

Guests of Honor: Clam Chowder

I first encountered Clam Chowder roughly 20 years ago. They were to perform at Balticon, and I was dragged to Balticon by a friend who had been a clam fan since almost the start. Our conversation went something like this:

"We're going to Balticon this weekend."

"No, I don't like large cons and that's a large con."

"It's worth it, Clam Chowder will be performing."

"A soup is performing?"

"No, they're a group. - Trust me you will love them."

And, reluctantly, I went.

We drove down to Balticon and were wandering around the hotel. In the downstairs lobby behind the escalator was a pretty woman (Kathy Sobansky) playing a harp and singing *The Queen of Air and Darkness* by Poul Anderson, and I was hooked.

The next couple of years my con going was mostly based on whether or not Clam Chowder was playing. Not 100%, but most of the time. And, getting Clam Chowder to become Darkovercon regulars was one of my major coups.

But this personal history begs the question, "what is Clam Chowder?" The answer is quite complex and not easy to do.

They are a group of people (they have varied in size from four to seven) who sing together in wonderful harmony.

There aren't many generalities beyond that. I have heard (and enjoyed them) singing: Classic folk and modern folk, filk, sea shanties, spirituals, medieval and renaissance era songs, Australian songs, especially sheep sheering songs, westerns, drinking songs, songs from movies (including the theme song from The Rocky Horror Picture Show), country-western, hymns, prohibition anti-drinking songs, and more. About the only thing their assorted music has in common is that it all sounds wonderful when Clam Chowder sings it.

But Clam Chowder is more than wonderful music. It is incredibly fun audience/band interaction. Various things that Clam has had done to them (mostly taken from their songs or their name):

- Dancing Clams
- Presentations of cans of Clam Chowder
- Presentation of a very dead moggie (luckily a stuffed one)
- Invasion by the KGB
- Invasion by Zombies
- · Chorus line of people in long underwear

But Clam Chowder also strikes back. They have suddenly reversed who sang which part in "standard" songs. They have surprised everyone by playing a prohibition anti-drinking song (complete with Bob pulling out a saxophone).

But, most importantly, what raises them above almost everyone else is that they use their music to help the various communities both in and out of fandom. They have done benefit concerts to raise money for organizations that work on cystic fibrosis. They have raised money for Children's Hospital. When I ran a filk convention that lost major dollars, much to my surprise they gave me some of the

profits from one of their concerts, to help cover the loss. They raised money to help pay medical bills for a local fan/medievalist who was in a serious automobile accident and didn't have medical insurance. They raised money to help remodel Manley Wade Wellman's house when he had to have his legs amputated because of diabetes. I could go on, but you get the idea.

They have raised money a variety of ways, but *Bend Over Greek Sailor* is a consistent winner. And, in that lies a tale.

It was a Philcon. Clam Chowder was raising money for Manley Wade Wellman. Instead of having a set list, they were taking requests on dollar bills - said dollar bills would be then turned over to the fund. After the concert was over they were looking at the dollar bills. One of them had *Black Velvet Band* written on them. John said that he wouldn't sing it for \$100. Kathy retorted, "Oh yes we would. For enough money we would sing anything. Why, we would sing *Bend Over Greek Sailor* in five part harmony." A voice from the hall (and I disavow all knowledge of that voice) said, "How much?" There was a pregnant pause and they said, "Five hundred fifty-five dollars." And the fund raising began. (Note: if Kathy tries to disavow this, tell her I have the tapes to prove it.)

Now *Bend Over Greek Sailor* is, um, rather risque. Therefore, while not all the money requested was raised, most of it was, and Clam Chowder sang it. In five part harmony. And, it has remained a favorite for fund raising since then, whenever Clam Chowder can be convinced to sing it.

This gives you only the barest hint of what they are and can do. I envy all of you there for their concert; I wish I could be there, and until about two months ago was planning to fly out for it. I have left out so much of what makes them them - the way they sell their records/tapes/CDs for instance. But even a con as great as this one has limitations on the size of the program book.

In conclusion, while any short description of Clam Chowder found be incomplete; unexpected and lots of fun comes closest.

