4. Cy's Coffee Shop; 340-23rd Ave.; open 24 hours.
5. Dave's Coffee Shop; Broadway and Mather; open 24 hours.
6. Dreyer's Ice Cream; College and Harwood; daily 7 AM to 12 MN; ice cream, sandwiches and breakfast; open Labor Day.
7. Hickory House; College and Lawton; no other information.
8. Jack London Square; downtown Oakland at the end of Broadway; many restaurants; mostly expensive; very touristy; open Labor Day.
9. La Val's Pizza; College between 63rd and Alcatraz; closed Mon.; Tues., Wed., Thurs. 11 AM to 12 MN; Fri., Sat 11AM to 12 MN; Sun. 4 PM to 12 MN.
10. Norman's Restaurant; College between 63rd and Alcatraz; very expensive; daily 5:30 PM to 10 PM.

#### BERKELEY

11. Brennans; University under the Eastshore freeway;
12. College Inn (Chinese food); College St. between Ashby and Webster; 11 AM to 9 PM; closed Wed.
13. Cruchon's; 1926 Shattuck; 11 AM to 9 PM.
14. Inside Inn; College between Ashby and Webster; 11 AM to 7:30 PM.
15. International House of Pancakes; Telegraph and Derby; 7 AM to 8 PM.
16. Larry Blake's; University and also 2367 Telegraph; student hangout; popular; good steaks; rather expensive; 9 AM to 11 PM.
17. Lichoo Wwon; Telegraph and Dwight; 12 N to 9 PM.
18. Spangler's Fish Grotto; 1919 Fourth St.; right across the street from Brennan's; very popular; inexpensive; features sea food; 9 AM to 1 AM.

#### BUS INFORMATION

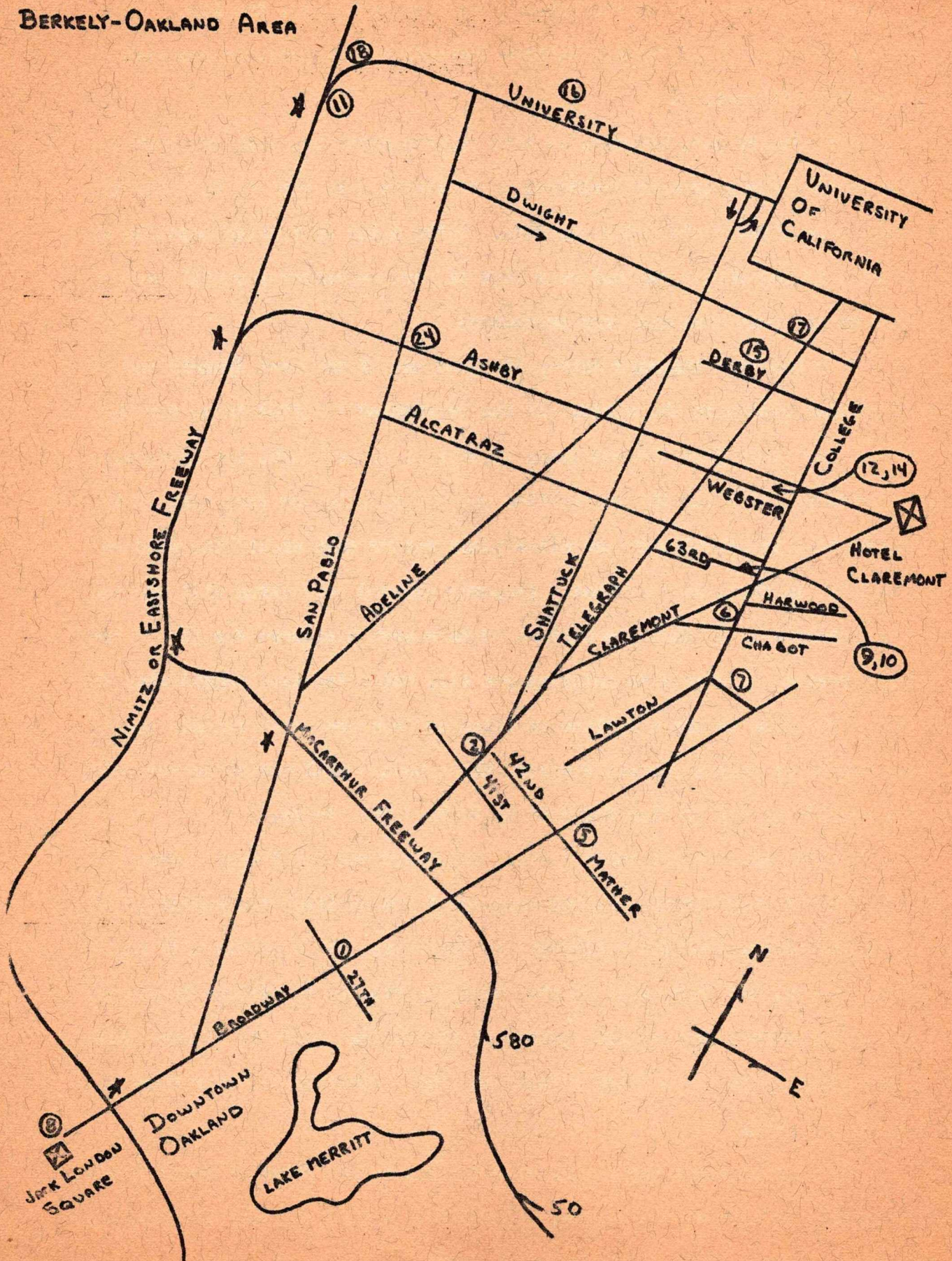
Fare on the local busses is 25¢. Bus fare to San Francisco is 50¢. You must have the correct change! Bus schedules will be posted at the Baycon registration desk.

To and from San Francisco: Catch the "E" bus at Ashby and Claremont Aves. It will take you to the Transbay Terminal at First and Mission Sts. in Frisco. From there you are on your own.

Hotel Claremont to downtown Berkeley or the U. of California: Catch the #65 bus at the corner of Domingo and Ashby. It will take you directly past the University and into the downtown section.

Hotel Claremont to downtown Oakland: Catch the "E" bus at Ashby and Claremont Aves. At College and Claremont transfer to either the # 51, 58, 59 or 76 bus. Any of these will take you downtown.
