Did you ever wonder what happens when an immovable object meets an irresistible force?


Greg Bridges would be that immovable object. And I mean that in the nicest possible way. He's steady, he's dependable. He's a rock that forms the foundation of MidSouth Fandom.

If you ever go to a Memphis Science Fiction & Fantasy Association meeting. Greg is probably the first person you'll meet. Which is fitting – he's the perennial (generally unchallenged) Chairbeing. He has also published ("published" meaning wrote, typed, mimeographed, assembled, and mailed) the association's semi-official fanzine, Memphen. He's worked on every MidSouthCon in Memphis, most often as Chairman of Vice. He can be described as low key, somewhat quiet, yet actively engaged. He's also a packrat. His old house in Memphis was full of books, art, mimeo supplies, fliers from current and old conventions, and "stuff". He believes wall space was made for bookshelves.

To call Greg a trufan is no exaggeration.

Greg's working style is "just in time". If he has to have the program books printed in time for registration to open, he may be up until 4 AM running the mimeo machine. But it will be done, and the program books will be at registration when it opens – though perhaps not entirely, as it were, assembled.

The irresistible object – and I mean that in oh, so many ways – would have to be Dana Hager-Bridges, MD.



Dana was active in the New York fan scene, but when she arrived in the MidSouth she thought she wouldn't be able to participate much because of her busy schedule as a Real Doctor. She's also detail oriented, highly organized, and a real "take charge" kind of person. #### REMEMBERING AL, JACK AND JERRY



Alphonsis J. Fennelly—
Dec. 15, 1946—Jan. 5,
1005. Most of you reading this never knew Dr. Al
Fennelly, but I can say with confidence that you would not be reading it if not for Al. Dr. Fennelly was the faculty advisor to the Western Kentucky University
Speculative Fiction Society in its formative years in the late 70's and early 80's.
You may not recognize Al seated second from the left

in this 1979 yearbook picture, but you might recognize Rickey Sheppard. Pat Molloy, Jim Woosley, Debra Hussey, Betsy Sheppard, Gary Robe, and Tony Cannon in the group. Without Al's support the WKUSFS might never have existed and there would have been no fan group in Bowling Green to stand ready to run Concave in March 1980.

Indeed the first organizational meeting of the Concave committee happened on Al's dining room table. Although Al took no active role in running the convention he certainly advised up on organization and provided the all-important place for us to meet and plan strategy between games of Rail Baron and World War II. Al was the glue that held the group together in those days be providing us with a, dare I say, role model and place to hang out. He once said we were welcome at his house anytime as long as we didn't stagger in the back door and slur something like "Hi Dr. Liquor Cabinet is the Fennelly stocked?"

One of the most important lessons we got from Al was that if was possible in that per-Revenge of the Nerds era to be a nerd and party animal at the same time! Al was a respected physicist and we all knew he was way smarter than any of us, however, life around him was a constant party in which alcohol consumption, philosophical discussions, explorations of spirituality, war

games, and contact with the opposite sex were all possibilities. Al was both cooler and brighter than any of us and we all admired him for it. Al also set several of the SF club members onto paths that let to careers such as physics for Jim Woosley and NASA for Pat Molloy.


Al could also be mysterious. When he left teaching to join the US Naval Reserve we were puzzled. When he became a Naval Attache to the embassy in Islamabad it became a bit clearer. Why would US Naval Intelligence have a physicist on their staff in Pakistan? I'm not saying that Al was a spy, but the circumstances are verrry interesting.

Al died suddenly in early January of heart failure before he could be prepped for bypass surgery. Many of us will always have a place in our hearts for Al as the one who taught us to drink beer and thing strategically simultaneously.

Jack L. Chalker—Feb. 11, 2005—Jack was one of the few SF pros that have attended Concave—a SF convention that mostly celebrates fans instead of pros. Jack and his family came to Concave as fans and for the fun of it, not as paid guests. Many of us got to know Jack through long conversations through the wee hours of the morning at various room parties at conventions. As party hosts we learned that to attract Jack to a party you didn't liquor as is common with many other pros; a hot pot of coffee would do the trick with Jack.

Jack was the author of dozens of SF novels that spanned a long career as a writer. One of Jack's endearing characteristics as a writer was to make the first line of his book so catchy that the reader just had to keep reading. One of my favorites was from his 1979 novel A War of Shadows that goes: The shadow of death passed through Cornwall, Nebraska, but it was such a nice day that nobody noticed. How could you take in a line like that and not keep reading? And for over 30 years we did.