The members of Clam Chowder throughout the years have included:

- Bob Esty
 - Bob Esty has been playing harp off and on for around 15 years, and he and his wife, Sue, are a regular feature at the Maryland Renaissance Faire. Bob used to run a madrigal group, which at one time or another included nearly all the members of Clam Chowder. Bob has two daughters: Sharon, 11, and Maureen, 9, and presently is a Montessori teacher with a combined 4th and 5th grade class at the Barrie School in Silver Spring, Maryland.
- John Huff
 - "I play guitar, mandolin, clarinet, banjo, bass, concertina, fiddle (when no one is too near...), sing tenor and have recently launched into the keyboard (ouch!). I have my own small (cramped, noisy, cluttered) studio at which I record for myself and other poor damned souls. This is where I have done the re-mastering of the Chowder material."
- Kathy Sobansky
 - Kathy Sobansky has been singing and messing with the harp for over 20 years. She met up with the future members of Clam Chowder back at the Maryland Renaissance Faire in 1977 and has been hanging out with them at concerts, science fiction conventions, folk festivals, weddings and cheesy bar gigs ever since. She is the loving wife of Ed, the scourge of the Maryland State's Attorneys' Office, and the proud mother of Edward, a future World Series MVP.
- Don Stallone
 Don appears on Clam Chowder recordings, but will not be at Consonance.

Cliff Laufer

"I play electric and acoustic fretless bass guitars with Clam Chowder. I've *listened* to Clam Chowder for years; a bit over a year ago John Huff asked if I'd play bass for a Chowder concert, and one thing led to another until now I play all the low notes that Sam doesn't bother with. I'm not on any of Clam Chowder's recorded material, but I sign the CD inserts anyway, if asked.

"I play electric 8-string bass guitar and lap dulcimer with Stuart Mawler (Chapman stick player) as "Cliff Art," and I play acoustic bass guitar with John Huff, mostly 'cause we just like to play the occasional humorous song together."

Sam Van Wyck

Samwise the BassClam... Eldest if not wisest of the Clams. Retired schoolteacher, electronics wiz and forester, he now devotes his declining years to restoring and riding BMW motorcycles, enjoying retired life and riding herd on numerous grandkids.

Interfilk Guest: Gary Ehrlich

Gary Ehrlich—Sensitive New Age Guy by Terri Wells

What can I say about Gary Ehrlich that someone else hasn't already made up a vicious rumor about? Let's start with the factual stuff. Earth is his planet of origin, but he overcame that nasty handicap by discovering filk at what was then considered to be the "final" Clam Chowder concert (at Unicon '89), and was instrumental in getting them back together for an encore at Bucconeer last year. In between...well, as they say, it's been a long, strange trip.

To continue with his filking career...at Phrolicon '91, he premiered (with co-writer Joe Neff) his first filk —"The Dalek Song"—to the tune of "The Lumberjack Song" ("I'm a Dalek and I'm ok..."). After a few years of hunting around for people to back him up on guitar, he took the matter into his own hands—literally—and bought himself a Seagull, which he promptly named "Christine," after Christine Lavin, his favorite folkie. (And yes, he really *is* a certified Sensitive New Age Guy, with Lavin's signature to prove it). He moved up in the world in '93, with his first concert, at Conterpoint.

In '94, tragedy struck when his grandmother died while he was at FilkOntario. He pulled through, thanks to the support of his friends, most notably Judith Hayman, MEW, and Urban Tapestry. Great tragedy sometimes provides great inspiration; in this case, his original song "Face to Face" came out of this. But of course, Gary's written lots of original songs, by turns moving, joyful, and funny: the two in his Edifice Complex (one of which Hannah M.G. Shapero did a painting for); "Through a Child's Eyes"; "Come Travel with Me" (one of my favorites -- don't miss Gary's wrapping his smooth tenor around *this* one!); "Distant Voices;" and "Builder's Song." Of course, if you *really* want funny, listen to his parodies: "Middle Age Love," "March of Cameras," "Ghost Pirates in DC," and "Operation Winter Storm," just to name a few (hey, I've got to give him a chance to surprise you; I'm not going to tell *all* his secrets!). If you wonder why so many of his songs, particularly the original ones, are about building things, his mundane job is as a structural engineer. He passed a test last year that lets him put P.E. after his name -- this means, I understand, that he has a License to Build.

Gee, I'm running out of space. Hmmm. Okay: ask him to tell you about "The Nymph Incident" (we have *that* particular humiliation on tape) or why MEW once exclaimed of him: "I think I've created a monster." Oh, and be sure to ask nicely first before you touch his guavas. :-)

Programming

Throughout most of the con there'll be at least three rooms available. Two will have active programming items of one sort or another; the third will be available for open filking. There will also be a separate "Smoking Filk Room" in room 974 for those people who wish to inhale oxidizing tobacco products while they filk, as well as those who wish to hang out with people who like to inhale oxidizing tobacco products while they filk.

We'll have lots of concerts with many people who you may be discovering for the first time. Your old favorites will be here, too. If you want to participate in a one-shot performance or a 20-minute miniconcert, sign up at the registration table.

Note: Theme circles are participatory; the leaders are there to get things going and keep them running.

