LELAND SAPIRO LEGAL DISPUTE

(The following letter is from Larry Propp who is representing Sandra Miesel as her lawyer. Please send copies of any material sent to Sandra regarding conflicts with Leland to him. His address is 3127 North Sheridan Rd., Peoria, Ill. 61604.)
"It has come to my attention that the rumor is circulating throughout fandom that Leland Sapiro has sued Sandra Miesel. As of the date of this memorandum, the rumor is false. However, a legal dispute has arisen between Mr. Sapiro and Ms. Miesel which may result in a lawsuit. Sandra has retained me to represent her in this matter, and the purpose of this memorandum is to set forth the true facts of the matter.

"In the Jan. 1970 (Vol. IV, No. 2) issue of Riverside Quarterly an article by Sandra entitled "Challenge and Response" was published by Leland. Leland copyrighted the entire contents of the magazine in his name. Sandra received no payment for this article. Subsequently, an expanded and substantially rewritten version of this article was purchased by Roger Elwood for inclusion in THE MANY WORLDS OF POUL ANDERSON, published by Chilton.

"On Aug. 19, 1974, Stanley Sapiro, an attorney who happens to be Leland's brother, sent a letter to Chilton threatening suit for copyright infringement unless publication of the book with the article in question included was immediately halted. Various correspondence then ensued between Chilton's attorney and Leland's brother, the net effect being that Chilton denied any valid claim on Leland's part and Leland threatening immediate suit. The last letter was dated Jan. 27, 1975, from Mr. Sapiro.

"Although Leland has never directly threatened suit against Sandra, the net effect of his threatened lawsuit would be to force Sandra to defend. When Sandra sold the revised article to Elwood, a part of her contract was an indemnity agreement. Elwood signed a similar clause of indemnity in his contract with Chilton. If Leland sues Chilton, Chilton will file a third-party action against Roger Elwood on a theory of indemnity. Elwood would quite properly third-party Sandra into the lawsuit.

"To squelch all rumors, let me repeat that Leland has never directly threatened to sue Sandra and that no lawsuit has yet been filed by any party, to the best of our present knowledge.

"NOTE TO FANZINE PUBLISHERS: The above memorandum is for publication, and you may use it or not use it as you see fit. However, if you do decide to publish it, PLEASE QUOTE IT IN ITS ENTIRETY."

(I also received a reply from Leland Sapiro (Box 14451 University Station, Gainesville, Fla. 32604) which I intended to run here (in fact I typed the stencil). But it has been brought to my attention that some of the statements may require Rober Elwood's approval (I don't want to be sued), so I am holding back from publishing Leland's side until I hear from Roger Elwood. More on this will probably appear nextish (including, hopefully, Leland's letter). Basically Leland states he is not aiming his actions at Sandra and hopes to make up damages, if any, which might occur to her. This statement was of April 8, but subsequent letters from Leland and his brother (copies of which were sent to me and are also being held pending approval to publish) indicate that this situation is volatile and may change. I will try to present both sides of the picture as best I can and as promptly as I can. -LeB)

The CONTRIBUTION TO THE FIELD category was withdrawn because nominations were too diffuse (141 nominations on 158 ballots). (I know that was a dumb category -LeB)

(The above information comes from LOCUS - as usual the Aussiecon committee has sent advance information to LOCUS but none to KARASS. Others have also ignored KARASS in distributing news, which is rather discouraging. Fortunately LOCUS is around for me to borrow news from. As usual, LOCUS is doing an excellent job on providing fast, full coverage of pro news and the most important fan news. I recommend it highly. (Subs are 15/\$6.00 in North America from Charlie & Dena Brown, 34 Ridgewood Lane, Oakland Calif. 94611 or Box 3938, San Francisco, Calif. 94119 (I think the S.F. address is correct for subs, the Oakland address for editorial matter))

Issue 172 of LOCUS has results of the 1974 LOCUS poll and commentary, all of which is very interesting, especially as insight into Hugo voting patterns)

The Hugo Awards have some interesting results. It seems as though the NOVELLA isn't getting too much support as a category. It has always confused me -- perhaps it should be done away with. THE ALIEN CRITIC was nominated again, despite Dick Geis's admission that he does it to make money, pays contributors, and says it is not an "amateur" magazine anymore. I don't consider ALGOL amateur either, but evidently someone does, or else some people don't read the rules or don't pay attention to them. Because the Hugo rules prevent an artist who makes the pro category from appearing in a fan category, Tim Kirk and Steve Fabian are in the pro category only.


I must protest naming of George Barr as Best Fan Artist. I don't believe his work in the past year was fan work, and therefore I don't feel he is even eligible. I'd appreciate hearing from anyone with information to the contrary. As I recall, his work at various artshows is done in the professional categories, along with Alicia Austin's, Kelly Freas, and so on, and I can't recall any fanzine work in the past year (that is, 1974). Also, is PHANTOM OF THE PARADISE an SF movie? I haven't seen it, but I didn't think it was. (And it seems amazing that 45 different items were nominated for Best Dramatic Presentation - I wonder what they were).

