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## Gary K. Wolf – a short biography

Gary K. Wolf grew up an only child in Earlville, Illinois, a small farming town where his father ran the pool hall. He wanted to be the world's best pool player when he grew up and was on his way to that goal when, at 10, he was beating the hustlers. Wagers were made and money exchanged hands but, when he won, he got a grape soda. When his mother realized what was going on, he then had the time to get a delivery job, thus increasing his monetary remuneration.

Wolf worked as a farm laborer to pay his way through the University of Illinois. He sometimes worked with Mexican migrant laborers, and was often mistaken for one because of his dark tan. Wolf graduated with a B.S. in Advertising and an M.S. in Communications and Psycholinguistics. His education and later work in advertising has helped him in screen writing where you have to get it quick, with no mistakes, and combine various viewpoints into something acceptable to a wide audience. He spent six years as an Air Force officer doing public relations for the Electronic Systems Division and the Cambridge Research Laboratories. CRL did pure research in such areas as crystallography, lasers, alpha and beta waves, microwave physics, and telepathy. It was during this time that he began (though did not finish) his first short story. While combat news reporting for 18 months with the Fifth Air Commando Squadron in Vietnam, Wolf got a lot of his ideas about superheroes. He also learned a distrust of the government.

For the next 12 years, he wrote advertising for high technology companies. Wolf's third novel, *The Resurrectionist*, is dedicated to one company president who was very helpful to him in the area of technology. In his spare time during those years, he wrote all of his short stories and published novels.

With the success of *Who Censored Roger Rabbit*? Gary Wolf became a full time novelist and screen writer.

### George Alec Effinger

George Alec Effinger was born in Cleveland, Ohio, in 1947. He discovered the works of Heinlein, Norton, Asimov, and Clarke one momentous day in grade school, when he went into the Memorial Branch of the Cleveland Public Library and turned right, thus bumping into the science fiction section. Who can say what his life would have been like if, when he'd turned right, he'd found nurse novels or dog stories instead?

In any event, he rapidly got older and attended Yale, where a chemistry course disabused him of the notion of becoming a doctor. Wellread, thoughtful, and curious, he was totally unfit for any sort of gainful employment. He had the opportunity to meet many of his sf idols through his first wife, who was Damon Knight and Kate Wilhelm's babysitter. With Damon and Kate's encouragement, Effinger began writing science fiction in 1970 and had a certain amount of early success.

This was one of life's cruel jests, however, because in rapid succession he was nominated for and lost a Nebula Award, (for *What Entropy Means to Me*), a Hugo Award (for his third published short story, "All the Last Wars at Once"), and the John W. Campbell Award for Best New Science Fiction Writer. He thus became the first sf writer in history to lose all three awards. Since then he has also lost a Hugo in the novelette category (for "The City on the Sand"), another short story Hugo and Nebula (both for "The Aliens Who Knew, I Mean, Everything"), and both Nebula and Hugo for When Gravity Fails.

Maybe he just can't take a hint, because despite everything he persevered. At last the Powers That Be rewarded his obstinacy by bestowing both the Nebula and Hugo Awards for his novelette, "Schrödinger's Kitten," which was also named the winner of the 1989 Theodore Sturgeon Memorial Award, given to the year's best work of short fiction.

His most recently published novel is *A Fire in the Sun*, the sequel to *When Gravity Fails*. He has just completed *The Exile Kiss*, the third book in that series. He has also finished *Circuit's Edge* for Infocom, a computer role-playing game based on the world of *When Gravity Fails*. Later this year he'll be working on a novelization of Infocom's bestselling Zork trilogy of interactive fiction games.

He has lived in New Orleans since 1972, primarily because he never wants to see snow again. He is active in local fandom, and can usually be seen at conventions twisting up a storm on the dance floor. He has

often been heard to mutter that all of his life's problems would be solved if he looked like Errol Flynn, sounded like James Mason, and could fly. He has been a Cleveland Indians fan since the age of 7, and this has made the notion of life in an ozone-depleted, energy hungry, post-cataclysmic age somewhat easier to bear.

Program book bios are usually a way of embarrassing your friends by telling scurrilous tales (plausible, if not true) about their misdeeds. It's difficult to do that to Con†Stellation's Artist Guest of Honor because Debbie Hughes is a pretty nice person. But I'll try anyway.

