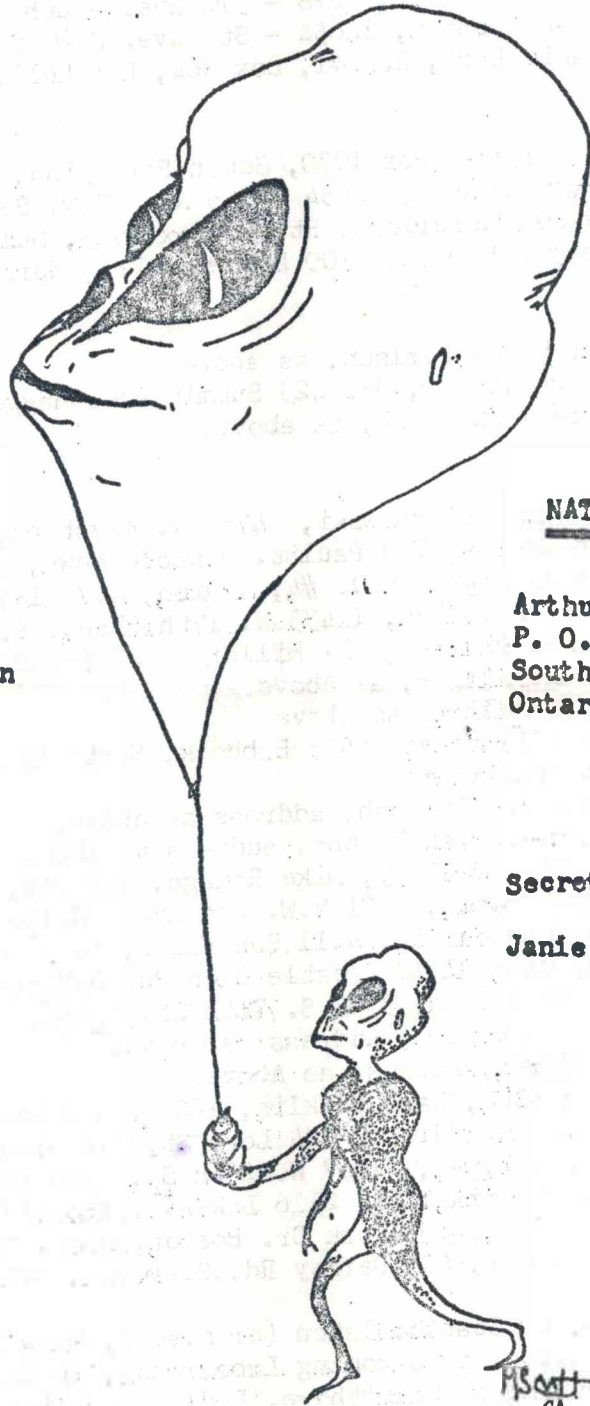

Apologies for giving the WRONG publishing schedule and deadlines for TNFF in my first 1971 ish. This is an attempt to get back on sched and is a few days late. Have received two covers for TNFF and one that must be for TIGHTBEAM (since it has the letters TB included in the artwork) from Mike Scott, Box 2043, Alhambra, Cal. 91803. Many thanks to Mike. Remember, in MY case, artwork must be visible to Thermofax. This means that marking pencils generally won't do, nor will ball point pens. India Ink or pencil will do nicely. Last word - Here, cold weather comes from North or West, SNOW COMES FROM THE SOUTH MAINLY, some from the west, and occasionally from the East.

Howard DeVore will Manage the 1971 SF-Fantasy Short Story Contest. This has just been decided. I wrote to Dannie Plachta, seeing if he would take on the job for a second year, and I wrote the letter with the understanding Dannie had passed along to me the offer of Howard to handle the contest this year and if Dannie could not do it, he may be able to help. The first year as Manager can be the hardest, and advice from Dannie should help considerably.

