## Reports on past events

Race Mathews' fan GoH speech set the tone and the cocktail party got us all going.

In the 'Babylon 5 enigma' session, Danny Heap and Jane Killick conducted an interesting discussion with lots of juicy gossip of events behind the scenes.

The first *Timebinders* session on 'The 1952 convention and Oz fandom of the early 50s' was moderated by Dick Jenssen with Race Mathews and Mervyn Binns reminiscing about post WWII fandom.

Mervyn has documented his recollections in a fanzine that he is happy to sell to anyone for \$2 a copy.

Race observed that a big influence on development of the Melbourne group was the scarcity of American SF due to the fact that the Sterling area had pooled all its dollars and prioritised dollar purchases. SF was at the bottom of the buying list. The club library became a literary lifeline for desperate fans.

Dick Jenssen opined that the Atom Bomb and Sputnik conferred legitimacy on SF in the public mind. Race recalled that his group was aware of an older fandom arising out of Hugo Gernsback's magazines in the 1930s.

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The second *Timebinders* session on 'New wave fandom – the ratbag years 1985-99' was chaired by Danny Heap and starred the larger than life and exuberant James Allen. Sydney fan, Susan Batho, was a moderating influence. She reports as follows.

"Everyone who contributed had a different view of fandom in Australia. The gentlemen on the panel were verbose and, despite my helpful interventions, a lot of areas were not covered in the time allotted. Bruce Gillespie, the polite heckler in the front row, was persistent in feeding in pertinent questions about Melbourne fannish history.

"Danny tried vainly to keep discussion to the point, but .. so many years .. so many tales to tell .. we were asked to write down the missing bits, preparatory to trying this out again next convention."


Joe Haldeman, Stephen DedmanKerry Greenwood and Geoff Allshorn explored sexuality in SF. Joe remarked that 'The Forever War' was about control, not sexuality; and that, with his introduction of a homosexual character, suddenly that's what the story was all about in the public mind. The point was made that we are all queer according to somebody else's definitions.

The term 'transgressive fiction' was introduced to define writing that goes beyond the pale. A fascinating line of argument concluded that hermaphrodites have no less than sixteen different ways of being turned on by other people.

WA fandom, in the persons of Stephen Dedman, Grant Watson and Simon Oxwell, continue the late night variety show with a fannish perspective they pioneered at Swancons. If you missed 'Raw Cordial' on Friday, don't miss it on Saturday and Sunday nights at 11pm.

The Art Show in Room 5 is a wonderfully eclectic set of pieces, including photoshop work, acrylics and sculpture. Some of it is for sale.
