The 1979 Worldcon will be Seacon at the Metropole Hotel, Brighton, U.K. on Aug. 23-27. Permanent address is Seacon '79, 14 Henrietta St., London, WC2E 80J, U.K. Rates are \$5 supporting until March 31, 1978, \$7.50 attending; then \$7.50 supporting, \$15 attending from April 1 to Dec. 31, 1978. If you paid \$5 to vote for site selection and had a presupporting membership, you will be made an attending member. Cards, receipts, etc. will be mailed out in the not too distant future.

The committee consists of Peter Weston, Chair, Eve Harvey, Secretary, John Steward, Treasurer, Graham Charnock, Malcolm Edwards, Rob Jackson, Roger Peyton, Peter Roberts, and others. GoHs will be Fritz Leiber, Harry Bell, Brian Aldiss. Toastmaster will be Bob Shaw.

## CORRECTIONS/APOLOGIES

Last issue in page 5 of my Suncon report I seem to have made several erroneous statements. Even though I toned down my Suncon report considerably and only mentioned things which were confirmed by more than one source, my sources apparently were wrong, and I'm very sorry. I would like to apologize to Jack Chalker and Art Saha, and I'm extremely sorry if my comments may have caused any embarrassment or problems for them. I hope that this correction will clear things up.


Jack Chalker called me and was very upset. He said that what I had printed (that Jack had taken it upon himself to rewrite parts of the PR and it was Jack's action that caused the confusion regarding the definition of "amateur" in the fan Hugos) was completely untrue. He explained the following: His job as editor of PRs 2-4 consisted of gathering articles and material in accordance with the format Don Lundry specified for the PRs; he then went over the material with Don and Grace Lundry and other people on the committe; finally he typed or retyped the material and sent it to the Dietzs for typesetting. He did not do the layout and did not ordinarily handle ads (there were a couple exceptions when he was given ads). In all cases PR material of an official nature came directly from committee members and was generally checked by Don. In the case of the PR3 and wording of the Hugo nomination ballot and text of the definition of "amateur", Jack wrote the definitions while at a meeting at the Lundrys' after a discussion with them and other committee members and with the Lundrys helping him write the definitions. He later went home and typed the definitions from his notes. He then called Don and read him the ballot and text over the phone, word for word, for final approval. Jack then brought the ballot separately to a meeting at the Boardman's and read it aloud and then gave it to Perdita Boardman for printing. Thus the Hugo ballot definitions appearing in PR3 and on the nominating ballot were the work of the Lundrys, Jack, and other members of the committee and were given final approval by Don Lundry. Jack did not rewrite them in any way after that approval.

Also, Art Saha called to tell me that he did not forget to put the copyright notice in the Program Book. He said he specifically told both Ted Pauls (who did the layout) and the Dietzs (who did the typesetting) to be sure to include a copyright notice. Jack Chalker mentioned that he thought Pauls had such a notice in typeset form when Ted was laying out the Book. Apparently the notice was inadvertantly left out of the pasteup after that. At any rate, it appears that Art was in no way at fault.

Jack Chalker has promised to write me a letter about this which will be published next issue. Again, I apologize to both him and Art for any erroneous statements I may have made. Apparently they both did good jobs under trying circumstances.