I met Debbie through Mark Maxwell, her SO. Although Debbie, like many artists, is a somewhat shy retiring person (Hi, Kevin) — well, maybe not that shy — she's a lot of fun to be with. Partially that's because Debbie is a very attractive woman (not only plausible but true!), but largely it's because she likes people. That means she could never be considered a stereotypical fan (you know — the socially inept technonerd), but Debbie is a member of the southern fandom family.

I have a Debbie Hughes story to illustrate this. When Debbie entered customs on her way to the Brighton Worldcon, she ran into a cute British custom: the Value Added Tax. She needed a couple of thousand dollars to put in escrow to rescue her paintings (that'll teach her to

tell the truth about the value of her paintings to a tax man). She mentioned this to Uncle Timmy who found a few southern fans and the funds were available (the fact that she contacted her sister and got the money wired is irrelevant). The point, of course, is that you've got to be a pretty good friend to get that kind of help. Debbie is family — by choice.

Although Debbie's not much of an sf reader (nobody's perfect), she has a really warped imagination. She has painted a lot of horrific art, as those of you who have seen "Solid State" will recognize. Although my tastes do not run to horror, her work has it's admirers, as her awards (and current prices!) attest. Debbie is painting more mainstream sf pieces now — I find myself the proud owner of a couple of Debbie Hughes paintings, and expect to own more.

To sum up Debbie Hughes: looks, talent, warped mind — she's got it all. Her worst flaw is that she's living with Max instead of me... and that may only indicate her good taste. I am pleased to see her recognized by Con†Stellation.

### Mark Paulk – an appreciation

Although he had been attending conventions (including Worldcons) for some years, Mark Paulk took his first serious step into fandom in the winter of 1980-81 — he attended his first soon-to-be NASFA (North Alabama Science Fiction Association) meeting.

Mark is responsible for many things in NASFA that persist to this day. His early invitations established the tradition of our after-the-meeting meetings being held at a club member's home instead of Pizza Inn. (Nelda personally appreciated this since she usually ended up as "treasurer" of the Pizza Inn-vasions!) His penchant for bridge helped establish cards as one of the highlights of each get-together.

Gradually the A-T-M meetings were farmed out to various homes and hearts supplanted bridge as the game of choice. For several years, though, Mark continued to host a Saturday party between monthly club meetings, giving NASFA club members a better opportunity to get to know each other socially. We all

attended conventions together and as we became known as a club, the question of holding our own convention arose.

Once NASFA foolishly naively decided to pursue this masochistic undertaking, Mark was co-chair of Con†Stellation I. He was also railroaded persuaded to co-chair Con†Stellation III. Most of the remainder of his convention work in Huntsville was involved in the art show – his interest in sf art is evidenced by his extensive collection. Over the years Mark has worked at a number of conventions, including ConFederation where he was a key member of the NASFA team running registration.

It was a bright day for Mark's career but a dark day for NASFA when we lost him to Pittsburgh. Although he is no longer a resident of the south, if you look carefully you may, at an occasional con, spy him through a half-closed door, deep in concentration, playing killer cutthroat spades, trying to win a longstanding bet with Uncle Timmy!

### A Few Words About Algis Budrys

Born Algirdas Jonas Budrys, the son of Lithuanian diplomats stationed in Nazi Germany, Algis Budrys entered the U. S. in 1936 at the age of five. Until 1964, his father was Consul General of Lithuania in New York City, and Budrys is entirely U. S.educated. His wife, Edna, has accompanied him to Huntsville this time. They have been married since 1954 and have four grown sons.

Budrys wrote his first story – a piece of science fiction – at the age of nine, sold his first article – to a regional magazine – at the age of 15, and turned professional in 1952 at the age of 21. Since then, he has written and sold eight sf novels – including *Who?* (1958), *Rogue Moon* (1960), and *Michaelmas* (1976) – and several hundred sf short stories.

Budrys has won the Locus bard Writers of Magazine poll for the year's best nonfiction book on sf; entitled Benchmarks: Galaxy Bookshelf by Algis anthology of We Budrys, this collection of his bookreview essays was published in 1985. He is also a member of the Science Fiction Hall of Fame, and holds an Edgar Special Award from the Mystery

Writers of America, as well as The Invisible Little Man Award for service to the sf community.

His major interests outside sf include automobile topics and bicycles – he is the author of a Rand M<sup>c</sup>Nally book on bicycle repair.

His editorial career has included a variety of sf magazines, and the top editorial positions at Regency Books, Inc., Playboy Press, and the Woodall Publishing Company. Budrys is known worldwide as a premier critic and historian in the sf field, as well as a top editor and writer. He has also taught sf writing extensively, at several universities as well as top-level privately-sponsored workshops.

