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K.W. JETER

K.W. Jeter's first sale was to Laser Books, Roger Elwood's Canada-based line of original science-fiction paperbacks. It was a novel called *Seeklight*, and it was one of the few Laser books that Lester del Rey admired.

We doubt that he ever let on, but the young Jeter must have been awed to be dealing professionally with a real editor; though any such awe was soon to evaporate — probably on the occasion when he would meet Elwood in an airport bar and say, "I'll have the same," after Elwood ordered a "Vanilla 500", which proved, incredibly, to be a fifty-fifty mix of milk and soda-water on ice. Jeter has regarded all human strivings with sardonic suspicion ever since.

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Born in 1950, in Los Angeles, after graduating from college Jeter was found unfit for the draft because of his membership in the Young Trotskyists, which met in an abandoned brick warehouse on 7th Street, and which was bombed ineffectively a number of times by CIA-backed anti-Castro Cubans. He later fled to Norwalk, a sort of no-man's-suburb south of the city. It was there that he wrote his first book. He claims to be the first male in three generations of his family who hasn't made his living driving a truck.

He still possesses a souvenir coffee cup manufactured by the Greek Communist Party.

Since then he's lived in Mallorca, London, Bath, Zaire, Santa Ana, San Francisco, and Portland, Oregon. In those exotic locales he wrote his vividly idiosyncratic novels: Dr. Adder, The Glass Hammer, Soul Eater, The Dreamfields, Morlock Night, Mantis, Infernal Devices, Death Arms, Dark Seeker, and most recently, Farewell Horizontal — due this winter from St. Martins — and In the Land of the Dead, which will be published by Morrigan Books in England in 1989.

And now here he is in Austin, with his Greek coffee cup in his luggage. Do offer to buy a Vanilla 500 to pour into it, so that he can empty it into the swimming pool.



How do cities get picked for a Worldcon®, you ask? Well, he said, in the good old days you merely had to convince the Worldcon business meeting that you had what it took to win, and you were in like flint. In these more modern times, you have to convince Scott and Jane Dennis that you can do it. Really. That's all it takes. Naturally, they'll tell you that no, you've got to convince Ben Yalow and Bruce Pelz (who will, of course, finger other likely suspects) all denying all the while that any small group of fans could have that much influence.



Such crafty fans are, often, called "SMOFs" for "Secret Masters Of Fandom." However, if you know who they are, then they can hardly be secret, can they? No, these people are merely the upper management of the fannish Civil Service — the real SMOFs lurk in the fevered imaginations of certain New York Worldcon and upper Midwest Worldcon bidders. Ah, you ask, if Jane and Scott were SMOFs, how would you be able to tell? Usually, you see, you have to screw up big on a convention, to show the possibile ability to learn from your mistakes. You didn't think SMOFs could make mistakes, did you? So, once upon a time, Scott could have been involved with some sort of disaster, but, being in polite company, we won't go into that.

Instead, we'll say Scott Dennis started as a young man in Midwest fandom, and went on to greater things in Italy. One day he found himself in Baltimore, of all places, hanging out with the likes of Mike Walsh (sometime captain of the starship Constellation). Once Scott got that out of his system, he moved to Kentucky to seek his fame and fortune. (Sounds better than to say he went to get married, doesn't it?)

Scott and Jane are often found incognito at conventions, trying to pass for hucksters in the dealers room. This gives them a chance for gossiping, uh, information-gathering, in preparation for their hobby. A fanzine (that's right) called, appropriately, Jane's Fighting Smofs, and a future supplement, All The World's Conventions.

All this makes them a triple threat — not only can they help manage conventions and huckster at conventions, they also do a fanzine about conventions. This is pretty formidable, when you realize that I, for instance, can only manage two of those at a time. Boy. Well, despite all that, they are even personable, you know, nice, friendly, approachable people. It is even possible to just walk up and talk to them. They are excellent companions for dinner, are gracious party hosts, know more about conventions than almost anyone, and, on top of that, can converse on a large variety of topics.

But whatever you do, don't talk to them about newspaper comic strips (well, not to be specific, mind you, but the strip in particular's initials are "Nancy").

BRAD W. FOSTER

Our Official ArmadilloCon Artist Guest is a native Texan. Working out of Dallas, Texas, now, Brad Foster earned an architecture degree at Texas A&M, then turned his energies to making big money in the world of art.

In one short decade Brad has built a publishing empire, Jabberwocky Graphix, and garnered two Hugo Awards, the 1987 and 1988 editions for Best Fan Artist. We knew him when he had only the publishing empire.

