
# Introducing our Guests of Honour

### GREG BENFORD

regory Benford is a professor of physics at the University of California, Irvine. He is a Woodrow Wilson Fellow, and was Visiting Fellow at Cambridge University. and in 1995 received the Lord Prize for contributions to sciences. His research encompasses both theory and experiments in the fields of astrophysics and plasma physics. Formerly a co-editor of the fanzine Void, and an SF writer since 1965, he is the author of the Nebula-winning *Timescape* and the Galactic Center novels. Gregory Benford's fiction explores the human side of hard science, and extrapolates humanity moving into a realistic far future. He has won the Nebula Award twice, the John W. Campbell award and the Australian Ditmar award for international novel. In 1989 he won the United Nations Medal in Literature.

He is a frequent and eloquent attendee at many conventions. Dr. Benford makes his home in Laguna Beach, California.

# **SEAN MCMULLEN**

ean McMullen is one Australia's leading SF and fantasy authors, and lives in Melbourne with his wife Trish and daughter Catherine. He is the winner of eleven awards for SF and fantasy. His international sales cover the USA, Britain, France, Poland and Japan. He works in scientific computing, and is currently doing a PhD in Medieval Fantasy Literature at Melbourne University. Sean has been awarded the Ditmar Award three times, won the Aurealis Award twice and the William J Atheling Award for Criticism five times, and is the author of over 20 scientific papers, most of which are far too technical to be mentioned here. He has also prepared literally dozens of articles about speculative fiction in Australia and made numerous presentations on the genre to various forums, not all of which are SF related. Oh, and was the Editor, MUSFA's fiction Magazine Yggdrasil: March 1983 - March 1984.

Karen Herkes was born in Parramatta, NSW, but grew up in Queensland, where she and a friend edited a "crudzine" of stunning mediocrity, *Hyperspace*. She enlisted in the Army in 1981 and coincidently started to attend a number of Science Fiction conventions. She moved to Canberra in 1983 and became involved in local SF fan clubs (both general and media). She wrote a lot, edited a few local fanzines, helped with a few conventions, served on some Club committees, and generally enjoyed good company! After graduating from University, she now works as a psychologist, and is married with a rapidly expanding family: one daughter (Tara aged 4 years) and another due on Christmas Day 2002. She still writes a lot of short stories, most of which she's not game to show anyone, is collecting local ghost stories and has an ever-expanding book that she hopes will be published one day. Karen is also involved in a small group responsible for the website act-sf.8m.com, a comprehensive guide and historical record of Canberra Fandom – a work-in-progress. She also writes murder mysteries for parties – she's done several for charities and a couple of private affairs. Oh, and one for the 1989 SF Media Natcon, *Conspire*, held in Canberra. There were 197 players - what a challenge, but so much fun!

Karen comments, "I've been really impressed with both Vanessa's work on building local conventions again and the Canberra Speculative Fiction Guild. Fandom in Canberra continues to be a dynamic and interesting community, what a great place to live!"