## MEDIA NEWS

Star Wars alone accounted for 18% of summer boxoffice receipts. It has now outperformed JAWS, and boxoffice receipts have totaled more than \$100 million. Various SW merchandise continues in the news, and now DARTH VADER, C3PO, and others are turning up on TV to plug various shows (Sat. TV shows), as guests (actor who played C3PO was on Dinah! show), etc. Richard Pryor show had a Star Wars Bar skit. STAR WARS II is set for production next April. It is expected that 20th Century Fox will realize more than \$1,000,000 from sale of licensing rights alone during the first year. In Los Angeles, KABC-TV has scheduled a "Galactic Wars Week" featuring SF movies, appearances by David Prowse (Vader), etc. KSTP-TV, St. Paul, obtained some SW footage and made up a 10-minute film entitled "Journey to the Stars" as a promotional film to be shown to visitors to the Minnesota State Fair. End of the World will be released soon. The film tells of a scientist who comes upon a band of aliens disguised as six nuns and a priest. Its a cheapie (\$500,000), quickie (3-weeks) "sci-fi-exploitation film." Proposed new films include Alien from 20th Century Fox, The Incredible Melting Man, a remake of The Thing, and a remake of The Incredible Shrinking Man staring Lily Tomlin (I kid you not). Meteor will cost \$11 million and be produced by Sandy Howard, Gabriel Katzka, and Run Run Shaw. Blows Against the Empire, Paul Kantner's SF Grunt album, will become a film.



STAR WORLDS is a new TV series, mid-season replacement designed for family hour. U-TV which did special effects for STAR WARS will do effects. Star Trek news: Robert Goodwin & Harold Livingston have been named as producers by exec producer Roddenberry. Paramount TV has sold its new 3-hour TV programming to Metromedia channels for more than \$30,000 a night. Star Trek will lead off the Paramount programming.

Fanthology '75 is an excellent complilation of the best articles of that year from Bruce Arthurs (4522 E. Bowker, Phoenix, AZ 85040). Available for \$2. It is a limited edition (250 copies) so write soon. It is well worth the \$ and contains everything from funny articles such as the classic "A Chicken Looks At Midwestcon" by Gene Wolfe to book reviews by Mike O'Brien from KRATOPHANY (funny) -- emphasis is on fannish humor. Excellent.

Drift 3 is Gary Farber's fanzine (1047 East 10th St., Brooklyn, N.Y. 11230).

Repro is not the best, but contents are quite good & include Aljo Svoboda con report, Walt Willis reprint, Susan Wood reprint, etc. Fannish fun. SF Commentary, Bruce Gillespie's sercon fanzine, is now available from a US agent — Hank & Lesleigh Luttrell, 525 W. Main St., Madison, WI 53703.

Since my last column I have gotten at least one letter complaining that I don't critically take apart fanzines, so I suppose it is time to reiterate that the point of this column is solely to function as a source of recommendations. Its purpose is to quickly tell you what the good current fanzines are that you might not be seeing. I do long-winded analyzation elsewhere, hokay?

OUTWORLDS 28/29 (Bill Bowers, P.O.B. 3157, Cincinnati, OH 45201): OUTWORLDS is an interesting fanzine to review. In many ways, it is a holdover from the days of the Great Midwestern Genzine; more importantly, it is an example of the Great Bill Bowers Genzine. Bill has a rather personally oriented, offset genzine of 68 pages (from cover by Steve Fabian to bacover by Brian Sultzer) with contributions from friends and hangers-on. The item that stands out for me here is Robert A. W. Lowndes' memoirs, here up to what he calls the "Health Knowledge Years" (editing the MAGAZINE OF HORROR, STARTLING MYSTERY STORIES, etc.). Lowndes is a Thoughtful Person -- I am always interested in anything he has to write, and behind the scenes of cheapo publishers (and Lowndes' mind) is no exception. The graphic(s) trips in this issue include 2001 misc. Derek Carter sketches (mostly done at Midwescon); a 4-pg montage of photos from cons Bill attended in 1976; the Westercon Comics (a multi-panel strip done by over 25 artists); and a pretty nice portfolio by Stu Gilson. The other highly note-worthy written material includes Dave Locke's "Fan-writer Symposium" which has some damn valuable comments although overall I found it disappointingly shallow (as well as suffering from, believe it or not, too small a study group); a minor piece by Susan Wood on dentistry; Neal Wilgus's interview with Robert Shea (co-author of ILLUMINATUS!); Leah Zeldes's poem; and Bill's own comments on his life. OUTWORLDS is neat and pretty, overall. It gets more overawed praise than it deserves, which unfortunately causes people to not give it the praise it does deserve. Bill Bowers gives good OUTWORLDS. Available for \$2.50, or the dread purple usual.

