



hing-Wing Chung : Financial Controller




John Richards : Publicity


Annette Wilson & Dorothy Cantoni : Masquerade





Jay Plester : Security







"John" Varley by Spider Robinson

(The following was originally written for Tuscon in 1984; everything in it, however, is still as true as it was then.)

Hard factual information about Herb Varley's life is astonishingly easy to come by. In most major cities it is necessary only to mention his name to any cab driver. Should you ever get within a thousand meters of him at a convention, of course, you'll find him willing, nay, insistent, to talk about himself at great length and in the kind of intimate detail that would have embarrassed even John Lennon. Indeed, a recent survey showed that only six people in the state of Oregon do not know more about Herb than they do about their own mothers - and four of those are legally brain dead.

But it is possible that you have just returned from an extended sojourn beyond The Black Stump - I was asked to write this; someone must perceive a need - so I'll retell the tale one last time:

Herb "John" Varley (a nickname affectionately given him, along with numerous infections, by certain professional women in his neighbourhood) was born in 1904 in Weasel Pee, Wisconsin, the twelfth of ten children. He was born on three successive days - they had to handle him in sections - and assembled on-site with the aid of an instruction manual translated from the Japanese. This accounts for his extremely short stature (he calls Harlan Ellison "Highpockets") and unprepossessing appearance, and, given the repulsion he inspires in the opposite sex, forms the only possible explanation for the thorough knowledge of gynaecology displayed in his stories and novels. Somehow he knew one look (albeit a rather protracted one) was going to have to last him a lifetime.

His extended birthing also makes him the only known human with two astrological signs (Pisces/Aquarius, a fish out of water), accounting for the mass of contradictions in his personality.

His parents moved frequently during his early childhood, but he always found them. He showed great promise at an early age; nothing was done about this and it blew over. He matriculated at Cal Tech (with the aid of massive oestrogen injections) and did post-doctoral work at Stanford (until the physical exertion of carrying people's doctorates from the mail room to the corner to post them proved too arduous for his frail constitution). He lost his virginity briefly in 1934, but it was returned to him almost immediately when the lights came back on. In the late '60s he hit upon the expedient of checking it with his luggage on a flight to Chicago, and has not seen it since. He has a great many children ...but to his credit, he always lets them go afterwards if they promise not to tell. He has been married twenty-seven times, to wealthy foreigners seeking U.S. citizenship (some of whom he has actually met), and indeed has no other source of income

that the police or the IRS can prove. He is not, of course, paid for his fiction (there *is*, after all, *some* justice), and occasionally creeps into print only by virtue of his incredible knack of producing stories which fit any given hole in a magazine's layout *to* the word on half an hour's notice. Unfortunately, so many editors who had time on their hands actually *read* the stuff (before word got around) and were driven to drink, that the very words "John Varley Corn" have come to be synonymous with alcohol itself.

Fortunately, none of his early stories attracted the attention of the public, perhaps because they appeared so infrequently or perhaps because they were so impenetrably dull, and he was never seriously considered for any science fiction awards.

And then, a few years ago, the single noteworthy event in his overlong undistinguished career occurred, at long last. He met me.

You see, Herb gave me this commission with the following conditions: First, I must refuse it if it would interfere with my "regular work". (Hah. It is as likely to interfere with my menstrual cycle.) Second, I could, if I chose, tell the truth about anything that had occurred since we met - but I must lie about anything that had occurred before that. (What writer could resist a job for which he's forbidden to research?)

So we have come now to the point at which I can (if I choose) tell you the truth, or some of it (certain incidents will have to remain untold until the statute of limitations has expired), and the first true thing I want to tell you about Herb Varley is this: I have never loved anyone so much on such scant acquaintance. (No matter what that woman in New Orleans told the judge.) The number of times we have been in the same room could be counted on the fingers of Django Reinhardt's left hand, and we are such prolific and faithful letter-writers that our total combined correspondence could be re-mailed with a single stamp.

(1989 update: by now Herb and I have been in the same room enough times that my wife is mildly concerned; despite this I still love him. Our correspondence rate is still such that our modems would need a baud-rate of less than 1200 bits per month to keep up, assuming Herb would use a computer in the first place.)

Nonetheless he is my brother, and I knew that even before I ever met his face, would know it even if the only communication I'd ever had with him was to read his stuff. It is no accident that the first fan-letter I ever wrote in my life was to Herb.

