GUEST OF HONOR:

Brandy Spraker: The Fan Who Gives Us Liberty



It wasn't always like this. Forty five years ago Southern Fandom was changing fast. In the late 60's Southern Fandom's main mode of communication was through fanzines and the letter columns of comics and the pulps. By the mid-70's SF conventions began to pop up in places across The South: Louisville, Nashville, Memphis, Chattanooga and Atlanta. Most of those cities burned through their founding fandom in 20 years or so and those first-generation conventions like Rivercon, Kubla Kahn, Constellation

and others have all either died out or been replaced by new faces and new organizations. There are two cities where that is not true: Bowling Green, KY and Chattanooga, TN.

The secret to the longevity of a Science Fiction convention has four main ingredients. First, you must give your audience something to enjoy to keep them coming back. Second, you must have a solid core of workers to run the event. Third, you have to bring in new blood because an organization that cannot refresh itself will die. Lastly, you have to have a venue for the event. Brandy Spraker is a living testament to the truth of these principles.

Brandy's father was the greatly-missed fannish legend, Uncle Timmy Bolgio. In the early days, Chattanooga fandom was a bit of a side project of the Tennessee Valley Authority because so many of the founders were also TVA engineers like Richard Lynch, Robert Zielke, and Tim Bolgio. These folks started Chattacon in the mid-70's and it became the most successful Southern SF convention in the South until DragonCon came along and changed the game. Chattanooga fandom was strong enough that in the late 80's Tim Bolgio decided to start Libertycon on the opposite end of the calendar. Some might say that Libertycon has outstripped it's larger progenitor in prestige over the years.

Sometime after the turn of the century, Uncle Timmy realized that in order to keep Libertycon going, it would have to be turned over to the next generation. Literally. I'd be interested to know if there was a single point in time where Tim informed Brandy that she

was taking over or if that was in the plan all along. In any case, the handover happened and Brandy's tenure as chairman of Libertycon is on track to exceed her father's.

There are several points of similarity between Libertycon and Concave. Early on, the decision was made to limit the size of the events and focus on developing style over attracting numbers. Anyone attending both cons knows that the ambiance at either one is unique and far different from any other SF convention one might attend. Style like that doesn't happen accidentally, and nothing makes that more difficult than providing for a continuity of leadership and a damn hotel that doesn't burn down on you! Here at Concave I groomed Claude and the "Crack & Cheese" group to take over for years before they even knew I was doing it. Brandy's near seamless transition into the chairmanship of Libertycon is a tribute to her skills as a manager as well as her dedication as a Fan.

Speaking of hotels, Brandy, Claude and I could fill an entertaining hour or more in the program telling Hotel Horror Stories. We've had hotels shift to suddenly hostile management, decide that a SF convention no longer fits their new Born-Again Christian business model, decide to convert half their guest rooms into inner-city condos, remove all the blankets from the beds in the guest rooms because one of the members the year before had hurled chunks on the comforter, as well as the aforementioned burning down. You have to be an SF fan to deal with hotel management because in our years of combined experience most hotel managers and owners are either masquerading aliens or something from the Dungeon Dimensions.

Another important thing to know about Brandy is that although for her Fandom is a Way Of Life, she has a day job too. She has a B.S in Electrical, Instrumentation and Control from the University of Tennessee, Chattanooga and a graduate certification in Leadership and Management from the Owen School of Management at Vanderbilt University. She's worked for the Tennessee Valley Authority since 1996 and is currently the Senior Manager of Transmission Programs, so if the lights are on for you to read this, you can thank Brandy. If the lights go off in the night during the Annual Apocalyptic Thunderstorm and we have another Naked Blackout Pool Party, you can also thank Brandy.

Whatever happens this weekend, you should thank Brandy anyhow! It takes a very special sort of person to organize and run a SF convention. It takes a very special breed indeed to do it more than once! We're all very lucky to have Brandy's talents applied to keeping the flame of Southern Fandom burning as it was in the beginning.