If you're new to filking, here are a couple of quick definitions to get you going:

- **Bardic** filking is when each person takes a turn in a circle. You must wait your turn before you perform unless someone requests otherwise when it's their turn. On the other hand, this means everyone gets something resembling an equal amount of time.
- Chaos filking involves people jumping in as they feel an urge to do so. Some people get more turns than others. This kind of circle takes the pressure off people who don't want to perform and who don't feel like requesting anything, and it lets performers who are lesser-known get in more songs. At the same time, it makes it possible for you to become a Filk Hog™, and trust us, you *don't* want to become known that way!
- Freestyle means "do what you want." You can sign up the room for an hour or so to get together with other filkers and practice something, or you can declare it to be the exclusive domain of Appalachian Nose Flute music; it's up to you!

We'll also be trying something new called a "Haiku Bardic."

Open filking (freestyle) is available in any room when there's nothing else scheduled in it.

Everyone has their favorite type of filk circle; that's why we provide a choice.

Our function rooms are available for open filking whenever nothing else is scheduled there. The San Mateo room is designated for Bardic Circles when we have exclusive use of the bar (Hops), specifically:

Sacred Harp, or shaped-note music was a type of three- or four-part music popular in America around the time of the Revolutionary War. Its musical form harkens back to earlier forms in that the melody line is always in the tenor and harmonies tend to be fifths and octaves, which gives it an almost medieval sound. In traditional shaped-note music, each note on a do-re-mi etc. scale had its own shape or, in older versions, a choice of four shapes. The content of the music is sort of generic Christian. The tradition behind the music is that everyone sings it; in fact, it was designed to be music in churches before organs were imported from Europe. That tradition, and the music itself, has moved west and south, and is still sung today in the Southern Appalachians, particularly in Georgia and in Alabama.

Sacred Harp has gotten a modest following in the folk community and at some science fiction conventions out East because the music sounds neat, and because the tradition is that everyone, regardless of ability, is always welcome to join. At the Sacred Harp workshop at Consonance, we will provide music and teach several tunes. You do not have to be able to read music to pick up the tunes.... indeed, the idea of the shapes was to teach music to people who could not read at all!

From Top to Bottom is an ethnically diverse, unity oriented gay male quintet led by Aurelio Font, an original member of The Flirtations. With David Dobrusky, Chris Dilley, Wade Gardner, and filk legend Joey Shoji, the five-some covers a repertoire ranging from the Doo Wop of the fifties to the music of today with wit, tenderness, and sometimes risque humor. **Note:** Some of their material may not be appropriate for young children, right-wing Republicans, or homophobes. Jordi Sears-Zeve says they're more fun than the Mighty Morphin' Power Rangers.

Cynthia McQuillin

Cindy is a master songwriter who has been performing for many years with her partner, "Dr. Jane" Robinson. Here Cindy returns to her roots as a solo performer.

• **Tom Holt** (by proxy)

Tom Holt is a masterful filk parodist from England whose two favorite victims are Leslie Fish and Kathy Mar. Leslie and Kathy have graciously agreed to perform some of his parodies of their songs. Look for Tom's outstanding book of filk parodies, *Bitter Lemmings*, in the dealer's room. Tom, who lives in Somerset, downwind of the meat-canning factory, also writes fantasy novels. • Echo's Children (Cat Faber and Callie Hills)

In Memoriam

Robert "Buck" Coulson 1928-1999

On the morning of Feb 19, 1999, Robert "Buck" Coulson passed away, with his wife Juanita at his side.

Buck leaves behind a lifetime of accomplishments and a lifetime of friends who will miss him greatly. Joe Ellis said it well: "Buck was... no, is a special person, and will long live on in our memories. We are better for having shared his life."

Buck devoted much of his life to fandom. At Midwest conventions, he was known for his entertaining stories about fannish history. He and Juanita sold books and filk music at their huckster table, and they edited the Hugo-winning fanzine YANDRO practically forever.

Twenty years ago, at the first filk con ever, FilkCon I (or, as it was known in those days, "the FilkCon"), Buck had the honor to be chosen as the first president of the Filk Foundation. As a filker, he was not prolific, but his songs were memorable.

Buck was very modest about his own accomplishments. I did not learn until after his death that he was also a professional writer, both individually and in collaboration with Gene DeWeese. Two of his more intriguing titles are "Charles Fort Never Mentioned Wombats" and "Murder at the WorldCon." Buck also wrote reviews for *Amazing*.

Buck's passing brings to mind his own words about the impermanence of life, taken from one of his best-loved (and most cleverly parodied) filk songs, known as "Reminder" or "The Stardrive:"

"Now the First Ones are forgotten and the insects but a memory, And the creature known as Man stands on the threshold of his fame, But remember, little Earthling, there were others here before you And still others who will follow in your flame."

