# **Special Wartime Issue #05**

#### **Dear Readers:**

Over 125 days have passed since the terrible events of October 7<sup>th</sup> when Hamas terrorists invaded the southern communities of Israel and carried out inhumane atrocities.

### Star Trek: Picard (III) + Last of Us (I) + Silo (I) + Simulant Reviewed by: Leybl Botwinik

Following are a few short reviews of three SF TV series and one film that I've recently watched.

### 1) Star Trek: Picard – Season 03 (2023)



The 3<sup>rd</sup> season of Picard is quite complicated. It brings back all the former *Star Trek: The Next Generation* (TNG) crew – including Dr. Beverly Crusher who was absent from the first two seasons of Picard – as well as some of its former enemies, including Lore and the Borg and particularly the **Changelings** who are front and center in this season. Many of Season 1&2 characters, such as Seven of Nine are also present.

[\*Note: For those not familiar with the "Changelings" they are shape-shifting entities that become key characters in the *Star Trek: Deep Space Nine* (DS9) episodes, beginning with a few in Season 2 and slowly becoming prominent players in the course of seasons 3&4, and play major roles in the Season 5, 6, and 7 in what is known as the "Dominion War" (See: <u>https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Dominion\_War</u>)]

In short: The shape-shifting Changelings have plotted a major coup to destroy Earth and the Federation, but ['spoiler alert'] Picard and his team and friends manage to foil their plans.

The acting is quite good – as usual, with Sir Patrick Stewart as 'Jean-Luc Picard', leading the way.

This season, like the previous two (2) is recommended watching.

### 2) The Last of Us – Season 01 (2023)

Hm ... if you like Zombie-Apocalypse-End-of-the-World stories, this has it (mostly) all ... That having been said, there is nothing new about the storyline, and feels like something I've already seen before in one form or another. The only difference is the way in which the zombie-like plague has developed: a fungus-like disease that is spread in various ways – but mostly from being bitten by raging infected humans. Some of the mindless humans have (d)evolved into mushroom-like or plant-like monsters. Most are just raging zombie-like humans with twisted plant roots growing into and all over their bodies.

The storyline follows a 'recalcitrant' tough guy who has taken a job to get a young girl from the US East coast to a medical facility in the middle of the US. The girl is immune to the disease, and may be the key to saving humanity... Sounds familiar? The story, as usual, mostly revolves around the problems between humans (raiders, isolationist enclaves, etc.) and less about the disease and the diseased.

In fact, one entire episode deals with two survivors that have almost nothing to do with the storyline. In another episode, a cameo role by a well-known First Nations actor <u>https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Graham Greene (actor)</u> – and in both cases it felt like the actors were hired because someone owed them a role in a TV series...

#### All-in-all, nothing special about the series.

\* Post-script: The show is apparently based on a 2013 video game. In 2020 a 'Part II' game was released.

### 3) Silo – Season 01 (2023)

A very well-done adaptation of the first book "*Wool*" of the Silo trilogy by Hugh Howey. I read the books a few years ago and reviewed them in the July 2020 issue of CyberCozen – where I cover the entire set of 3 books in the trilogy. Just as I recommended the books, I recommend seeing their adaptation – at least the first book's first season TV show.



What particularly intrigued me was how the show producers would reproduce the physical/architectural setting of the story: 150 (or so) levels ('floors'). In the book, it takes about a day and a half to go top to bottom. In the TV show, this has been compacted to less floors, and top-to-bottom takes much less (probably something like 6-8 hours if not less). Nevertheless, the visual effect of the silo and staircase is very well done and gives a true feel of a giant underground 'reverse sky-scraper' – the Silo planted in the ground.

I'm looking forward to the next season and highly recommend watching Season 1.

### 4) Simulant (2023) – Movie


**Background:** In the near future, there will be robots in various aspects of our lives, such as worker bots and servants, etc. The more advanced model robots – Simulants – will look so human-like, that it would be difficult to know the difference. However, their activity (motion) can be easily stopped – so you know who is real and who isn't.

**Storyline:** Two threads are intertwined in the movie's plot:

1) There is a hacker who works to 'liberate' the advanced robots by eliminating the ingrained (programmed) restrictions – so much so, that these Simulants have developed not only

independent thought – but creativity as well. Of course, the 'government' has human agents that are out to destroy these Simulant 'anomalies' and try to stop/capture the hacker.

2) There is a new trend – or the beginnings of one – where rich people can buy Simulants that are externally physical copies of themselves and on a daily basis, their thoughts and experiences are downloaded into its memory. In this way, if something should happen to the human, a Simulant can continue 'being' that person. Sort of a different way of 'cloning' a person, and assuring longevity.



This is a Canadian-made film that is in many ways similar to '*Blade Runner*' – but on a much smaller budget – and in some ways also reminds me of the TV series '*Humans*' from the UK, as well as other cloning and/or Al-robot stories.

It had some good moments, and I mostly enjoyed it.

### **SpaceIL Updates and News**

#### Our work on the Beresheet2 mission continues at full speed!

The association's engineering team is working on further spacecraft development, with a focus on landing technology. We continue our efforts to raise the necessary funding to complete the Beresheet2 mission and reach out to private donors for collaborations with various countries, emphasizing the national, scientific, and educational importance of the mission.

## Another milestone on the way to the Moon: A successful drop test simulating the landing of Beresheet2 on the moon was performed.

SpaceIL continues to advance the Beresheet2 mission. As part of the mission's progress, a landing simulation experiment on the moon was conducted using a full-scale model of the lander scheduled to be launched in 2027. The model is constructed to simulate the actual weight center of the spacecraft during landing on the moon, that is, a free-fall weight from a height of 5 meters while considering that the gravitational force on the moon is about one-sixth of the gravitational force on Earth. As part of the experiment, the spacecraft was dropped from various heights to examine the landing legs'

response and assess the energy absorption mechanism upon impact with the ground. The landing legs system responded as expected and even beyond that to landings from all heights and stayed structurally intact.