During the five or six years I was a book reviewer for *Galaxy*, *Destinies* and *Analog*, Herb was the *only* writer who ever wrote to thank me for a less-than-totally-favourable review, claiming to have learned something thereby. That's class. His works have on several occasions inspired my wife Jeanne to choreograph exquisite dances (something I've only pulled off once myself), and God knows they have inspired every one of us in SF to crank up our imaginations and work a little harder, in a futile attempt to keep up with him. I have a mental picture of him as the Viking-sized biker he vaguely resembles, thundering down the road of literature on his big Verb Harley, leaving the citizens in his dust.

But that's just class and style and skill and imagination: that's merely what I admire him for and envy him for. What I *love* him for - just as evident in his work - is his heart.

It is agonizingly rare, these days, to find a writer of Herb's intelligence who is not a cynical, hip, bitter, pessimistic smartass. In these twisted times, most writers whose knowledge and skill approach his seem dedicated to depressing you to the point of suicide, and most "great works" these days seem to consist of highly articulate screams of rage at God, and at our present, immensely privileged, condition. Meanwhile Herb goes blandly on, assuming that humanity's most ancient and enduring problems - death, sex, pain, war, procreation, loneliness - will, in an astonishingly short time be forgotten history; that even being utterly vanquished and dispossessed by aliens would not break

the human spirit; that one day artists will drift among the Rings composing music; that even a goddess more cruel, arbitrary and diabolically witty than the one you and I have to endure can be dealt with by responsible human-type beings; that in the end (however distant the end), intelligence and good will *might* prevail over stupidity and evil. Most of his future fictions seem like they'd be nice places to live - and, even in the grim ones, they're still trying to get it fixed.

I love him for his courage.

He and I have been collaborating on a novel for almost ten years. As of September 1985 we had produced three words - the title. It's Herb's title, and typical of him: THE FREE LUNCH. (He and I both love and honour the late Robert A. Heinlein.)


At LACon II in '85 I enjoyed one of the tastiest pleasures in a life marked by rare good fortune: it was my privilege to experience Disneyland for the first time, in the company of Herb Varley (and David Gerrold). Within an hour, inspired, I had finally produced my first tangible contribution to our collaboration - the setting and protagonist - and two days later Susan Allison of Ace Books offered us a plot that nobody was using at present, and now it's all done except for the formality of putting it into words and putting them on paper, which shouldn't take more than another five years, max. Unless something comes up. (1989 update: something, you'll be stunned to learn, came up. At this point we have a five page outline that neither of us likes a lot, and three pages of copy that I like a lot because I wrote them and Herb hasn't commented on yet. Sorry. If you want to help, buy more of our books so we can afford to spend time collaborating.) So eventually, God grant, I will know Herb better than I do now, perhaps even half as well as I want to. I sincerely hope so, and I look forward to it.

But when I come to think about it, I already know everything I need to know about him. Everything that's really important.

So, I suspect, do you.

ABOUT THE EIGHT WORLDS:

Most of Varley's short works and THE OPHIUCHI HOTLINE form a loose series, in that they are set in a common future known as the Eight Worlds. GAS GIANT, his first (unpublished) novel, set the scenario for the series by postulating the invasion of the Solar System by aliens from a Jovian-type gas giant. Not being recognized by the Invaders as intelligent, humanity is exiled from Earth, settling initially only on the Moon. Gradually, other bodies not of interest to the Invaders are reached (namely: Mercury, Venus, Mars, Titan, Titania, Triton & Pluto). A small number of humans also inhabit free space in the rings of Saturn, in symbiosis with plant organisms. Humanity is aided in its recovery by "free information" beamed via a laser which apparently originates from the star 70 Ophiuchi. Memory recording and advanced cloning techniques are two of the benefits acquired over the Ophiuchi Hotline. However, the lack of initiative required by humans to utilise this information, combined with their exile from Earth, has resulted in a society which in many respects is stagnant.

AWARDS

Between 1975 and 1981, Varley works appeared in at least one (and usually two or more) of the annual "best sf of the year" anthologies, a feat unmatched by any other writer. (He has also had works included in the 1984 and 1986 anthologies.) Over the same period, his work has been recognized by award committees as well: he has been nominated for either a Hugo or Nebula (and often both) in every year for which he has been eligible since 1976, except 1987. Bob Shaw



The first time I ever met Bob Shaw was in Melbourne at Aussiecon II. A southern belle by the name of Charlotte Proctor introduced me to him. (Charlotte is herself a well known fanzine author.) She introduced Bob by saying, "Greg, this is a good friend of mine, Bob Shaw, he likes drinking Scotch too." Well, suffice to say that anyone who has an affinity for the finer of the spirits will soon, over the bar, become a good friend of mine.

