Orson Scott Card - Guest of Honor

Orson Scott Card first came to the attention of the science fiction world with his novelette Ender's Game in the August 1977 Analog. The story went on to place second for the Hugo award in 1978, while Card was given the John W. Campbell Award for best new writer of the year. In 1985, the novelette became the novel "Ender's Game," which won the 1985 Nebula and the 1986 Hugo awards. It was followed in 1986 by the novel "Speaker for the Dead," which continues the story of Ender Wiggin 3,000 years after the close of the first novel, as he struggles to find out why a small, peaceable group of aliens have murdered the two humans who were closest to them. "Speaker for the Dead" won the 1986 Nebula and 1987 Hugo awards.


Card is currently working on a series of novels called *The Tales of Alvin Maker*, set in an alternate America in the early part of the 19th century. The first book in the series, "Seventh Son," was released in July of 1987. The second book, "Red Prophet," was released in January of 1988, and the third, "Prentice Alvin," in February of 1989. His novella "Hatrack River" (which is a portion of "Seventh Son") won the 1987 World Fantasy Award.

He has also published a cycle of stories entitled *The Folk of the Fringe* which includes the Hugo- and Nebula-nominated story "The Fringe," a story that is intensely personal because its hero is a victim of severe cerebral palsy, like Card's youngest son, Charlie.

Before he began writing fiction, Card worked extensively in regional theatre in Utah. Dozens of his plays and musicals have been produced, and it was in playwriting that he served his apprenticeship as a writer. He continues to lead a double life, writing science fiction, fantasy and historical novels for the general audience, while producing audio scripts, humor and fiction for the Mormon audience.

Card was born in Richland, Washington, disturbingly close to the Hanford Atomic Works, and grew up in San Mateo and Santa Clara, California; Mesa, Arizona; and Orem, Utah. He also served a mission for the Mormon Church in Brazil from 1971 to 1973. He and his wife, Kristine Allen Card, currently live in Greensboro, North Carolina, with their three children Geoffrey (10), Emily (8) and Charlie (5).

C. J. Cherryh - Toastmaster

C.J. was born in St. Louis. Her parents moved a year later to Joplin, Missouri for about 2 years before moving to Oklahoma. Although she has moved around quite a bit, C.J has always gravitated back to Oklahoma City where she currently resides.

After earning a BA in Latin at the University of Oklahoma in 1964, C.J went on to earn a MA in Classics at Johns Hopkins University in 1965. She has a wide and varied scope of knowledge and specialization which includes Latin, Greek, bronze age myth as related to archaeology, law of early Roman Empire, history of engineering, French (professional translator), and she can speak Italian and several other languages in which she can "at least get a drink of water and directions to



the train station." Her professional experiences include teaching Latin, Greek and ancient history, writing, and she is a semiprofessional in archaeological photography.

In addition to all this, she also has informal training and personal interest in human genetics, astronomy, space science and aeronautics, astrophysics, botany, geology, climatology, cosmology, anthropology, and technology in general with practical and anthropological considerations. Would you believe she actually has time for hobbies? Her favorite is galactic mapping, specifically of the stars and objects within 100 light years of us, and she also indulges in guitar, music composition and travel.

C.J. has earned these Awards and Honors: American Classical League Scholarship in 1960, Alpha Lambda Delta, Phi Beta Kappa, Woodrow Wilson Fellow in Classics in 1964-65, John W. Campbell Award in 1977, Hugo Award for the short story "Cassandra" in 1979, and the Hugo Award for the novel "Downbelow Station" in 1982.

C.J. writes full-time, travels and likes to try out things. What has she tried out so far? The list includes fencing, riding, archery, firearms, ancient weapons, donkeys, elephants, camels, butterflies, frogs, wasps, turtles, bees, ants, falconry, exotic swamp plants and tropicals, wildemess survival, fishing, sailing, mechanics, carpentry, wiring, painting (canvas, house, interior), sculpture, needlepoint, refinishing furniture, video games, archaeology, Crete, Celts, and caves. She has traveled from New York to Istanbul and Troy, outrun a dog pack, and seen Columbia lift off on her first flight. She has fallen down a cave, nearly drowned, broken an arm, been kicked by horses, fended off an amorous merchant in a tent bazaar, fought fires, slept on deck in the Adriatic, and driven Picadilly Circus at rush hour. Whew!! She has also waded in two

oceans and four of the seven seas, and she wants to visit the Amazon, the Serengeti, and see the volcano in Antarctica -- on one of such ambitions she is now making current progress.

