We hope that fans will be available to talk about their fanzines or to SMOF, artists to discuss their work, and editors to hold forth on a wide variety of subjects. We've arranged to have many authors autograph their books, and we'll be setting up a special Hucksters' area where you can buy a book for someone to sign. Don't be shy; do come and enjoy.

Remember, we have TWO Hucksters' Rooms this year: the Tara Grand North, and the Marriott Springfield Room. Check them both out!

Those who ordered Banquet tickets in advance of the con can pick them up at Registration. There may be a few more Banquet tickets available (probably for chicken entrees, \$17); please check with the Banquet table in Registration (Tara King George Room). A special prize will be given away in a drawing (for banquet attendees only) during the banquet. Also, Grand C & D in the Marriott will be open for non-banqueters to watch the Awards Ceremony and Guest of Honor Speech by Greg Bear starting after the Banquet on Saturday (around 9pm).

Help needed! Your convention doesn't run by itself -- everyone you see working (as well as those you don't see, who labor behind the scenes) is a volunteer. Boskone always needs lots of people to keep moving, and this can include you! You don't need any experience to work on a convention. The work is fun, and makes you a part of the convention. Our volunteers are called gophers. Those gophers who work 8 hours or more will receive as a special thank-you in the form of a Boskone XXV gopher t-shirt with artwork by Bob Eggleton. Stop by the Tara Suffolk Room to volunteer.

Hotel Information: The walkway between the hotels is planned to be open from 9am-2am Friday and Saturday and 9am-4pm on Sunday. (It may be closed earlier if usage is low.) The Food Court on the second floor of the Mall closes at 5:30pm Saturday. The Mall is closed on Sunday, except for the walkway.

The Marriott Snack Bar will be open Friday 6pm-11pm, Saturday 9am-2pm and 6pm-11pm, and Sunday 9am-2pm. Lucky's serves a Continental breakfast on Sunday from 8am-noon, and the Superbowl pre-game starts at 3pm. Albert's Breakfast Buffet runs from 7am-11am Saturday and 7am-10:30am Sunday. There is a Sunday brunch from 11am-2pm; there is heavy local usage and reservations are not taken. Dinner specials will be extended until closing Friday and Saturday nights ... The Sheraton Sunday Brunch (\$16.95) runs from 10am-2pm; it also has heavy local usage, but does take reservations. The Sheraton Upper Crust Restaurant has a dress code.

More Hotel Information: The Sheraton conducts room checks in the early afternoon to make sure you're alive. We strongly suggest keeping your "Do Not Disturb" signs out if you don't want to be disturbed.

Back stairs in the Sheraton can't be used between floors I and 4 due to self-locking doors; they can be used above 5. The Sheraton pool is not finished yet, but steam rooms, exercise equipment, and racquet ball courts are available. The Marriott pool is open to Marriott guests only from 9am-10pm.

We extend our apologies for the early closing of the walkway last night. We had an agreement with both hotels and Baystate West that the walkway would stay open late, and they had arranged this with the Monarch Place building management. Unfortunately, the word never got to the guard company responsible for the building so they felt they had to lock up at the normal time. At this time, we can't be sure whether the walkway will be open past 6pm tonight, but senior management of both hotels are working to solve this problem.

Some of the stalls in the Food Hall of the Baystate Mall are willing to stay open on Saturday beyond their normal 5:30pm closing time as long as there are people waiting to be fed. This is

contingent on the walkway problem being solved.

Our thanks to all the VIPs who attended the Meet-the-VIPs party last night. Your fans really enjoyed the chance to meet and talk with you.

Please pick up your pre-paid Banquet tickets at Registration before the area closes at 3pm.

Otherwise, they will be available just before the Banquet at the door. There are no more banquet tickets available. The <u>first 20 people</u> who are signed up on the waiting list will get tickets; please pick them up as soon as possible. Remember, the after-banquet events will be open to all around 9pm.

Tonight, in addition to the Banquet, Awards Ceremony, and Guest-of-Honor speeches, we are happy to present a new (for Boskone) event: The Kirk Poland Memorial Bad Prose Contest at 10pm in the Tara. This item was originated by Eric Van for ReaderCon, where it was moderated hilariously by Craig Shaw Gardner ("...they took so long to die..."). Craig will read a bunch of the worst-written passages in the history of SF. None are identified, and each ends in mid-sentence (often mid-metaphor). A group of alternate endings are then read, one written in advance by each of our panelists, as well as the heretofore top-secret real ending. The audience votes for the ending they think is genuine. Panelists get a point for each poor fan they fool, while the audience earns a point for each fan who gets it right. Come and try it; we think you'll like it!

Please check out the Foyer area of the Marriott Grand Ballroom. The deadline for entering the Trivia Bowl has also been extended. Sign up at Information. Depending on the number of teams entered, some of the early rounds this afternoon may be cancelled.

Because of all the changes in the Boskone format, we are especially interested in getting your feedback on Boskone XXV. Boskone Questionnaires (salmon color) are now available at Information and the third floor of the Tara. You can turn them in at Information, or mail them to us after the convention (preferably by February 15).

Boskone XXVI is planned to be HERE on January 27-29, 1989. The Guest of Honor will be Tim Powers and the Official Artist is James Gurney. Memberships are \$24 at the NESFA table in the

(Tara) Hucksters' Room.

Why You Shouldn't Go Up to Go Down:

We all know that elevators at conventions can be extremely frustrating. It is unfortunate that the Marriott has function rooms on the sixth floor and that there are only three elevators. To make matters worse, the Marriott elevators tend to hunt in packs. The result is that you wait for several minutes for an elevator and then several arrive in a row.

Many fen call an elevator and then take the next one that arrives even if it is going in the ward direction. As a result, elevators are often full with people who are just taking up space. This does not save time. The elevator will have to return to the floor you originated on before going to your destination. Since the elevator is more crowded for the people going in the opposite direction, it takes longer for people to get in and out of the elevator, and therefore the elevators take longer to go up and down.

The second biggest problem with over-crowded elevators is that they break. Please don't cram every last person into the elevators. They are just machines. They won't last. If everybody follows

"Elevator Etiquette" we can all have a pleasant time,