A memorial service is planned for Marcon 33. Charitable contributions in Buck's name may be made to the American Diabetes Society, the American Heart Association, or the American Lung Society. Consonance is taking up a collection to benefit Juanita. In addition to Juanita, Buck is survived by his son, Bruce.

We'll miss you, Buck.

Gary Anderson

It's been almost a year since Gary Anderson has left us. Over this past year I have, on occasion, found myself working my way out of problems by asking myself, "What would Gary do in this situation?" Surprisingly enough, it works. Faced with a choice between the convention just reprinting what myself and other have already written, or writing a new narrative in just a few days—the only answer to is think of Gary. So here we go.

A lot of stories have been told about Gary, about his life as a husband, an electrical engineer, working for the government, costuming, and other fannish activities. Rather than talk about these other things I thought I would write about a very strange passion that Gary and I shared—filk singing. That is, in fact, how we met; it was at the Los Angeles Westercon in 1980. Westerfilk was being released at the convention. Chris Weber pulled me into filking and I met Gary in my first filk Circle. As I went to the Los Angeles Filkers group monthly sings, I got to know Gary more and more.

It was Gary, Paul Willett, and Ron Bounds who were the driving force behind the resurgence of filking in Los Angeles and most of the West Coast back in the 80s. In many ways if it weren't for him you wouldn't be reading this right now at a filking convention. But I detract from my story...

For those of you who never heard Gary sing, you may have noticed that he is not on any convention or studio tapes/CDs. He had a low rumbling voice and used to joke that his range was 3 notes - widely spaced on the scale. He loved to sing songs about blood guts and destruction. His favorites back in the 80s were "Ian the Grim" and "Thomson, the Headless Gunner". The quality of his voice was more than made up by his enthusiasm and energy. Gary, ever since I knew him, had more energy than most eighteen-year-olds with two pots of coffee in them. There was many a convention that we went to where after working the whole convention, running the back-stage at a Masquerade, hitting a few parties, he would then grab his guitar and go to the filksing. I was, and still am, in awe -- WHERE would he get that burst of energy at 2:00 am? Then he would repeat the same thing the next night.

Now this image might shock some people who had only met Gary a few times. That is because Gary came across as a quiet person. He didn't bellow at the top of his lungs when there was a problem, toot his own horn when he was successful, or leave the dirty work for someone else. He would often try to fix conflicts by pulling people off to the side of the room and have a quiet chat with them, to calm them down or suggest solutions to their difficulties. Gary had a talent of working behind the scene where, unless you were working beside him, you had no idea how much work he was putting in. I personally watched him fix or rescue numerous conventions over the years. One of the most famous stories is the time he completely rewired a hotel's electrical system, without disrupting service.

Even with all of his energy and abilities Gary would also just sit back and listen to other people perform. He had a huge collection of filk tapes in his car and whether driving to work or a convention, Gary would always have a tape playing, with him singing along as he drove down the road. Even though he had many obligations that did not allow him to go to filk sings as often as he wished, he never gave up his love for this crazy music and the people who make it.

So whether you are new or old to filking, let me say for Gary; "pull up a chair, don't be afraid to join in, because if this group of crazies will let *me* sing, *you* have nothing to fear."

The Starving Musician 3427 El Camino Real Santa Clara, CA 95051-2806

The Starving Musician is the nearest music store to the con. Take Lawrence Expressway to El Camino Real, turn left, and it's on your left (you have to make a U-turn after you see it). It's also a fun place to visit; you never know what you'll find for sale, as they mix their current inventory with their consignment stuff. I've seen a guitarron (the big six-string bass guitar they use in Mariachi bands), regular and guitar lutes, and many international instruments. They sell strings 2-for-1, and their prices are very good. Unfortunately, they're not open Sundays.

Gryphon Stringed Instruments 211 Lambert Ave Palo Alto, CA 94306-2217 Phone: 650-493-2131

This is a first-rate shop for anything with strings. They not only sell guitars, but harps, dulcimers, banjos, ukuleles, and violins. They're not open Sundays.

Guitar Center 3430 Stevens Creek Blvd San Jose, CA 95117-1042 Phone: 408-249-0455

It helps to be male to get decent service here. I've come in nearly ready to buy something when a salesman would screw up the deal by making a condescending remark or would ignore me. The last time I bought something from them I had to jump up and down and wave my arms to get the cashier's attention. They do sell strings, however, and they're open Sundays.

Guitar Showcase 3090 S Bascom Ave San Jose, CA 95124-2099 Phone: 408-377-5864


