

DUFF WINNER

William Rotsler is a native son of California, from a pioneer family that crossed America more than a hundred years ago. He has been a sculptor in iron, and later bronze, and created over 6,000 works in less than three years. He is also a cartoonist, mostly for his own amusement. As a figure photographer he has photographed over 500 girls, his work appearing in everything from 'Playboy' to 'Skin Diver'.

"I have always been interested in film, but there is really no place to learn, not when you haven't the time to go to school." He formed his own production company and convinced clients such as Lockheed, Max Factor, and Mattel Toys that he should do their industrial films. Rotsler produced over 60 hours of industrials, training films and commercials before he decided it was time to do what he had wanted: make movies. "I only knew one man in the business and he made sex films. I figured that was a natural for me and I talked him into a two-picture deal without him ever seeing an inch of film I'd done!" Rotsler said.

Twenty-six features later Rotsler decided to bocome a writer. "It happened by accident, as a lark, but I started selling everything. I was mostly writing science fiction, but I soon began doing articles for the men's magazines. I wrote what I knew about and as a result I've sold over 200 articles on the erotic film field alone." Rotsler has a science fiction novel, Patron of the Arts', Ballantine Books, 1974.

"I still want to make movies," Rotsler says,
"because film is the most fluid and delightful art
form of all. You can do anything with a movie,
anything you can do with any other art form, except
participate directly. You can play with time and
space and reality, you can generate and control
emotions, you can change people.

"With a free screen a film-maker should be able to do anything, with only his own taste and abilities to worry about, testing it in the market-place of public responses. If no one wanted to see filmed eroticism it wouldn't last a week.

"But eroticism is only part of the concept of a free screen. The motion picture screen should be as free and uncensored as the free press."

Rotslor lives on a wooded hillside in Hollywood, California, with a pool and very private yard full of trees and grass. "I'm very popular in the summer," he says, "and it gets to be a sort of private nudist camp for figure models and other friends. Our record so far is 24 adults and 4 children.

Sportcars, western movies, John Ford, chocolate, science fiction, exotic-looking women of all races, the American Southwest, Saul Steinberg, ancient civilizations, Henry Moore, apples that snap and pop when you bite them, Gaston Lachaise sculpture, drawing, flying low in airplanes, Orson Welles, beautiful mouths, laughter, freedom, and frequently changing his life all around are some of Rotsler's favourite things.









the new ditman

Over the years since the Australian Science Fiction Achievement Awards (Ditmars) were inaugurated the physical shape of the award has taken many forms.

The Organisers of A-Con 7 would like to suggest a simple but olegant linear design in keeping with, but not the same as, the design of the Hugo.

The design adopted by A-Con 7 is that of the Black Monolith in the proportions 1:4:9 as used in the Clarko/Kubrick film '2001: A Space Odessy'.

The shape, as that of the Hugo rocketship, is one readily recognisable to a vast majority of fans and it is simple to construct.

The materials used in the A-Con 7 Ditmar are all Australian, polished black granite, a mounting block of jarrah, a timber peculiar to Australia and even the brass plate is made from ore mined in Australia.

But the material itself is relatively unimportment, the main points are that the design is simple, elegant and recognisable. A-Con 7 wishes to formally move the adoption of this shape as the permanent physical form of the Australian Science Fiction Achievement Award.
