THE FILE 770 YEARBOOK may be a misnomer -- with limited time and resources the thrust of this issue is to centralize all kinds of useful fannish information -- schedules of conventions, the location of clubs, the variety of apas. The right word to describe this issue may be almanac or fannish handbook. The fact is, even though I used to enjoy rich brown's annual review of events in FOCAL FOINT, the process of researching and writing such material bores me intensely. But here we are at the end of a decade -- and it happens to coincide with the tenth anniversary of my entrance to fandom. So a review of fandom in the 1970s is a project-in-outline tailored to my interests. Of course the subject is very complex -- so I structured the F770 Foll to include a Best of the 70s, plus a slot to write in what the reader considered the most important fancws event of the decade. So what I've done is used the responses as the framework for miniessays about the decade.

"'Respectability' of SF" -- Frank Richards :: History doesn't break up into neat 10-year periods -- so it follows that the academic interest in science fiction evident in the 70s originated in the late 1960s. A significant effect of the literary self-promotion of major sf writers like Eilison, Moorcock, Ballard etc. was to attract literary scholars in need of a field of study. The first generation of science fiction writers suffered from a general prejudice against pulp fiction, and a specific prejudice against sf's shortcomings in characterization and style. The first generation of sf writers was also generally politically conservative, meaning that their fictional messages were unlikely to appeal to academics. The following factors contributed to the respectability of sf in the 70s: (1) SF Sales shouldered the genre into the forefront of commercial publishing; students of popular culture -- logically -- prefer to study that which is popular; (2 A trend away from vocational training during the 60s created a population of liberal-arts degreeholders in need of an original field of study; (3) The beginning decline of college enrollment inspired university administrators to look for "commercial" courses to keep their departments afloat; (4) SF writing got a lot better than it used to be, in terms of story styling and literary technique; (5) SF was the last genre where short stories were still selling -- for some people, the sole choice was between writing for little magazines, or for sf magazines. The growing respectability of SF inspired Dena Brown to coin the slogan "Let's get of out of. the classroom and back in the gutter where it belongs." (Or something like that...)

"Non-English-speaking Worldcon." -- Mike Lowrey :: Heicon was staged in Heidelberg, Germany, in 1970. Other moderately intersting news from 1970, reported by LOCUS --Mallardi and Bowers announced the folding of DOUBLE: BILL... Irish John Berry. a police fingerprint expert, was hit by bricks in Ulster...Geis claimed a net loss of \$1200 on SFR for the prior year...First issue of ENERGUMEN...The TAFF race featured Charlie Brown, Bill Rotsler and Elliot Shorter -- Shorter won a majority of 267 votes cast...At the same time The Bob Shaw Fund was launched on a misconception that no TAFF race was planned...Mike Glicksohn and Susan Wood married Aug. st 29... Charlie Brown & Dena Brown marries December 27... Jack Speer was elected Small Claims Court Judge of Albuquerque...PgHLANGE shceduled "Up Against the Wall Panel -- Women in Fandom."

"Minneapolis in 173 (for continuity of purpose)" -- Gregg Trend :: 1970 was also the year that the Minneapolis in '73 worldcon bid simultaneously died and achieved immortality. Somehow the committee not only survived that blow, but outlived the committee who won the con, not to mention the decade.

"Torcon II" -- Mike Glicksohn ::Yes, as a result of Minneapolis folding, Toronto was forced to put on the Worldcon ... Interestingly, for a long time Toronto's principal rival in the central zone was Dallas, a comics-oriented fandom headed by Tom Reamy. Reamy's Dallascon Bulletin boasted a readership of 6000. It was the first omen of potential worldcon hugeness, and Reamy would be instrumental again when the issue of worldcon size came to a head in 1976. However, Reamy's Dallas bid disintegrated under poorly-reported conditions. As a result, when ballots were cast in 1971 Toronto got the nod. Other notes on 1971: Seattle's Nameless Ones reportedly disbanded ... "Blows Against the Empire" by Jefferson Starship appeared ... Fantasy Publishing Co. Inc. (FPCI) resumed business. Later in the decade it served as the Crawfords' umbrealla organization for cons which Doug Wright wanted out of business... TAFF nominees were Peter Weston, Terry Jeeves, Per Insulander and Mario Bosnyak, the latter winning a majority on the third ballot ... Apollo 15 ... First DUFF race consisted of candidates Buck & Juanita Coulson, Lesleigh Luttrell, and Andy Porter. Luttrell won...SCIENCE FICTION REVIEW folded.