It was at this point that there came a dagger in my mind, as I realised who I had been speaking to for the past few hours or so. I tried desperately to say something intelligent but all that came out was, " Oh, that Bob Shaw!!!!!!"

Bob Shaw is a professional science fiction writer, born on the 31st December, 1931. Bob started out as a fan and in fact Tuck's *Encyclopaedia of science fiction and fantasy* mentions in passing that Bob Shaw " is also very well known in fan circles. " This is like saying that Bob Hawke is a member of the Labor party. Bob Shaw is a real fan's fan.

Bob's list of novels bears testament to his literary achievements. Novels such as *Dagger* of the mind, The Ceres solution, Ship of strangers, Orbitsville, Vertigo and many other novels and short stories.

In convention terms one of the things Bob is most famous for is his talks. Bob can natter delightfully on an assortment of topics. At Aussiecon II Bob gave one of his very best after dinner speeches. He had the diners alternatively laughing, crying and falling off chairs. The spotlight operator was broken up by fits of giggles and Bob performed an impromptu Irish jig which cracked up the assembled audience. The dinner was sold out and when Bob heard that there were fans outside that were going to miss his talk he insisted that they be allowed in. Bob's just that sort of bloke.

Finally, Bob Shaw is one of the most polite gentlemen I have ever had the pleasure of meeting and anyone who gets to his programme items at Swancon 14 has my assurance they will not be disappointed. In short, Bob Shaw is a delightful person, and not at all into being a 'big name author', despite the fact that he is one of Britain's most successful science fiction authors. (Marc Ortlieb has informed me that Bob is also one of the best selling authors in Poland, however he is unable to take the money out of Poland. One day Bob might go to Poland to spend it.)

Oh, by the way, he is partial to the a single malt scotch or two at the bar, I have that on good authority, so remember to stock up for Good Friday. He has also sampled the more traditional items of Australian cuisine, such as meat pies, lamingtons and vegemite, but I doubt they are as popular.



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








Paul J. Stevens

If you won't be able to see the edge of the stage, or can't climb onto the stage in the first place, let us know before Friday night! - 7. Best costume overall (No, not dungarees!)

NOTE: The ceiling of the main hall is quite low, so costumes <u>must</u> be no more than 7 ft (2.1 m) high.

Weapons.

Auction

Keith Curtis will be in charge of the collector's auction and it is, again, run on a cash and carry basis. Please hand in all auction items to Registration by Friday evening. Twenty percent of all proceeds bar allocated fan funds will go to Swancon 14.


Huckster's Room

The Huckster's room is situated in the James Room, next to the main convention room and will be open from 10 am to 5 pm Friday to Monday.

Sell! you this year's batch of Swancon Tawny Port. This port is a descendant of the Swancon 11 Port and will be available for \$10 per bottle in the Huckster's room. But wait, there's more! This year, after you've purchased your port you must leave the hotel and re-enter it BEFORE opening the port. It's all because of the licensing laws. Unfortunately, due to Friday being Good Friday, we are unable to sell port on that day, but orders can be taken for collection on a later day.





Weapons Policy

- 1) The carrying of any weapon, including any replica or imitation weapon, or any object considered by the security co-ordinator to be capable of causing injury or disturbance, will not be permitted at any time during the convention or at any place within the precincts of the convention with the exception of: the Grey Company panel item; the Huckster's Room where they may, with the prior permission of the security co-ordinator, be displayed as merchandise; the masquerade and the masked ball, where they may, with the prior permission of the security co-ordinator and the masquerade organisers, be carried as part of the costume; or in transit to, or from, the panel item, masked ball, masquerade or the Huckster's room. Any such item, whilst in transit, must be packaged in such a way as to prevent offense or injury to any member of the convention or of the general public.
- 2) No weapon, including any replica or imitation weapon, or any object considered by the security co-ordinator to be capable of causing injury or disturbance, will be permitted to be displayed or brandished in any way which, in the opinion of the security co-ordinator, is likely to cause offense or injury to any member of the convention or to a member of the general public.
- The Swancon14 committee, and the security co-ordinator acting as their agent, reserve the right to refuse entry, or, subsequent to entry, the right to expel from the convention and its precincts at any time, any person, or persons, carrying any weapon, including any replica or imitaion weapon, or any object considered by the security co-ordinator to be capable of causing injury or disturbance; and reserves the right to seize any such object and to hold it for such time as the person, or persons, are within the precincts of the convention. Neither the Swancon14 committee, nor the security co-ordinator acting as their agent, shall be liable for any cost, expense, loss(including consequential loss) or damage of or to any object or objects so seized, or to any object or objects held or retained by them for any reason whatsoever, arising out of or resulting from: theft; the negligence of the Swancon 14 committee or the security co-ordinator or any other person into whose possession such object or objects are given for safe keeping; or from any other cause.
- 4) The Swancon 14 committee, and the security co-ordinator acting as their agent, reserves the right to vary any of the above conditions, and to grant individual exceptions and dispensations on a case by case basis, at any time and without notice.