Jabberwocky Graphix has produced coloring books, computer instruction books, apartment guides, comic books and books for adults only. Sorry, kids, no violence, only sex. Brad was a pioneer in the creation of the mini-comic format which has proven to be the backbone of the Jabberwocky line of publications.

Some of these publications have made Brad into a traveling controversy. Wherever he camps his huckster's table, comments on the chief-subject-matter most attention-getting subject matter of his wares, sex, are sure to be heard. Rather than shying from debate Brad welcomes what he considers a healthy discussion airing different points of view on the subject of the graphic depiction of the human body at its most intimate moment. It certainly breaks the monotony of the endless parade that passes by during a convention.

What's next for Brad Foster? Another art project? More likely several at once. He is always looking for a new challenge, such as drawing one cartoon a day, every day for a year. It led to the book *One Year's Worth*, another Jabberwocky Graphix production

published in a signed, limited edition which is nearly sold out. Whatever he does it is certain that Brad will bring to it the creative enthusiasm and unique craftsmanship that have become the hallmark of his work.

GINJER BUCHANAN

One of the best things that ArmadilloCon does every year is bring an editor as a special guest of the convention. In SF it seems like a few high-profile editors (no Gardner Dozois jokes, please) seem to get all the attention, while some of the hardest-working people in the business are hardly known — except to the authors lucky enough to work with them.

(It's a common complaint. You hear stories of authors mentioning pets, childhood sweethearts, and long-dead ancestors in the their acknowledgements, while the names of their exhausted, underpaid editors never come up.)

When ArmadilloCon announced that Ginjer Buchanan would be Editor GoH this year, the entire industry seemed to puff up with pride. "It's about time," was a comment I heard more than once. Or: "I can't think of anybody who deserves it more."

To say that Ginjer is one of the best-loved people in publishing would be an understatement. She came to editing not from college or business school, but from fandom. There has never been any doubt that she does what she does for love, not for prestige or power or the corporate bottom line.


Before she came to Ace, her publishing credits were few: columnist for the short-lived *Cosmos*, New York correspondent for *Locus* during the early 70's, first reader for the SF Book Club. When Susan Allison hired her in 1984 (to fill the void left by Beth Meacham's departure to TOR), Ginjer had been making her living as a social worker, supervising foster care and adoption for the Catholic Home Bureau in New York City. Yet what better training could anyone have for dealing with such epitomes of maturity as SF writers and artists?

Which is not to say she was without notoriety. She was cofounder of the SF club in her native Pittsburgh and helped run PHLANGE, their regional convention. In fact, she made such a powerful impression on fandom that she was nearly nominated for a Hugo in 1973 for Best Dramatic Presentation. Since coming to Ace she's edited such ArmadilloCon guests as Jim Blaylock, Melinda Snodgrass, and Richard Kadrey. Her other authors include Jack McDevitt (winner of the Phil Dick Special Award), Loren MacGregor (a Campbell Award nominee), and popular fantasy authors Craig Shaw Gardner, Ru Emerson, and Christopher Stasheff. Clearly it's Ginjer's writers that continue to keep Ace in the forefront of SF publishing. Even more important is her obvious concern with finding and developing new talent, something Ace has always been known for.

It's funny, but I can't remember the first time I met Ginjer. I want to say that it was May of 1985, during a visit to the Ace offices in New York. Yet when I think back on it, it seems as if I'd already known her for years, even then.

I think the reason is that once you've met her, it's just too hard to imagine your world without Ginjer Buchanan as a vital part of it.

If you buy him a drink, he'll take a club soda. Sensible. He doesn't chase blondes (or brunettes or redheads). Very sensible. You'll never catch Lew out in the rain without an umbrella. He knows most of the good short-cuts in his part of Austin. If someone at a party is wearing a lampshade over their head, you don't have to look underneath to know it isn't Lew Shiner. When I offered to buy him a T-shirt and have "CAPTAIN SENSIBLE" printed on it, he said, "make sure it's 100% cotton."

But if you want to see this paragon of practicality loosen up a bit, find out where the dancing is going on. Lew will be bouncing around out on the floor 'til the cows come home. Those who wonder how his wife stays so stylishly slender need wonder no longer. Keeping up with this boy is a full-time job. The man is a dancing machine. Check it out.