The Australian influence seems evident in the nominations of STARLING, John Bangsund, and SF COMMENTARY, but of the 267 hallots, over 200 were from the U.S. All nomination counting was done by David Grigg as an awards sub-committee. Hence SF COMMENTARY was judged eligible in the fanzine category even though editor Bruce Gillespie is on the convention committee. However, I believe AUSSIECON is acting under pre-Discon Worldcon rules, and those rules do not allow for creation of a sub-committee; therefore SF COMMENTARY is technically not eligible. Clarification of this by Worldcon rule experts or Aussiecon would be appreciated. - LEB

XEROX UNIVERSITY MICROFILMS has begun large-scale filming of pulp magazines and comics. It has been working with major library collections of materials and has devised special camera to permit photographing fragile material without opening mags more than halfway. The firm has appealed for collectors to lend certain things for filming. Some of the pulps needed include DARE DEVIL ACES, FAMOUS FANTASTIC MYSTERIES, and DIME MYSTERY. The address is Xerox University Microfilms, 330 N. Zeeb Rd., Ann Arbor, Mich, 48106. No fee for use of material, but insurance protection is offered. The firm plans to release for college and library purchase microfilms of DOC SAVAGE, the Beadle and Adams dime novels, and ADVENTURE MAGAZINE by Spring. 

STAR TREK NEWS

It has been 6 years since STAR TREK left the air. It now seems definite that a ST movie will be made by Paramount. Gene Roddenberry will take offices at Paramount very soon. The latest rumor says that all the original stars have signed contracts, except for Leonard Nimoy, who feels it would be bad for his career. It is estimated that the film will reach the screen sometime late 1976.

Several ST books will be published soon. Jacqueline Lictenberg, Sondra Marshak and Joan Winston wrote STAR TREK LIVES which is slated for Bantam's May list. Sondra is working with Myrna Culbreath on a book wholly on SPOCK with Gene Roddenberry's involvement. Sondra and Myrna are doing a television special on the rebirth of STAR TREK with why as the key question. Sondra has also edited an anthology and will be working on books about other ST characters, such as Kirk, as companion volumes to the Spock book.

Educational TV station in Bowling Green Ohio has a special on ST with a May air date. Jacqueline Lictenberg will possibly appear.

Discon 3 bidding for the '77 convention has sent some additional information on the Washington bid. The bid is chaired by Peggy Rae Pavlat; Vice-Chair is Alan Huff; Bill Evans is Treasurer; Susan Applegate; other members include Bill Hixon, Ron Bounds, Bob Madle, Bob Pavlat, Dick Eney, Barry Newton, Don Pauley, Dave Bischoff, and Joe Haldeman. CON REPORTS

MARCON March 21-23 was delightful as usual with some 300 attendees. Large groups of fans from Pittsburgh, Kansas City, Bloomington, and other areas, GoH James Gunn, and many nice fans from all over and Columbus made the con friendly and enjoyable. The Columbus group provided room parties and arranged for film premiers of DARK STAR (very good) and SHANKS (poor), as well as several other movies. Freff and Randy Bathurst drew tons of cartoons, including the one below (others will appear as a folio in GRANFALLOON). Randy also brought a prototype statuette for the Fanzine Activitity Achievement Awards (a Bheercan man with a beanie perched on a mimeo). While some fans ate the rather good Chinese banquet at the hotel, others organized dinners to various outside Chinese restaurants. Filksongs, balloons, Worldcon smoffing, and bright conversation dominated the room parties. (Linda)

BALTICON 9 -was markedly different from preceeding Balticons. Instead of being rather small and dull, a mass media blitz brought about 800 people to the con. Limited SF program items were supplemented with items on Biofeedback, Kirlian photography, robots, films, and Bermuda Triangle. Hal Clement was GoH, and his talk and question/answer session was well recieved. The hotel was inhospitable and closed room parties. SEACON 75 - BRITISH EASTERCON Drew some 550 fans including a lot of newcomers. Fans were from all over Europe and Britain, with a few North Americans. The attendees enjoyed the luxurious accomodations of the De Vere Hotel and the related social atmosphere. The program was well-rounded with an excellent mixture of serious and light material. Harry Harrison, replacing Mike Morrcock as GoH, was a popular figure whose entertaining speech was well-received. The main difference between U.S./ Canada cons and British cons seemed to be the delightfully important role played by the hotel bar, the remarkably informal atmosphere of the business sessions, and the marvellously widespread use of the inherently fannish phrase "Let me buy you a drink." AUSSIECON - 33rd Worldcon - will be held Aug. 14-17 1975. Membership now is 1,243, a new record for Woldcons outside North America. The Heicon in 1970 had a total of only 973 with 620 attendees. It is still not too late to join, and even if you can't attend, you should buy a supporting membership so you can vote on the Hugos and vote for the 1977 site by mail ballot. John Bangsund has sent out a very nice letter withdrawing his name from the Hugo nominations, partly because he is not entirely convinced that the Hugo award represents a true evaluation of worthiness, partly because he is Toastmaster for Aussiecon, and partly because he's been closely associated with the Australian bid.

MidAmeriCon now has over 1550 members, more people than attended Noreascon in 1971. The con will have a number of surprises, including a World Film Premier. Hotel registration cards will be available in Oct. You can send in room reservations now, but the hotel may be confused. Heinlein won't authorize any recording of his GoH speech, even for the con committee. Persons wishing to make a recording or to publish the speech must go through Heinlein's agent and pay a fee. MidAmeriCon will not publish a proceedings, but hopes to publish a photo memory book containing a list of the Hugo winners, costume winners, etc., called Epilog.

Gene Roddenberry has sent out a letter clearing up the facts regarding the ST motion picture. Roddenberry will be writing and producing the picture for Paramount. No director will be set until the script is completed. Negotiations are underway to obtain all the original cast, and no other actor is being condidered to replace any of the cast. The use of name stars in guest or cameo roles is being considered as well. Efforts are being made to use the original "behind the camera" people.