"Laser Books" -- Terry Whittier :: Actually Laser Books belong in the middle of the decade, especially 1975 when the little-mourned SEEDS OF CHANGE was dumped on fandom. However the Roger Elwood boom began taking shape in 1972. The pages of LOCUS gradually fill up with project after project initiated by Elwood. Elwood personnified the strongest theme of the 1970s -- exploitation, and the efforts of fandom as a pressure group to control, undercut and stifle the exploiters. Other items from 1972: The infamous Ozarkon, when GoH Larry Niven showed up, but the con didn't. Nobody had bothered to tell him it was cancelled. As a result LOCUS announced it would, henceforth, only list cons the had a reasonable chance of actually coming off...George Senda ripped off Bubonicon hucksters, buy material with bad checks. By January 1973 he was convicted of misdemeanor burglary, resulting from his visit to the home of Gary Lowenthal -- Senda pulled up in a Yellow Cab, loaded Lowenthal's comic collection into it, and took off. This was one of the most bizarre events in the 70s, and Lasfs reacted to it by making Senda only the fourth fan to have his membership revoked. ... Charlie & Dena Brown moved to San Francisco... Rusty Hevelin attended 21 cons.

::1973 was the last year in which a mimcographed fanzine won the Hugo --ENERGUMEN. For the dominant story of fanzine publishing in the 1970s was the economic rewards reaped by such zines as LOCUS, ALGOL(now STARSHIP), THE ALIEN CRITIC (retitled SFR under threat of suit from THE CRITIC); and the equally heavy capital investment of rival editors for OUTWORLDS, THRUST, NICKELODEON and SF CHRONICLE. Rocketing postal rates and general cost inflation even made the production of unpretentious zines like MYTHOLOGIES a burden for their editors. The success of these zines suggests a sociology of sf readers that I don't have time to go into here -- but the zines thrived on a class of subscriber who was interested in the facts behind the genre, yet not a fannish fan. Geis and a host of imitators had done spadework in developing this market -- although they were convinced that it was the feuding between writers that boosted circulation. OUTWORLDS would continue the feud formula, although ENERGUMEN ejected a Ted White/Ted Pauls feud from its



pages and went on to win the Hugo. Porter, with ALGOL, keyed into an alternate trend of the 70s, by sinking his investment into high-quality graphics, and running lots of nonfictional sf material seldom tinged with controversy. Perhaps it was appropriate that the moderate ALGOL and fuming-n-fussing ALTEN CRITIC shared the 1974 fanzine Hugo. Along with postal rate hikes and mass fanzine circulation, I'd class the "decline of controversy", and overshadowing of amateur fanzine activity by semiprozines, as important events of the '70s.

Other 1973 tidbits: Moffatts take TAFF trip. Torcon's lawyer Smookler found a

Other 1973 tidbits: Moffatts take TAFF trip...Torcon's lawyer, Smookler, found a pretext for the Nasfic rules to be omitted from the Wsfs constitution...Joan Bowers and Susan Glicksohn announced a fund to bring Mae Strelkov to the '74 worldcon from Argentina...SFWA decided to boycott Cohen's publications, including AMAZING and FANTASTIC...The Change of Hobbit Benefit netted \$2400 and kept that LA bookstore in business...Brian Burley founded Beaker People Fandom...

"LASFS buys a clubhouse" -- Bruce Pelz :: Another 1973 event.

"Discon II" -- Walter K. Willis
::Discon, with registration over 4000, was by far the largest worldcon of its
time, double the size of the 1972 worldcon. A simple line on a graph riveted the
attention of prospective worldcon runners. On the strength of a print media
blitz Kansas City won the right to contend with these problems in 1976, edging
Columbus. At the time Columbus' problems included its admission that it couldn't
fit the worldcon in a single hotel.
The rest of 1974: SFWA voted to deal with complaints about Elwodd's business
practices...TAFF was won by Peter Weston...Jackie Franke and Bruce Gillespie
announced the Tucker Fund to jet him to Aussiecon. By the end of the year the
fund had gathered \$2500...First issue of KARASS...DUFF candidates were John
Bangsund, Susan Clarke and Leigh Edmonds, the latter winning...Lasfs hit age 40.

