Isaac Asimov won the best novel of the year contest for The Gods Themselves, with When Harlie Was One by David Gerrold placing second, and There Will be Time by Poul Anderson copping third. Other final nominees included two by Robert Silverberg, The Book of Skulls and Dying Inside, and Clifford Simak's A Choice of Gods.
