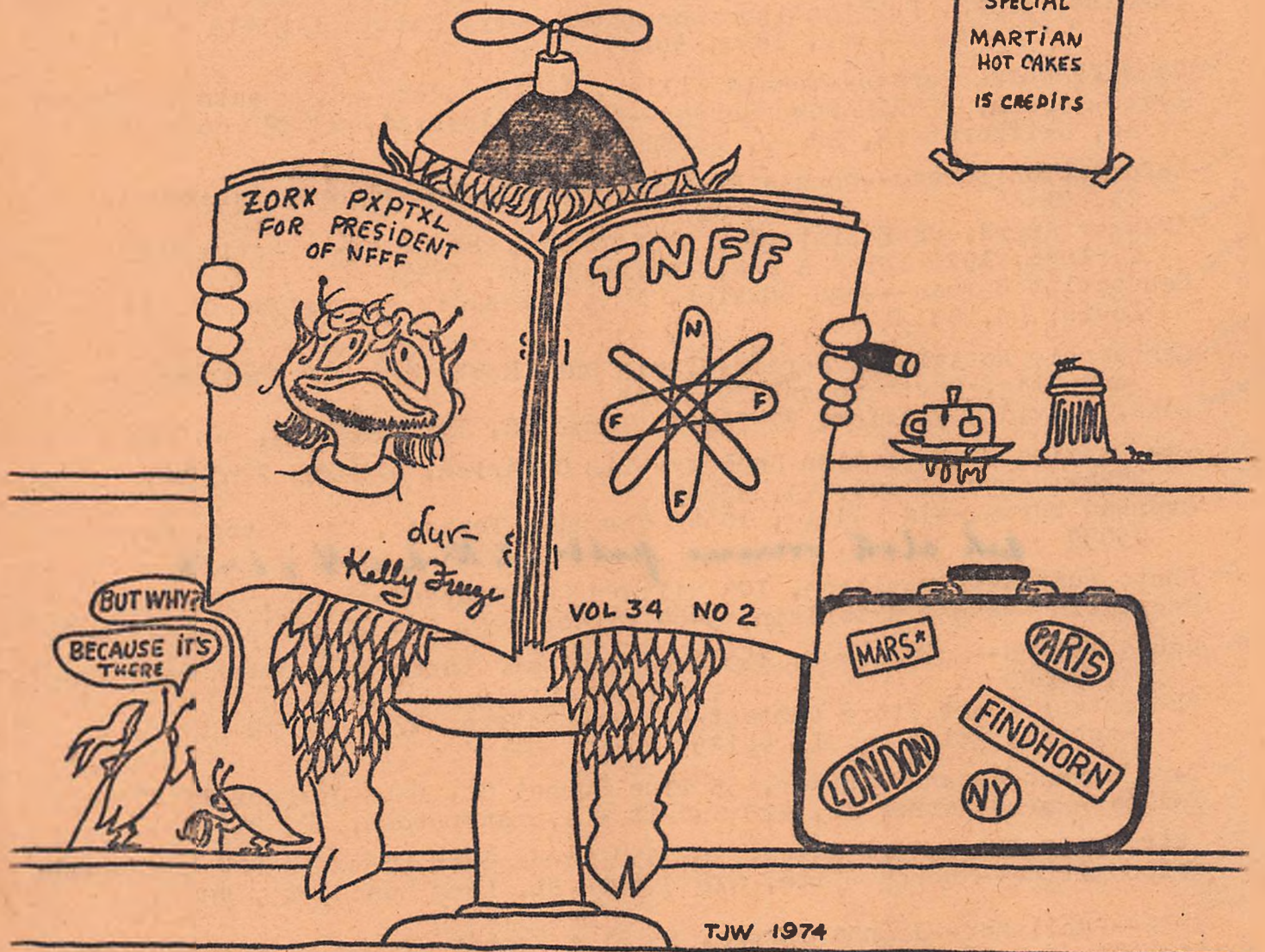

First off, Granfalloon #18 (Linda Bushyager, 1614 Evans Ave., Prospect Park, PA 19076) is out. The zine is available for 75¢ each (no long term subscriptions), contributions, trades, or letters of comment; it's 58 pages plus covers and a portfolio of art by Jay Kinney and Grant Canfield. Inside, are numerous replies via loc and loc-turned-article to Linda's editorial on profit-making and commercialism in fandom. Sue Glicksohn contributes an article about "happy faces" and hypocrisy behind painted-on smiles people are supposed to wear (literally, as in the T-shirts and stickers; and figuratively, smiling even when you're unhappy). Recipes, book and fanzine reviews round off the issue. Excellently produced and chock full of art.

