



THE FILMS

A NOTE BY PAUL STEVENS

THE films this year have been chosen to provide as much variety as possible for convention viewers, bearing in mind that the range of sf films available is rather limited, and that the distributors will not always agree to our having the films. (This is the reason we are not screening THE TENTH VICTIM, SPACEMAN and FIRST SPACESHIP TO VENUS.)

Of the films available to us I have chosen THIS ISLAND EARTH as an example of one of the better sf films of the mid-fifties, BARBARELLA and DANGER DIABOLIK as representative of the new wave in sf and comic art emanating from Europe by way of the cinema, PROJECT X as representative of some of the poorer efforts of Hollywood over the last few years, and 2001: A SPACE ODYSSEY as the one true classic of all time.

THE FILMS (continued)

There were other films which I would have liked to include films such as MOON ZERO TWO, a perfect example of the "space western", COUNTDOWN, an example of a near-miss in factual sf, MISSION MARS, possibly the worst sf movie of all time, and the recent Columbia release, HEAD. HEAD, featuring the Monkees, might not be sf, but it is one of the best surrealistic films I have ever seen.

It is also hoped during the convention to screen some bits and pieces of horror films - fragments, shall we say - the bits Australian viewers have never seen. Just so you'll know what Joe Censor thinks isn't good for us.



THE DITMAR AWARD

The Australian Science Fiction Achievement Awards, or "Ditmars", were instituted at the 8th Australian SF Convention in Melbourne, 1969, through the generosity of a prominent Melbourne fan who has little hope of remaining anonymous.

Last year a system of nominations and final ballot, similar to the Hugo system, was used. This year the organizer, Bruce Gillespie, decided to try taking straight-out votes with no previous nominating. If you read this by the evening of 27th March you may still vote. See Bruce. But you must be a Convention Member.






