DUFF & TUCKER FUND

DUFF collected \$1300 plus money in Australia and 140 ballots, thus making the fund fully funded and able to send someone to Australia. The special fund to send Bob Tucker to Aussiecon has also been successfully funded, with a balance of \$2270 + \$310 outstanding. This money will be used to send Tucker and excess funds will be shared with DUFF and with Aussiecon's Fan GoHs, Mike Glicksohn and Susan Wood. Leigh Edmonds has volunteered to handle the Fund's cash Down Under, and will be doing the honors for DUFF as well.

NOREASCON FINANCIAL REPORT

I received the following letter from Donald Eastlake, President of NESFA which clears up questions of what Noreascon's finances were to a great extent:

"Noreascon received the Worldcon emergency fund at \$241.55 and did not consider it as normal income but rather as held in trust for future Worldcons. It was transferred to LACON with accumulated interest. Noreascon "made" \$2906.67, of which \$150 was given to TAFF, \$100 was given to Argocon (c/o Mario Bosnyak), and \$1032.96 was spent toward producing a proceedings. No pass on funds were given to LACON, as they said they didn't want any, nor to Torcon 2 which, on inquiry, did not indicate it wanted any. That left \$1623.71 which did not appear to be enough to produce and distribute a proceedings of the type planned. To raise money, the NOREASCON Awards Banquet LP record set (2 records available from NESFA for \$6) was designed and produced under the direction of William H. Desmond. NOREASCON's expenses through the initial preparation of 250 records were \$929.87. NESFA acted as sales agent for the record which so far is less than half way to breaking even. Eventually, all of NOREASCON's assets and liabilities were transferred to NESFA by an agreement in which NESFA acknowledged a moral obligation to produce a proceedings. NESFA got \$693.84 plus proceeds of record sales up to that point. The proceedings have been making a lot of progress recently, and I expect that they will be available in early 1976. Advance orders at a minimal price will probably be solicited from NOREASCON members."

WESTERCON XXVII FINAL REPORT

The 1974 Westercon financial report is now out which shows a total income of \$20,912 and expenses of the \$20,912, with donations of \$50 to TAFF, \$50 to DUFF, and \$475 to LASFS.