The Sword That Bites #2 (Bill Breiding, 2240 Bush St., San Francisco, CA 94115) is a new poetry zine; it's available for a couple of stamps, contributions, or trades. Bill wants to print poetry, articles, and criticism of poetry. He also needs artwork. The mimeography is spotty on many pages, but it does not make it difficult to read. Bill, also pubs a genzine, Starfire, and he's looking for material there, too.

Notes From the Chemistry Department #3 (Denis Quane, Box CC, East Texas Sta., Commerce, TX 75428) is available for locs, trades, contributions of art and articles, or 30¢ in stamps or money. Denis's primary concern in his first three issues has been books and book reviews. Each issue has also had a short article concerned with either science or sf. The zine is irregular and it seems that he's keeping it small so he can send it first class for a dime. Letters take up about half of the present issue, with the rest of the zine filled with reviews and a small article on Andre Norton.

Spoor Anthology (Fred C. Adams, RD #1, Box 498, Lemont Furnace, PA 15466) is an anthology of horror and fantasy fiction, poetry, and art. The cost is \$1.25. A list of contributors is probably the best way for you to get an idea of the contents without seeing a copy: W. P. Ganley, S. L. Tannahill, Frank Balazs, Robert E. Howard, R. P. Berglund, Ames Salmonson, David E. Schulz, Jason Sharpe, Llewellen M. Cabos, Robert E. Weinberg, Jude Fulkerson, Jim Garrison, James Faulkenberg, W. H. Stout, and Harry Morris. There is some show-through of pages, but the repro does not impair readability in any way. The art is uneven but generally of good quality; Fulkerson's work (five drawings) stand out in the book along with Morris' bacover. I reserve comment on the stories as I have not yet read all of them. If this genre interests you then I recommend this, along with Fred's zine, Spoor.

Brief notes: Columbus fandom is alive; their Worldcon bid and John Ayotte's Killikanzaros proves this. The zine is available for trade, contribs, locs, or \$1 (which means he prefers something besides \$\$). Red Planet Earth is "a magazine of American Indian Science Fiction" from Craig Strete, R.R.1, Box 208, Celina, OH 45822.

Should the NFFP contribute something to this project?
Should you?

Dear Ben:

I'd like to bring something important to the attention of the readers of Analog.

It is widely known, but of course not by everyone, that the home of Forrest Ackerman—called Ackermansion—contains the largest science-fiction and fantasy collection in the entire world. What this means is that on the interior walls of the building hang hundreds of original paintings of science-fiction magazine covers dating back to 1926.

It also means that occupying bookcases that fill room after room are the magazines themselves: every issue of every science-fiction magazine published anywhere in the world, as well as every science-fiction fan magazine ever printed—over ten thousand different fanzine titles. Other bookshelves contain every edition of every science-fiction and fantasy book published in the universe. Elsewhere in the collection are thirty-five thousand stills from all the science-fiction films ever made.

It's all there: the record of the science-fiction explosion of the Twentieth Century, more than one hundred thousand items of science-fiction memorabilia.

Its value at the end of 1973: roughly one million dollars.

In the owner's will it is set up to become a science-fiction museum. Not a single piece is to be sold. No direct heirs will benefit.

But, alas, there's a fly in the eye

of Forry's future. The nine-year-old boy who started to collect early *Amazings*, and slightly later, *Analogs* (called *Astounding Stories of Super-Science* at that time), is no longer nine. In fact, he's fifty-seven. In fact, he had a heart attack a few years ago. And he's got to handle himself carefully, or he won't see the year 2001.

The reason I bring all this to your attention is that, as a friend of Forry, I observe that at fifty-seven he has undertaken a project which, in my opinion and that of some other friends, is too much for him. He has moved his vast collection from a cramped and crammed two-story house to an eighteen-room location at 2495 Glendower Avenue, Hollywood, California 90027. In order to have the new place he has to pay out a long-run (with interest) total of a quarter of a million for the future museum. The down payment took every penny he could borrow from relatives. The monthly payments are astronomical. It's too much—I believe—for one man, who will be sixty in a couple of years. And, if you think about it, it really shouldn't be up to one person to single-handedly create a science-fiction museum.

