## CARE AND FEEDING OF THE HAMPTON INN OF HORSE CAVE

The Hampton Inn does have some things in common with the old Park Mammoth Resort. It has guestrooms, a pool, a fireplace, a front door, carpet in the hallways, and a view of I-65. After that, however, the differences become too numerous to mention. There are some rules we expect all Concave members to respect if we are to get along here

1. The only smoking areas in the hotel are the smoking consuite in Room 141, the front unloading zone, the swimming pool patio, and in designated smoking guestrooms. ANYONE FOUND SMOKING IN THE HALLWAYS WILL HAVE THEIR CONCAVE MEMBERSHIP REVOKED! We are serious about this. There are few things that will displease the management more than having to fix cigarette burns in the carpet.

2. The hotel Continental Breakfast is for registered guests of the hotel only. You will be given an ID card for each person in a room. There is no sharing allowed, and a maximum occupancy of four people per room.

3. Even though it says 100% satisfaction guaranteed or your room is free on the keys, we cannot expect the hotel to support that promise on a group rate and a full house. We feel that you will find the staff of the hotel to be extremely supportive and helpful if there are problems. Gary Robe is the final arbiter for any hotel disputes.

4. Don't trash the hotel! There are several trash barrels on each floor and in the lobby area. Please do not allow trash to accumulate in the hallways. The better the job we do in housekeeping, the more welcome we will be next year.

5. Please report spillage as soon as possible! The sooner we are able to clean up a mess the lower the probability of damage!

6. The area from Room 224-241 is designated as the quiet zone. Please try to minimize loud talking and hall parties in this area. Many of the convention workers are staying in this area, so unless you like grumpy bartenders, keep the noise down in the upper end of the second floor.

We hope you all will join us in thanking the staff of The Hampton Inn in agreeing to host this madness. They gone out of their way to make us welcome here, so lets all try to make this as much fun for them as it is for us! A great way to show your appreciation is to leave a gratuity for the housekeeping staff.

## GUEST OF HONOR: VINCE DOCHERTY The Once and Future Worldcon Chairman



There are not many people who can say that they have chaired a Worldcon, one of those jobs that sound prestigious until you think about what it actually involves. Vicnent Docherty took on the job of co-chairing the 1995 Worldcon. Intersection, in Glasgow, Scotland. If running a Worldcon is like herding cats through a catnip patch then running one in Glasgow is like putting the catnip patch in a minefield. Take the "normal" challenges of organizing а Worldcon-negotiating for facilities, lodging, program development, transportation, and logistics-and add in unknown factors such as an inexperienced local volunteer base. untried location, international travel. and untested infrastructure and you have a recipe for potential disaster.

Vincent learned the difference between a bad and a good experience early in his involvement with Worldcon running. He helped work on Conspiracy, the 1987 Worldcon in Brighton. Suffice it to say that all did not go well there. When it came time to take the reins for Intersection in 1995 the result was quite different. In Vincent's own words: "Before, during and after Intersection, I think we had at least ten staff or committee marriages with as many kids following (or so it appeared). The corollary is also true, as Conspiracy was known by some as the con, which launched a thousand divorces." It is high praise indeed to all those involved with Intersection that not only was the convention among the best received recent Worldcons, it was popular enough to be selected again as the Worldcon venue for 2005! While Vincent seems to be rational enough when you talk to him he has shown a masochistic streak in that he agreed not only to lead the UK in '05 bid and to chair Interaction, the 63<sup>rd</sup> Worldcon to be held again in Glasgow.

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## A FAN'S GUIDE TO HORSE CAVE AND SURROUNDINGS

**FOOD**: Aunt Bee's Country Kitchen is open 24/7 and has a surprisingly diverse menu and some excellent deserts. We'll see if they managed to buy enough food to make it through the weekend this year! The Marathon Mart also includes a Pizza Hut and deli. In the Outlet Mall the Caveland Cafe serves sandwiches, plate lunches, and deserts. In downtown Horse Cave there is a new Main St. Restaurant that is as yet untried. Alas, The Bookstore Cafe is no more although the book side is still operating. About 5 miles to the south on I-65 at Cave City there are restaurants that range from Mickey D's to The Sahara Steak House. If you want something fancier, try Exit 22 in Bowling Green.

