DUFF NEWS

The 1975 DUFF campaign is now open. Any currently active North American fan is eligible to run. To become a candidate, signatures of 5 nominators are needed by Nov. 2, two from Australia and three from elsewhere in international fandom. A \$5 bond and a platform of not more than 100 words are also required. So far, only one person, Rusty Hevelin, has completed all these steps. Several other fans seem to intend to

run, but haven't completed all necessary steps. If you intend to run, be sure to file before the deadline of Nov. 2. Ballots will be available shortly and will be distributed with KARASS. The DUFF fund is starting with a balance of about \$150, but will need to collect about \$900 more to send a North American fan to Australia. TAFF NOMINATIONS

DUFF, the Down Under Fan Fund, sends fans to and from Australia. TAFF, the Trans-Atlantic Fan Fun, sends fans across the Atlantic. TAFF has been in operation since 1953, while DUFF is only a few years old. Both these organizations are very worthy, since they promote the internationalism of fandom and give a worthy fan the opportunity to visit fans and a convention in another country. TAFF nominations are open Dec. 1, 1974 and close April 1, 1975. This year a North or South American fan will be sent to the 1976 Eastercon in Great Britain. Each nominee must have five nominators, three from the fan's own country and two from overseas. Each nominee must provide a platform of 100 words and a \$5 bond as a bond of good faith and a donation to the fund. Each nominee must sign a statement to the effect that he or she is ready, willing, and able to make the trip, barring acts of God, etc. Anyone active in fandom prior to Sept. 1973 is eligible to nominate, be nominated, or vote. CONVENTION REPORTS

PgHLANGE was held the last weekend in Sept. About 120 persons attended this relaxing con. This year the con was held at the Sheraton North, a new location in a northern Pittsburgh suburb. The hotel was compact and comfortable with large rooms at relatively low prices. Nearby was a main shopping area with everything from a grocery to a Baskin Robbons. The con ran smoothly with several open parties, including the con committee party, films (mostly shorts), and panels. GoH Joanna Russ was kept busy on several panels and gave an excellent banquet speech comparing SF to medieval literature. The banquet was a fine buffet with three hot entries. The festivities were highlighted by two events of note, presentation of THE MIMEO MAN and the Patia Von Sternberg incident. The later occurred on Sat. night when a party was crashed by two 6-foot non-fans, typical football jocks. Patia, aided and abetted by Ro Nagey and a host of fans decided to put these guys on. This led to the 1st annual "lady of the night" PgHLANGE lottery and numerous other events which left the fans in hysterics and the non-fans indisposed. THE MIMEO MAN came off extremely well, leading to the possibility that it will be shown again. David Emerson was the perfect mimeo man. He was aided by Susan Palermo, Asenath Hammond, Ted Greenstone, Suzle Tompkins, Linda Bushyager, Genie DiModica, Linda Lounsbury, Jerry Kaufman, Hank Davis, Jon Signer, Paul Jordan, Moshe Feder, Matt Schneck, Hope Leibowitz, and Barry Smotroff. Susie Tiffany filled in as a last minute singer and prop person. John Curlovich, Ben Pondexter, Ron Bushyager, Jim Freund, and Ross Pavlac helped with props and prompting. Morris Keesan played the piano. Stu Shiffman created the great props and settings. THE MIMEO MAN was written by Debbie Notkin, Eli Cohen, and Moshe Feder.

SFANCON 5 was held in Gent, Belgium over Aug. 30/Sept. 1. Attendance was about 250, mostly Belgian and Dutch fans, with some fans from France and Britain. The con had a true international flavor, with three languages in constant use (Flemish, French, and English). ROGER ELWOOD WRITES

"I have arrived at the conclusion that I should make a definitive statement and then drop the matter. I have been told that my biggest problem until now has been a "communications gap." George Zebrowski of SFWA BULLETIN mentioned that people have written in asking for more information about me; others in this field have encouraged me to be open about what I am doing, cooperate more with the fan community, and so on. Any of the recent "developments" have been sincere attempts by me to take this advice to heart.

"It is not easy for me to do these interviews, primarily because of the time I desperately need to handle the editorial commitments I have. But I think the interviews are important because unbiased people are asking unbiased questions, and it seems reasonable for my answers to provide insight into my motives, directions, and plans. Whether there is agreement with what I say or not is unimportant to me; people are entitled to their opinions, and I never react to honest negative criticism, but, rather, I react to negative criticism that is based upon falsehood, inadequate reasoning, and so on. Bruce Arthurs was, I felt, someone who had engaged in this; I responded to his criticism, and he printed my letter along with an apology for a good percentage of what he said. The point is this: He and others have attributed to me motvies and such that, I feel, are wrong. One way of trying to clear up matters is for me to make myself available so that people have something to base their conjecture upon, rather than second-hand supposition and no direct contact with me.

"Yet, again, my motives seem to be under question. I have never paid for anyone else to come here. I have been a host to a meeting of ESFWA members; I have been a host to others within the SF community - but simple hospitality should not be considered an attempt to "buy" my critics. I made my offer to Bruce, he accepted, and that seemed that. I have had misgivings since then, and if Bruce feels his objectivity was compromised in any way, he can drop printing the interview, and there will be no hard feelings. These misgivings have not been about my intentions, but about what others would misconstrue those intentions to be.

"So, from now on, no offers to pay anyone's way here. I did so in your case and Bruce's because I thought this was fair in view of the fact that I was the one requesting the interview. If you or Bruce had done so, it probably would have been another matter. I would be pleased to engage in any interviews, by phone or in person, that fan writers care to suggest, with no limitations as to subject matter or whatever. But in view of the foregoing, these must be at the writer's request, not mine. My phone numbers are as follows: area code 609, 927-0326 or 927-0024. I am also building a network of contacts to channel complaints and/or inquirires to me. On the West Coast, Stephen Goldin has agreed to help; his phone member is 215-365-7579. In the midwest, Sandra Miesel has agreed to do the same thing; her number is 317-846-9519. Also, I have a secretary; if I ever do not answer my phones, she can be called: Mrs. William Ridgeway, 609-641-6865. All I ask is that fans get to know me, rather than lean on hearsay and such. I am willing to be available much more than most pro editors -- and willing to incorporate suggestions that are reasonable. I make this offer: Tell me how you think my books can be improved. Tell me how you think my relationships with fans can be improved. I cannot know what your thoughts are until you contact me. I am willing to listen, to absorb, to make communication a two-way street. Are you, the fans, willing to come through on your end?

(The above is a slightly abbreviated version of Roger Elwood's letter. I think this clears the matter up. This will be the last on the subject.-LeB)

The Queen E has 1200 guest rooms, closed circuit TV, meeting room for 2300, and banquet room for 1700. York is also bidding for 1977. The committee chairman is Thom Anderson. Other committee members are Dana Anderson, Stu Grossman, Stu Hellinger, Devra Langsam Elyse and Steven Rosenstein, Ben Yalow, Dave Simons, and Joan Winston. The bid hotel is The Statler Hilton, which hosted Nycon III. The con facilites would be the entire hotel though, not just the facilities on the 18th floor. The "7 for 77" Committee has finally found a city - Orlando. The hotel is the Sheraton-Towers is the con hotel. The brochure I have on the hotel shows 53 meeting rooms, the largest holding 1900 persons theater style and 1255 banquet style. There is also a larger exhibit hall, but it is unclear whether this room could be used for a program or would have pillars, walls, etc. making it suitable for use only as an exhibit room.
