





AN APPRECIATION OF JOHN SCALZI

ANS KEEP TALKING ABOUT JOHN SCALZI'S meteoric rise in science fiction. Well, that word "rise" is just wrong. Dude, if you're around for a meteor's *rise*, your planet has just exploded.

But it's certainly true that the guy's like some literary meteorite that streaked into view within the last decade or so. And that with retrospectively astonishing velocity, he's grounded himself in our field with an impact (hey, this metaphor is really working!) that's changed the climate of the SF world.

Scalzi's Old Man's War (2005) and its series sequels display a Heinleinian authority, a Haldemanly grit, and a uniquely Scalzian wit that have made military SF cool. His links with the media world — he was creative consultant to TV's *Stargate: Universe*, has a movie deal for *OMW* at Paramount, and once proposed to Laura Dern — have helped build bridges between SF page and screen. As current President of the Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America (SFWA), he's promoted an ambitious agenda to improve the SFF biz. And the Internet profile he's constructed since 1998, principally on his focal point blog *Whatever*, has given him what the online *Encyclopedia of Science Fiction* has called "perhaps the most influential presentation of a public face possessed by any current science fiction writer."

To top it all off, he's showing that face around here as this year's Boskone Guest of Honor.

I've only met him twice, briefly. However, like 45,000 other fans, I'm certain I know him better than anyone else alive from reading his books and virtually snorting his blog. So as you encounter him around the con at panel, party, barstool, or bathroom, here are some things to keep in mind about John Michael Scalzi II.

He's formidable.

Behind that playful facade lurks ... well, kind of a goofball, as he admits himself. But behind *that* lurks a really keen mind. He's got a degree in philosophy from the University of Chicago, people. And in verbal combat,

his riposte is like unto *Kung Fu Panda*'s Sword of Heroes, said to be so sharp that you can get cut just by looking at — OW! Plus Scalzi's written two editions of *The Rough Guide to the Universe*. Which means the guy knows, like, everything, right?

So if you're thinking of crossing blades with him in a con suite symposium on (David) Weber versus Wittgenstein, mind your manners. That's just good sense around certain authors anyway. As Scalzi says, "Don't annoy science fiction writers. These are people who destroy entire planets before lunch."

He's hilarious. If you like that sort of thing.

At the Boston Worldcon in 2004, my sister Darcy came back from a program item where she'd encountered a new writer named Scalzi. "He's funnier than you are," she reported, still giggling unbecomingly.

A few hours later, tearstains drying on my tie, I moderated a movie panel alongside this vile *arriviste*. Was it there that Scalzi said, "A name like Grima Wormtongue should have been a tipoff ... Little known fact: Theoden's previous advisor was named Pervert McTraitorpants"? Or "The Jedi look like they dressed for their local Renaissance Faire in the dark"? Or, about the film version of *The League of Extraordinary Gentlemen*, "See, this is why steampunks can't have nice things"?

Actually no, he said most of these later, as he clawed his way to the top of SF's laugh ladder to hang out with Connie Willis, Terry Pratchett, and the smiling ghosts of William Tenn and Douglas Adams.

He's a performance artist.

Harlan Ellison used to do a stunt where he'd write a short story in one afternoon while sitting on display in a store window. Scalzi *lives* in that window. Blogging nearly every day for the last 13 $\frac{1}{2}$ years, he's typed his daily life into a work of art.

Such is his skill at serving up varied content in a friendly, funny, trendy, intensely readable style that we're fascinated to learn the cats are bored. He tells us how lucky he feels on his wedding anniversary, how sad he is when his wife's dog dies, how proud he is when his daughter outsnarks him. He shares his low opinion of the Creation Museum ("Imagine, if you will, a load of horseshit"); his memories of growing up poor; his instinct to listen instead of lecture about white privilege; his affection for 80s Brit synthpop, Coke Zero, or *Scott Pilgrim vs. the World*; and the time that he decided to ink smiley faces onto his toenails because hey, happy feet.

Of course, being GOH at a con demands yet another type of performance. Expect Scalzi to give great guest.

He loves to experiment.

Few authors of military SF series could be described as experimentally minded. But Scalzi certainly qualifies. The world is a big playroom, and Scalzi wants to try out *lots* of the toys.

