FAAN BALLOTS

Enclosed are the 1977 Fanzine Activity Achievement Awards. These are peer awards given by active fanzine fans to the best active fanzine fans of the past year (1976). These awards are not meant to replace the Hugos which have developed into popularity awards, but rather to supplement them. They will be handed out at a regional later in the summer. If you were active in fanzines last year, please read the ballot carefully, list your qualification to vote in each category, and send with \$1 plus a self-addressed stamped envelope. Everyone eligible to nominate in any category may vote in all categories on the final ballot (and you can vote on the final ballot even if you did not nominate). If you feel unqualified to vote in any category or feel no award should be given this year, leave that category blank.

I just looked through all the fmzs I received so that I could fill out my ballot intelligently and discovered that this year has some hard choices. At the same time I thought about the FAAns, I also determined the possible Hugo nominees, since Hugo ballots will be out soon. Here are my decisions; study your fanzines and make up your own minds.

FAAns: Best Fan Writer was the easiest category, with Mae Strelkov the obvious choice for number 1. She had her trip report, her fanzine, plus numerous articles in a variety of fanzines. Don D'Ammassa was a close second with Mythologies and many articles. Honorable mentions go to Susan Wood, Darrell Schweitzer, Paul Walker, Bob Tucker, Dave Locke, and Jodie Offutt, in no particular order.

Top LoCwriter is a tie between Harry Warner and Mike Glicksohn; with Don D'Ammassa, Darroll Pardoe, Eric Lindsay, Jessica Salmonson, and Laurine White, again in no particular order, striking me as being especially interesting and prolific. The artist categories are much more difficult, because of their separation into humorous and nonhumorous (serious). Since I'm not eligible to nominate in the locwriter or artist categories, I really don't have to worry, but since I will be able to vote on the final ballot, I did my best to make some selections. The major problem is where to place artists like Shull or Carter - they do both serious and humorous work; of course it is possible to nominate them in both categories. If I do that I come out with something like this: Best Humorous Artist: 1. Stu Shiffman, 2. Derek Carter, 3. Jim Shull, 4. Grant Canfield, 5. Dan Steffan, with Foglio, Rotsler, Bell, Fletcher, and Waller getting honorable mentions. Best Serious Artist: 1. Jim Shull, 2. Derek Carter, 3. Michael Streff, with mentions to Taral Wayne MacDonald and Al Sirois.

While I found it easy to choose a Best Single Issue (No. 1 Suzle Tompkins and Jerry Kaufman's incredible SPANISH INQUISITION 7/8 and number 2 Mike Glicksohn's wonderful DUFF report THE HAT GOES HOME with honorable mentions to SF Commentary 43 [Tucker issue] and Simulacrum 3), I found it incredibly difficult to put some sort of order to Best Fanzine Editor. First of all, do I rank myself? Since I did 9 KARASS's and GRANFALLOON 20 (not to mention FALSE KARASS) last year, I think I probably deserve a nomination. Obviously Bill Bowers' two fine OUTWORLDS will again give him a nomination, but does he really deserve first place? After all, Bruce Gillespie had 3 fine SF COMMENTARYS, Terry Hughes had at least 6 MOTAs that I could find, and Victoria Vayne had 3 Simulacrums. I also enjoyed Arnie & Joyce Katz's SWOON. Jackie Franke's DILEMMA, & Bernie Peek and Dave Rowe's fanzine, K, deserve mention. Of course, I'm not allowed to nominate myself, so that's one thing I won't have to worry about on the actual ballot.

Hugos: Since these categories are different from the FAAns, some interesting things happen. Best Fan Writer: 1. Mae Strelkov, 2. Don D'Ammassa, then I'll have to make up my mind between Warner, Glicksohn, Tucker, Salmonson, Wood and others, but perhaps No Award would be more appropriate in third place. Best Fan Artist: 1. Jim Shull, 2. Stu Shiffman, 3. Derek Carter, 4. Grant Canfield, 5. Dan Steffan, with the first 3 really very close. Amateur Zine: I can't make up my mind on the order, certainly any list would have to include MOTA, OUTWORLDS, SF COMMENTARY, SIMULACRUM, and SPANISH INQUISITION, and if LOCUS is still an amateur zine (which I'm not sure of) it could easily be nominated. I maintain ALGOL and SFR are not amateur zines. In the latest ALGOL Andy Porter has officially stated that ALGOL is no longer an amateur magazine and will not be eligible for the Amateur SF Hugo (he can be nominated as Best Pro Editor instead). He also invites SFR and LOCUS to follow the same example, since he feels they make substantial money. Both file as businesses for IRS purposes, I believe. SFR pays contributors; LOCUS publishes pro ads. Whatever you think -- vote.