Earth is viewed by C.J. as a part of the whole universe. Until she gets the chance to get off of it -- to do a flyby of Mars and take a look at Nix Olympica and the Vallis Marinaris, see Titan and Saturn's rings and the Red Spot on Jupiter -- she is stuck on it for a while. But until that time comes she doesn't plan to neglect where she is, and she keeps a constantly updated list of wonders this planet has to see.

Being a frequent lecturer inside her field and often outside it, C.J. speaks to all sorts of organizations from civic groups to writers and occupational groups on the topics of energy and space and future society. She occasionally combines her abilities as entertainer and does musical programs, space age folksongs and ballads to communicate with audiences outside the normal reach of technical publications.

C.J. was our Guest of Honor at MIDSOUTHCON III in 1984, and we are delighted to have her with us again as our Toastmaster.

Over the past year, Mary has contributed work to about 75 convention art shows, and has had works published in program books, on flyers and on T-shirts. Her published works include a Tarot Deck, the cover of "Tales of the Witch World, Vol. II" (published by Tor) and the interior illustrations for "Serpent's Tooth" by Andre Norton.

Mary currently resides in Orlando with her two sons, Josh and Devin, along with various fish and cats.

Bill Sutton - Filk Guest

The best way to describe my husband and your filk guest of honor is to start at the top and work down. When I first met Bill, there was more to the very top of him, but, since he chose to marry a woman with five children, the top of him has thinned out a bit. He now sports what I consider to be a noble brow, and the hair loss doesn't worry him much since he knows how I idolize Sean Connery.

Below the brow are bright blue eyes which catch every detail to be filed away in his cranial trivia depository. The man reads faster then Evelyn Woods instruction machines, digesting novels like they were jelly donuts. Our trips to the book store produce frustration for we like many of the same authors—he will have devoured four books and be breathing down my neck for me to finish the fifth. (I assure you, I am not a slow reader, neither do my lips move while reading.)

You will never see Bill without some form of facial hair. That is because Eris was in an impish mood when he was born and blessed him with eternal youth. He shaved the Errol Flynn beard once and was instantly transformed into an eighteen year old.

Unfortunately, you will also often find a cigarette dangling from Bill's mouth. He is a militant though courteous smoker, something rarely seen among filking circles. It fits with his style of filking, though, as Bill likes to talk as much as he likes to sing. He will play for a while and go wandering the halls in search of a lighter and a good conversation, to return for another few songs when the talk runs dry.

Bill's throat and vocal chords are attached to one of the strongest set of lungs around. He was trained to project while doing high school and college theatre, and you will more often than not he ar him coming before you can see him. Put him in the same filk with Julia Ecklar and Juanita Coulson, and the walls will fall down. It makes it a real challenge blending my small voice with his, something we're doing more often now at the Atlanta area folk clubs and coffee houses.

The body is easily spotted, dressed in his traditional Belly Buttons Need Kisses Too T-shirt, corduroy paint-splattered pants and well-worn tennis shoes. There's usually a good bit of dog hair included. The man does love dogs, as anyone who's listened to his music knows. He wants at some point in his life to have enough animals that he can lie down and be completely covered in dogs. No cats, though. Allergies, you know.

That's the outer shell. The inner man is harder to describe. There are times when he is one of the silliest people on the planet, but accuse him of it and he'll pull himself up to his full 5 10" and assure you he always conducts himself with the utmost dignity and decorum.

He's a diligent and dependable worker -- just ask Hewlett-Packard or any of the concomms he's headed. Bill manages others by finding good people, designating wisely and only getting involved when it's absolutely necessary. Thus far, he's chaired two and a half successful Phoenixons, a DeepSouthCon, and has run filking at most major southern cons including the Atlanta WorldCon. He took a breather off this year and only helped with the program book for PhoenixCon (he's going to hit me when he reads that).

If you really want to get to know the man, put a beer in his hand and ask him his opinion on any subject.

G. Patrick Molloy - Fan Guest

Originally from New Jersey, Patrick moved to Bowling Green, Kentucky, where in 1978 he joined the Western Kentucky University Speculative Fiction Society. He jumped right in, so to speak, helping to write the WKUSFS constitution and becoming that club's second chairperson in 1979. While in the WKUSFS, Patrick managed to obtain time on the University's computer to produce the club's first fanzine, The Speculator, which may well have been the first fanzine completely produced on a computer.

