# A Short Biography of C. L. Barrett, M. D.

The Guest of Honor of this year's ConCave, "Doc" Barrett, was a founding member of First Fandom. During the 1930s he was a major influence in the development of the personality of fandom, contributing much to the society that we enjoy today.

In the fall of 1949, after Cinvention, Doc hosted the first get-together of midwestern fans in his office in Bellefontaine. His office (which doubled as his home) continued to be the site of fan meetings. Those who stayed the night after a meeting would tell of sleeping on the examining table, and being waked by the smell

of bacon and eggs.

Doc's next effort was in organizing an annual gathering at nearby Indian Lake. During its five-year span several of the best-known fan writers stopped in at Indian Lake. Arthur C. Clarke, Robert A. Heinlein, Robert Bloch, Harlan Ellison, and Ted Carnel. In 1955, the gathering, retitled conference, moved to Cincinnati and assumed the name MidWestCon.

Doc did not neglect his personal interest in science fiction while working so hard in building fandom. It may very well be that he has one of the largest collections of books, fanzines, and art in fandom today. At one time, he had a standing order for everything that was published within the genre. Another area of interest he has cultivated, to the combined delight and dismay of fans of his aquaintence, is that of the practical joke.

Doc once asked a friend, a fellow fan, to take a large bell over to a neighbor's house and place it on his porch. "Somehow" the neighbor was alerted and the fan discovered. Discomfiture did not disappear when the fan realized that he had been set

up when Doc's deep laugh rumbled through the night.

Doc is forever interested in the views of others; he is also a forceful exponent of his own views. Be prepared, when you approach him, for warmth, courtesy, and combat. He will "expand your mind" no matter the encounter. Fandom will forever be glad that he has travelled this way.

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



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
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# A Fan's Guide to Park Mammoth Resort

The following block of instruction is provided for the first-time visitor to Park Mammoth, and for those fans who have not ventured out of the convention area. Items are listed in a descending order of importance.

The Pool...a hole lined with concrete and filled with water. It is very wet, very warm, and generally, very chlorinated. It stays open until around ten at night, or so.

The Restaurant, not wet. A beautiful view of Kentucky farmland and the L & N railroad from the tables along the long wall. The prime rib is excellent, as is the cinnemon roll.

The Miniature Golf Course…a smaller but no less taxing version of its big brother next door. Clubs are available at the desk. Management requests that the clubs not be used against the peacocks, and that the peacocks not be used as clubs.

The Train...an exhiberating amusement that is sure to entertain even the most jaded of convention goers. Too bad that it is out of season. Nyah.

The Arcade...a random selection of video and pinball games. They operate on quarters, not tokens, and usually are not very current. However, one of your favorite oldies may be standing in a corner! Knock the dust from the glass and give it a try.

The Sauna...just around the corner from the pool, outside of the hotel, giving a rustic cuthouse sensation. Claim the key at the desk. One person at a time, though, and you might keep an eye open for "screamers", i.e., hot, exposed nail heads.

## A Fan's Guide to the Cave Area

To get anywhere you have to endure a thumbnail lesson in local geography. You are in Edmonson County.

Bheer...for beverages not found in the cozy cheerfulness of the Hospitality Suite, you have to trevel. All of the counties surrounding Edmonson County, except for Warren County, are dry. This entails a twenty-five mile drive down KY 31-W into Bowling Green. Make a right turn as you leave the resort.

Food. Cave City is the place to go for food, especially that of the rapid preparation persuesion. Hamburgers, pizza, chicken, and fish are all represented, with most of the businesses open into the night. There are also a couple of all-nighters that you can find without any trouble at all. Turn left as you leave the resort, drive for six miles or so, then turn left at the stoplight. From there you will be guided by the pancrama of neon advertising.

Gasoline...immediately available in Park City is one of the gas station/grocery stops that flourish just off interstate roadways around the world. Take a left from the resort, then left at the first stop sign. If they are closed, or you want to use the plastic money, then Cave City is again the place for you. All major brands, though at prices probably higher than those back home. Anytime day or night.

Cave Tours—the fan wishing to hallmark an already memorable weekend might enjoy visiting justly famous Mammoth Cave. The hotel desk should have any information as to schedules and prices. On the grounds of Park Mammoth itself are several caves. If enough people are interested, and if the bats are gone, then there is a possibility of arranging a tour or two. A sign-up sheet will be present at registration for those who are interested.

Stuff...the various tourist traps are worth the effort, if you are in a piddling mood. There are many genuine cave rocks out there looking for owners, as well as antique/authentic/handmade somesuches.

If you have any questions, please ask. We will eventually answer anything. It's not like the old days, though, when you could nudge the bellhop, whisper to the elevator attendant, or inquire of the cabbie. Sigh.

### A Fan's Guide to Fan Talk

Many new fans are confused at their first science fiction convention by the vocabulary that older fans use when talking to each other. Continuing our efforts to grease the skids for your entry into the fan experience, we provide a glossary of the more important words and terms you will hear this weekend.

Bheer...known as beer in the outside world. A staple of fandom.

BNF...Big Name Fan, that is, a fan who is very well known in fandom.

Blackpools...the family name of a collection of E-vil humanoids who were, until recently, menacing all the masquerade shows of all the cons in the South. Their Waterloo was at Chattacon this year.

Con ... a shortening of "convention". You are attending a con at this very moment!

ConCave...the name of the con that you are attending at this very moment.

Fanac an amalgamation of the term "fan activity". Examples of fanac are the printing of a fanzine or the attendence of a con.

Fanzine, amateur magazine (...zine) produced by a fan or fens.

Fen., the pleural of fan

Fiagdh...one of the two principal philosophies of fandom. Its devotees believe that "fandom is a god-damned hobby".

Fiawol...the other of the two philosophies. Its adherents hold that "fandom is a way of life"

Filking fans engaged in sitting and singing. Also known as filksinging.

Smoffing conversation regarding the mechanics and politics of fandom. Characterised by details of hotels, meeting rooms, bid committees, and the like.

UpperSouthClave- A traveling con founded by Irvin Koch and friends, connapped for seven years by Ken Moore and John Hollis, and brought to the cave area by Cliff Amos.

Now, neo-fan, you are armed with a basic knowledge of fanspeak.

Pronunciation is another thing, however. Maybe we can get around to that next year.
