STORM CONSTANTINE

Storm Constantine is 30 something, and lives in Stafford with eight cats and a husband. Apart from being a successful author and an accomplished artist, through her love of music, she has been involved with band management for many years.

Storm has written stories all her life. Her interests have always lain in the realms of the fantastical, but she was influenced by the mythology of Ancient Egypt and Greece more than by contemporary fantasy writing. After beginning - and never completing - several full-length works, Storm began work in 1985 on the first of her Wraeththu novels, *The Enchantments of Flesh and Spirit*. This was completed in 1986 and accepted by Futura/Macdonald, finally being published in 1987. It was followed by two further Wraeththu books, *The Bewitchments of Love and Hate* (1988) and *The Fulfilments of Fate and Desire* (1989).

In 1990, Macdonald/Orbit published Storm's fourth book. *The Monstrous Regiment* - a departure from the territory of Wraeththu, though still, as her editor once put it, "quintessential Storm". A sequel to *The Monstrous Regiment - Aleph* - appeared in 1991.

1991 also saw Storm moving publishers, to Headline, which Storm saw as a major step forward in her career. Storm had four happy and successful years with Headline which saw the publication of her next four books: *Hermetech* (1991), *Burying The Shadow* (1992), *Sign For The Sacred* (1993) and *Calenture* (1994). *Hermetech*, a favourite of Storm and her fans, was a step sideways for Storm in that it was a science fiction novel.

A change of publishers again in 1994, to the exciting new Penguin/Creed imprint, has served to strengthen Storm's outlook and career. Her first book with Creed, *Stalking Tender Prey*, is due to be published in November 1995. *Stalking Tender Prey* explores Storm's continuing fascination with the mythology of the Fallen Angels, drawing on characters and ideas from her earlier novel, *Burying The Shadow*, and her short story, "A Change Of Season" (which appeared in the Midnight Rose Anthology, *The Weerde*).

Besides her novels, Storm has had several short stories published in magazines and anthologies/collections, and both *Hermetech* and *Burying The Shadow* have been translated into German with translations into other languages planned for the future.

NEIL GAIMAN

Expatriate Britisher and winner of the World Fantasy Award, Neil Gaiman is probably most widely known as the writer of the Sandman comic saga. He is also the author of numerous comics and graphic novels, often working with acclaimed artist Dave McKean. An occasional writer of short fiction (some of which was recently published in a collection), he collaborated with Terry Pratchett on a highly successful humorous fantasy novel and co-created and edited a number of shared-world anthologies including Temps and Weerde. Gaiman also collaborated with Kim Newman on a compilation of high-lights of the low-lights of science fiction and horror writing in literature and film; he is a popular interview subject, has received many awards and happens to be an authority on Douglas Adams' Hitch-Hiker series of plays and novels.

Writer, columnist, film maker, artist, publisher, editor, critic, interviewer and raconteur, Robin Pen has worked in three SF bookstores - managing two of them - two comic shops, and a computer games store, and has been active in conventions since Swancon 14 in 1989. In 1990, he helped found and edit *Eidolon - The Australian Journal of Science Fiction and Fantasy*, and began his film column, "Critical Embuggerance", for which he won a Ditmar Award in 1993. He has also programmed film events for the Lumiere Cinema, including two Sci Fi Blockbusters and the week long Festival Fantastique in 1994. Today, along with his contributing editorship with *Eidolon*, he is also an associate editor for *PC Games Plus*.