In July of 1978, Patrick went with the first of any Bowling Green fans to attend a RIVERCON (4). Cliff Amos and other Louisvillians expressed an interest in reviving the then defunct Upper South Clave idea in Bowling Green in the spring of 1979. The original intent was to have the con staffed by denizens of Bowling Green. Well, the Louisville group dropped out, but the con still had a name, date and a guest-of-honor -- but with no money, no hotel contract or anyone with expreience. Patrick was elected chairman due to the fact that he had attended more cons than anyone else, and he ran the first Con Cave with only three months preparation. Naturally, the con was a success, ans so another was set in motion. Patrick remained the chairman for the next two and a half years until he moved to Huntsville

In the early 80's, Patrick got a co-op job at the Marshall Space Center —a position which developed into a full-time job. Patrick is working on computer programming for downloading data from the Space Shuttle to the ground. Within a few years of moving to Huntsville, Patrick was elected President of the North Alabama Science



Fiction Association (NASFA), a position he retained for several years thereafter. He was subsequently elected Co-Chairman of 2 CONSTELLATIONS -- leading a successful DEEPSOUTHCON 25 bid in 1987, of which he was also Co-Chairman. Patrick has been a leader of a Science Fiction club for over five years and has chaired or co-chaired six conventions.

In 1987, Patrick was elected Vice-President of the Southern Fandom Confederation. Since his election, more bulletins have been published than before -- one being over thirty pages long. The SFC runs on a volunteer basis totally, and Patrick has helped save this valuable fandom asset.

Wilson "Bob" Tucker - Special Guest

Categorizing Bob Tucker presents a dilemma, for he has been first of all the consummate Science Fiction Fan, and also a very effective writer. Many consider him Forrest J. Ackerman's only rival for the title of Number One Science Fiction Fan, but then on the professional side he has been nominated for the Hugo Award and has won the John W. Campbell Memorial Award. He has served as both Fan Guest and Professional Guest too many times to number (including Toastmaster for MIDSOUTHCON VI and Pro Goh for MIDSOUTHCON II).

Bob became active with SF Fandom when both he and Fandom were quite young, publishing his first fanzine (*The Planetoid*) in the early thirties. He soon became known as a humorist under his fannish pen name Hoy Ping Pong. His best known fanzine has been *Le Zombie*, which he published intermittently from 1938 to 1969. His writings as a fan were known for a smoothness that often appeared to be simple improvisation, but was in fact the result of careful prose crafting.

He made his first professional sale in 1941 to Super Science Novels, producing his first novel—the mystery thriller "The Chinese Doll" in 1946. After that he worked heavily in both the SF and mystery fields, selling fourteen novels and a dozen short stories in the next 12 years.

He maintained his position in Fandom while making a new name for himself -- Wilson A. Tucker -- as a professional writer. He built fannish legends as well as publishing stories. When Le Zombie faded, he began publishing The Bloomington Newsletter, later retitled the Science Fiction Newsletter.

As one of the first Big Name Fans, his fannish activities have become so widely known that writer Robert Bloch once said of him, "I sometimes suspect that Bob Tucker has unwittingly become Wilson A. Tucker's worst enemy...his fannish fame tends to dwarf the recognition he deserves..." His name as a writer is surely secure after such novels as "The Long Loud Silence," "Wild Talent" and "The Year of the Quiet Sun."

Now, after many years as a professional writer and even more years as a SF fan -- and twice being reported dead in fan hoaxes -- he is probably one of the best known and most liked people in SF fandom.

As a writer, a fan and as our Special Guest, Wilson "Bob" Tucker can justifiably be called "SM-O-O-OO-OO-O-TH!"





DeepSouthCon By-Laws

- Section 1. Paragraph 1. The DeepSouthCon is an unincorporated literary society whose functions are to choose the locations and committees of the annual Deep South Science Fiction Convention (hereinafter referred to as DSC); to attend the DSC; and to perform such other activities as may be necessary or incidental to these purposes.
- Section 1. Paragraph 2. The membership of DSC shall consist of (A) anyone paying the membership fee established by the current DSC committee, or (B) anyone upon whom the current DSC committee confers a complimentary membership. Only members attending the DSC will have voting privileges and each person shall have one vote. Absentee and proxy votes are not allowed. An optional class of non-voting supporting membership may be established by the current DSC committee for persons who wish to receive DSC publications but cannot attend the convention and participate in the business meeting.
- Section 1. Paragraph 3. No part of DSC's net earnings shall be paid to its members, officers, or other private persons except in furtherance of the DSC's purposes. The DSC shall not attempt to influence legislation or any political campaign for public office. Should the DSC dissolve, its assets shall be distributed by the current DSC committee or the appropriate court having jurisdiction, exclusively for charitable purposes.
- Section 2. Paragraph 1. The voting membership of DSC shall choose the location and committee of the DSC to be held in the calendar year two years after the current DSC. Counting of all votes shall be the responsibility of the DSC committee, using the preferential ballot system as it is used in site selection voting for the World Science Fiction Convention.
- Section 2. Paragraph 2. A committee shall be listed on the ballot if it submits to the current DSC by 6:00 pm on Friday of the current DSC, the following: a list of committee officers; a contract or letter of agreement with a facility adequate to hold the DSC; and a statement that the committee agrees to abide by these rules. A committee may bid any site in the states of Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, Arkansas, Texas and all states both south and east of any of these.
- Section 3. Paragraph 1. Any proposal to amend this constitution shall require a two-thirds vote of all the votes cast on the question at the DSC meeting held at two successive DSC's.
- Section 3. Paragraph 2. DSC meetings shall be held at advertised times at each DSC. The current DSC committee shall provide the Presiding Officer for each meeting. Meetings shall be conducted in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, and any Standing Rules the meeting shall adopt.
- Section 3. Paragraph 3. The DSC constitution shall be published in the program book of each DSC. Any amendments eligible for ratification at the DSC shall also be published in the program book.