MUSICAL GUESTS: FIVE YEAR MISSION



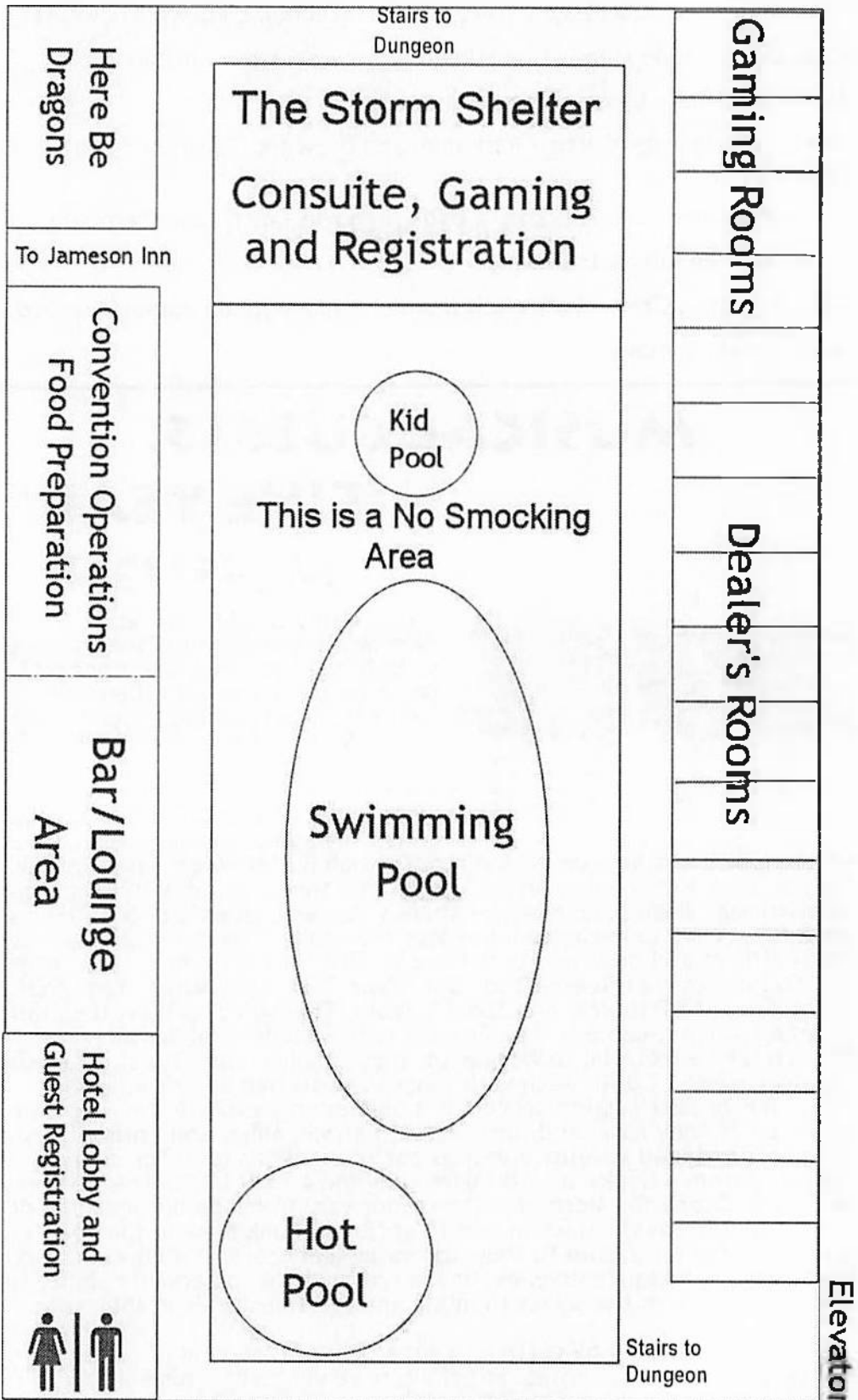
Do we really need to introduce Five Year Mission since this is their seventh straight year in concert at Concave? If you aren't familiar with them yet, this Fantastic Five from Indianapolis takes filk to Warp 8.7 (approximately). The band's mission is no less than to write at least one original song for each of the 79 episodes of *Star Trek The Original Series*. The result is more fun than a

load of tribbles in a Klingon engine room. Noah Butler, Andy Fark, Patrick O'Connor, Mike Rittenhouse, and Chris Spurgin take a collaborative approach to songwriting. Each band member studies the next episode of *ST:TOS* in sequence for setting to music and develops their take. The band then works on each treatment and picks one best-liked version for inclusion in their magnum opus. So far they've released *Year One*, *Year Two*, *Year Three*, *Year Four*, *The Trouble with Tribbles*, and *Spock's Brain*. Their process blew the dilithium crystals when it came to *The Trouble with Tribbles* and *Spock's Brain*. With such fertile material to work with, they simply couldn't pick a favorite, so they recorded a CD for each with songs from all five band members!