Jack Dann

Jack Dann is the author or editor of over thirty-five books, including the novels Junction, Starhiker, and The Man Who Melted. Dann's work has been compared to Jorge Luis Borges, Roald Dahl, Lewis Carroll, Castaneda, J. G. Ballard, and Philip K. Dick. His short stories have appeared in Omni and Playboy and other major magazines and anthologies. He is the editor of the anthology Wandering Stars, one of the most acclaimed anthologies of the 1970's, and several other well-known anthologies such as More Wandering Stars. He also edits the multi-volume Magic Tales fantasy series with Gardner Dozois and is a consulting editor for Tor Books. He has been a finalist for the Nebula Award eleven times and a World Fantasy Award finalist three times. He has also been a finalist for the British Science Fiction Award, and is a recipient of the Premios Gilgames de Narrativa Fantastica award. Dann's major historical novel about Leonardo da Vinci—entitled The Memory Cathedral—will be published in hardcover by Bantam Books in December, 1995. Dann is also listed in Contemporary Authors and the Contemporary Authors Autobiography Series; The International Authors And Writers Who's Who; Personalities Of America; Men Of Achievement; Who's Who In Writers, Editors, And Poets, United States And Canada; Dictionary Of International Biography; and the Directory Of Distinguished Americans.

Dr. Janeen Webb

Janeen Webb is senior lecturer (professor) of literature at the Australian Catholic University in Melbourne, Australia. One of Australia's leading SF critics, her work is also widely published in the USA, England, Germany, and Austria. Her books include *Trends In The Modern Novel* (Institute of Early Childhood Development), *Modern Australian Drama* (with G. McKay) (Institute of Early Childhood Development), and *Storylines* (with M. Tyrrell) (Oxford University Press). Dr. Webb is currently working on critical bibliographies of William Gibson, Angela Carter, and Thomas Keneally for the *Borgo Press Modern Authors* series. She was co-editor of the *Australian Science Fiction Review* from 1987 to 1991. This bi-monthly journal was the premier science fiction forum in Australia and had a world wide influence on science fiction, especially in the USA. She is a consultant and contributor to the Hugo award winning *Encyclopedia Of Science Fiction*, edited by John Clute and Peter Nicholls. Dr. Webb is listed in *The Who's Who Of Academics In Australia, The World Who's Who Of Women* (13th edition) and the *International Who's Who Of Intellectuals* (11th edition).

INVITED GUESTS

Pat Cadigan -

Pat Cadigan, acclaimed by the London Guardian as "The Queen of Cyberpunk", is the author of three novels, *Mindplayers*, *Symmers* and *Fools*; and three short story collections, *Patterns*, *Home By The Sea*, and *Dirty Work*. Some of her short stories also appeared in *Letters from Home*, alongside work by Karen Joy Fowler and Pat Murphy. Pat is at work on her fourth novel, *Parasite*, and continues to publish short fiction. Her most recent short stories are "Death in the Promised Land" and "Tea from an Empty Cup".

Sara Douglass -

Lecturer in medieval history and culture, Sara Douglass published her first fantasy novel *BattleAxe* with HarperCollins in 1995. In 1996 the final two installments of the trilogy will appear, *Enchanter* and *StarMan*, as well as an adolescent fantasy with Hodder Headline, *Beyond the Hanging Wall*, due out late in the year. She has just completed her fifth novel, *Threshold*, which should be out in 1997.

Nick Stathopoulos -

Originally trained as a lawyer, Nick Stathopoulos is now a full-time commercial artist, working chiefly for computer game creators SSG. He has won many awards for his work, including numerous Ditmars and the 1990 Australian Television Award ("Penguin") for the production design on *Son of Romeo*. Nick's work adorns the covers of numerous books, records and computer games, and his animation skills have earned him employment with companies such as Hanna Barbera and Walt Disney.

Grant Stone -

Grant Stone's involvement in the organisation and running of WA's genre events dates back some twenty years. He instituted and managed Murdoch University's extensive collection of genre material, and his radio programme "The Faster than Light Radio Show" is a valuable forum for new writers and provides the general public with information about Australian science fiction. His writing is principally non-fiction, including reviews and commentary.

INVITED GUESTS

Stephen Dedman

Stephen Dedman's stories have appeared in F&SF, Asimov's, Science Fiction Age, Strange Plasma, Aurealis and Eidolon, and the anthologies Little Deaths, Alien Shores, Metaworlds and Terror Australis. He has recently sold his first novel, The Art of Arrow Cutting, to Tor Books.

Terry Dowling -

Terry Dowling's short stories have been appearing regularly in magazines, both locally and internationally, since 1977. He has also published five collections to date, and in addition co-edited *The Essential Ellison* (1991) with Richard Delap and *Mortal Fires* (1994) with Van Ikin. His most recent collection is *An Intimate Knowledge of the Night* (1995).

