okay, so what about Dallas or Houston? Well, while they have beautiful convention centers and some wonderful hotel properties, they are nowhere near each other. Fans like being where the action (parties) are, and aren't into shuttle buses. Besides, with all the hotels along the River Walk, there is NO hot pavement to cross to get anywhere anyone would want to be. However, when you come visit us in 1997, you'll still have to take a day trip up to Austin to commune with the bats.

While we're all young and enthusiastic, to get a Worldcon to Texas requires the participation of LOTS of people. We're talking about something over five years away here. The final decision on where the 1997 site will be won't even be made until 1994! So I have hit upon a simple plan to insure a positive result: do good, avoid evil, and throw great room parties.

To bring a Worldcon to Texas requires that fans who want to see a LoneStarCon II must get involved. Just like changing personnel in Washington (or Baton Rouge or where ever) requires your active participation, having the Worldcon in San Antonio requires your active interest. No smoke-filled back rooms deciding the fate of convention bids for us. So our fate is in your hands. Without each and every one of you helping in whatever capacity you can, we won't be meeting in San Antonio in 1997.


It's Beginning to Look a Lot Like Christmas

A Visitor's View of Downtown San Antonio

Living in Austin as I do, I'd visited San Antonio before. Heck, I'd been to several meetings there and my inlaws-to-be live in San Antonio. But I'd always visited the north part of the city. I'd never been to downtown San Antonio, and that's what we're selling. It was way past time to see what it was I was pitching.

Friday, July 3, seemed like a perfect time. I'd gotten off work early for the Fourth of July holiday, so we headed south on I-35 to San Antonio. It's a short drive from Austin, so we got there in early afternoon.

First there was a driving tour around the sights of downtown. I was amazed at how close everything was. The Alamo is right there, practically around the corner, and the Convention Center is literally across the street from one of the two Marriotts we'll be using. La Villita, the funky arts and crafts "little town" with shops and restaurants, was across the street from the Convention Center in another direction and just a block or two from the Marriott hotels. And we're talkin' short, downtown blocks, not those quarter-mile blocks you can find in the suburbs.

The second thing that impressed me was how well downtown San Antonio accommodated pedestrians and convention-goers. The sidewalks are extra-wide, and the drivers didn't seem to be playing "Let's Get 'Em", as seemed to be the case in other cities I've visited. There was a wide variety of food available right around the Convention Center area, and no one looked like they were staring at the people walking around with convention badges.

Another thing I noticed was how well San Antonio has restored and renovated its downtown. There were neat architectural features on practically every building we drove past, and I could tell that these buildings had been lovingly restored. Some of the old downtown hotels, like the Menger and the Crockett, looked really cool. In a way, the age of the restored buildings, the width of the sidewalks and sheer number of tourists/pedestrians almost reminded me of parts of New Orleans.

One thing I wanted to go look at close up was the Marriott Rivercenter, since that's the main hotel we're bidding. (Well, I really wanted to go look at the Convention Center too, but that Friday was the last day of a big national conference taking up almost the whole center, and they weren't letting anyone in without the right credentials.)

We parked Moby, the great white van. It seemed like there was plenty of parking available all around downtown, and as I recall, the day-lots were pretty inexpensive, only a couple of bucks for the day with in/out privileges. The lot we parked in was directly across the street from the back of Alamo Plaza and less than a block from one of the entrances to the Rivercenter Mall. The same entrance, in fact, that you use to go to the IMAX theater.

For a mall, the Rivercenter Mall is fairly cool. It's built as an open square with the middle of it open to the San Antonio River and the Riverwalk. It has three levels, with shopping on the

top two levels and fast food and restaurants completely ringing the bottom level. While the upper two levels are glassed in toward the center, the lowest level literally opens out to the Riverwalk and the River Taxi stops there at the mall. Although the lower level is partially open-air, it wasn't particularly hot, even in July. The river acts as a natural air-conditioner, bringing the ambient temprature down to about the low 80s. Even the conference delegates I saw from Northern states seemed to think the temperature was comfortable.

From one side of the mall, doors lead to the Marriott Rivercenter. Now this is a hotel built with large conventions in mind. There were three groups meeting there that Friday, and they didn't interfere with each other at all. In fact, they practically didn't see each other. One very large group was using most of the main ballroom and some smaller meeting rooms on one floor; a second group was using some of the meeting room at the other end of that floor, and the third group was using function space on a lower floor. And we're talking a BIG ballroom. The group using part of it for a banquet that night had over 200 tables in there, each seating 10 people. (I know, I checked the seating map.)