The Contest Rules will most likely be so similar to last year's that they can be paraphrased as: SF or fantasy fiction, up to 5000 words of new, unpublished stories by someone who has not sold over 2 stories in the genre. Manuscript is to have title of story on each page but no name of author; entry form has space for name and address of author as well as title of story, and the Manager keeps this on file, so the Judge will be able to decide on merit without any chance of previous contact influencing the decision. Already directors have okayed the awards, which will be the same as last year--\$15 for first place, \$10 for second place, and \$5 for third place. If any stories sell all money will go to the author, of course.

Don Miller says: "My eye trouble has set me back so far that some of my publications may never get out (but TWJ, SOTWJ, THE GAMESMAN, and THE GAMESLETTER, at least, will survive)." This should explain if you have noticed delay in anything in Don's area of fanac, in or out of NFFF. Eyesight is so important to a person it's bound to affect fanac.

How many fanzine publishers are there in NFFF? I'm not sure--but I do know not all have joined the Neffer Amateur Press Alliance. More of you who publish should write to Frank Denton to get information about our apa, because it is getting out some interesting mailings and it only takes a short time before the membership may be full again. Once, in FAPA, membership fell off, we got 10 new members all at once, and this began a rush towards membership because with more viewpoints and subjects brought out the mailings snowballed in interest. Since then there has been a large waiting list for FAPA--and this could happen for N'APA. Now is the time to write Frank Denton (14654 8th Ave. SW, Seattle, WA 98166).

I've written to Jeff Cochran hoping to get him to do an ad for us. Directors okayed a half-page ad in final Progress Report, and a full-page ad in the Program Booklet. Actually we would like interested fans to join, and I'd like to see us gain a larger percentage of active members next year (or the rest of this). Perhaps an ad inviting them to join if they are interested in the kind of things NFFF features will help.

Alma Hill is serving as contact-lady for us and the Norwescon committee, in relation to the Neffer Room. Perhaps I should call it the Hospitality Room, as its purpose is to provide a place to find other fans and pros who want to talk, maybe play games and relax when they aren't busy at conventional activities. (Of course it's not conventional always to be active at conventions, and for those who haven't attended a convention the whole matter can be confusing. It's time to consider an article in TNFF about what a convention really is, and I'm hopeful someone will write a page or so on this. But basically it is mostly for and by fans--with pros active as speakers and otherwise. What it is in particular is the outgrowth of ideas presented at conventions in past years, and the reaction of people with common interests as readers, viewers and actifans.)

But back to Alma: She is looking for willing helpers--meaning mostly those willing to serve as assistant Hostesses (or hosts). Write her...

TAPE BUREAU REPORT

The TAPE BUREAU is still going strong. The Library is constantly growing, and a new catalog should be out soon. If you would like to see what there is in the TAPE BUREAU LIBRARY, write for a copy of the catalog (10¢ postage would be appreciated.)

THE Minnesota Science Fiction Society (Nate Bucklin, 190 N. Saratoga, St. Paul, Minn. 55104) has started a Minn. Stf Audio Book Project in cooperation with the Library of Congress division for the Blind. The Tape Bureau is cooperating with the Minnesota Club, and if you can help out, let either Nate or myself know. You can help even if you don't have a tape recorder, since there is quite a bit of bookkeeping to be done - who is taping what, do we have permission to do so, where is the master copy, who got copies of it. If you can copy tapes you will also be welcome, since I know of some blind people who would like to hear the stories without waiting for the Library of Congress to get around to cataloging them (it takes them only 2 months to answer a simple letter). And, of course, if you would like to read stories or novels onto tape, you will be very welcome.

Art Hayes has published the Tape Bureau zine, which will continue to appear at irregular intervals, controlled by how often we get enough material to warrant publication. (If there is enough material, it will assume its own title and not be a part of TTH - Jah) Any articles/ artwork should be sent to me, not to Art. We need articles on any aspect of tape recording, old radio shows, and even on TV shows and movies, such as Star Trek.

I am copying shows from the Bureau Library for St. Francis Mission (St. Francis, South Dakota 57572) as a personal gift from me. The Sioux children have to learn to speak and understand English, and shows such as the Bureau has in the Library are a big help to them, because it provides an entertaining educational experience. This is a common problem among the Indian children, who usually have to repeat the first grade because they spend the time barely learning English, and nothing else. If any of you would be interested in helping out the Indian Missions, I have the addresses of several and can get more.