DUFF

The Down Under Fan Fund ballot is included. Fred Haskell, William Rotsler, and Bob Vardeman are all good choices. Even if you don't know who to vote for, you can contribute to DUFF. Several items are being sold to profit DUFF including 1972's report by Lesleigh Luttrell "Lesleigh's Adventures Down Under" for \$1 from Rusty Hevelin, 3023 Old Troy Pike Dayton, OH 45404 and the 1974 report "Emu Tracks Over America" by Leigh Edmonds from Box 76, Carlton, Victoria 3053, Australia. I'm selling Bob Tucker's NEO-FAN'S GUIDE for 50¢. I've already sent one check to DUFF for \$20 of its profits.

Mike Glicksohn (141 High Park Ave., Toronto, Ont. M6P 2S3, Canada) has just published a portfolio of Derek Carter drawings for \$1.25 cash only to profit DUFF and to support Bill Rotsler's bid. The drawings are really great and very funny.

By the way, the ballot is missing one of Bob Vardeman's nominators, but he does indeed have the 5 necessary.



SUNCON

I received the following from a reliable source that does not wish to be named:
"The SUNCON committee is being difficult and causing problems with the SFWA." Suncon replies that "It's hard to reply to a vague comment that the SUNCON committee is being difficult because it doesn't really specify where your unnamed high SFWA source sees the problems. And, of course, from our viewpoint, we could just as easily say the SFWA is being difficult. But we are not saying that at all. We have been working along with SFWA just as any other Worldcon convention committee does. While there may be areas where SFWA and the SUNCON committee may not agree, I see no problems that cannot be solved. At this point in time, we have sent Andy Offutt, the president of SFWA, our response to their requests. We feel that this is similar to what previous Worldcons have done for SFWA, and that there should be no reason for them to claim that we are being 'difficult'." (signed Donald Lundry, Suncon chairman).


Don also enclosed his response to Andrew Offutt, which in summary offers SFWA a room for SFWA's annual meeting. The room would be in the Fontainebleau if at all possible, especially if held in the early morning, otherwise in an overflow hotel. Also, a pressroom with Dave Kyle arranging interviews for the mutual convenience of SF pros and the interviewers. And finally a sumptious function room similar to a large suite but without the sleeping area is offered to SFWA with the condition that SFWA manage the rooms but allow it to be open to all SF professionals, con committee personnel, and other members of the convention (as conditions allow). Don Lundry says these arrangements are based on ones similar to previous conventions and the "Pro Room" is superior to previous arrangements.



Meanwhile, the Fontainebleau is still having financial problems. So far it has not been sold. According to VARIETY, a mystery group has paid a large portion of the tax bill and the hotel may be purchased. Don Lundry says that in the event the hotel is purchased, owner Ben Novack will probably continue to act as manager and all contracts will continue to be in force, thus our convention should have no problems.

Suncon also announced a new phone number to call in case you have problems. It is the Lundry's home phone: 609-424-5120. The next progress report which will have the Hugo nomination ballot and hotel reservation forms is scheduled to be mailed out at the end of Jan.

Suncon says it has been hearing some rumors of minor problems with third class and bulk mailings. If you are a Suncon member and have NOT received your first two Suncon journals, please write immediately, giving details to:

A FINGER IN THE INK: CONSUMER GUIDE

Allow me to stress once again that this column is neither fanzine criticism nor essays on the philosophy of fandom (which I gladly do elsewhere). As it says above: this is a consumer guide, and as such I only mention here those fanzines that I consider worthy enough to be recommended. This means that by putting my personal stamp on these zines, I let you learn something about my taste, so that you can grow to rely on it -- one way or another. It also means that a lot of zines that I get (some specifically for review) will not be reviewed. My apologies. However, it doesn't always mean that I didn't like the zine; often there is simply not enough room. (That should keep me from getting punched in the nose.) Starting next time, I shall try to list all zines received.