"MidAmericon" -- Cy Chauvin; "MAC Controversies" -- Craig Miller;
"A circa 6000-person worldcon" David Bratman; "MidAmeriCon's decision to charge \$50 at the door" -- Lise Eisenberg

::Right in the midst of worldcon stats that made the fan population appear to be doubling as fast as bets on a backgammon cube, Aussiecon injected a breath of calm from another era. 600 of 2000 members attended (many bought memberships as a contribution, having been warned by the concom that they expected to lose money). The result was an intimate worldcon in an exotic locale. It was in extreme contrast to the planning priorities of the '76 Kansas City committee, who undertook to deliver the Ultimate Worldcon. As it turned out, KC's public planning (their escalating membership rates and crowd management designs were updated in each gaudy progress report) resulted in such controversy and apprehension that of 4184 members, only 2614 showed up -- rather luckily, since the hotel couldn't have held many more. // The growth of science fiction fandom is tackled under the next heading, but I present at this point a simple table of statistics illustrating the growth of con fandom in the 70's. The figures are estimated actual attendance (from LOCUS, KARASS and FILE 770) unless asterisked, which is registered membership. Figures were not obtainable for all years.

(The estimate of total conventions is throw off by the erratic reporting of overseas conventions. The figure for 1979 is approximately correct, for N. Amonly -- the other figures could be up to 10 below actuality for a world total.) (The dropoff for Lunacon is partly due to Balticon being scheduled against it.)

Other 1975 matters: DUFF contestants were John Alderson, Shayne McCormack, Christine McGowan, Paul Stevens. Stevens won the following year...TAFF ended in a tie between candidates Bowers and Tackett. Bowers stepped down when a charter cheap enough to let both winners go fell through... The first FAAn ballots were circulated...SF Expo, the professional convention, was announced...Leland Sapiro stirred up the controversy of the year by threatening to sue Roger Elwodd for reprinting Sandra Miesel's essay about Poul Anderson without obtaining his permission. Sandra had sold the essay to an Elwood anthology (an essay Sapiro had paid nothing for, but simply copyrighted as part of RIVERSIDE QUARTERLY). Miesel's contract included an indemification clause, which would result in her having to reimburse Elwood for the expense of suits resulting from her essay. SFWA entered into the discussion. Eventually the statute of limitations ran out... Elsewhere on the legal front, Geis switched the title of THE ALIEN CRITIC back to SFR under threat of suit from THE CRITIC...

::Actually that never impressed me as being big news -- fascinating, yes, and a concrete example of why you can't run a worldcon long-distance. But it wasn't as if the committee did anything to cause their hotel to change ownership -- it was just a tough break.

Other 1976 entries: SF Expo, much feared as a wave of the future (throughout the 70s there was always something sparking anew the fear that pro writers would be seduced away from True Fandom by commercial conventions -- in 1972 it was rumored that pros would -- through SFWA -- demand an appearance fee at cons. In 1975-76 it was SF Expo.) SF Expo bombed out on its original date, with a loss estimated at \$70000 by LCCUS. The con was salvaged, and run in '76 at a Playboy hotel, with 400 attendees. Its principal effect on fandom, in the end, was getting A. Bertram Chandler a paid trip to North America...TAFF contenders were Terry Jeeves, Peter Roberts and Pete Presford. Roberts won the following year.

"The SF media explosion and resultant fandom" -- Gary Farber "Population explosion in fandom -- media explosion" -- Patrick Nielsen Hayden "STAR WARS the biggest moneymaker" -- Jack Collinson "STAR TREK the motion picture" -- Steven Tait "Leonard Nimoy signing for Spock," -- Kim Drapkin "Wright and fandom" -- Alan Prince Winston "Mike Glyer overreacts to Doug Wright" -- Jim Meadows III ::Last year I was privy to a discussion where it was pointed out that, due to films like STAR WARS and tv like BATTLESTAR GALACTICA there were probably very few people left in the country who had never been exposed to science fiction. Giventhat even a poorly rated show is still regularly viewed by millions, and that STAR WARS, the all-time moneymaker, must have been enjoyed by millions more, science fiction fandom loosely defined might add up to 15% of the US population. It becomes easy to understand why certain Star Trek conventions hit 10,000 attendees. And while there were always more convention fans than fanzine fans (it was even an issue in a 50s Taff campaign), now there are vastly more of them. Can they be assimilated into active fandom? Do either they or we want them to be? // Perhaps part of the answer to this question can be illustrated by the misadventures of Doug Wright. His contribution to LA fandom has been to attract thousands of sf media fans, get them into the habit of attending cons, then alienating most of them from his cons. If nothing else, Wright is the bogeyman fundom pointed to for all those years without ever actually finding. Wright has tried, and in some. cases succeeded, in usurping hotel facilities from cons planning to use them. He has applied pressure to hucketers (both incentives and threats) to get them to attend his cons exclusively. He filed suit against fans who protested his tactics, saying in his charges that the fans were interfering with Wright's making a living. (Can you overreact to somebody like this?) Notes from 1977: DUFF candidates were Fred Haskell, Bill Rotsler and Bob Vardeman. Rotsler won....Fake Jay Kinney illos emanated from Indiana...Warner's fanhistory of the 50,s A WEALTH OF FABLE was released...Gale Burnick organized Tucker Transfer to get him to Seacon... The Jeeves Fund attempted to bring Terry from the UK to either Suncon or Iguanacon, but circumstances prevented both trips... KARASS announced its plans to fold ... Ted Johnstone and Tom Reamy died in 1977.

