

CON STEPHEN BEUGHER

Three True Things and a Bunch of Lies About Stephen Boucher

Steve was born in Launceston, Tasmania in 1938. He graduated from the University of Hobart, Tasmania, with a joint degree in Fine Art History, and in Public Relations. Before discovering fandom, he trained performing dolphins at Marineland, managed a chain of miniature golf courses, and worked



in public relations for the National Party of Australia. His years with the Koala Preservation Society, fighting to protect marsupial habitat from urban encroachment, instilled him with a passionate love for the unique fauna of Australia. As he tenderly nursed orphaned koalas back to health, he swore never to eat meat again. "Thank God for Vegamite!" Steve exclaims. "I never feel the need to apologize to my broccoli before eating it."

He discovered fandom through his intense interest in the Dr Who series, and is well known for recreating entire episodes, playing all the parts, for the entertainment of his friend. He has long expressed a desire to travel to overseas conventions, but is reluctant to fly over water. He remains committed to a vision of fandom in which the interests of media fandom and literary fandom are as one.

His interests are wide ranging, He is a founding member of the Australian

Vegetarian Society, and co-author of the v e g e t a r i a n cookbooks Never Eat Anything With A Face, and Exciting Evenings with Tofu. He was a founding member of the Adelaide University Temperance Society.

After a long career with IBM, he provided much of the public relations in Australia for the

introduction of the Apple Lisa computer, and Microsoft Windows 95. Recently, however, he has decided that computing is a passing fad and now works as an international marketing consultant for Foster's Beer Co. It is through his new career that he has realized his dream for travel by providing security on container ships for export shipments of Foster's Lager. "I'm only here for the beer," quips Steve, a lifelong temperance advocate, as he tours the US promoting his company's product among fandom.

He lives in Melbourne, Australia although he often pines for the fondly remembered Tasmanian countryside of his youth. He is married to the lovely Jenelle, and they have three children Vera, Charles, and David.

FUDD: The Park Mammoth Resort (PMR) restaurant is a perennial

fannish favorite with excellent home-style cooking and their justly famous cinnamon rolls. If you want to explore, turn left on US-31W (the main road running in front of the hotel), and drive 6 miles to KY 90 in Cave City. Turn left, and you are in fast food Nirvana, If you are looking for something fancier, Bowling Green offers several choices within a 30 minute drive. Ask the con staff

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for recommendations. and directions.

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DHRINK: If you need something that's not in the consuite, you'll discover you are in a desert, and the nearest oasis is Bowling Green. Just get on 1-65 and drive to either Exit 28 for the basics,

or Exit 22 for a larger selection. Since Bowling Green is the only wet area in a 50 mile radius, there are liquor stores within sight of these exits.





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There is an outlet mall in Horse Cave just 10 miles to the north on 1-65. Bargains are mixed with the rip-offs,

so caveat emptorl There is also an ATM machine located inside one of the restaurants in the center of the mall. This is the closest cash machine to the PMR. If this machine is not in line with your current banking system, Bowling Green or Glasgow are your second and third options.







CAVE TOURS:

Mammoth Cave National Park is located about 8 miles from PMR on KY 255, and is well marked. The PMR front desk has tour schedules abailable. Tours often sell out, so

make reservations as soon as possible. Advance tickets are available at the National Park site. Plan to get to the Visitor's Center at the Park at least two hours before departure to decide which tour you wish to take and beat the crowds.

SF con hotel. The front desk can equip you for the sauna or

miniture golf. Pool cues can be checked out in the consuite. The riding stables may be open if the weather permits. Follow your nose to find them! The mini-train is not running, but walking the 1.5 mile track is a Concave tradition in good weather. Other favorite outdoor activities include a walk to Lookout Point and the Tilt House, plus the tennis courts, playground and the 18 hole golf course.