Fanzines for review should be sent to Gary Farber, 1047 East 10th St., Brooklyn, N.Y. 11230 and should be in addition to any sent to Linda for trade purposes.

One other matter before I get into the reviews: In my last column, in the course of a review of THE SPANISH INQUISITION 7/8, I made reference to an article contained within by Mike Glicksohn on Dorothy Parker. Ms. Parker, for those who don't know, was (among many other things including essayist and poet) an acerbic reviewer for many years as the pseudonymous Constant Reader. One of her most famous barbs was launched in the course of a review of a Winnie-the-Pooh book; Ms. Parker merely quoted a few lines and then said "At this point, Tonstant Weader thwowed up."

Your humble editor of this zine, a certain Ms. Bushyager, an obvious illiterate (though a decent faned -- I wonder if they could be connected?) failed to recognize my high-level intellectual reference and "corrected" it: From "and at this point in reading Jackie Franke, Tonstant Fwan thwowed up!," an obviously keen and pointed, though good natured and humorous barb to the merely mundane, cruel, evil, nasty, and vicious -- "...Jackie Franke, I throwed up!" My apologies, Jackie. If I want to insult you, I'll do it myself!

It's been a slow month for fanzines. Lousy, actually, for the most part; I was disappointed by a flood of crudzines, and lesser issues of normally excellent fanzines. Doesn't that cheer up everyone reviewed here?

NICKELODEON 2. (Tom Reamy and Ken Keller, 1131 White, Kansas City, MO 64126) Complete with 4-color covers, slick paper, typesetting and utterly impeccable offset, NICKEL-ODEON is laid out as a package. Completely professional looking (as it should be,

vis-a-vis Reamy's former TRUMPET), NICKELODEON suffers slightly from the same problem of the aforementioned TRUMPET, in having less interesting content than the package. This issue contains a mildly funny article by Tom Monteleone & Grant Carrington on reading slush for AMAZING/FANTASTIC, with excerpts from cover letters. From my experience in that task, there are (with one or two exceptions) better stories available, but this piece is interesting, although short. There is also a typcial Darrell Schweitzer interview with Fred Pohl; a piece on Agatha Christie by Reamy; an article trying to call Aristotle an SF writer (For god's sake! -- Mit footnotes!); and a couple of other pieces including the growingly notorious nude feature pictorials of "SF personalities" -- a centerfold and a "neofan discovery." Professional enough for a newstand, but a bit tacky. Available for \$1.98.

MOTA 20. (Terry Hughes, 4739 Washington Blvd., Arlington, VA 22205.) This issue is a bit slow compared to the extravaganza of the last — the 5th Annish. Nonetheless, it is MOTA, the current leader in faanish fanzines. An excellently funny cover by Dan Steffan leads off, with more good artwork within, mostly by Dan and Ross Chamberlain. Surrounding the artwork is a minor piece by John Alderson refuting all of the Aussieconers accounts of Ballarat; a minor semi-Malzberg, semi-himself parody of a journal by Eric Mayer; an extremely weak Watergate-Fandom parody by Gary Deindorfer (Deindorfer is one of my favorite fanwriters, so that's painful to say.); and a 2-page nostalgic reminiscence of the obsolete sticky quarter by editor Hughes. The lettercol is the best part of the zine, with contributions from Tucker, Deindorfer, Lesleigh Luttrell (a great letter), Rob Jackson, Buz Busby, Ted White, and John Brosan. Available "wherever feminine hygiene products are sold" from Terry Hughes, for the usual.

CHECKPOINT 76. (Peter Roberts, 18 Westwood, Cofton, Nr. Dawlish, Devon, UK.) This is the British newszine, now in the capable hands of Peter "for TAFF" Roberts. 6 pages of news done very much the way I would; items like -- "Sunken P'u rises at night!" (a warning that Darrell Schweitzer's compass sometimes wanders 45 degrees to the West at night, and questioning how this could be if there weren't some Nameless Influence in the Pacific, which isn't always there?) -- or the news that Terry Hughes' 1975 novel "which dealt with what the 23rd Century would be like if the people of Earth had their right and left nostrils transposed by menacing aliens" did not win the Hugo! Monthly; \$6/\$1 or the usual.

