

me and ISAAC ASIMOV

Let me begin by quoting a well-known writer of science fiction and science popularizations: "Isaac Asimov is a national resource!" He is also witty, urbane, striking(for one of his height), generous and extremely modest. I'm proud of my influence on him.

(You see, we sf writers never let contradictory facts ruin a good story. Anyhow, Isaac lives just around the corner from me and is much heavier and somewhat younger than I am. Besides, he has a charming and strangely devoted wife whom I'd hate to displease.)

Most readers consider Isaac one of the real old-time writers of sf, his first story having appeared in January, 1939 (not quite a year later than my first). After some early efforts, he discovered his famous three laws of positronic servility and established himself as a writer about robots. (Modesty forbids mentioning who has written more robot stories.) As an acknowledged writer, he realized that writers—even encyclopedia writers—should take over the galaxy, and he invented psychohistory. His resulting Foundation stories made him famous, despite the fact that he copped out in the middle of the series when he couldn't locate the secret of the Second Foundation. (For 20 years, my reticence kept me from telling him where it was.

Meanwhile, to justify his self-appellation of "the good doctor", he obtaine a Ph.D. in biochemistry, since it was felt that his work on the endochronic properties of resublimated thiotimoline adeqately compensated for his other research.

Upon obtaining his degree, he moved to Boston, away from those who had known his humble beginnings. But he continued to write. His first science fiction book was published in 1950 (more than a year later than my first). Thereafter, he became a compulsive--some say expulsive--writer, and has since produced some 150 books, many of which are not autobiographical at all. He has been recognized by a Nebula Award and three Hugos. (The last, which I placed in his hands in Toronto, was won without the need of public pleading or tears, which I feel does him particular credit.)

He has developed a singular reputation as a public speaker and TV personali (It is with humility I admit to having encouraged that by choosing to make him toastmaster at a 1950 regional con as his first public appearance. But how could I have known?) He has also become a prolific writer of introductions to almost anything. (In fact, it was he who taught me all I know about writing introductions such as this!)

But Isaac has never forgotten his beginnings as a science fiction writer or his achievement as a letterhack under the name of Asenion. Any admirer can feel free to address him informally as Dr. Asimov, and he is still willing to share his time with the eager fans—especially with femfans.

I can think of no one more worthy to be chosen as a guest of honor. (Well--almost no one.) I'm delighted to pay suitable tribute to him.

Boskone Down The Ages

There seems to be a rule that science fiction conventions must have portmanteau names. No doubt it is a corollary to the rule that there must be science fiction conventions, and naturally the place where they are held has to be indicated somehow.

Equally naturally, fans from the Boston area have their standards somewhat elevated by the fact; their convention name not only locates them but makes it clear that they are science fiction fans. While there is no real evidence that Edward E. Smith, creator of the original Council of Boskone, had this city in mind when he coined the name, and therefore no formal charges of conspiracy have been filed, the fit is obviously too perfect to have been due to chance alone.

The first Boskone, furthermore, took place in 1941, only a couple of years after the first published word of the Council. A couple of dozen fans repeated the event in the following two years, skipped 1944, repeated in 1945, and then...? Well, remember what happened to Jarnevon.

But there were survivors, or perhaps decendants. Twenty years later the Council--pardon, the Con--reappeared, and since 1965 it has been a regular event (in fact, there were two of them in 1966).

In these days when science fiction is taken so earnestly, analyzed so carefully for its social significance, and taught in college courses, it would seem that some equally serious analysis of the reason for Conventions should be made. We hereby report that this has been done.



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

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30 FIRST ANNUAL NESFA... SCIENCE FICTION STORD CONTEST

Rules

- 1. The contest is open to all amateur writers who are residents of New England or members of the New England Science Fiction Association. An amateur is defined as someone who has never sold a work of fiction.
- 2. Stories must be the original work of the person entering them, must be less than 7,500 words long, and must fall into the catagory of science fiction or fantasy.
- 3. An entry fee of 500 per story will be charged to defray expenses of the contest.
- 4. Stories must be typed in black, double spaced, on one side of $8\frac{l_2}{2}$ x ll white paper. Title of the story should appear at the center top of the first page, and the top left corner of each subsequent page. Writer's name should NOT appear on the manuscript, but should appear on a separate cover sheet along with the writer's address and the title of the story. Manuscripts will be given an entry number on receipt, and will be identified by this until the final judging is complete.
- 5. Although all reasonable precautions will be taken to prevent loss of manuscripts while in our hands, NESFA cannot be responsible for such losses. For your own protection, keep a copy of your manuscript.
- 6. Each manuscript must be accompanied by a self addressed, stamped, envelope for its return.
- 7. Entries should be mailed to NESFA Box G, MIT Branch PO, Cambridge, Mass. 02139, and must be postmarked prior to midnight, 31 October, 1974.
- 8. Results of the contest will be announced at the Boskone Science Fiction Convention to be held at the Sheraton Boston Hotel on Feb. 28-Mar. 2, 1975. The winners will be awarded a plaque and an inscribed book.
- 9. All manuscripts will be returned to the authors during March, 1975. All rights to the stories remain with the authors.
- 10. Any entry that does not conform to these rules will be returned to the author and the entry fee will be refunded. In all cases the decision of the judges will be final.

Reproduction of these rules is authorized and encouraged, providing the wording is followed exactly.