So, what I propose is that periodically you and I slip a dollar, or two, or three into an envelope, and send it to the above address. A dollar for a millionaire. But it's a million that he spent on the love of a lifetime: science fiction.

DIRECTORATE REPORT

This is a belated tying up of loose ends left by yours truly in 1973 (yours truly is Gary Mattingly)

Those items which passed, beyond those which were listed by Joanne in the last issue, are as follows.

Those items which were deleted from the Bylaws were:

Article II. The President:

2. The President will bring to the attention of the Directors all important Constitution dates.
3. The President will call attention to violations of the Constitution
6. The President is authorized to place a one-half page advertisement for the TFFF in the Con Book. Payment will be automatic for these ads not requiring a vote of the current Directorate.

Article II, The President, Section 9, of the Bylaws was changed from:
9. At the instruction of the President, the Treasurer will send funds for estimated ink, paper, and postage, depending on the currently counted membership, and may also include estimated postage cost at rate the Constitution permits. Later a ~~list~~ list of costs will be sent to the Treasurer to adjust payment to fit the complete costs, up to the rate the Bylaws permit.

Added to the Bylaws, Article III, The Directorate, Section I, was the following, underlined section.

1. The Chairman of the Directorate shall report to the membership all measures passed by the Directorate. The Chairman of the Directorate shall also keep a record of the Bylaws changes, update the Bylaws at least quarterly, and send a copy of the updated version to the other Directors, the Secretary-Treasurer, and the ~~the~~ President

An International Classified Directory of Dealers in Science Fiction and Fantasy Books and Related Materials is being compiled by Frank H Kalpern, Reference Librarian, Rare Book Department, Free Library of Philadelphia and will be published by Haddonfield House, 300 Kings Highway East, Haddonfield, NJ, 08033 in the fall. All dealers, full or part time, wishing to be listed should contact the publisher, giving the following information in the fullest detail: address, telephone, store or appointment hours, frequency of catalogs, willingness to search, and specializations in such areas as authors, publishers languages, time periods, paperbacks, pulps, posters, artists, comics by title, pulps by title, dime novels, Big Little Books, fanzines, film stills, tapes, novels by subject, general SF & F, general pulps, etc.

Do we need a bureau/publication on teaching sf in the schools? I just talked to a teacher kh who was given that task last year, and she says what she needed was a list of books that are probably available, with a brief description (one sentence will do) of the plot, an estimate of reading difficulty, and is it acceptable for schools (publick) without any hassel (any sex or bad language, in other words). If someone wanted to work up something along that line, I would be willing to publish it and advertise it so that the teachers would buy it. The NFFF could get its money back, I am sure. She also needed kkkkk source material--reference books in print, where to find kkk the usual biographical details on the kkkkk authors, mainly.

The kh books that would be covered should be the ones that remain in print in paperback, usually, or ones that you think are good enough where they will be reprinted fairly often. She also needs textbooks with good, interesting stories that range kkkkk from the early days to the present. The ones she has seen have not been satisfactory.

If anyone is interested in any part of this, either as a project or a bureau, let me know (Joanne Burger, 55 Blue Bonnet Ct, Lake Jackson TX, 77566)

with the disturbing thought that Ray Nelson, may, himself, be just an illusion created by his 'author'. Doesn't have the action or plot elements of story #2 but more thoroughly examines 'reality'.

4. THE TRIAL & THE CONSUMMATION. Steve Sneyd, 1800wds/3 pps ss (single spaced). A rocketship captain is apparently explaining his action of destroying his ship to a computer in a Field Court Martial. The ravings of the character make little sense to this reader, and perhaps it was so intended. The two alien ~~kkk~~ things that occupy and hang down, one from each nostril, seem rather normal in comparison. This is a difficult piece to classify; not in the commercial mode; probably says more than I can get out of it.

5. LSD AND WATER DON'T MIX. Mike Benton. 2000 wds/4pps ss. An episode of Sonar, Agent of the Elite whose adventures are presented in BOMBHELL AMA-ZINE. A full-page comix-type illo is provided in addition to the 4 pps of text. A spy-superman type story with sfish weapons and protective devices.