The hotel felt spacious, not cavernous. There are plenty of open spaces with seats to hang out and "lobby lurk", a couple of nice little open bars, and several Information/coat check booths built in. It felt like a great convention hotel, and I can hardly wait for y'all to come see it.

I'm planning to make several other tourist trips to San Antonio over the next couple of years. I'll let you know what I find.







For those from outside the area, give us a shout at the hot line or at 512/453-2099 and we'll do our best to locate crash space. Things will be underway early to midafternoon and last until late evening, so drop by just about anytime.

Directions:

From the Southlands: Once you get to Austin (e.g. IH-35), you'll want to head for Ben White Blvd. Go west until it becomes Loop 360/Capital of Texas Hwy. Past the mall and traffic lights, watch for the RM 2222 exit. Get on 2222 and head away from Austin. After a few miles, you'll come to Hwy. 620 (there's a light). Turn left.

From the Northlands: In Round Rock, look for the Hwy. 620 exit off IH-35. Get on 620 and head west (to the right).

All: Keep on 620 over the dam. After a few miles, you'll see a big Circle K store on the right at a funky intersection. Turn right onto Hudson Bend Rd. Go about 2 miles and turn right on Pool Canyon Rd. Within 100 yards, there'll be a row of mailboxes on the left. Turn onto the next dirt driveway after the mailboxes. Several other driveways branch off of this: you're looking for the one right after the black wrought-iron fence. If you're lucky, you may see the infamous Dead Datsun on the left back in the brush. If you're not and you go too far, you may end up meeting the Poodles from Hell.

Why the Alamo is Important to Texans

The Alamo is the most popular tourist attraction in San Antonio, one of the most popular in the entire state of Texas. The powerful images left by a small building in the middle of a busy downtown, of lives given for freedom in 1836, resonate to this day. It seems everyone wants their picture taken to show they were there.

The Mission San Antonio de Valero was established in 1718 by Catholic priests there to care for the population headed west and north out of Mexico and to convert the native Indians to Christianity. But the Alamo was forever sealed in the minds of historians in 1836, when over 180 men and women were held inside for 12 days and gave their lives on the 13th day for the ideal of freedom from Mexican dominance.

All Texans over a certain age know that. But most don't know what happened to the Alamo after the siege.

The site was left in ruins. The U.S. Army used the grounds of the Alamo as a quartermaster depot in 1846. When they began to clear the old chapel, skeletons were found. A fight began for control of the Alamo in 1849 between the city of San Antonio, the Army and the Catholic Church. It was argued for six years, before the Texas Supreme Court gave control of the Alamo to the Church, using a grant from the Spanish crown. The Army stayed on the site, and made improvements to the chapel between 1850 and 1852.

In 1877, Hugo Grenet bought the area for \$20,000 and built a two-story store; he leased the chapel from

the Church and used it as a storehouse. In 1883, the chapel was sold to the state of Texas for \$20,000, and the state gave it to the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, who control it to this day. Even now, when the San Antonio River downtown is drained each year, archeological crews still dig for artifacts.

My first image of the Alamo was in 1961. I was 5 years old, and my parents told me the story as we drove the 75 miles down from Austin. My mother, who is not a native Texan, spoke in the reverent hushed tones usually reserved for church. Now, walking the grounds with my son, I want him to understand the history of the Alamo and what it means as a symbol of freedom and pride.

From now until Conadian, we'll be reminding you how important it is for you to vote in the site selection balloting. Without your votes, everything we've done up til now will be meaningless.



Included with this issue of The Alamo Chronicles is the 1997 Worldcon Site Selection Ballot, the piece of paper we've all been waiting for.

To be eligible to vote, you MUST be a Supporting or Attending member of ConAdian, the 1994 Worldcon. If you're already a member, you'll need to put your membership number on the ballot for it to count; no number, and your ballot won't be counted.

If you're not a member yet, you can send in a *separate* check for either a Supporting membership (\$25US/\$35Can) or for an Attending membership. Attending memberships are \$125US/\$165Can through July 15, 1994. After that date, Attending memberships will be \$200Can and the US rate will depend on the current exchange rate. Membership fees can either be charged to Visa or Mastercard, or paid for by a separate check from the voting fee, made payable to "ConAdian". If you try to pay for a ConAdian membership and your voting fee with the same check, your ballot will be invalidated.