VARIEGATION 27. (Mike Bailey, P.O. Box 48563, Station Bentall, Vancouver, B.C. V7X 1A3) Mike Bailey's small (6 pages) mostly personalzine. Offset and typeset, although completely plain, in unimaginative 3-column sideways layout. This issue has Mike's MAC report; a book review by Steve Beatty; and a neat, very well written piece by Allyn Cadogan reacting to Harlan-Ellison-the-person. Available for the usual, 5/\$1.

KNOCKERS FROM NEPTUNE 5. (Mike and Pat Meara, 61 Borrowash Rd., Spondon, Derby, DE2 7QH, England.) Mostly Mike's personalzine, this zine is diary-style, weaving letters in and out among the commentary very well. Usually pretty interesting and somewhat funny, KFN unfortunately suffers a bit from the somewhat aggressive "well, here I am drunk again, and writing in my zine, and if you're not drunk enough to appreciate it, well, screw off" attitude actually most typified by the Ratfans (which the Mearas' are not). Also within is a piece sort of on a Kitten Meet, sort of, by Paul Skelton and Mike. For the usual, or \$1/1.

SIMULACRUM 3. (Victoria Vayne, P.O. Box 156 - Station D, Toronto, Ont. M6P 3J8, Canada.) SIM has the best mimeography of any current zine, is typed on a Selectric with an elite ball, is done on 24-pound bond blue paper, has heavy stock offset covers, is attempting to experiment with layout, and is heavily art-conscious. In short, it's overall appearance is most impressive. Victoria is trying to do a fancy zine, and isn't doing too badly at it; extraordinarily well, in fact, considering that

this is only the third real issue (Victoria does special sub-zines for letters). It doesn't quite match up to her ideal of ENERGUMEN in appearance or content, but that is understandable. Her mimeography and layout are overwhelming and impeccable compared to most zines, although when compared to zines in the class she is trying to compete with (such as ENERGUMEN at it's best) it is most peccable and flawed.

A brief critical rundown of the issue leads off with an impressive, blood-red mimeoed photograph of Toronto as a frontispiece; moves on to Victoria's "Non Sequitur" in which she talks about her vacation trip through Northern Ontario to Midamericon (going through a number of places I had traveled to myself only a month earlier) and her relationships with people in Toronto fandom; and then goes on to many articles. The BNF OF OZ, a major faanish tale by Cy Chauvin, differs vastly from the classic BNF OF IZ by Terry Carr years ago (which neither Cy nor Victoria knew about until after the piece was done and scheduled) -- it is the story of Dorothy Zeldes and her little mimeo, Typo, at the Muehlbach, how they are magically transported to the 1982 Worldcon, and how she attempts to get back to Kansas against the wishes of the Wicked Spock of the West Coast -- a very, very funny quality piece by Cy, excellently illustrated by Randy Bathurst.

"A Poem From the Edge of Time to the Days That Pass" is a long article by doug barbour on THE MARTYROLOGY by bp Nichol. "The Evil Eye" is a rather minor piece of rhyme by Jessica Salmonson that condemns TV; I agree heartily with the sentiments, but the verse was barely worth the presentation. Wayne Hooks writes a piece on Freudianism in myth that reads like it was written for a high-school paper -- totally derivative, stiff, boring, and elementry. I'm afraid I also found Dave Jenrette's "Golden Guide to Sex" (with diagram) boring, unoriginal, on a level with a giggly 12-year-old, and plain dumb. Ed Connor contributes a fannish word-puzzle that will give you a few minutes of diversion if you know current fandom and are into that kind of thing. Janet Small attempts to be Rosemary Ullyot (well, that's what it looks like!) and does okay, although not 1/10th as good as Rosemary. Michael Carlson has a passable account of a pinball experience. Then comes a forum on fans' personal religous beliefs, which I found interesting; and a long string of poor book reviews, which I did not; and last comes Victoria's listing and summary of her favorite fanzines, which shows her good taste. One of today's best SF-fannish genzines -- for what that's worth. Available for the usual, or, very reluctantly, \$2.50.

SPICY RAT TAILS #4. (Rich Coad, 1735 47th Ave., San Francisco, CA 94122.)
SPICY is the American ratzine, and it's unprepossessing contents hold up well. Behind the Townley cover is a long and interesting profile and history of London's Rats: the lads and the group, done by Greg Pickersgill (who should know) and by Rich. Plus locs, news, and fanzine reviews. You too can learn what Taral means by "Cats are bowling!" The usual.

