UNICON IV

SOME GENERAL INFORMATION

To properly explain the notion of a Science Fiction Convention, a little should be first explained about Science Fiction Fandom. It is a world-wide non-organization which has been growing steadily from its early beginnings in the twenties. By fandom, we mean the many readers of science fiction who, by way of the amateur publications or the many conventions now held, have built up an international communications system which is probably unequalled by followers of any other literary genre. In the early days readers communicated via the letter columns in the pulp magazines, criticising the stories and then writing to one another. Eventually many readers started publishing their own duplicated magazines to air their views, and some went on to become professionally involved with sf writing, editing and publishing.

In time, groups of these people decided to get together and talk about their interests, meet the authors and see displays of books and artwork related to SF and the associated genre of Fantasy. Since then SF Conventions have become popular all over the world and whether they are small gatherings or WorldCons, the format remains much the same. The authors, illustrators and editors are the stars, sc to speak, and many of the sessions will be the discussion of the work of a particular writer, panels and round-table discussions on "How to plot your way out of a paper bag," or "Building your own design for a world", meetings of Comics enthusiasts or sword-and-sorcery fans, or on the problem of writing a story to fit in with the background set up in earlier stories. There are often films, usually auctions of books and artwork, manuscripts and memorabilia, and sometimes banquets at which awards are given to the best work of the year.

UNICON IV is the 17th National SF Convention to be held in Australia, and also the fourth in a yearly series of conventions run by University SF Associations around Australia. It is the second convention to be run under the auspices of MUSFA, the Melbourne University Science Fiction Association, who were responsible for the eminently successful UNICON II in 1975 in Melbourne.

As a glance at the Programme will tell you, Unicon IV can rightly be called a Science Fiction Film Festival. Ten major sf films and several shorts will be shown during the convention. Films expected to be shown include: - Clockwork Orange, Dark Star, Sleeper, 8½, The Man Who Fell To Earth, Silent Running, Flesh Gordon, Monty Python & The Holy Grail, Slaughterhouse 5, a tinted print of 'Metropolis' and Star Trek shorts.

EASTER EGG HUNT

One of the highlights of Saturday afternoon will be the UNICON IV

Easter Egg Hunt, "for the young and the old, for the tall and the small and the inbetween."

Easter Eggs will be hidden around the grounds and of course there will be a special prize for the ones who find the right type of Easter Egg... More details later.

UNICON IV is special in that as the National Convention, it is where the DITMAR awards are given, the main yearly awards of enthusiasts, as opposed to the writers, of the field. Everyone who is a member of the convention at the time of balloting, about one month before the convention, may vote in the various categories of award for the best fiction, amateur publication and critical writing of the year. Accompanying this Progress Report is a Nomination Form Blank with further details concerning the definition of awards categories.

Science Fiction, long the literature of the future, is now the literature of the moment, especially in Australia More SF is now being published than any other single genre, and alongside the American magazines are now a number of Australian publications, anthologies and novels as well as magazines, and Unicon IV is very much a celebration of that fact.



GUEST OF HONOUR

Brian W. Aldiss should need little introduction to science fiction readers. Winner of both the Nebula and Hugo awards, he is highly respected in science fiction and literary circles for his novels and shorter work. Brian Aldiss was recently voted "Best Contemporary Author" by the membership of the National Australian SF Convention, and it is an award which he has lived up to.


Publications soon to see the light of day in Australia are: 'A Rude Awakening', the third "Horatio Stubbs" novel; 'Last Orders', a short-story collection; and 'Brothers Of The Head', an out-size publication with illustrations by Ian Pollock.

Over a period of approximately the last twenty years, Brian Aldiss has produced many fine novels, among which are such as 'The Malachia Tapestry', 'The Eighty Minute Hour' and the Hugo-winning collection of short stories combined into the novel, 'Hothouse'. As well as many collections of short stories (The Saliva Tree; Space, Time and Nathaniel; etc.) he is the editor of the 'Decade' series - a look at the fiction of the forties, fifties, sixties - he has edited 'Billion Year Spree', a critical look at science fiction as a whole. Mr Aldiss is an experienced speaker at conventions in Britain and Europe, and is to be Guest of Honour at the 1979 World SF Convention in London. This is to be his first visit to Australia, an appearance long overdue.

Our Special Guest - Roger Zelazny

Like the Guest of Honour, Mr Zelazny has been writing for approximately twenty years, and in that time he has been the winner several times of both the Hugo and Nebula awards. Guest of Honour at the 1974 World Con, his most recent and yet-to-be-finished work is the 'Amber'series of novels, a major undertaking of four books - to date. His first published short story - 'A Rose For Ecclesiastes' was a nominee for the Hugo award, and since then he has been the author of many short stories and some of his best known novels include 'Lord Of Light', 'Creatures Of Light And Darkness' and the more recent 'Bridge Of Ashes' and 'Doorways In The Sand'. Closely associated with the Australian bid for the World Con in 1975, this will be his first visit to Australia, and we welcome his presence.

MASQUERADE/PARTY



The Masquerade on the Saturday night of the convention will be a very relaxed affair. The theme of the evening shall be 'After The Holocaust', and it's hoped that all will attend in costume. A light show and street theatre will help things along, and for those who like prizes The Paul Stevens Show - Pick-A-Box will provide plenty of entertainment. There will be special encouragements for those who turn up in costume, and an extra-special prize for the Best Costume of the evening.

AUCTION/ART SHOW

The Great Unicon Auction Parts I & II will take place on Saturday & Sunday mornings during the film sessions, and already books, rare editions of magazines and other memorabilia are being stockpiled for auction. Save up your money and support our Australian artists; artwork on display during the convention may be offered up for sale during the auction; Leigh Edmonds has also threatened to put up some of his unusual model for sale. In any case, it should be worth turning up to see what's for sale.
