PROTECTOR for Best Novel, "Westworld" for Best Dramatic Presentation with "Soylent Green" running a close second and the rest behind, Bill Rotsler for Fan Artist with Grant Canfield a close second, Susan Glicksohn best Fan Writer, and J. R. R. Tolkien for Gandalf Award, who else? I'm in a quandry over Best Fanzine, if I really felt all four were "fanzines" I'd vote for ALGOL, but since I nominated Andy for Best Pro Editor, how can I convince myself ALGOL and CRITIC are fanzines? I'm of two minds about LOCUS, sometimes I think it is a fanzine, sometimes I wonder, since its slant is toward professionals, market reports, and so on, still I guess it still is a fanzine, and it is the second best of the four listed, but it has won a Hugo twice before. I'm awfully tempted to vote for it, though, because it is so good. Gosh darn it, maybe I should vote for no award? No, that's not right. I really don't know what I'll end up voting for, but I think it will be either ALGOL or LOCUS. Sorry I don't know enough about the other nominations to vote.

In any case, no matter what you think is best, VOTE!! If you haven't joined DISCON II, the Worldcon, yet, you should be ashamed of yourself! But it is not too late to join and vote for the Hugos. Supporting memberships are now \$3, attending is \$7. Write Discon 2, Box 31127, Washington, DC 20031. But remeber, no vote is better than an uniformed vote, and you can vote on some categories and skip others. - Linda)

LEIGH EDMONDS WINS DUFF

Leigh Edmonds is the winner of the DUFF race. Congratulations to Leigh, who will also make a fine DUFF ambassador to DISCON. A total of 232 ballots were received, including 113 from Australia, 108 from the U.S., 5 from Canada, 3 from U.K., and 1 each from Italy, South Africa, and New Zealand. John Bangsund withdrew from the DUFF race with barely a week of the DUFF contest left to run. His reasons were quoted as being ill-health, financial problems, and a possible conflict with his job with the Senate in Canberra. With the recent elections, he felt workload would be high at the time of the Discon and he would not be able to leave without placing his job in risk.

At the time of his withdrawal, John was running third on the balloting, so the only effect this had was the John was eliminated first, and his second place votes were then allocated to the other candidates. This did not affect the winner of the DUFF race.

Before Bangsund's withdrawal, votes were 42 for Bangsund, 13 for Susan Clarke, 51 for

Leigh Edmonds, 11 for Paul Stevens received by the American Administrator. The Australian administrator received 9 vote for John Bangsund, 16 for Susan Clarke, 21 for Leigh Edmonds, and 69 for Paul Stevens. After the Bangsund withdrawal, the votes were distributed as follows: Susan Clarke-41, Leigh Edmonds-103, and Paul Stevens-87. The final ballot gave totals of 128 for Edmonds and 102 for Stevens.

DUFF has a total of \$1511.59 (U.S.) which is well over the goal of \$1200, and not all monies are in. This income includes \$314 donations accompanying ballots, \$380 other donations, and \$137 from the auction. It appears that DUFF will grant \$1500-1600 to Leigh which should pay his complete travel expenses and expenses to the Worldcon. Any leftover money will be held for next year's race.

Lesleigh Luttrell's "Adventures Down Under (And What She Found There)" is available for \$1, proceeds to DUFF. Write Lesleigh at 525 W. Main, Madison, Wisc. 53703. There will be a DUFF 1975 race to send a North American fan to the Aussiecon. To become a candidate, you must obtain the signatures of five fans who are willing to serve as your nominators, two fans from the host country (Australia) and three from elsewhere in international fandom, write a platform of not more than 100 words, and send these items plus a \$5 bond to the U.S. Administrator, Lesleigh Luttrell. Deadline for filing is Nov. 2, 1974.

Leigh Edmonds will be accompanied to Discon by Valma Brown. They will be arriving on the West Coast at least a week before Discon and will be looking for a ride to Bubonicon in Albuquerque. Then they will go to the Worldoon, and afterwards visit Minneapolis and other places in the U.S.

Over 70 items have been donated for auction, including hb and pb books of all kinds, some autographed by the authors, artwork, fanzines. and lots more, too numerous to mention. WORLDCON FINANCES

Milt Stevens writes that LACON has collected on some of the advertising which was due at the time of the financial report. It was decided by the majority of the LACON Committee to donate half of this additional income to the LASFS Building Fund. So far, this has amounted to \$74.25. Several thousand dollars are still awaiting use for the publication of the photo book. Originally a proceedings was to be published, but since enough tapes could not be found, a photo book will be published instead.

From Mike Glicksohn and Locus: Torcon 2's Financial Report is out and a detailed report can be obtained by writing Peter Gill, 18 Glen Manor Dr., Toronto 13, Ontario, Canada. If you are bidding for a Worldcon, I strongly suggest that you write Peter for a copy, it could be a big help.

Basically, Torcon took in \$30,458.85 revenue and spent \$26,535.67. The \$3,922.18 profits will be spent to buy the Hugos for Torcon, Discon, and Aussicon, various expenses such as printing the Financial Report, \$300 each pass-on funds to Discon & Aussicon, \$150 each grants to TAFF and DUFF, \$150 grant to the sponsoring Ontario SF Club, and \$150 to the Worldcon Emergency Fund. The Worldcon Emergency Fund now contains \$668.95 which was passed on to DISCON.

THE REMAINING \$1,749.81 will be returned to the fans who contributed to TORCON by throwing an open party at DISCON II. Details will be given out at DISCON. The party will last until all the money is gone, and all members are welcome.

HUGOS

Mike Glicksohn informs me the Hugos are not ready yet, and it is doubtful they will be ready by Discon either. This means there may not be any Hugos to hand out at Discon!

Andy Porter writes: "I'm involved with a Worldcon bid for 1977 for Montreal, supported by fans in New York and in Montreal. Our hotel is the Queen Elizabeth, a Canadian National/Hilton International hotel. The Queen Elizabeth has 1200 rooms and has temporarily reserved 750 for our use. If overflow hotels are needed, a 1000 room Sheraton is 3 blocks away and a 500 room Canadian Pacific Hotel is a block away." Tentative plans for programming call for a bilingual convention, where possible, with very tentative plans for both an English language and a French language GoH.

If you haven't been keeping track of Worldcon bidding for 1977, I've heard of two other main bids "Seven in 77" headed by Don Lundry which is a committee in search of a city. Right now they are trying to decide on Orlando, Boston, or Atlanta, Ga. Don Lundry would appreciate comments on these cities (his address appears on p. 5). And the other bid is Philadelphia, which has a city, but is seeking a hotel. The Montreal bid seems to have both, which puts it ahead in my estimation.
