THE HUGO AWARD CEREMONY

The Hugo Award is the leading award for excellence in the field of science fiction and fantasy. The Hugos are awarded each year by the World Science Fiction Society, and presented at the World Science Fiction Convention (Worldcon). They were first presented in 1953 and have been awarded annually since 1955. Originally called the Science Fiction Achievement Award, but popularly known as the Hugo, the name officially became Hugo in 1992. The Hugo is named after Hugo Gernsback, the father of modern science fiction through his magazine *Amazing Stories* founded in 1926.

The Hugo Award is easily identifiable by the iconic rocket on the award. The original was a car hood ornament, but the same style of rocket has been in use since 1984. They are made from a mold designed by British fan Peter Weston. While the rocket is the same from year to year, the design of the base is left to each year's Worldcon committee to determine and, for the last several years, the design has been chosen through a Base Design Competition. Sara Felix and Vincent Villafranca joined forces to create the design selected as the base for the 2018 Hugo Awards.

The Hugos are currently given out in 17 categories. Four of them are fan categories as the World Science Fiction Society recognizes the contributions of fans to the fields of Science Fiction and Fantasy. The other 13 categories are given to professionals for work in art, television, film and the written word.

Tonight's ceremony will see two other awards, which while not Hugos, are given out at the ceremony. The first is the John W. Campbell Award for Best New Writer. A writer is eligible in the first two years after their first professional sale. The John W. Campbell Award is named after the editor of *Astounding Science Fiction* from 1937 until his death in 1971. *Astounding* later became *Analog* during Campbell's tenure as editor. *Analog Science Fiction and Fact Magazine* is published by the award's sponsor *Dell Magazines*.

The other non-Hugo to be awarded this evening is the World Science Fiction Society (WSFS) Best Young Adult Book Award. This is the inaugural presentation of this award, which endeavors to welcome new generations of science fiction and fantasy readers.

THE BIG HEART AWARD

The Big Heart Award was first given to E. E. "Doc" Smith in 1959 in memory of E. Everett Evans. It has been given each year since, at the World Science Fiction Convention, to a fan or professional who has contributed greatly of time and effort for the betterment of the Science Fiction Community. The purpose of the award is to honor fans or pros that have gone out of their way to make new fans feel welcome and have been very supportive of the ideals and values of our community, but who have not been given the recognition they so richly deserve.

The 70th recipient of the Big Heart Award for 2018 is Mike Glyer. Mike has been active in the Los Angeles Science Fiction Society since 1970. He has edited and published at least 167 issues of the Science Fiction newzine, File 770, since 1978, for which has won seven Hugo Awards. He has also won four Hugos for fan writing. To date, Mike has been a Guest of Honor at 13 conventions and chaired the 1996 World Science Fiction Convention in Anaheim, California. He was presented with the Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society (LASFS) Forry Award for Lifetime Achievement in 2011.




FIRST FANDOM



First Fandom was founded in the late-1950s to organize Golden Era science fiction fans. Membership was originally limited to fans whose activity predated the 1939 Worldcon. Robert A. Madle was the first president, holding that position for more more than 25 years. Later, a category of Associate Member was added for enthusiasts who have actively and regularly engaged in SF fandom for at least 30 years.

This year, distinguished First Fandom member Erle M. Korshak will present the Hall of Fame Award. He and Madle are the only two remaining fans known to have attended Nycon (1939). Korshak, who was on the committee for Chicon I (1940) and TASFiC (1952), is believed to be the only person who attended each of the first 15 Worldcons. ROBERT SILVERBERG

Robert Silverberg has been a professional writer since 1955, the year before he graduated from Columbia University, and has published more than a hundred books and close to a thousand short stories.

He is a many-time winner of the Hugo and Nebula Awards, was GoH at the Worldcon in Heidelberg, Germany in 1970, was named to the Science Fiction Hall of Fame in 1999, and in 2004 was named a Grand Master by the SFWA, of which he is a past president.

Silverberg was born in New York City, but he and his wife Karen and an assortment of cats have lived for many years in the San Francisco Bay Area.


FIRST FANDOM POSTHUMOUS HALL OF FAME AWARD

LEN AND JUNE MOFFATT



Len and June Moffatt were longtime dedicated fans, SF and mystery readers, authors, fanzine publishers, editors, correspondents, convention organizers and associate members of First Fandom. They joined LASFS in the later 1940s. They published the FAPAzine Moonshine, published in APA-L, and were founding members in the fanzine 5x5. Len was one of the organizers of the 1958 Worldcon. Len and June were co-founders of the Bouchercon, and were the 1973 TAFF Delegates. They were Fan Guests of Honor at Loscon 8 (1981) and BoucherCon (1985), and recipients of the Evans-Freehafer Trophy (1994) and the Anthony Award (1999). They are being honored as a couple for their tireless service to others over the course of their lifetimes.