You have TWO options on the voting fee: 1) pay \$25US/\$35Can for a supporting membership in the 1997 Worldcon; or 2) pay \$60US/\$85Can for an attending membership in the 1997 Worldcon. Your voting fee checks will need to be made payable to "The 55th World Science Fiction Convention". Unfortunately, you cannot pay your voting fee by credit card. Trying to do that will only cause your ballot to be rejected.

Just think, no standing in line to convert your supporting membership (because we KNOW you're all going to vote, aren't you...). One quick and easy payment for an automatic attending membership. What a deal!

Mail-in ballots must be received at ConAdian, Site Selection Voting, PO Box 2430, Winnipeg, MB R3C 4A7 CANADA by Aug. 15, 1994. Ballots can also be hand-carried to Winnipeg by another ConAdian member; voting at ConAdian will continue until 6:00 PM Saturday, Sept. 3, 1994.



1997 Worldcon Site Selection Ballot

Voting Instructions—Please Read Carefully Before Voting

- 1. You must be an attending or supporting member of ConAdian to be eligible to vote for the site of the 1997 World Science Fiction Convention (Worldcon 55). If you are not yet a member of ConAdian, enclose a *separate* payment for a supporting or attending membership to ConAdian with this ballot.
- 2. You may vote by mail or in person at Con Adian. If you vote by mail, after marking the voting area below the dotted line, fold the bottom half up to meet the dotted line and seal the ballot by using a small piece of clear tape. Please do not staple your ballot. If you vote at Con Adian, the administrators will give you a validated ballot after confirming your eligibility and collecting the voting fee; after marking your ballot, deposit it in the ballot box. The polls will be open at Con Adian until 18:00 (6:00 PM) on Saturday, September 3, 1994. To vote by mail, send your ballot and voting fee to:

- 3. Complete the information requested on the other side of this ballot. The information you give will be how the winning bid records you in its files.
- 4. You must pay the voting fee (Can\$35 or US\$25). Make your cheque payable to "The 55th World Science Fiction Convention." Do not make your cheque payable to ConAdian or any bid committees. Payment of this fee entitles you to vote and makes you a supporting member of the 1997 Worldcon, no matter who wins the election. If you do not pay the voting fee, you may not vote. Voting fees are not refundable. If you attempt to pay your voting fee with a credit card or combine your voting fee payment with a membership to ConAdian, your ballot will be rejected and returned to you.
- 5. (Optional) All bids listed on the ballot have agreed to accept CAN\$85/US\$60 as a full attending membership for voters. You may choose to pay your entire attending membership now, rather than paying the voting fee and having to upgrade to an attending membership later. If you pay the larger amount, you will automatically become an attending member of the 1997 Worldcon, assuming one of the bids listed on the ballot wins the election.

- 6. If you choose to not pay for a full attending membership when you vote, you may convert your supporting membership in the 1997 Worldcon to an attending membership by paying a conversion fee to the winning Worldcon committee after the election. For at least 90 days after ConAdian, the conversion fee will not be more than US\$50. Contact the winning committee for conversion information.
- 7. The bid committees that filed acceptable qualification papers by March 5, 1994 appear on the ballot. Also listed are "No Preference," "None of the Above," and space for write-in votes. "No Preference" is the same as an abstention and is counted as if it were a blank ballot. "None of the Above" is treated as a candidate. If "None of the Above" wins, the site of the 1997 Worldcon will be decided at the World Science Fiction Society business meeting held on Sunday, September 4, 1994 at ConAdian. Write-in votes will be counted, but a write-in committee can win only if it files acceptable qualification papers by the close of balloting at ConAdian.
- 8. Voting is by the "preferential ballot" system. Place a "1" besides your first choice, "2" beside your second choice, and so on. You do not have to indicate any preference besides your first preference. If you mark an "X" with no further marks, it will count as a first-place vote with no further preferences. If the administrators are unable to determine your preferences, your ballot will be counted as "illegal/ illegible."
- 9. Voters who are not "natural persons" (for example, "guest of" memberships or memberships in the name of clubs, companies, inanimate objects, or animals) may vote only for "No Preference." The administrators will change any ballot voted by a non-natural person to "No Preference" if necessary.
- 10. If you have more than one membership in your name, you must vote any ballot you cast (other than the first one) as "No Preference." The administrators will change the second and successive ballots cast by the same person to "No Preference" if necessary.
- 11. Each supporting and attending membership in ConAdian may be voted only once. If you have a ConAdian membership which somebody else transferred to you, you may not vote if the original owner of the membership has already voted using that membership.