Revised ByLaws Of The Southern Fandom Confederation

SECTION 1. (a) The Sœuthern Fandom Confederation is a nonprofit organization of, by and for science fiction and fantasy fans residing in the states of the Confederacy (Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia), existing for the purpose of promoting fan and professional activity within that area.

(b) The President shall have the discretion to name as "Southern Sympathizers" persons or groups outside the South for the purpose of membership and participation in the SFC.

SECTION 2. The SFC shall meet once a year, simultaneously and at the same place as the DeepSouthCon, hereafter DSC. This meeting shall be open to all dues-paid and dues-exempt SFC members, plus interested parties. Only dues-paid or -exempt members may speak or vote except through dispensation by the presiding officer. Each meeting shall consist of: (a) a review of the previous year's activity, (b) election of officers, and (c) suggestions from the membership for activities in the year ahead.

SECTION 3. The officers of the SFC shall consist of (a) a President, (b) a Vice President, (c) a Secretary-Treasurer, with duties as follows:

(a) The President shall run the annual SFC business meeting, present a summary of the year's activities, set SFC policy on matters of controversy, publish the official SFC bulletin on a semi-annual basis, and represent the SFC at all fannish functions.

(b) The Vice President shall serve in the place of the President should the President be absent.

(c) the Secretary-Treasurer shall collect dues for the SFC, and maintain an account at a convenient bank on which only the Secretary-Treasurer or the President may draw; the Secretary-Treasurer, in conjunction with other officers, shall also maintain a file of all active Southern s.f. fans, amateur press alliances, fanzines, clubs and conventions. The Secretary-Treasurer is responsible for mailing the official bulletin at the cheapest possible rate.

All SFC officers must be residents in the Confederacy. All are elected to one-year terms, and may be elected to no more than five consecutive terms.

SECTION 4. Dues for the SFC are \$5.00 per year, a year being defined as the period between successive DeepSouthCons. The following are dues-exempt: (a) Winners of the Rebel Award presented at the DSC, (b) Individuals who have performed such service to the organization that the President feels they merit exemption, (c) SFC officers during their term of service.

SECTION 5. The official SFC bulletin shall be published on at least a semi-annual basis, though more often as finances permit. Each issue shall publish as comprehensive a list as possible of active Southern s.f. clubs, apas, and fanzines. One issue each year shall publish a roster of dues-paid and - exempt SFC members. Other contents shall be left to the discretion of the President, but shall revolve around Southern fandom's history, present activity, and future plans.

Editorial policy: (a) The bulletin shall concern itself freely with controversial matters confronting Southern Fandom. All editorial opinions shall be signed by the author and shall not be considered reflective of the opinions of any officer or the SFC itself. (b) The bulletin shall maintain a neutral position between and among competing bids for DSC, or between and among Southern contenders for a worldcon. (c) A letter column shall be printed in each issue containing a comprehensive spectrum of opinion on any matter before the SFC. (d) The SFC shall promote the candidacy of Southern fans and professionals for national honors such as the Hugo Awards. SECTION 6. This set of by-laws may be amended or replaced by the SFC members in attendance at the DSC meeting. Any amendment proposed in writing and signed by 20 or more SFC members must be brought before this meeting and voted upon. A majority of members at the meeting may cause an amendment to be brought to a vote. A 2/3 majority of members voting shall be sufficient to cause an amendment to pass. SECTION 7. All previous by-laws, rules and constitutions of the SFC are henceforth null and void.