Shannah Jay -

Sherry Anne Jacobs, a successful Western Australian romance writer in her own right, has in recent years begun to write romantic SF and fantasy under the name of Shannah Jay, selling a number of novels to Pan Australia, four of which, *Quest, Envoy, The Lands of Nowhere* and *Shadow of the Serpent*, have been published to date.

Sean McMullen -

Sean McMullen's work has appeared in such magazines as *Analog*, *Omega*, *Fantasy & SF*, *Interzone*, *Eidolon* and *Aurealis*, and he has won the Ditmar Award for SF and the William Atheling Award for SF Criticism. His collection *Call to the Edge* was published in 1992, and was followed by the novels *Voices in the Light* (1994) and *Mirrorsun Rising* (1995).

Sean Williams -

Sean Williams sold his first story to *The Esoteric Order of Dagon* in 1991, and he has barely been out of print since, having had over thirty stories published to date since. He regularly appears in *Eidolon Magazine*, and had a chapbook of short stories published by Mirrordanse Books in 1994, as well as *The Unknown Soldier*, a novel co-written with Shane Dix, released by Aphelion in 1995.

PROGRAMME IN PROGRESS

Somewhere in the vicinity of this text is an outline of the intended Festival Programme. Please use it as a guide for what to generally expect. But for heaven's sake, don't hold us to it. It is subject to change when- and wherever it is to the advantage of the Festival and to you, the respective and prospective members.

Now, it is quite clear from this proposed schedule that there are very few specific items mentioned other than major events. Well, be assured that we could fill it in and have excess for another con. But what would be the point? We have a continually growing list of talented attendees, and we wish to exploit them as is best for everyone. Thus the short list of panel/ presentation/ discussion/ forum items is constantly being altered, and will continue to be until the final programme is announced. Australasian Science Fiction Media Awards The ASFMA's

The ASFMA's were originally conceived as a way of giving a form of acknowledgment to those in the media side of fandom, in much the same way that the Ditmar pays tribute to its literary aspects. They were first awarded in 1984 at Medtrek, and are now awarded at the annual National Australasian Science Fiction Media Convention. 1996 will be the first time the ASFMA's (which, at one point in their brief but venerable history were known simply as 'Robbies') have been awarded in Western Australia. The awards themselves are made out of glass by Peter Lupinski, and are fashioned to look impressive sitting on a mantelpiece, as well as to be a fairly deadly weapon in close combat.

Eligibility

Eligible nominees for the awards must have been published or produced between 1 January 1995 and 31 December 1995, and be the work of Australasian residents during that period. Eligible categories are listed on the back of this page.

Nominating

All nominations will be considered strictly confidential. You do not have to be a member of the convention to nominate people or items for the awards. You do have to be a member of the convention to vote for the awards.

To nominate works for the awards, write clearly your nominations on the form provide on the back of this page under the correct category.

To be included nominations should be posted no later than 15 February 1996 to the convention address. Nomination can also be submitted by E-mail to richards@iinet.net.au.

Voting

Voting membership is \$10 and postal votes will be posted to all members before the convention. Membership is available by writing to the convention address.

Postal votes must be received by 31 March 1996. Voting will be allowed at the convention by members attending. Proxy voting is not allowed.



he Ditmar SubCommittee of the 1996 National Science Fiction Literary Conference, the Festival of the Imagination 1996, have opened the nominations for the 1995 Ditmar Awards.

Tne categories for the 1996 Australian Science Fiction Achievement "Ditmar" Awards have been previously announced. Awards will be presented in the following categories:

- 1. Best Long Fiction.
- 2. Best Short Fiction.
- Best Publication/ Fanzine (Periodical).
- Best Artwork.
- Best Non-Professional/ Fan Writer.
- Best Non-Professional/Fan Artist.

In accordance with the Constitution of the National Science Fiction Convention, the William J Atheling Jnr Award will be presented for outstanding works of criticism.