You might assume that the writing produced by such a straight arrow would be like sugarless vanilla ice-cream, safe and bland, and that you could read Shiner's stuff at bedtime and be assured of dropping off in no time. Nope. Reading Shiner is like feeding your mind a Halloween apple full of razor blades. He looks so harmless for his stories to have so many edges. If you haven't read anything by Lew, try his current novel Deserted Cities of the Heart, or read "Love In Vain" in the Gardner Dozois and Susan Casper anthology Ripper!, or his Wild Cards stories, or anything else you can get your hands on. Like his friends, you'll wonder what's going on with this nice, mild, sensible-looking man. Maybe it's all the dancing that agitates his mind so. If that's the case, crank up the music and play it all night long.



This British sleeper from 1961 falls in the subgenre of planetary disasters popularized by John Wyndham (Day of the Triffids) and John Christopher (No Blade of Grass). Great performances by Leo McKern (Help), Edward Judd, and Janet Munro bring life to a first-rate screenplay by Val Guest and Wolf Mankowitz. A nuclear accident sends the earth spiraling in towards the sun. The results are well-extrapolated, gripping and believable. Emphasis throughout is on the characters and what it costs them to survive. Saturday Review said, "Better than On the Beach" and I agree.

Jack the Ripper Double Feature

In observance of 100 years of the Jack the Ripper mythos, we join in on the "celebration" which is taking place this fall both in the UK and here in the US. In London, they hold Ripper Tours, Ripper Events and probably Ripper Promotional Tie-Ins with commercial products. Here in America, a television network will be showing a mini-series based on Jack and his exploits, starring the ubiquitous Michael Caine.

The Ripper has surfaced as a character or theme in a number of films from the beginning of cinematic history. Among others, he appeared in the classic German silent, Pandora's Box; the 1926 Hitchcock silent, The Lodger; and a German film which starred Klaus Kinski. Other Ripper theme films include Dr. Jekyll and Sister Hyde, Hands of the Ripper, Time After Time, and Murder by Decree.

THE LODGER (1944, 84 min.) is the third (and considered by many to be the best) of the films based on the Mary Belloc Lowndes novel. The first was the 1926 silent directed by Alfred Hitchcock. It was remade in 1932 as a sound film with Ivor Novello reprising his starring role from the silent but with the story modernized to the present day. In our 1944 version, John Brahm directs Laird Cregar and Merle Oberon in a period (1880's) piece variously described as "madly baroque", "atmospheric", and as a story of a monster who could live next door to any of us.

The second film of our double feature, A STUDY IN TERROR (1965, 94 min.), is a stylish British film based on an Ellery Queen novel. It stars John Neville, Anthony Quayle, and Robert Morley in a very watchable and entertaining tale in which Sherlock Holmes tracks down the villainous Jack the Ripper. Leonard Maltin gives it three stars.

Friday night is our Jack the Ripper Double Feature night in the Amphitheatre. K.W. Jeter will introduce The Lodger at 10:00 p.m.; at midnight, sit tight for a screening of A Study In Terror.

The Lodger will also be shown at half-past midnight on Saturday night, and A Study In Terror on Sunday at 2:00 p.m., both in the Amphitheatre.

How To Get Great Art Buys



- 1. Sign up at the Art Check-In desk (near the entrance to the Art Show, Southpark A&B) to receive your Buyer Number. This number must be included on each written bid and used in the voice auction. Get a buyer number even if you do not plan to purchase art. You never know when a painting will beg to be adopted.
- 2. If you see a piece of art you like, you may bid on it by writing your name, buyer number, and the amount of your bid (dollar amounts only) on the bid sheet. If you are not buying it at Quick Sale, be prepared to attend the auction (1:00 p.m. Sunday afternoon, Ballroom E) to defend your bid!
- 3. If you cannot attend the auction, or if you want to be certain of your purchase without the risk of it being overbid, you may buy it for the Quick Sale price if there are no previous bids listed. Quick Sale purchases may be picked up at any time during the show, but we do request that, if possible, the pieces be left in the show until Saturday evening for contest judging.

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
- 4. At the Auction: You must have a Buyer Number to bid at the auction.
- 5. If a piece of art does not have enough bids to get to auction, or if a piece brought to auction receives no additional bids, the highest bid on the bid sheet buys the piece.
- 6. You may pay for your art and pick it up during and immediately after the auction, or by 6:00.
- 7. Payment accepted includes: Cash, Check with ID, and VISA or MasterCard (6% surcharge for credit card sales).
- 8. All art must be paid for and collected before 6:00 p.m. Sunday, except by special arrangement with the Art Chairman, Teresa Patterson.