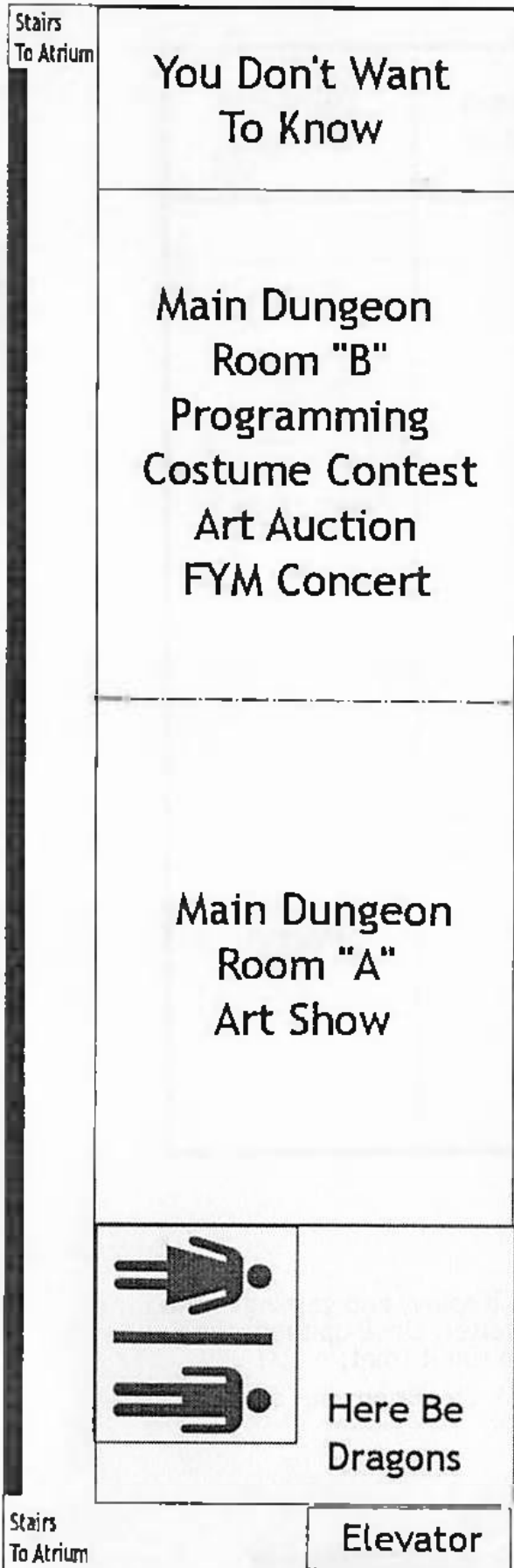
A Five Year Mission concert is a high-energy experience. The constant factor is Andy Fark on drums. Noah, Patrick, Mike, and Chris all switch instruments and lead vocalist duties as each song demands. The styles of the songs range from a honky-tonk drinking song for *A Wolf in the Fold* to angry rock for *The Doomsday Machine*. The moods vary from the lilting ballad of *Friday's Child* to savage slash in *Miri* (Bonk Bonk! Bonk bonk in the head!). It's also possible for a Gorn to show up during a concert. The constant factor is the sharpness and inventiveness of the lyrics with a remarkable ability to both set quotes from the shows to music and tell the stories in their own words.

This year we'll be certain to get a generous serving of tracks from *Year Four*, lots of old favorites, and if we're really lucky a peek at *Year Five*! The band members always enjoy themselves at Concave, and they're certain to be around to hang out with before and after the show. The energy of the Concave audience really helps to bring out the best in the band, so you're in for a wild ride! - Gary Robe