SAM MOSKOWITZ ARCHIVE AWARD





Hal W. Hall's consistent interest has been in bibliographic citation collecting and creating access tools for scholars.

In 1970, he started indexing SF and fantasy book reviews, ending that effort 25 years later with a bibliography of some 79,000 citations. In the late 1970s, he started collecting citations to articles and books about SF and fantasy, in book and online form. That material resides in the SF and Fantasy Research Database, now approaching 115,000 items. In 2017, he published *Sam Moskowitz: A Bibliography and Guide* (221 pages, listing 1,489 items).

This year, we honor Hal W. Hall -- librarian, researcher, author, academic and activist.

HUGO AWARD ELIGIBILITY

BEST NOVEL: A science fiction or fantasy story of forty thousand (40,000) words or more.

BEST NOVELLA: A science fiction or fantasy story of between seventeen thousand five hundred (17,500) and forty thousand (40,000) words.

BEST NOVELETTE: A science fiction or fantasy story of between seven thousand five hundred (7,500) and seventeen thousand five hundred (17,500) words.

BEST SHORT STORY: A science fiction or fantasy story of less than seven thousand five hundred (7,500) words.

BEST SERIES: A multi-installment science fiction or fantasy story, unified by elements such as plot, characters, setting and presentation, appearing in at least three (3) installments consisting in total of at least 240,000 words by the close of the previous calendar year, at least one (1) installment of which was published in the calendar year, and which has not previously won.

BEST RELATED WORK: Any work related to the field of science fiction, fantasy, or fandom, appearing for the first time during the previous calendar year or which has been substantially modified during the previous calendar year, and which is either non-fiction or, if fictional, is noteworthy primarily for aspects other than the fictional text, and which is not eligible in any other category.

BEST GRAPHIC STORY: Any science fiction or fantasy story told in graphic form appearing for the first time in the previous calendar year.

BEST DRAMATIC PRESENTATION, LONG FORM: Any theatrical feature or other production, with a complete running time of more than 90 minutes, in any medium of dramatized science fiction, fantasy or related subjects that has been publicly presented for the first time in its present dramatic form during the previous calendar year.

BEST DRAMATIC PRESENTATION, SHORT FORM: Any television program or other production, with a complete running time of 90 minutes or less, in any medium of dramatized science fiction, fantasy or related subjects that has been publicly presented for the first time in its present dramatic form during the previous calendar year.

BEST EDITOR SHORT FORM: The editor of at least four (4) anthologies, collections or magazine issues (or their equivalent in other media) primarily devoted to science fiction and / or fantasy, at least one of which was published in the previous calendar year.

BEST EDITOR LONG FORM: The editor of at least four (4) novel-length works primarily devoted to science fiction and/or fantasy published in the previous calendar year that do not qualify as works under Editor Short Form.

BEST PROFESSIONAL ARTIST: An illustrator whose work has appeared in a professional publication in the field of science fiction or fantasy during the previous calendar year.

BEST SEMIPROZINE: Any generally available non-professional periodical publication devoted to science fiction or fantasy, or related subjects which by the close of the previous calendar year has published four (4) or more issues (or the equivalent in other media), at least one (1) of which appeared in the previous calendar year, which does not qualify as a fancast, and which in the previous calendar year met at least one (1) of the following criteria:

- paid its contributors and/or staff in other than copies of the publication
- was generally available only for paid purchase

BEST FANZINE: Any generally available non-professional periodical publication devoted to science fiction, fantasy, or related subjects that by the close of the previous calendar year has published four (4) or more issues (or the equivalent in other media), at least one (1) of which appeared in the previous calendar year, that does not qualify as a semiprozine or a fancast, and that in the previous calendar year met neither of the following criteria:

- paid its contributors and/or staff in other than copies of the publication
- was generally available only for paid purchase

BEST FANCAST: Any generally available non-professional audio or video periodical devoted to science fiction, fantasy, or related subjects that by the close of the previous calendar year has released four (4) or more episodes, at least one (1) of which appeared in the previous calendar year, and that does not qualify as a dramatic presentation.

BEST FAN WRITER: Any person whose writing has appeared in semiprozines or fanzines or in generally available electronic media during the previous calendar year.

BEST FAN ARTIST: An artist or cartoonist whose work has appeared through publication in semiprozines or fanzines or through other public, non-professional, display (including at a convention or conventions), during the previous calendar year.

AWARD FOR BEST YOUNG ADULT BOOK: The Award for Best Young Adult Book is given for a book published for young adult readers in the field of science fiction or fantasy appearing for the first time during the previous calendar year, with such exceptions as are listed in Section 3.4 of the WSFS Constitution.

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HUGO AWARD