QUARK 14 (Tom Perry, P.O.B. 2134, Boca Raton, FL 33432): Tom's revival is a quartosized, little, fannish fanzine. There's a little Silicon report by Eric Benticliffe, an account of an encounter with Harlan Ellison (compared with Harlan's own account in VECTOR) by Dave Langford, but the meat of the issue comes from the lettercol (with letters from Gary Deindorfer, Terry Carr, Terry Hughes, Bob Shaw, etc.) and Tom's own 12 page essay on the DonWest-Charles Platt-Pete Weston-Walt Willis controversy currently going on in the pages of MAYA and WRINKLED SHREW. Perry has some perceptive things to say about the tendency of some fans to see fandom as a zero-sum game with everyone in competition for egoboo. QUARK has a pleasant, informal gestalt, combined with a very reassuring time-binding awareness of fandom-as-an-entity. Available only for the usual from the hekto lagoon.







WRINKLED SHREW (Graham & Pat Charnock, 70 Ledbury Rd., London W.11): SHREW is the fannish (and faanish) genzine in the UK today. Drawing mostly on the talents of the Rats (contribs by Kettle, Pickersgill, Don West, Dick Howett, Rob Holdstock, etc) SHREW averages 50-60 pages, is mostly funny, is mostly good writing, and is very faanish. Missing from this issue is installment #4 of Roy Kettle's Memoirs, but filling in is a 23-page column of fanzine analysis by Don West. West has some extremely perceptive comments about the influence and current status of Pickersgill and Kettle in British fandom ("...Pickersgill is no longer the challenge to authority; he is the authority to be challenged -- or sucked up to.") and shoots a very sharp, accurate needle in the sides of those fans who allow their judgements to be made second-hand by other fans (and reviewers like me), although I do differ with his judgements on Walt Willis (and wonder just how much of Willis's material he has read). Nonetheless, West is one of the best critics to ever hit fandom, up there with Ted White, Terry Carr, Greg Benford, and Franklin Ford. SHREW also has a funny, anecdotal con report of the Dublin ProWriters Con by Rob Holdshock -god, have they gotweird characters that attend writers conventions in the UK! (And Rob transmits their spirit very well.) Tom Perry has a bit of memoirizing about his neofannish activities in the 50's; Andrew Stephenson talks about the London stage production of "Illuminatus!": the Charnox talk about nothing much (though Rob proves he's a fan of Detroit rock); and the lettercol is quite meaty (not to mention a bit bloody). WRINKLED SHREW is one of the most accessible of the British Ratzines, and deserves more of a US distribution. Give it to them. The usual is a louse!


PERIPHERAL VISIONS #2 (Wally Smart & Pam Sook, 400 Sheldon Ave., Aurora, IL 60506):

PV is a promising little genzine written entirely by Wally, illustrated entirely
by Pam. This Special Ecology Issue is mostly book reviews (of SF and of material
dealing with the environment) and letters, but there is also a Wiscon report and
some interesting personal chitchat about porn,

Pam & Wally's causes, and their lives. Offset, with a nice cover. Take the usual and stick it in your ear.

BEN'ZINE 1 (Ben Zuhl, 2646 15th Ave. S., Mpls., Mn. 55407): BEN'ZINE is another little genzine that promises even more, this time in a fannish way. Ben has a rambling, but mildly amusing piece by Mike Glicksohn on the differences between UK and US fandom, and a couple of other minor pieces, of which the best is "The Weird Tail of Spayed Gerbil Fandom" by Ben Zuhl himself. BEN'ZINE has some nice art and promises to join the current faanish Resurgence. It's talkin' 'bout the midnight usual. (Or for 50¢, all money to DUFF and TAFF.)