Jack's wide-reaching mind showed through in the diverse scope of his writings. His topics ranged from An Informal Biography of Scrooge Mc Duck to the fictionalized re-telling of the sinking of the US Indianapolis entitled The Devil's Voyage, the book that was supposed to be adapted to the screen as Jaws 3. His SF novels were all fast-paced, imaginative, and eagerly awaited by his many fans. His loss will be deeply felt by his many readers and by all of who knew him from conventions.

Jerry was the manager of the Downing University Center (DUC to us alumni) at WKU and was responsible for booking movies into the university's theater and arranging for meeting space in the center for student organizations. Jerry always made sure that SF films played at DUC and that the Speculative Fiction Society got meeting space in the building even when we were competing with the space with more mair stream organizations.

Jerry often followed us over to Mr. D's, the archetypical college hangout joint that we used as our after-the-meeting-meeting place for man years. Jerry introduced us to other like-minded barflies, some of whom are still attending Concave today.

Jerry died last year from complications of kidney transplant surgery. The old place won't seem the same without him.

- 2. The Continental Breakfast is for registered Hampton Inn guests only. There is no sharing allowed, and a maximum occupancy of four people per room.
- 3. Even though it says 100% satisfaction guaranteed or your room is free on the keys, we cannot expect the hotel to support that promise on a group rate and a full house. We feel that you will find the staff of the hotel to be extremely supportive and helpful if there are problems. Gary Robe is the final arbiter for any hotel disputes.
- 4. Don't trash the hotel! There are several trash barrels on each floor and in the lobby area. Please do not allow trash to accumulate in the hall-ways. The better the job we do in housekeeping, the more welcome we will be next year.
- 5. Please report spillage as soon as possible! We understand that accidents will happen, but the sooner we are able to clean up a mess the better!
- 6. The area from Room 224-241 is designated as the quiet zone. Please try to minimize loud talking and hall parties in this area. Many of the convention workers are staying in this area, so unless you like grumpy bartenders, keep the noise down in the upper end of the second floor.

We hope you all will join us in thanking the staff of The Hampton Inn in agreeing to host this madness. The management is very appreciative of our business so lets try to deserve their trust! A great way to show your appreciation is to leave a gratuity for the housekeeping staff.

### A FAN'S GUIDE TO HORSE CAVE AND SURROUNDINGS

**FOOD:** Aunt Bee's Country Kitchen is open 24/7 and has a surprisingly diverse menu and some excellent deserts. We'll see if they managed to buy enough food to make it through the weekend this year! The Marathon Mart also includes a Pizza Hut and deli. In the Outlet Mall the Caveland Cafe serves sandwiches, plate lunches, and deserts. The Main St Cafe offers a basic meat & three buffet that is at least fast and cheap if a bit hard on the arteries. Alas, The Bookstore Cafe is no more although the book side is still operating. About 5 miles to the south on I-65 at Cave City there are restaurants that range from Mickey D's to The Sahara Steak House. If you want more, try Exit 22 in Bowling Green.


ATTRACTIONS: Just across I-65 is the Kentucky Down Under Park. Caves and Australian critters-down under, get it? Too bad it is closed for the season. Follow the road for another 2 miles and you are in Downtown Horse Cave. In the center of town you will find the National Cave Museum and Hidden River Cave. Check out perhaps the only place in the world where they had to consider a cave opening when they laid out Main Street. This is a must-see place for the eco-tourist. About 16 miles away at Exit 48 is Mammoth Cave National Park. If you want to tour the cave, the Hampton Inn receptionist can help you. Tours often sell out early even in winter, so plan your visit well in advance! For those who can't resist a peek at the old place, the Park Mammoth Resort still there 10 miles to the south on I-65. It is, however, closed until March 1.

**PARTY SUPPLIES:** The Houchens market in Horse Cave can probably satisfy your non-alcoholic party needs. Just take Highway 218 into Horse Cave. Turn left onto Highway 31-W. The store is one block down on the right. Store hours are 8-8 daily. If you need something more potent, you'll discover that the nearest watering hole is Exit 28 or 22 in Bowling Green. Since this is the only oasis within a 50-mile radius, there are liquor stores within sight of the exit ramps.

**SHOPPING**: We're not quite sure why they built an outlet mall in a cornfield in Hart County, but there it is. The only question is if there are any stores left open in it. It is theoretically within walking distance and may be just what you need to burn off what you did to yourself on Friday night! In Horse Cave you can find The Bookstore, Dollar General Store and other shopping opportunities. For the city mall experience, there is Greenwood Mall in Bowling Green at Exit 22.

**FUEL FOR MAN AND MACHINE:** They may not be elegant, but the two convenience stores within walking distance of The Hampton Inn should provide what it takes to provision both you and your car for the weekend and the trip home. There is also an ATM machine located at the Marathon Mart.


# POINTS OF INTEREST IN HORSE CAVE


# PLACES OF INTEREST IN CAVE CITY, KY