WOMEN AND MEN 6. (Denys Howard, Box 8975, Portland, OR 97208.) The Underground Pick Hit of this issue's column (meaning I only just found out about it) is WOMEN AND MEN. WAM! is theoretically a genzine, but it basically consists of letters; it is also theoretically an SF-comics zine, but is basically about women, men, sexuality, and the relationships of the three. WAM! is mimeoed and contains fascinating, detailed discussion of sexuality, feminism, gayness, and other parts of being human. There are particularly fascinating letters by Ursula Le Guin and Paul Novitski. Although marred in my view by partially being a comics zine, and by reviewing other comics fanzines, WAM! remains interesting to me because (as all fanzines do, in the long run) of the person who is its editor -- the flavor he lends it, the personality he gives it in what he/she picks, how he/she arranges it, and what he/she says. Like Ursula says -- "...comics bore me to tears, evidently what I like in it is you, your mind, your feelings, your honesty." This issue also has fanzine reviews by Denys; and a couple of comics pieces, one by Brian Earl Brown, both on sexism in Marvel Comics. Good stuff, Denys. Available for the usual or 50¢.


ALGOL 27. (Andy Porter, Box 4175, N.Y., N.Y. 10017.) Well, let me check up my super-latives supply...um, running low, but we'll have to gear up and make do, because this needs it. Actually, the cover says it all: it's a (deep breath now) gorgeous, beautiful...ooh...ah...breathtaking full-color, subtly air-brushed and colored piece by Eddie Jones that makes most Analog covers look like rejects -- I kid you not. The absolute only pieces of fanzine art that I can remember that compare with this at all have been the last three of four ALGOL covers. On the cover, tastefully small lettering simply says "Isaac Asimov. L. Sprague de Camp. James Gunn. Richard Lupoff. Susan Wood." in a column. So confident is Andy that he doesn't want to crowd up the cover with the other names on the Table of Contents -- Darrell Schweitzer, Marta Randall, Vincent DiFate, Bob Shaw, and James White. The subtitle? The Magazine about Science Fiction. It is. If you're reading this, you should get it. 1/\$1.95, 3(one year)/\$4.50, 6(2 year)/\$7.50. Checks payable to ALGOL MAGAZINE. It's worth it.

STARFIRE #8. (William Breiding, 151 Arkansas St., San Francisco, CA 94107.)

STARFIRE is, regardless of what it says on the contents page, hardly the zine to make you barf. (Hiya, Bill!) It is yet another of Bill Beiding's strange visions come to physical being. STARFIRE is both mimeoed and offset, and does a lot of graphic experimentation which often flops with a big belly whop, and sometimes succeeds in a flash of beauty and brilliance. One gets the impression of Bill pushing around visual effects and being as surprised as we are when we discover something beautiful or something incomprehensible within. It is multi-colored and reminds me most strongly, especially in atmosphere, of CARANDAITH of past fame. Although sloppiness is Bill's trademark, just about everything in this issue works. The prose includes a couple of pieces of fiction, including one rather clever one by France Colberg; book reviews; poetry; and mostly, locs. And of course, Bill, whose personality positively drenches, much less permeates, the zine, with his lovely, lovely Romanticism and sense of wonder. Available for Love Letters, the usual, or "for dullards and money worshippers" \$1.50.

SCINTILLATION #10. (Carl Eugene Bennett, Box 8502, Portland, OR 97207.) SCIN is offset, though not typeset, on newsprint, is about SF, and thus manages to look like
Geis's current SFR with a little more white space. It's well done, if you want a
professional looking, acttractive little genzine about SF, although I miss DORKPIZZLE.
This issue has a very good interview with Frank Herbert by Daniel DePrez, which manages
to go into most of the topics it touches with depth, something few interviews do, and
revealing a talented interviewer. It also contains an interview with the editors of
GALILEO, the new prozine; locs; many reviews; and John Shirley saying some interesting
things about Kate Wilhelm and Damon Knight's Milford Workshop, and revealing his
ignorance of fandom. Available for the usual for 1/\$1.25, \$3.50/year.

That's it. Again, my apologies to those who didn't make it this time. Perhaps next time.