"ERA Boycott/Non-Boycott of Iggy" -- Jeanne Gomoll
"Markstein-Ellison square-off" -- Dick & Nicki Lynch
::I opposed the political manipulation of the Worldcon; I managed to get sucked into
the vortex of the Markstein-Ellison exchange; and ironically I may be the only
person whose opinion of ERA was actually changed by the whole hoorah. Ellison
served to question us, if fans are sland, why do they spend all their time sitting
on their cans?

Many people who already supported ERA were
perfectly content to transform Iguanacon from a mere science fiction convention to
a political statement; especially since the economic boycott of Arizona as a
nonratified ERA state resulted in Iguanacon being the only major convention in
Phoenix that summer. The political thing was done with finesse, and this controversy was, in the end, swallowed up by operations problems. Whatever one may feel
the duties of the Pro Guest of Honor are, it's not as if they had invited a man
who had never expressed an opinion before...

Other true facts of 1978: Seattle momentarily became the Mecca of 70s fandom... Ben Indick attempted to gafiate, and partially succeeded...TITLE folded...Iguanacon began its never-ending committee shakeup as it was discovered that no contract had been signed with the hotel. Kyger replaced Brown in the chair...Leigh Brackett died...Neither Fred Patten nor Carl Bennett could be induced to take over the management of SCIENCE FICTION REVIEW...A Woman's Apa voted to exclude men from membership...Linda Bushyager sold her first novel: Jack Chalker's first novel was published...Mae Strelkov again visited the US...Roger Johnson got stuck in a rubber lizard mask...Sol Cohen sold AMAZING. Ted White left soon thereafter... The GET UT AND OVER FAN FUND (GUFF) was launched, with John Foyster its first winner...Controversy erupted over the proposed DC-in-84 rotational change plan.

a couple thousand dollars after assessing an equally hefty fine on Doug Wright...
Rick Katze...Mark Sharpe won a bowling tournament in Western Australia...

The Narrative category boils down to Glyer and Hlavaty getting the same proportion of points as they did for fanzines, and no one besides Victoria Vayne getting more than 10 points. A RIDDLE WRAPPED IN AN ENIGMA: After an intensive weekend sifting through the data returned from this year's poll, I conclude that almost as much can be learned from what wasn't in the poll as what was in it. (1) Voters were unable to produce significant pluralities when picking potential guests of honor for the worldcon, (2) Even though 24 of the above voters can be considered active fanzine fans, only 20 voters overall succeeded in filling all five slots under Favorite Fanzine and Favorite Fanartist (and we won't even get into the two writer categories which turned out to be a bad job). The declining influence of the print medium in fandom seems evident -- footnoted by the voters' general agreement that Con Listings was their favorite part of F770. The decline in the influence of fanzines is not synonymous with the fall of fandom -- quite obviously focal point conventions like the Worldcon, Balticon, Boskone, Westercon, Midwestcon, etc which draw ever-increasing armies of fans have finally succeeded in providing the direct fan links for which fanzines were only a substitute anyway.

Although I continue to draw no distinction between con fans and fanzine fans, since most of the latter also attend cons, evidence abounds that the time and funds sunk into convention attendance preclude major fanzines from developing, or from being published frequently. It only takes eight or ten excellent faneditors to spark a renassance of sorts, and when you consider the success of MYTHOLOGIES, and before it WARHOON and KIPPLE, the potential clearly exists for highly successful fannish publications. But I speculate that fanzine activity will only return to prominence if the current acceleration of fuel costs makes con attendance prohibitive. This is a real possibility; however it is impossible to predict how tough the transportation crunch must get before conditions return to what they were in the 60s and before when air rates were relatively high.