Since 1983 he has been Coordinating Judge of the L. Ron Hubbard Writers of the Future International sf-writing talent search, editor of the Bridge Publications annual anthology of WOTF contest-winning stories, and director of the WOTF writing-workshop program. He also serves as a senior advisor to the L. Ron Hubbard Illustrators of the Future contest.

#### WEAPONS POLICY

Con†Stellation VIII has a **no weapons** policy, with two exceptions. Dealers may sell weapons, but these must be wrapped before leaving the Dealers Room and not opened in any public area. Weapons may also be used in the Masquerade, if approved in advance by the Masquerade staff. Any violation of this policy **will** result in confiscation of the weapon or ejection from the convention, at the sole discretion of the committee.

### Huntsville Bookstores

The stores reviewed in this article are listed in approximate order of proximity to the Sheraton. If you can't find what you want in the Dealers Room, these are good places to look. Good hunting!

**Waldenbooks** and **B. Dalton's**, in Madison Square Mall on University Drive. Hours 10A to 9P Monday through Saturday and 12N to 6P Sunday. These are virtually interchangeable chain stores. No ambiance.

**Bookshelf** in Madison Plaza off University Drive, across from Madison Square Mall. Hours 10A to 9P Monday through Saturday and 12:30P to 6P Sunday. There's little to say about this: a typical used book store but with convenient hours. You must trade sf in to get sf out, unless you buy it outright.

**Booklegger** in Steadman Corners at the corner of Jordan Lane and Holmes. Hours 10A to 6P Monday through Saturday and 1P to 5P Sunday. This used book store features a room devoted to hardbacks. They pack a lot of books into not much space.

**Books-A-Million** in The Mall at the corner of University Drive and North Memorial Parkway. Hours 9A to 10P Monday through Saturday and 9A to 9P Sunday. A very large store; be prepared to spend quite some time here. New and damaged books, excess Hallmark stock, etc.

**Friends of the Library Bookstore** in the main library on Monroe Street. Hours 12N to 4P Monday through Saturday and 1P to 4:30P Sunday provided a volunteer shows up. They have hardcovers (some library editions), paperbacks, and magazines; most are in very good condition. Dirt cheap prices but unfortunately poorly organized — be prepared to search the racks.


**Wild Birds Unlimited** on Monroe Street within walking distance of the library. Open 9:30A to 5P Monday through Friday and 9A to 5P Saturday. No Sunday hours. This is what the name purports. They have an intriguing book section. While you're there, buy some corn kernels, then walk across the street to feed the ducks.

**Ibis Books** at the corner of Governor's Drive and 8<sup>th</sup> street. Open 10A to 6P Monday through Saturday. No Sunday hours. Some of you may be familiar with owner Charles Blakely from meeting him at cons. This is a metaphysical bookstore featuring audio tapes and new age music as well as books. Gamers take note: he carries gaming supplies, also, and can talk knowledgeably about them.

**Opening Books** at 403 Pratt Avenue. Hours 9A to 10P every day. Pleasant non-profit giftshop and library, with a reading room. The focus is on thinking books, with a generous selection of alternate sexuality. Well worth a visit.

**Fleming Books** on Andrew Jackson just south of Pratt. Hours 9:30A to 6P Monday through Saturday and 1P to 5P Sunday. Spacious, well-organized store with a pleasing atmosphere but no surprises.

**Shaver's Bookstore** on Whitesburg Drive just south of Bob Wallace. Hours 9:30A to 5:30P Monday through Saturday. No Sunday hours. Mostly hardbacks catering to the intelligent reader. If you want good children's books or audio tapes, this is the store for you.







In Greek mythology, Cetus was the sea monster sent to plague Ethiopia by Poseidon when Cassiopeia claimed that she and Andromeda were more beautiful than the Nereids, Poseidon's daughters. Cetus would cease only when given Andromeda, daughter of Cassiopeia and Cephus. Perseus, riding Pegasus, saved Andromeda, who was chained to a rock awaiting Cetus, by turning the monster to stone with the head of the Gorgon, Medusa.

Cetus is an extensive equatorial constellation near Pegasus and Andromeda. Omicron Ceti is Mira (Mira Ceti), a well-known prototype long-period variable star. Tau Ceti is the only star in the constellation resembling our sun and is one of the closest stars to our solar system. The head of Cetus contains  $\alpha$ , the body has  $\theta$  and  $\tau$ , appendages are at  $\nu$  and  $\pi$ , and the tail is in the direction of  $\beta$  and  $\iota$ .