The announced categories are intended to reflect traditional Ditmar categories, as well as to recognize the changing face of science fiction in Australia today.

NOMINATIONS FOR THE 1995 DITMAR AWARDS ARE NOW OPEN. ANY PERSON WELCOME TO NOMINATE FOR THE AWARDS

General Eligibility Criteria

For a work to be eligible it must have been first published between 1 January 1995 and 31 December 1995 (inclusive); and have been created by a person who was an Australian resident at the time of publication. Publication, for the purposes of these awards, means made available to the public, whether by sale, hiring, leasing or public display. It is not a requirement for eligibility that the work have been published in Australia.

Best Long Fiction

For a work to be eligible for Best Long Fiction it must meet the general eligibility criteria and be in excess of 40,000 words. As has been the practice in the past, single author collections and anthologies will be eligible in this category.

Best Short Fiction

NOMINATIONS OPEN!!

For a work to be eligible for Best Short Fiction it must meet the general eligibility criteria, and be less than 40,000 words.

Best Publication/Fanzine (Periodical)

In order to recognize the quality and diversity of publications currently appearing in Australia, this category has been expanded to cover any periodical publication which contains original fiction or non-fiction. For a publication to be eligible for Best Publication/Fanzine (Periodical) it must meet the general eligibility criteria and have published a minimum of two issues during the year in question.

Best Artwork

For a work to be eligible for Best Artwork it must meet the general eligibility criteria and be a single or discrete artwork which can be attributed to a single artist or group of artists. Judgments on eligibility will tend towards the inclusive, rather than the exclusive, but the intention is to explicitly include specific paintings, sculptures, drawings, illustrations, comic strips, cartoons, single issue comics and any other stand alone artwork. The intention is to honour a specific creation, rather than an artist's body of work generally.

Best Non-Professional/Fan Writer

There is fine work being done by writers at all levels of science fiction throughout Australia. In order to recognize the critical, reviewing, journalistic and other work being done across as diverse a range of publications as Thyme, Ethel the Aardvark, Gegenscheim, Science Fiction Commentary, ANZAPA, Bloodsongs, Sirius and many, many others it has been decided to expand this category to cover any body of science fiction-related writing which meets the general eligiblity criteria and which was principally unpaid.

Best Non-Professional/Fan Artist

For an artist to be eligible for this award he/she must have completed a body of work during 1995 which meets the general eligiblity criteria and which includes works which are individually eligible for the Best Artwork award. Again, this award category has been expanded in order to recognise the range and diversity of work being created at all levels of Australian SF, most particularly those which do not attract more than nominal payment.

SOCIAL PROGRAMMING

In addition to the serious presentations and discussions, the Festival will also be offering light events not to inform, educate or elucidate but simply to amuse (after three days without sleep we all get a bit crinkley around the edges). The two major events are the masquerade on Saturday night and Swancon's 21st birthday party on Sunday night.

The Masquerade will be held in the ballroom (ooh) with a cash bar (ahh) with a full PA system and a DJ (whee) scheduled to start nineish and run until everyone is all partied out. Masks will be worn! Until midnight, anyway. Complimentary masks will be available for the squeamish, and for the truly creative there will be a mask decorating workshop on the Saturday afternoon (with various odds and bods and maybe a pet artist or two). On the other hand, Swancon's 21st birthday party will be a more relaxed affair, possibly with a few stories of Perth fandom's sordid past (if we can find anyone who will admit anything). Other light entertainment events will include:

- The Great SF Debate: two teams informally debate a question important to the future of SF (actually, they usually just rant about something very silly, but this sounds so much more profound, don't you think?).
- Sci fi Evangelism: five try-hard demagogues try to convert the audience to the insane SF inspired cults they hope to lead. Be prepared for strange transformations, conversions and cries of "infidel". Not to be missed, and certainly not to be believed.
- Impromptu space opera: 50's style pulp SF the way it never was. Storytellers and artists try to
 recount the adventures of Link Starthruster while the audience bombard them with bizarre
 plot events and villains. Insanely funny. (or funnily insane? -Ed) Be prepared. You have
 been warned!

