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Cut-Throat Publishing Industry Dept .: Ted White had part of his forthcoming novelization of Captain America (Bantam Books, 50¢) lif-

ted without permission by the East Village Other, an underground NY bimonthly newspaper with a circulation of 20,000, in a special anti-air pollution edition. Ted didn't learn about it until he got back to New York from Christmas with his parents. The part lifted was haphazardly edited, and was more than 500 words. (Reprinting without permission of more than 500 words from a copyrighted work leaves one open to legal prosecution.)

Retief's War by Keith Laumer makes use of many of the original black & white interiors by Jack Gaughan that appeared originally in IF. Lawrence Ashmead, editor for Doubleday, the publisher, originally asked permission to print them without paying Gaughan, who consented. Later, Owen Scott, art director, notified Gaughan that Doubleday would pay him for the use of the illos. However, when endpaper proffs were sent to Jack, he was notified that the interiors were part of the "book-budget," not the "art-budget," As a result. the money paid to Laumer is considered by Doubleday to include permittifer the Lustrations, and Jack will receive the month at all.
