THE FARMERS MARKET:

If you come to Corflu, you'll be in Madison for the first outdoor Farmers' Market of the season on Saturday morning. That means it could be 40 degrees F, or 80; snowing, raining, or sunny. But, it won't be crowded at 7 a.m. like it is later in the season. The vendors will be there before 7 a.m., and typically shut down around 1 p.m.

The market covers the 4 sides of the Capitol Square, which really is a square. (That was a big surprise to me—a transplanted New Englander used to Harvard Square and other "squares" that were trapezoids, heptagons, and the like.) It's about 2 miles from the hotel, but the free hotel shuttle (and various local fans) will be driving there on Saturday morning. The Capitol is worth visiting, and most of the local museums are within a couple blocks.

The first markets of the season tend to have limited amounts of produce: spinach, watercress, ramps (a wild leek), various other greens, some flowers, hydroponic tomatoes. It all has to be grown locally, and we're in the frozen northland, so fresh-grown selections are limited. But you'll also find lots of things to plant, maple syrup, honey, popcorn, meat, candy, eggs, and had a goods. And more baked goods. And even more baked goods into of baked goods. There will also be some amount of populated action, particularly later in the morning, it'll probably be too early for the morel mushrooms, but you can never tell with global warning. Since we're in Wisconsin, there will be artisan cheeses, and lots of fresh, squeaky cheese curd.

There's a huxsters street next to the market, for the people who want to sell things that don't qualify as "homemade" or "locally grown". Since we don't grow a lot of our own coffee in Madison, you'll need to go there or, better, to one of the excellent coffee shops within a block of the Square (Ancora is our favorite). For

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THE BADGER STATE?