The following people have expressed an interest in exchanging tape recorded correspondence. I would suggest an exchange of letters before trying tapes. The letters following the address denotes the type of tape recorder available. S means 3" reel at 3 $\frac{3}{4}$ ips, and C means cassette.

DIRECTORATE REPORT

The Directorate is working well together, and motions are being offered and passed or rejected. I was elected Chairman, and we have set up our operating rules, we have also passed some motions that are of general interest.

The Directorate would like to thank Gary Labowitz for his past services.

The following be placed on the 1971 Election ballot: Article II Section 5 of the Constitution be changed to read: "Vacancies in the Directorate not provided for in the bylaws...."

The Awards for the Writing Contest for 1971 be \$15, \$10. and \$5. for first, second, and third place.

The NFFF shall buy supporting membership in the 1971 Worldcon, and take out ads in the Program Book and the fourth progress report.

I want to take this opportunity to remind you all that elections are coming up, and we have a better club when lots of people are interested in running it. If you don't like the way the club is being run, or if you think you can do it better, or differently, or if you would like to find out what running the NFFF is like, why not run for office? We need candidates for President and for the Directorate. Send your Platform to Art Hayes, in time for the JUNE TNFF, and make this an interesting Election. It is not too soon to be thinking about the elections.

If you have any comments, complaints, questions, or just feel like talking, send your letters to any of the Directors or the President. It may not be possible to reply immediately, but we will try to answer all your letters as soon as possible.

CONSTITUTION:

ARTICLE III - ELECTIONS. (1) The President and five members of the Directorate are to be decided by the membership in an annual election of those officers. Ballots for the election are to be distributed before October 10th and the elected candidates take office on the following January first. Any member may seek office by complying with the official requirements which are to be published in the Official Organ at least two months previous to the filing deadline. (2) No person may hold two elective offices at the same time. (3) Each member may cast one vote for each of the five candidates of his choice in the election of the Directorate. The five candidates receiving the largest number of votes are elected. Ties are resolved by majority agreement of those elected candidates not included in the tie. (4) Of the candidates for President, the one receiving the largest number of votes is elected. In case of a tie, the elected Directorate chooses a President from the tie candidates.

FANCLUB BUREAU

UNIVERSITY OF ROCHESTER SF SOCIETY:- Here's the tale that has been kept too long from the light of day, giving you the nickel tour of the U of R SF Society. Steve Carper and I (John Kessel) were the co-founders of the club. Steve and I went to the St. Louiscon in '69 and upon returning decided to start a club here. We printed URanian #1 ourselves and then gave it out free to arouse interest on campus; after a few meetings and trials, we wrote a constitution. We then became an official campus organization, which enabled us to receive money from the university and use the printing equipment belonging to the student activities office.

After getting started, Steve and I immediately got involved in more things than we could handle, showing a couple of movies on campus, had Anne McCaffrey and Robert Silverberg in to speak, started a lending library and went to Boskone 7. Add to this all the budget problems we got from the Campus Finance Board.... we got buried. We are just now getting started again and hope to have URanian #4 out by the middle of March.

On the Book dealing, our experience might be valuable to others. The U of R has in past years given permission to enterprising students wishing to sell products to other students. This has resulted mostly in the establishment of two thriving record

U of R SF Society (FanClubs Bureau) -

and tape concessions. Anyway, in our enthusiams, last spring, Steve and I noted that the U of R bookstore had almost no SF, and no comic books at all (comics are popular on campus); we visited a local book dealer and found we could get a 20% discount off list price, so we applied for and received the campus monopoly on SF books. We then, somewhat belatedly, realized we would need money to do all this, so we did nothing until this fall when a third party approached us and offered to help finance the operation and do most of the accounting and selling work.

ELECTIONS - Bylaws.

V. ELECTIONS (1) All Candidates must, by the filing deadline, have paid their dues for the year in which they will hold office if elected. (2) In Addition to the regular candidates listed on the ballot, members may write in the name of any member in good standing as a candidate for any elective office. (3) Deadline for filing in the N3F elections shall be AUGUST 1st of each year.
