PACIFICON II Progress Report #1, September, 1963:::  
Published for the Committee by John and Bjo Trimble,  
5571 Belgrave Avenue, Eastgate, Garden Grove, Calif-  
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The PACIFICON II Guest of Honor will be a double-barreled one: Edmond Hamilton and Leigh Brackett. Both of them have roots extending far back into science fiction; both of them have written many classic stories in the field.

"World-Wrecker" Hamilton is known to every reader of science-fiction since his first story appeared in Weird Tales in 1926; his Captain Future series remains a landmark in pulp fiction; his novel The Star Kings set a space-opera standard seldom equalled.

Leigh Brackett Hamilton entered the field in 1940 in Astounding and Planet, and during the forties and fifties drew dozens of murals, of color across the realm of space opera, forever leaving her mark. No one can wipe out memories of The Starmen of Llyrdis or The Sea-Kings of Mars; in recent years her talent has found extra profit in the film industry---she is author of screenplays for Rio Bravo and Hatari!

The PACIFICON II will also proudly present the first Worldcon Fan Guest of Honor: long time number one fan, deservedly named Mr. Science Fiction for years, Forrest J. Ackerman. He was a charter member of the Los Angeles SF Society (oldest extant science-fiction association), prime mover of the Big Pond Fund (predecessor to the current successful Trans-Atlantic Fan Fund), and chairman of the first Pacificon in Los Angeles in 1946; his current activities revolve around his magazine, Famous Monsters of Filmland.



The PACIFICON II will open with registration on Thursday night, September 3, 1964. The four-day program will begin Friday, and will be integrated about the theme, "Science Fiction: Ideas and the Imagination."

In addition to the more formal program, there will be the traditional masquerade and banquet and a winetasting will be added to spice up the doings--drawing on the products of one of California's finest wineries. There will be a Meet Your Authors party, and the National Fantasy Fan Federation will host an open-house hospitality room.

Auctions, panel discussions relating to the s-f field, mobs of people you'll want to meet, and the beautiful recently-redecorated Hotel Leamington will provide many other reasons for you to be in the San Francisco Bay Area next Labor Day. Send \$2 now to:

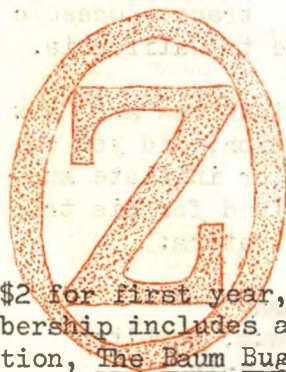