THE VIDEO PROGRAMME

With approximately 100 hours of time to fill, the video committee will try to create for the festival a video programme that will encompass all aspects of Science Fiction and Fantasy (or as many as we can find videos for). But what does this entail? Well, we try to acquire videos from a variety of sources that encompass a wide range of SF genres and people's tastes, to hopefully entertain our members throughout the convention. Remember, some videos we show at the convention will not be available through regular channels and may be very difficult to see anywhere else. We will often run themes throughout the various days of the convention, such as Hard SF, Fantasy, Horror, and so on. Films will be shown from videos and laser disks on a screen with a video projector. With 100 years of films to chose from, the program will be varied.

The Festival's video programme will run from 4pm on Thursday April 4th and continue non stop, 24 hours a day (yes we *are* looking for volunteers to look after the video room), until just before the closing ceremony on the final day of the convention. There will be a wide selection of films, videos and television shows. No genre will be ignored, so expect SF and Fantasy films, Animé, old and new SF television shows, Hong Kong films, Rubber Suit Monsters, and lots lots more. There will be times set aside for open screening for people to show what ever they like, so if you have something you wish to show at the convention that you think is worthy, bring it along, we'd like to see it. The video stream will run approximately as follows:

7:00am	Morning Cartoons - classic cartoons and animated shows.
9:00am	Light Entertainment - no sane person is truly awake yet.
11:00am	Celebration of 100 years of Science Fiction Films and TV.
12:00am	Midday Movie - A collection of classic SF and Fantasy movies.
2:00pm	SF Series - everything from Animé to classic SF TV
4:00pm	More SF - What can I say, there is an awful lot of this stuff.
6:30pm	Aus/NZ SF Film - Let's support our local industry
8:30pm	The Nightly Feature - Great films that can not only melt the mind, but strain it as well. These will be a collection of Director's cuts, cool SF and Fantasy films.
10:00pm	Late Night Science Fiction - Mix of movies and TV series.
12:00pm	Midnight Movies - Mix of the ultra violent action, SF, Fantasy and Animé.
2:00am	Anything Goes- SF to keep you awake till dawn.
6:00am	Kick out the trash. The video room needs to be cleaned at some time.

An exact list of videos and times will be provided at the convention. Any similarities between this report and the real programme are purely coincidental and can be put down to blind luck.

COMPETITIONS

SHORT STORY COMPETITION

As part of the commitment that the Festival of the Imagination 1996 has towards the encouragement of creativity and talent in Australian fiction writing, there will be a short story competition for works of speculative fiction held in the months leading up to the conference.

The competition will be held open for any piece of Australian unpublished fiction of five thousand words or less, and will have two categories: the open category, and the category for entrants aged 16 and under at the time of submission. Stories for the competition must be based on the Shaun Tan artwork featured here.

The prizes will be \$130 first prize and \$70 second prize for the open category, and \$70 first prize and \$30 second prize for the sixteen and under category. These prizes will be presented by one of the guests of the conference. In addition, winners will also receive memberships to the convention, to allow the prizes to be awarded in person.



To be eligible for entry, manuscripts must be typed and double spaced, and submitted to the Festival of the Imagination by no later than the thirtieth of March, 1996.

ART COMPETITION

Additionally, the Festival of the Imagination 1996 will be holding a art competition open to all members of the Festival and the general genre community. The competition will be arranged into four categories - Professional, Non-Professional or Fan, Photography and Dimensional. All entries must be produced by the entrant and be of a Genre nature. There are no limits on the size or material used, but all entries must be available to be displayed. The Festival will take all due care but no responsibility for entries. All entries must be available and presented to the Festival by April 4th 1996 for judging and displaying.

The Art Competition will be judged by noted Australian genre artist Nick Stathopoulos and displayed at the Festival of the Imagination 1996 Art Show for the duration of the Festival. At this stage the prizes will be \$100 for best in show and \$25 for best in each category. It is hoped that we will increase this prize pool in the near future. Art can be included in the show without being in the competition if requested. Please contact the Festival at the addresses on page 2 for further information or inquiries.