**ATTRACTIONS**: Just across I-65 is the Kentucky Down Under Park. Caves and Australian critters-down under, get it? Too bad it is closed for the season. Follow the road for another 2 miles and you are in Downtown Horse Cave. In the center of town you will find the National Cave Museum and Hidden River Cave. Check out perhaps the only place in the world where they had to consider a cave opening when they laid out Main Street. This is a must-see place for the eco-tourist. About 16 miles away at Exit 48 is Mammoth Cave National Park. If you want to tour the cave, the Hampton Inn receptionist can help you. Tours often sell out early even in winter, so plan your visit well in advance! For those who can't resist a peek at the old place, the Park Mammoth Resort still there 10 miles to the south on I-65. It is, however, closed until March 1.

**PARTY SUPPLIES**: The Houchins market in Horse Cave can probably satisfy your non-alcoholic party needs. Just take Highway 218 into Horse Cave. Turn left onto Highway 31-W. The store is one block down on the right. Store hours are 8-8 daily. If you need something more potent, you'll discover that the nearest watering hole is Exit 28 or 22 in Bowling Green. Since this is the only oasis within a 50-mile radius, there are liquor stores within sight of the exit ramps.

**SHOPPING**: We're not quite sure why they built an outlet mall in a comfield in Hart County, but there it is. The only question is if there are any stores left open in it. It is theoretically within walking distance and may be just what you need to burn off what you did to yourself on Friday night! In downtown Horse Cave you can find The Bookstore, Dollar General Store and other shopping opportunities. For the city mall experience, there is Greenwood Mall in Bowling Green at Exit 22.

**FUEL FOR MAN AND MACHINE**: They may not be elegant, but the two convenience stores within walking distance of The Hampton Inn should provide what it takes to provision both you and your car for the weekend and the trip home. There is also an ATM machine located at the Marathon Mart.

### Once and Future (continued)

Vincent comes by his affiliation with the Glasgow Worldcons legitimately through a long fannish history in the area beginning with his participation in the Strathclyde University SF Society in Glasgow from 1979-86 and cutting his teeth helping to run local conventions in Glasgow during that time. Vincent has held key positions on many of the Worldcons since 1987, and has been a familiar face at US conventions as the traveling spokesman for the '95 and '05 bids. Yes, Vince wears a kilt and is a connoisseur of single-malt scotch. He will probably indulge in both of these activities during Concave.

In the mundane world Vincent is an engineer for an obscure company called Royal Dutch Shell and lives in The Hague. In his professional capacity Vincent gets to travel to exotic and distant lands such as Oman and Nigeria. This may sound romantic and adventurous, but as a rule they don't put oil fields near tourist attractions. We hope his tour of Kentucky will be a bit more relaxing.

So why should Vincent Docherty be Guest of Honor at Concave? First of all, he deserves the recognition. He is not a SMOF (Secret Master Of Fandom), he's an KMOF (Known Master Of Fandom). There is nothing secret about Vincent's contributions to SF conventions. Just do a Google search on Vincent's name and see how many times it pops up linked to convention references. Second, Vincent is our kind of guy. In a recent psychological study of the UK it was found that only 18% of the passer's by on a London street will return a smile to a stranger. In Edinburgh, the heart of supposedly friendly Scotland the figure sinks to a dismal 4%. In Glasgow the figure is 68%. Finally there is poetic justice in inviting a guest of honor who is the chairman of the Worldcons in Glasgow, Scotland to a relaxacon in the vicinity of Glasgow, Kentucky. We've just got to get a picture of Vincent posing in front of the Welcome to Glasgow sign. Maybe we can get him to wear the kilt!