NOTES IN FASSING: People who didn't put their return address on the envelope in which they mailed their ballot -- even though they wrote their birthday on the ballot -- will probably be surprised that they didn't get listed on the Fan Birthday Calendar. If you were such a voter, and lived in a part of the country where I have a dozen subscribers, I didn't waste time trying to deduce your well-hidden identity. On the other hand, I went through these ballots so often, tabulating, that a couple unsigned voters were revealed -- such as the fellow who voted his wife best artist and listed the fellow who bought her cover for his magazine as a Fan GoH prospect. (A lot of people voted for her, including a few from Washington state where this ballot had been posted.)
But enough Sherlock Holmesing...



### BILL ROTSLER'S RULES FOR MASQUERADES

- 1: There should be a weight limit for the purchase of leotards.
- 2: Every contestant must first see himself or herself from the rear.
- 3: Whother prince or pauper, act like it. Stay in character.
- 4: Speak distinctly, but not at length.
- 5: Learn to use the microphone, or don't.
- 6: When in doubt, keep your mouth shut.
- 7: If you are thinking of doing something funny, get a second opinion.
- 8: Short is better than long; funny is better than non-funny; short and funny is best.
- 9: No name tags on costumes.
- 10: If you have something for the narrator to read, keep it brief and leave out the unpronouncible and incomprehensible words.
- 11: Hand in a legible entry form.
- 12: If you are going to attempt a costume cliche you must do it better than ever before, or have a good variation.
- 13: Try on the costume well shead of time to be certain it fits properly.
- 14: Learn to manage your props and accessories.
- 15: Consider carefully before going nude or semi-nude.
- 16: Remember, some people can grow beards and some can't.
- 17: Choose a costume suitable to your sex, size, age and appearance.
- 18: Thou shalt have shoes to match thy costume.
- 19: Have something ready for a second appearance.
- 20: Rehearse. Rehearse. REHEARSE!

Reproduction of these "rules" is not only permitted but encouraged, especially infanzines and convention books and progress reports, rather than read before or during a masquerade, so as not to reflect on those particular contestants.

In 1975 Fred Patten compiled and issued the forerunner to this list. The Lasfs had conceived the project as an appropriate information-coordinating function for a major of club. I updated the list, whose second edition appeared in 1977. Although both lists were incomplete, the main defect to both of them was that hardly anybody got to see them. Locus and Karass announced the availability of the list, but woefully few people sent for it -- almost none of them the people this list was designed to help, new fans trying to find a social outlet. Therefore at the end of F770's first year of publication I revised the list again and circulated it to all subscribers as part of the Yearbook. This procedure has been repeated for the 1980 edition, and should get the widest distribution ever. The F770 Clubs list is still incomplete -- but it's a hell of a lot bigger. I'm constantly on the lookout for additional listings, and corrections to past ones. (Leose-leaf copies of this list are available for SASE.)

Any additions or corrections to this index are welcome. To be published by Mike Glyer in January 1980.

Once again a new editor takes over this apa-index. I am retaining the format used by the previous editor of listing the apas in alphabetical order. I am retaining the so-called quasi-apas. I am including a few invitational apas which are widely known, as well as a mundane apa or two.

The following terms are used thruout the index.

Copy Count...The number of copies of identical pages that must be submitted to be included in the mailing.

Dues......Money paid to the apa to cover costs of mailing, of printing the OO, and other expenses. Make out checks or money orders in the name of the OE, not the apa.

Minac.....The minimum activity you can get away with without being dropped from the apa.

Mailing.....What you get back from the OE after sending in your zine.

It consists of one copy of all zines sent to the OE. It
is sometimes called distribution or bundle.

OE..... The Official Editor, who runs the apa, collates the zines sent in, sends out the mailings, and keeps records. Also known by other names such as CM (Central Mailer).

Waitlist....An invention of fandom, not found in the mundane apas. A list of those who want to join an apa when the membership limit is filled.

Alarums and Excursions is a monthly Dungeons and Dragons apa. The OE is Lee Gold, 3965 Alla Rd., Los Angeles, CA, 2006, 90066. The copy count is being held down to 700 because of the recent paper strike. The OE does printing for 9-hole stencils. Subscriptions are available to non-contributers, at a cost of \$1.50 each mailing plus postage. An SASE will bring you more detailed information. This apa was founded by Lee Gold in July of 1975, the first of the D&D apas. I think it remains the best, and is certainly the most active. A mustapa for any player of Fantasy Role Playing games. (Lee Gold)