6. HOSTAGE IN BERLIN. Mike Benton. 1300 wds/24pps ss. Another Sonar adventure. If you want comix/pulpy adventure, both these stories should be taken by the same editor so there'd be continuity following the PROLOGUE that explains Sonar.

7. BEGINNING WITH THE END. Andrew Darlington. 500 weds/1p ss. Three time-travelers purposefully rid Earth of mankind by blasting the first fis/animal coming out of water to live on land. (Note, it has been reported that Darlington's work is multiple-submitted.)

8. THE OLD MAN ALONE. Andrew Darlington 500 weds/1 p ss. This incident of 'policemen' called by people lacking action to investigate an old man hanging by the neck in an old house is a commentary on something that escapes me. There's no element of sf or the usual fantasy elements.

9. POLITICS OF A SMILE. Andrew Darlington 750 wds/1 pps ss Non-fantasy non-sf episode of human interest on the line boy sees girl, makes first step toward getting acquainted with manufactured incident of a flat'tyre' of his bike, but fails to go beyond some imaginings, tho the filling of the ~~kk~~ tire and the operation of the handpump is symbolic of a successful intercourse (I think) It could classify as psycho-fantasy perhaps.

10. STAIRS AND STEPS. Andrew Darlington. 1200 weds/2 pps ss. A new wavish psycho-fantasy of a young boy who sits on the narrow steps and listens to the rooms of the house.

11. THE TOWER. Andrew Darlington. 3000wds/ A fable like tale of a strange 'moon-child' of some ancient Asiatic land who ~~x~~ has a vision to ~~kk~~ save the glory of a dwindling and dying village by conscripting his elders and all villagers into building a tower which future men would recognize;and nothing can stop him except the tower itself!

12. A MULTITUDE OF REALITIES. Andrew Darlington ~~RRR~~ 1700 wds. An old artist paints a picture of reality and speaks to two questioners about the nature of multiple reality, and when asked 'but what is the reality?' gives the final unarguable answer.

13. EMERGENCE. Andrew Darlington 1000 wds. Reality again explored in a more normal sfish tale of the diggin up of a man by the ince-men who finds he does not belong with these primitives in their cave and finds out he's in a domed cage, a 'zoo', one of many such time-isolated preparations by other men for future disasters.

14. THE KEEPEES OF THE VALLEY. Tom McKiniry 2500 wds. Has full-page ditto master illo and title by Flesher & Herpick. A space adventure of near disaster & rescue with some Earthly political dastardly plans in add tion to spacewarps, etc.

15. THE DEAD SUN OF ALTAIR. Michael Dobson. 2000 wds. Has ditto master title & illo for about 2 page. kk Ms has many penciled alterations. Aspace adventure of near disaster and rescue. This story and #14 seem on the comix level.

RULES FOR THE SCIENCE FICTION-FANTASY SHORT STORY CONTEST

SPONSORED BY THE NATIONAL FANTASY FAN FEDERATION

1. The contest is open to all amateur writers in this field. We define an amateur as one who has sold no more than two stories to the professional science fiction and fantasy publications.
2. Stories must be the original unpublished work of the entrant, must be less than 5000 words in length, and must come within the field of science fiction and/or fantasy in the opinion of the judges.
3. Stories should be typed on 8½ x 11 sheets of white paper, double spaced with the title on each page but the name of the author should not appear anywhere on the manuscript, to insure impartiality. Identity of the author will be known only to the contest manager who will retain all entry blanks until the contest closes.
4. Contestants may enter any number of stories. Each should be accompanied by a stamped self-addressed envelope and a separate entry blank. A fee of 25¢ should accompany each entry unless the contestant is a member in good standing of NFFF or BSFA, in which case no fee is required.
5. Contestants are expected to retain one or more copies of each story entered. The NFFF undertakes to use all possible care, but cannot guarantee against accidental loss in the mail.
6. First prize is \$15; Second prize is \$10; Third prize is \$5. Other prizes may be awarded if the final judges believe they merit them.
7. Final judging begins November 1, 1974. All entries must be in the hands of the Contest Manager before this date. Preliminary judging will be done by a committee of professional science fiction writers, with final judging by Terry Carr, professional editor and anthologist.
8. Winners will be notified by mail as soon as judging is complete. A full report will be made to the NFFF members sometime after the first of the year, in an issue of TNFF.