He seeks the shock of the new in everything from literary style to distribution channel. The God Engines and The Sagan Diary are both short works that experiment with tone: Diary especially is a prose poem about the sweet self-sacrifice of love. (Granted, it's the love of a killer cloneborg for a greenskinned septuagenarian, but modern life gets complicated.) His first-written novel Agent to the Stars went up on the net as free shareware. He apparently wrote my personal favorite of his books, The Android's Dream, to see if you could pull off an exciting thriller about an interstellar diplomatic incident that began with homicidal flatulence. (Turns out you can if you're Scalzi.) He edited METAtropolis, the first shared world anthology to begin life as an audiobook. His latest novel, New York Times bestseller Fuzzy Nation, is a reboot, of all things - just for the helluvit! - of a classic H. Beam Piper story. You've got to figure his next book will be in keitai shousetsu (Japanese cell phone novel) format ...

Because you know what, my friends? Somehow, wonderfully, this is one meteorite that's still in motion.

Bob Devney is a Boston-area fan, and a big loser. (Of the Hugo Award for Best Fan Writer. Eight times.)





Dan dos Santos






Scholastic Books, The Greenwich Workshop, Penguin Books, Random House, Tor books, UpperDeck, Wizards of the Coast, and DC Comics.





Toni Weisskopf

ONI WEISSKOPF IS THE PUBLISHER OF Baen Books and has been involved in science fiction fandom for many years, as well. Weisskopf lived in Brooklyn, New York, during her childhood, and then at age twelve moved to Huntsville,

Alabama, where she spent her teen years.

"When I was a kid, we lived just down the street from the Brooklyn Museum and the main branch of the Brooklyn Public Library, which gave me an undying appreciation for beaux arts architecture," says Weisskopf. "Then my father, who is an astrophysicist, took a job at NASA in Huntsville, where he became the project scientist for the Chandra X-ray Observatory, the world's most powerful X-ray telescope." Weisskopf was a voracious reader from a young age, but claims she didn't gravitate to science fiction until she came across H. Beam Piper's *Little Fuzzy*, which, she says, "flipped a trigger in me," and science fiction became her main literary love. At the same time, Weisskopf began to develop an independent and self-reliant streak early on that has carried over into her present life and philosophy.

"I was a reader, but I was also the girl who carried a knife at school. You weren't supposed to, of course, not in Brooklyn public schools, but the teachers all knew I had it and when they needed scissors there I was with my Swiss Army knife," she recalls.

Weisskopf left Huntsville to attend Oberlin College where she became president of the local science fiction club. At

Oberlin, she found another long-term interest in her life: putting out fanzines.

"Fanzines really did anticipate the internet," says Weisskopf. "There were no boundaries. You could talk intelligently about science fiction no matter how old you were, if you were a girl, or housebound. I'd like to say there were fewer flame wars, but there weren't. It was just slower. It was, though, more likely to nurture longer, more thoughtful pieces."

After college, Weisskopf was certain she wanted to get into science fiction professionally, and she went about the task with her customary persistence.

"In my senior year I went around to all the East Coast conventions and handed people my resume at parties," Weisskopf recalls. "I think I cornered Betsy Mitchell at a Tor party and gave it to her. Betsy was Senior Editor with Jim Baen at Baen Books. Not long after that, they called up and offered me a job."

Weisskopf worked her way up at Baen, first as editorial assistant, then production assistant. And then, when Mitchell left, she stepped in as editor.

"Betsy and Jim were both very generous in training new people. One of the nicest things that Jim did was to arrange for me to speak to Robert Heinlein on the phone. I was floating!"

With Weisskopf as executive editor through the nineties and early 2000s, Baen became become known as a source for story-driven science fiction, a bastion of compelling, well-crafted tales in the tradition of such venues as John W. Campbell's *Astounding* magazine. Writers such as David Weber, with his Honor Harrington series, Lois McMaster Bujold and her Vorkosigan saga, John Ringo, and Eric Flint got their start at Baen. Lately, Baen has had a run of a breakout bestsellers from relative newcomer Larry Corriea and his hard-hitting urban fantasy Monster Hunter series.

