special status. No one here is more or less important than any other. We strive for an environment of safety and equality for all who attend.



GUEST OF HONOR:

Bill Plott: The Fan Who Got Us Talking



Imagine, if you can, a time when there was no Internet, cellphones, laptops, or tablet computers. Imagine that there was a time when a phone call across county lines was long-distance and was charged by-the-minute. Now, imagine that you are a young person living in rural Alabama who discovered science fiction in the pages of pulp magazines and comic books purchased with scrounged change. The existence of the books proves you are not alone in reading the stuff, but how do you connect with others? That's what it was like to be a fan in the early 60's. The solution was found by many in the world's first chat room: the letter columns of the comics and pulps.

That's where a young Billy Joe Plott discovered the stirrings of fandom

in Birmingham, AL. As fate would have it, northern Alabama was home to a group of extraordinary and communicative SF fans. The attendee list from their early gatherings is a roll-call of the Founding Fathers of Southern Fandom: Dave Hulan, Al Andrews, Rick Norwood, John Guidry, Larry Montgomery and Bill Plott. A 1963 meeting of no more than eight is now known as DeepSouthCon 1 held at Dave Hulan's house in Huntsville. One of the most complete and reliable accounts of that meeting was written by Bill Plott.


One of Bill's ideas coming from the first DSC was to organize an amateur press association, which he called *The Southern Fandom Press Alliance* A.K.A., SFPA. An APA is a periodical in which a group contributes their own limited-run fanzines (zines). These publications include fan fiction, commentary, news, artwork, and, vitally, letters of comment on the other member's zines. Under Bill's leadership as its first Official Editor, SFPA membership soon swelled to its membership cap of 32 and generated mailings that could easily top 500 pages every two months. The role of the OE is to collect the zines from the contributors, compile them into bundles for the members, manage the treasury, mediate disputes (some of these are now Fannish legends) collect dues, and send the assembled mailings to the members. The 327th consecutive mailing of SFPA just hit the USPS on February 4th, 2019. Bill Plott is on the roster.

By the end of the 60's Bill had finished college and began pursuing his passions for sports and writing, becoming a sportswriter for

the Birmingham newspapers. He also married his lovely wife, Nancy and soon the responsibilities of work and raising a family nudged him out of fandom until retirement and the proximity of DSC 50 in Huntsville in 2013 encouraged him to check back in.

It should also be mentioned that Bill loves beer. He is accredited as a beer contest judge and has kept a beer tasting log for so long he has notes on over 7000 brews he's sampled and over 200 breweries he's visited over the years . (He's not a fan of over-hopped IPAs or heavy porters.) He's taking his RV around the country introducing his Grandson Atticus to camping, travelling, and fandom while seeking out microbreweries and adding to his list.

As an early retirement project, Bill wrote a history of the Negro Southern Baseball Leagues. Writing the book was a race against



time. The NSBL disbanded in 1951 and the surviving players and team management was disappearing fast. Bill applied the reporting skills, contacts he'd developed over his career as a sportswriter and as a member of the Society for American Baseball Research to complete the book and turn it in to the publisher in 2015. The book was published by McFarland and is available on their website.

Bill keeps himself active by continuing to participate in fannish writhing and publishing, writing more books on Southern sports history, and attending his grandchildren's sporting events. He recently got to watch his Grandson Jackson Leach go 4-for-4 in kicking field goals in Tuscaloosa for Bryant High School and take Grandson Atticus to Gump City Con in

Montgomery. Atticus is getting a good start into fandom. With Grand-pa Bill's encouragement he wore a Mandrake the Magician costume to the convention.

It's a great privilege to get to honor one of Southern Fandom's true Founding Fathers this weekend at Concave. Make an effort to get to know Bill this weekend at Concave. He won't be far from the beer taps in The Storm Shelter! You'll find he is easy to talk to, with a reporter's gift for getting you into a conversation! Just watch out for getting into a conversation with him. It just might end up going on for sixty years!

So far they've released Year One, Year Two, Year Three, Year Four, The Trouble with Tribbles, and Spock's Brain. Their process blew the dilithium crystals when it came to The Trouble with Tribbles and Spock's Brain. With such fertile material to work with, they simply couldn't pick a favorite, so they recorded a CD for each with songs from all five band members!