GENRE PLAT (1916 W. 15th Ave., Vancouver, B.C. V6J2L3, Canada): Allyn Cadogan & Bill Gibson are the co-editors of this neatly selectrified-gestetnerized Vancouver fanzine, although Susan Wood is Official Jewish Mother, and John Park is Official Silent Partner. GP is laid out in a very clean, open style with a pleasing amount of white space, and is actually serious about SF in a clear, real way. Doug Barbour talks about



SF criticism, and about how there need be no contradiction between being a popular art and "being heavy;" Bill Gibson talks about the assumption that SF is a Whole Other Thing than other fiction; DARK STAR is reviewed; there is a wonderful parody of academic writing; Allyn Cadogan talks about Harlan Ellison; and Susan Wood has a typically excellent piece on her rules for treating SF seriously but fannishly (with accompanying anecdotes). Bill Gibson and Alexis Gilliland have some nice cartoons, and a number of e-stenciled engravings give the zine a handsome look. Available for \$1 or a thrilling, wonderful usual (trades pre-arranged only).

SCIENTIFRICTION 7 (Mike Glyer, 14972 Osceola St., Sylmar, CA 91342): STFR is a good fanzine to get started in fandom with -- it deals with SF, but in a non-academic way; it has some good art; and it has reasonably clean repro and layout. The zine is rather thrown-together (the seams show), but that gives it a rather homey feel (which prevents it, however, from ever achieving Greatness). This issue has Dave Locke's column, Carl Bennett's column, an interview with Asimov, Joe Sanders talking about SF in Academe, Glicksohn's fanzine reviews, Dan Goodman, and a lot of letters and mini-reviews. Joe Pearson has some great artwork, and Carl Bennett illustrates his own column. Death to the fascist usual!

PHOSPHENE 6 (Gil Gaier, 1016 Beech Ave., Torrance, CA 90501): PHOS is Gil's personalzine, although the issue is really mostly made up of people interacting in the lettercol. PHOS is offset, and the art has improved tremendously since previous issues. Gil talks about himself, and people in fandom are discussed. PHOS is another good first fanzine to start with. The usual is very usual.

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

### GUFF BALLOT FORM

GUFF is a one-shot fan fund which has been created to send/bring a popular Australian fan to the British 1979 World SF Convention, SEACON, There are fan funds between America and Europe and between America and Australia (TAFF and DUFF), but by holding a special fund contest between Australia and Britain British fans will get to see what a dinkum Aussiefan looks like and Australian fandom will express a unique kind of support for SEACON.

GUFF will

be a success through the efforts and support of fandom. The candidates will be voted for by fans all over the world, each vote being accompanied by a do attion of not less than \$1.50 or f0.80. These votes and other donations and financial support will make GUFF a success.

WHO MAY VOTE: Anyone who has been active in fandom (fanzines, conventions, clubs etc.) prior to January 1977 and who contributes \$1.50 or £0.80 to the fund may vote. Contributions greater than the minimum are gratefully received. Only one vote per person is allowed; no proxy votes; and you must sign your ballot. Details of the voting will be kept secret and write-ins are permitted. Money orders and cheques should be made payable to the appropriate administrator, and not to GUFF.

DEADLINE: Votes must reach the administrators by the 30th April 1979.

HOW THE VOTES ARE COUNTED: Votes are counted using the optional-preferential . anso define involves of system which results in a majority win. You may rank the candidates in the order you wish to vote; if the leading firstplace candidate does not get a majority of the votes cast, the lowest-ranking candidate is dropped and his second-place votes are redistributed to the remaining candidates. In a three-person contest such as this one, this process will guarantee that one of the remaining candidates wins by a clear majority. If you wish to give preferences in your vote it is therefore important to vote for second and third places on your ballot.

However, voters have the option of voting only for their choice of candidates and not allotting preferences. If you wish to do this simply place a "l" beside your choice and ignore the others.
