

In case you are wondering why this issue is on white, 8x14 paper, the reason is simple, I had to get rid of it somewhere! You see, when I bought my Gestafax I also received about 15 reams of this paper, so you'll be seeing it again. It is not really mimeo paper, but rather for electrostatic copiers, but it should work.

I've been having a few problems with my new Gestetner 366. Even though I bought a new feed finger, it misfeeds every 20 or so pages, resulting in set off. So I've been running extra copies and throwing out the worst pages. Still, the 366 is faster than the 320 and has some nice features. I'm running blue and red ink on the 320 at the moment, and black on the 366. So far the red ink from Mishek's (Waseca, MN 56093) is working well. Mishek's has all sorts of stationary and mimeo supplies for sale in case you are interested. You can write and ask for a catalog.

The Gestafax is working fine so far. I'll be making electrostencils for fans for \$1 each plus postage (approximately \$1). Pasteups should be done on white paper (regular bond) with rubber cement to hold illos (do not use excessive cement and remove any cement that accidently lands on illos or top of paper). Use felt tip or pen and ink for illos for best results (pencil will give poor reproduction). Photographs which are already half-toned (such as from newspapers) will give good results, normal photos will probably be of poorer quality, but I'll do my best). Image area is 8 1/2 x 14, so for cheapest results make a 8 1/2 x 14 pasteup. Stencils will be 9-hole Gestetner topped stencils. Please send money in advance plus \$1 for postage. I'll bill you for any additional postage as necessary. Please send material in old stencil boxes if possible and I'll return them in same. I will not remove any dots of lines on e-stencils un ess you request me to; in that case I'll use special Gestafax corflu. I should be able to return material within 1 week of receipt.

#### SUNCON

Suncon, the 35th Worldcon to be held in Miami Sept. 2-5, 1977, has sent out its 3rd Progress Report. If you are a member and have heard nothing from them and its been 2 months since you sent in your money, please write Suncon immediately. There have been a few letters lost in the mail. Suncon (P.O.B. 3427, Cherry Hill, N.J. 08034) will also be happy to answer questions by phone from 8 am to 11 pm (609-424-5120). Grace Lundry has requested that people with problems try to clear them up before the con (hopefully by June) rather than at the con.

The Hugo nomination ballots are included in the mailing. VOTING DEADLINE IS APRIL 15 — so don't delay. Reservation cards for the Fontainebleau are also included and should be sent as soon as possible. The Fontainebleau will not accept reservations through its toll-free phone number, so write instead. If you prefer to stay at another hotel instead contact Travel America, 551 Fifth Ave., Suite 1419, N.Y., N.Y. 10017 which is handling other hotels. (Note: the blue form which came out with PR2 is not a binding reservation form, so if you want the Fontainebleau you must send in the postcard reservation card directly to the Fontainebleau).

#### IMPORTANT

Suncon rates listed in the PR3 are wrong! The correct rates are \$7.50 supporting until April 15, \$10 thereafter; attending rates \$20 until May 31, \$30 from June 1 to July 31, \$35 Aug. 1 to at the door. These are final rates.

Joe Siclari has resigned as Treasurer due to lack of time. He remains head of Programming. John Douglas, already the con's bookkeeper, has taken over as Treasurer.

Suncon will supply new members with back copies of the old PRs as long as they are available. There will be a major Hollywood motion picture premier at the con, but details are not yet settled. There will be a traditional dinner banquet, but only the voted awards will be given out there (Hugos, Gandalf, Campbell). The GoH speeches and other non-voted awards will be given out on Sat. afternoon.

Deadline for ads for the next PR is April 15. A 1 column, half-page ad for fans is only \$10 and faneds may want to take advantage.

One Suncon feature will be a World Map of Fan Clubs prepared by Stu Shiffman. This map will divide the world into regions such as "NESFA", "LASFS," etc. But they need to know about clubs to include them. Write Suncon if your club wishes to be listed and send name, place the club meets, membership size, geographical area covered.

# Fontainebleau Debts Piled Up Over 11 Years, Florida Suit Reveals

Miami Beach, Feb. 1.
A foreclosure suit filed against the Fontainebleau Hotel by one its major creditors has revealed problems bedeviling owner Ben Novack.

Evidence introduced during a court hearing last week revealed that the troubled hotel owes the City of Miami Beach \$250,000 in back taxes, \$61,000 in unpaid water bills, and \$11,300 in unpaid resort taxes. Some debts date back 11 years, according to court records.

\*But Novack's biggest headache is the Roland International Corp., which alleges the Fontainebleau and Novack owe \$4,300,000 in past due loans, and wants the court to put the hotel in receivership. For the moment, in an agreement forged between Fontainebleau and Roland lawyers, Roland Inc. will closely monitor the hotel's finances.

The Miami Herald reported in its Saturday editions that a massive new loan from a mysterious European lending trust, had apparently fallen through.

#### PROFESSIONAL NEWS

Deaths: John Thomas Phillifent, who wrote SF under the pen name of John Rackham, died on Dec. 16 after a long illness. He was 60. Alvar Appeltofft, longtime Scandinavian SF fan, died shortly before Xmas. He was 34. Donald H. Menzel, astronomer and SF author, died in Dec. at age 75. Edmond Hamilton, one of the most famous early SF authors died on Feb. 1 at age 72.

Laser Books has suspended publication. They are evaluating sales figures to determine if they will continue, but prospects seem dim. Editor Roger Elwood is no longer connected with the Laser line. Unknown may be revived. Ben Bova will be putting out a series of books in the Unknown tradition. The first book will reprint classic stories from Unknown.

James Tiptree, Jr. has been revealed to be Alice Sheldon, 61. Robert Heinlein appeared at SpaceCon 3 in San Francisco to run a blood drive and has nine more drives lined up for the year. He is also planning a new book soon. Frank Herbert's CHILDREN OF DUNE had a 800,000 print run and appeared on the N.Y. Times (from Locus) List of best sellers for several weeks.