A Pint of GUFF

GUFF (the Get Up-and-over Fan Fund or the Going Under Fan Fund, depending on where you are standing) was founded in1979 to further contacts between the SF fan communities of Australia and Europe. It facilitates its objective by sending a popularly elected fan from one continent to a major convention on the other continent. Candidates are put up for election upon the nomination of five fans, and are voted on by interested fans who donate at least 3 dollars or 1 pound towards the winner's airfare. The candidate elected makes the trip and upon returning home administers the fund for the next two elections and fends off questions related to the publication of a trip report.

GUFF exists entirely within fandom. The money which goes towards paying the delegate's airfare is raised via voting fees, general donations, donations of convention committee surpluses and the auction books and fanzines donated to the fund. The major fund-raising activity at Swancon 14 is the AUCTION. Please come along, for as well as helping GUFF that book you've been looking for for years may be put up for auction. Among the items placed in the auction are books, magazines and fanzines related to this particular convention's guests. (And, of course, at Swancon there is always the Vegemite Shield.)

This year Roelof Goudriaan, of The Hague, The Netherlands, is attending Swancon 14 as the GUFF delegate. Roelof is known as the publisher of a Foreign Fanzine, Shards of Babel, a member of the committee that successfully bid for the 1990 Worldcon and a bad punster. (For more background informnation read Roelof's authorised biography on the following page). While it is too early to ask him about his trip report you are encouraged to go up to him and find out just why GUFF supporters were willing to pay for his airfare to travel out here. Roelof joins John Foyster(1979), Joseph Nicholas(1981), Justin Ackroyd(1984), Eve Harvey(1985) and Irwin Hirsh(1987) on the list of people who have travelled as GUFF delegates. Some of these people will be at the convention and will be happy to answer any further queries you may have about GUFF. 

My story begins with an American fan. Not a fan of America (or perhaps that too), but a science fiction fan of American extraction, who was extracted all the way to Italy. This fan, a woman by the way, received a fanzine from a European fan. (I think it's understood that this was not a fan of Europe, but a science fiction fan of European extraction. Dutch, to be exact.) The fanzine, from Roelof Goudriaan, was more than just a fanzine to the American fan - it was a Discovery.

A Discovery of European science fiction fans. United, or at least to be found collected, in *Shards of Babel*. Roelof started publishing *SoB* in the hope of communicating with fans from all corners of the world - whilst explaining to many well-meaning people that he knew what the abbreviation of his fanzine's title might mean. Roelof wanted to talk to fans from any part of the world, secure that sf fans could find something to talk about, no matter what nation they came from.

And they do. If they work at it.

Working at communicating with "fans next door" has been rewarding for Roelof. He gets letters from Russia to Japan. And quite a bit between them, travelling the <u>long</u> way round the globe. He has received Achievement Awards from Eurocons and World SF, and was Fan GoH at the 1983 OrwellCon in Antwerp, Belgium, and the 1985 Eurocon in Zagreb, Yugoslavia. He also has published several issues of the light- hearted a Foreign Fanzine, and even sold a story or two abroad for friends appearing in aFF.

British and Swedish fans who got to know Roelof have coaxed him into drawing a couple of covers for their publications - a feat he is not quite as embarrassed about as the apa-zine he once helped write whilst sampling abundantly present honey wine at German friends... I don't mean to say that his countrymen don't appreciate his talents, because they do. In his Homeland, he chaired a Beneluxcon, and put in two years of labour for the 1990 WorldCon.