After Jim Baen died in 2006, Weisskopf took over as publisher at Baen.

"We have two important things going for us at Baen: reaction time and editorial independence," says Weisskopf. "Baen has the scheduling flexibility to bring a title out faster than most of the other large science fiction lines — all of which are part of giant international mega-corporations. Editorial independence speaks for itself. Part of that, though, is not just being able to select the kinds of books we think will work for our readers, but also the ability to decide in what format to bring out a particular book without reference to anything but what's best for that book. Which, by the way, is one reason we've got a thriving ebook program that's been ongoing for nearly fifteen years."

Weisskopf is not only a science fiction publishing professional, but also a long-time force in SF fandom and counts many fans among her personal friends. She's history's first winner of the triple crown of SF fandom in the Southern United States, the Phoenix, the Rebel, and the (infamous) Rubble awards.

"Science fiction fandom is an incredibly neat thing, a cultural phenomenon unique to the twentieth and now the twenty-first, century, an amorphous bundle of splendid contradictions," she says. "I'm very happy, and very proud, to be a part of it."

Weisskopf's future plans for Baen include a new on-line game she is launching called Planet Baen.

"We're going to pay you for playing by letting you earn free ebooks," Weisskopf says. "It's a win-win proposition for gamers who also love to read."

Baen Books' ebook site Baenebooks.com, with its unique monthly subscription service, was a pioneer in the ebook revolution and continues to grow by leaps and bounds. And, of course, Baen continues to put out new work by its stable of authors as well as to introduce new writers to the Baen audience. Recent new offerings include Robert Buettner's Orphan's Legacy series, which has been favorably compared to Heinlein at his best, and Robert Conroy's fascinating what-if World War II alternate histories.

"Working with great authors is one of the serious perks of the job," says Weisskopf, "but you'd get more job satisfaction drawing intricate designs on cats' claws than editing if you think you can 'control' an author's work. Heck, a lot of the time, authors can't control their own magic — and creating a brilliant story is a magical thing, have no doubt. What I can do, and what I enjoy doing, is creating the proper home for a great story when it comes along and then making sure that story can find its audience. It's not about control. It's more like matchmaking."

In the non-fiction area he may be best known for his "Chaos Manor" magazine columns on the computer field (in *Byte* magazine 1982 to 2006) and thereafter in his weblog. He has also written a number of books and manuals on using computers and software.

He has written a considerable body of SF both solo and in collaboration with Larry Niven, Roland Green, Michael Flynn, and Steven Barnes. Some of his earlier works were published under the pseudonym of Wade Curtis.

Jerry's also a long-time science fiction fan, active in the Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society (LASFS).


He has described himself as being "somewhere to the right of Genghis Khan" however, as part of his doctoral thesis, he developed a two-dimensional chart — the Pournelle Chart — to identify political beliefs. He also articulated the following law —

Pournelle's Iron Law of Bureaucracy: in any bureaucratic organization there will be two kinds of people — those who work to further the actual goals of the organization, and those who work for the organization itself. In all cases, the second type of person will always gain control of the organization, and will always write the rules under which the organization functions.

Science Speaker for the 49th Boskone. You can drill down a long way in any of these topics and he'll be right there with you, interested in the details.

The brain chemistry of deception. Drum Shopping in Cairo. Hand-crafted bitters. *Sous-vide* machines at home. Around the world trips. Frequent Flyer programs. Hash function design competitions. The Electronic Privacy Information Center. The best food markets in Touraine.

See what I mean? He gets interested in something and the next thing you know, he learns a lot about it, or goes and does it, or he writes a book about it, as when he wrote the still-classic *Applied Cryptography* or his just-beingpublished *Liars and Outliers*, where he amalgamates over a dozen disciplines into a theory that explains how we prevent societal parasites from ruining it for everyone. Or he's moved to France and started cooking rabbit in blood sauce. Or he's imported buffalo grass vodka from Poland.

Rochester, NY. — He was graduated from U of R. D&D. — He has played in the same game, with the same players and rules, since 1981. They believe theirs is the longest running game in the world.

And he's always, always interested in food. If it's exotic, he's considered trying it. On a safari trip to South Africa, we ate over a dozen kinds of hoofed stock. In China we had CONTINUED >