Roelof can be cuddly and mischievous, quite a conversationalist who can both party and fall asleep at the oddest hours. Also, he likes travelling. Fandom has spoilt him: winning GUFF is the ultimate example, of course.

In the mean time, Roelof has discontinued *aFF* and is still musing about a replacement. Nothing urgent though; he's happy right now, glueing and cutting and oohing and aahing over *SoB 27*, with occasional help. He's got a partner now, an American woman, imported by way of Italy. They're crazy about each other because fans do have something to talk about. No matter where they come from.


He is fortunate to be travelling Down Under with Eileen Gunn, a respected new sf writer with a growing reputation on her native shores. It is our good fortune as well.



or Things to see, people to do.

For those convention members who would like to see more of Western Australia than the convention hotel, Perth holds a rich variety of easily accessible tourist attractions. Topping the list is Kings Park. This huge, natural bush park overlooks the Central Business District of Perth. The park has large areas suitable for picnics, nature walks and just plain relaxation. Push bikes, including tandems, are available for hire near the Kings Park Restaurant. Public transport to and from Kings Park is available. Ring Transperth on 221 1211.

Also situated in the Perth business area are the Western Australian Museum (328 4411), Art Gallery of Western Australia (328 7233) and the SciTech Discovery Centre (481 5789). Both the Museum and the Art Gallery are featuring special exhibits during the convention weekend. The museum exhibit is entitled "First Impressions: The British Discovery of Australia" and has received rave reviews so far. At the Art Gallery you will find "Captain James Cook - Navigator". Both institutes have some fascinating permanent exhibitions; the museum's collection of meteorites may be of special interest. Please note that the Captain Cook exhibition closes on March 28th. Access to these cultural centres is easily available from the Convention Hotel. New walkways have just been opened which link the centres of Perth to Northbridge and the Perth Cultural Centre.

The SciTech Discovery Centre was opened in 1988. Situated at City West, the centre is reached by train journey from the Perth Railway Station, catch a Fremantle bound train from the railway station and alight at the first stop (City West). Across the road from the train station you will see a large, cream coloured building. SciTech is situated on the first floor. Booking is highly advisable on weekends, as the centre has proved very popular since opening.

The basic thesis of the centre is "The Fun of Finding Out". Exhibits are designed as "hands on" learning experience based around a theme such as sound, the brain, colour/light/music, and contains such experiences as the laser tunnel, the gyro seat, the distorted room and the "do-it-yourself" sun painting.

Also housed in City West is Western Australia's one and only Omni Theatre! This amazing three hundred and sixty degree cinematic wonder has to be seen and experienced to believe. Currently showing is the film SPEED, concerned with artificial motion and speed. Booking is strongly advised!

Across the Swan River and easily accessible by ferry or bus (contact Transperth for details) is Perth Zoo. The zoo has recently updated many of its enclosures, in particular the Great Cats, the Otters and Tricia the Elephant have all been moved to large grass filled homes. (If you'd seen their earlier homes you'd realise how important these new homes are.) The zoo's telephone number is 367 7988.

For those who think they're the lucky type the Burswood Casino (362 7777) may be the place. Situated just outside the Central Perth area, the casino is open twenty four hours a day. There is a tram service from the Casino through the central Business District to Kings Park. Ring the Casino for details.

Further afield, we find Western Australia's chief port, Fremantle. Many of Fremantle's buildings are still in their original nineteeth century state. Whilst its myriad attractions are too numerous to list here, special mention must be made of the Fremantle Markets, Fremantle Museum and in particular the Western Australian Maritime Museum. Once you get to Fremantle, regular tours are conducted via the "Fremantle Tram", in actuality a bus which has two tours, "History Trail" and "Harbour Sights". For further information about the tours, what to see in Fremantle and how to get there phone the Fremantle branch of the Holiday WA Center (on 430 5555).

Finally, let's mention the delights of Rottnest Island. This is Perth's and WA's "get away from it all " holiday paradise. Situated just off the coast, regular boat and plane trips are made to "Rotto" as locals call it. Rottnest is an ideal place for swimming, walking or seeing the Quokka, an animal native to the island. Accommodation ranges from camping sites, self service cottages to the Rottnest Hotel and the Rottnest Lodge. Information about the Island and how to get there is available from the Rottnest Island Ferries and Information Service (325 6033).

There are many more fascinating places for visitors to see in WA, most a couple of hours' distance or further afield. For information please contact Holiday WA, 772 Hay Street Perth, (322 2999).



Eating Out
